#### **Administrative Items**

<u>Approval of Agenda</u> The Manager asked to have Agenda item V, South Dakota Ground Water Anti-Mining Law Discussion, moved up in the order of discussion. He suggested taking the issue up following completion of the Administrative Items (II).

<u>Payment Requests</u> - The Manager presented three (3) payment requests from District-sponsored activities that required Board action. **Motion** by Kappel, seconded by Bonander to authorize payments to the South Dakota School f Mines & Technology and South Dakota State University totaling \$ 31,157.11 as requested. Motion carried unanimously.

<u>2026 Director Elections</u> - The Manager reviewed the upcoming 2026 general election cycle as it applies to the District. He noted that the current term of office for the directors from odd-numbered director areas will expire on December 31, 2026. This will impact Directors Moes (DA 1), Hawley (DA 3), Anderson (DA 5), Loveland-Swanstrom (DA 7) and Barth (DA 9).

Public notice of the impending vacancies will be published in the appropriate newspapers this coming December. Persons interested in serving in these positions may begin circulating nominating petitions on January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2026. The petitions must be submitted to the Secretary of State's Office no later than March 31<sup>st</sup>, 2026. If three or more petitions are filed for a given position, then they will be part of the June 2<sup>nd</sup> primary election, with the top two vote recipients moving on to the November 3<sup>rd</sup> general election. If only two petitions are filed, they move directly to the November 2<sup>nd</sup> general election. A single petitioner will ascend to office on January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2027. If no petitions are filed, then the remaining Board members will fill the vacancy according to South Dakota Codified Law (SDCL) 46A-3B-9.

## **South Dakota Ground Water Anti-Mining Law Discussion**

The Manager provide an overview of South Dakota Codified Law (SDCL) 46-6-3.1, which places limitations on the amount ground water which may be drawn from certain aquifers. In general, the law prohibits the withdrawal of ground water from a given aquifer in excess of the recharge to that aquifer. Ground water extracti0on in excess of recharge is sometimes referred to as 'mining.' However, there is an exception built into SDCL 46-6-3.1, and therefore the prohibition is not applied equally for all South Dakota aquifers. If the aquifer to be tapped is found <u>stratigraphically below</u> the Greenhorn Formation, <u>and</u> the user is a water distribution system (public water supply), then it is possible to get permission to withdraw water in excess of recharge. This exception is largely applies to the aquifers tapped in western South Dakota, particularly in the Black Hills region.

A recent report prepared by the United States Geological Survey has found that in places, the withdrawals from some of these aquifers is likely in excess of recharge, including the Madison aquifer

around Rapid City. Reporting on this study has prompted discussion about water management and future economic development in the region. This has included suggestions that the exception found in SDCL 46-6-3.1 should be repealed.

The Manager noted that pretty much all of the aquifers utilized within the District have been managed under the provisions of the anti-mining restriction found in SDCL 46-6-3.1 for decades. These aquifers are almost exclusively located stratigraphically above the Greenhorn Formation. He also stated that as a general rule, the over extraction of water from the ground is a bad idea. Over-extraction (mining) is unsustainable, and will eventually lead to the diminishment of the resource, to the detriment of all. It was the consensus of the Board that this was a prudent approach. However, the Board also recognized that making such a significant in code (eliminating the exception), regardless of the rationale, will have an impact on water resource management by the State.

The Board directed the Manager to solicit input on such a possible change from the SD Department of Agriculture & Natural Resources (DANR). If a move is made to amend SDCL 46-6-3.1 during the upcoming legislative session, the District is likely to be asked for a position on such a change, and the Board is seeking input from various sources. The Manager indicated he would reach out to DANR with the request.

(Director Larson left the meeting at 11:00 a.m.)

### **Annual Board Review of Open Meeting Law Requirements**

Prior to the meeting the board members were provided with a copy of the brochure "Conducting the Public's Business in Public" revised in 2025 as published on the Attorney General's website <a href="https://atg.sd.gov/docs/July%202025OpenMeetingsLaw.pdf">https://atg.sd.gov/docs/July%202025OpenMeetingsLaw.pdf</a>.

The Manager noted that earlier this year, the 2025 SD Legislature passed Senate Bill 74, <u>An Act to require the publication and review of an explanation of the open meeting laws of this state</u>. This is now part of the state code, under SDCL 1-25-13, the text of which is below:

- 1-25-13. Annual review of open meeting laws--Acknowledgment. Any agency, as defined in § 1-26-1, or political subdivision of this state, that is required to provide public notice of its meetings pursuant to § 1-25-1.1 or 1-25-1.3 must annually review the following, during an official meeting of the agency or subdivision:
  - (1) The explanation of the open meeting laws of this state published by the attorney general, pursuant to § 1-11-1; and
  - (2) Any other material pertaining to the open meeting laws of this state provided by the attorney general.

The agency or subdivision must include in the minutes of the official meeting an acknowledgment that the review was completed.

He noted that the Board operates under the open meeting law requirements, and therefore is subject to the provisions of SDCL 1-25-13. The Manager then reviewed the material found in the publication, "Conducting the Public's Business in Public."

**Motion** by Barth, seconded by Moes, to acknowledge that the Board had completed the annual review of the open meeting law as required by SDCL 1-25-13. Motion carried unanimously.



<u>Prairie Coteau Watershed Project</u> - Corey Zirbel, Project Coordinator for the Prairie Coteau Watershed Project, provided the Board with an overview of the effort, and an update on their current activities. The Project is run out of the Day County Conservation District Office in Webster, but includes much of the northern part of East Dakota (Big Sioux River basin north of Estelline and the Whetstone River and Yellow Bank River watersheds in the Minnesota River basin.

<u>Grant County Drainage Regulation</u> - Steve Berkner, Grant County Drainage Officer, provided the Board with an overview of the process by which the county oversees agricultural drainage. The Manager noted that at one time, most of the counties within the District had some form of drainage permitting/regulation. However, over the past decade, most have repealed their respective drainage ordinances, leaving Grant County as the sole entity within the District still involved.

## Adjournment

There being no further District business, Chairman Anderson declared the meeting adjourned at 11:50 a.m.
