

# THE FIVE BIOS EVERY AUTHOR NEEDS Joey Garcia - May 21st

When a radio talk show host, podcaster, or TV producer requests your bio before a scheduled interview, do you have the right document to send? What about bios for other opportunities related to the business of being an author? Too often, bios signal that a writer isn't ready for the next stage of their literary career and that can limit the chances of their book getting into the hands of readers. From this presentation, participants will learn the five specific bios they should prepare in advance of their book's publication, how to write each one, and how to use each to advance their writing goals.

Joey Garcia is a book editor and author platform coach. She helps writers get known while they're writing so there's an audience waiting to read their book once it's published. Joey's clients have had bylines in The Wall Street Journal, Smithsonian magazine, and Ms. magazine and have appeared on CNN and The Tamron Hall Show. Joey is the author of When Your Heart Breaks, It's Opening to Love and her poetry, short stories, and essays have received awards and been published in Calyx, Mslexia, Hippocampus, Creative Nonfiction magazine, Writer's Digest, The Caribbean Writer, and Hypertext.
