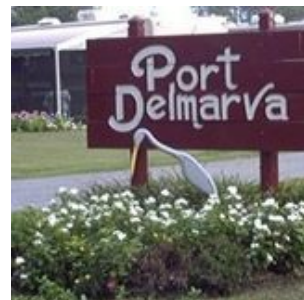


Every Day's a Pleasure

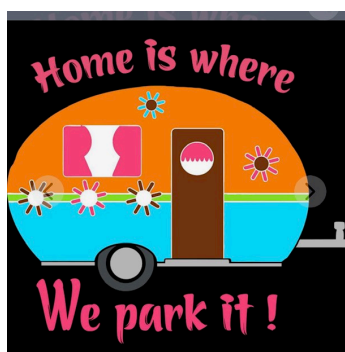

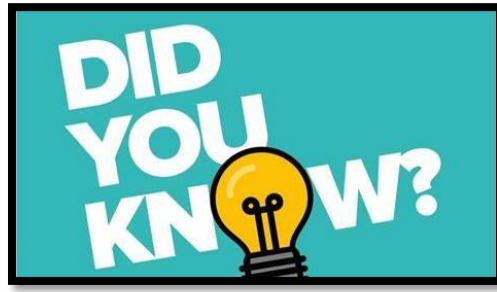


2023 FREE FISHING DAYS!

Important Propane Safety Tips For RVers

It's hard to find anyone who doesn't use propane as part of their RV experience. Propane gets used in RVs for cooking, refrigeration, and heating. Outside of the RV, propane has a host of other uses like firing up the barbecue or propane fireplace. The use of propane is so common, it's easy for RVers to take propane safety for granted.

Propane is a colorless, odorless gas that is compressed into a liquid. Since propane is a highly noxious gas that can kill quickly if a leak goes undetected, gas companies add a rotten egg smell to it. This smell helps us detect propane leaks before they can poison us. When handled correctly, propane is a stable, safe, and convenient fuel.

1. Know what to do if you smell gas.

If you already smell the rotten egg smell of a propane leak in your RV, here's what you should do:

Extinguish all flames and turn off indoor valves like the one on your stove.

Turn the propane cylinder valve off.

Leave the area of the leak immediately.

Be aware that propane is heavier than the air we breathe. Being closer to the ground, children and pets are more vulnerable to propane's toxic effects than adults.

2. Always store and transport propane tanks secured in an upright position.

In its compressed liquid state, propane is stored in metal propane cylinders. All propane cylinders are designed with a safety relief valve that will cause propane to leak out if the liquid propane inside comes into contact with the valve. This leaked propane vaporizes immediately and the resulting vapors could either ignite or cause propane toxicity.

Secure your tanks for use and transport them using the harnesses that come with your rig. If you need to take portable tanks in for a fill-up, secure them in the back of your pick-up truck using a milk crate, tie-downs, or a propane stabilizer.

3. Store and transport propane outdoors.

Don't store or transport propane tanks inside your RV or your vehicle. If you have to take them for a refill, transport your propane tanks secured in the back of a pickup truck. This is for two reasons:

If there is a propane leak inside your vehicle, you could die or be trapped in a fiery inferno.

If you are in an accident and firefighters attend, they will be focused on getting you and your family out of your vehicle. They'll be using all the tools they need to do that. If they don't suspect there is a propane tank inside your vehicle, a spark from a metal cutting tool could be disastrous.

Propane-related accidents can be catastrophic and are avoidable. Make sure you are on a safe route by planning your travels with RV LIFE Trip Wizard; you can simply select propane and RV-friendly routing options under the Routing & Driving tab to be automatically routed around tunnels that prohibit propane.

4. Keep propane valves turned off during travel.

One of the most hotly contested topics among RVers is whether you should run the fridge on propane during travel. On one side, there are RVers who passionately say they do it all the time without issue. On the other side, there are some RVers who don't want to risk it all for keeping their food and beverages cold.

The fact is, when we are traveling on highways and gravel roads with our rigs, they are subjected to shaking that can be equivalent to that of an earthquake. The parts of the propane system that make it function can theoretically be damaged during movement. All it takes is a small spark or your RV refrigerator's flame and you could be standing by the side of a highway, inhaling the carcinogenic fumes of your burning RV or worse.

The trick to avoiding this ugly and unexpected scene is to simply keep your propane valves turned off during travel. Your RV fridge is designed to keep its contents cold for a few hours even if it's off. For longer trips, you can always store cold food and beverages in a cooler, and then store them in the RV fridge when you get where you are going.

5. Keep propane cylinders cool.

Keep propane cylinders in a cool place. Don't expose them to heat above 120 degrees F. At 120 degrees, propane can start leaking or even combust.

On really hot days, it won't hurt to use Reflectix, aluminum shade cloth, or even ice to help keep your propane tanks cool. Given the high flammability of propane, it's a good idea to always keep propane cylinders away from flames.

6. Propane cylinders should be replaced when necessary.

Propane cylinders have a useful lifespan of 10 years in Canada or 12 years in the USA. There is a stamp on the collar of the tank that will give you the date of manufacture so you can tell how old it is.

In addition, propane cylinders should be carefully checked for excessive rust, corrosion, and wear and tear. Out of date or worn out propane cylinders can often be returned to anywhere that sells propane.

7. Inspect valves and hoses and regulators for leaks frequently.

Your entire propane system should be inspected at least once per year. It's best to get a certified RV technician to do this, but there are a few components close to the cylinder that you can easily check yourself and swap out if necessary. You can easily check them by spraying soapy water on them and watching for bubbles.



Amaro Spritz

This simple recipe takes the 3-2-1 spritz formula to heart, relying on just three quality ingredients. Amari styles vary wildly in viscosity and flavor, from intensely bitter to lightly sweet and floral, which means different bottles match different moods. To make sure you're always prepared, stock a few of the bitter liqueurs and start drinking. Current favorites include French China-China (spiced, earthy and orange-based), Sicilian Averna (sweet, citrusy), Californian Lo-Fi Gentian Amaro (juicy, floral) and Brooklyn-based Forthave Spirits Marseille Amaro (herbal, with warm spices). To these, add any hyper-regional bottles you've tucked into a suitcase. All spritz nicely, especially when paired with a lime wheel.

INGREDIENTS

Yield: 1 cocktail

2 ounces amaro
3 ounces dry sparkling wine
1 ounce soda water
Lime wheel



Fill a wine glass with ice, then add the amaro. Top with sparkling wine (slowly) and soda water. Add the lime wheel directly into the spritz and enjoy immediately.

Classic Italian Spritz Cocktail

Ingredients:

3 ounces prosecco (or sparkling wine of your choice)
1 ounce aperitif (such as Aperol or Campari)
club soda or sparkling water (optional, to taste)

Directions:

Fill a large wine glass with ice.

Add your aperitif of choice, then sparkling wine (slowly). Stir gently to combine. Top with soda if desired for a lighter variation.

Garish with a briny olive or orange slice and enjoy!



Eggplant Caponata Recipe

You'll love the combination of savory, sweet, and sour flavors in this creamy eggplant caponata with onions, tomato and olives! A great make-ahead appetizer to serve over crusty bread or use next to chicken or fish!



Eggplant: If you're wondering what kind of eggplant to use for caponata, you can use globe eggplant that is readily available in most supermarkets all year round. 1 large eggplant will be sufficient here.

More vegetables: 1 yellow onion chopped, 1 red bell pepper cored and chopped, 2 small celery stalks thinly sliced

Tomatoes: I use 1 cup crushed canned tomatoes here which add a ton of umami with less work.

Greek olives and capers: these both add a bit of that briny salty flavor that distinguishes caponata from ratatouille or any other eggplant dish really. about ¼ cup pitted green olives and 2 tablespoons of capers.

Sweet flavor makers: ¼ cup raisins and 2 teaspoons of honey (you can do more honey if you like yours on the sweeter side).

1 bay leaf

Crushed red pepper flakes: I use about ½ teaspoon for an extra kick)

Vinegar and wine: I used ¼ cup red wine vinegar and ¼ cup dry white wine (any dry white wine you have will do)

Fresh herbs for garnish: a little bit of parsley and fresh mint, if you have them (2 tablespoons each).

- Roast the eggplant. Cut the eggplant into 1-inch cubes and season with salt (I like to let my salted eggplant sit in a colander for a few minutes to sweat out any bitterness, but that is optional. If you do this, just be sure to pat the eggplant dry). Toss the eggplant with a generous amount of extra virgin olive oil and spread on a large sheet pan. Roast in 400 degrees F heated-oven for about 25 to 30 minutes or until fully cooked and tender.
- Cook the onions, bell peppers and celery in a large skillet with a bit of extra virgin olive oil until softened. Season with salt.
- Add the rest of the ingredients to make the sauce base. To the same skillet, add crushed tomatoes, capers, olives, raisins, honey, bay leaf and crushed pepper flakes. Stir in the vinegar and white wine. Stir to combine. Simmer on medium-low heat for 10 minutes.
- Stir in the eggplant. Since the eggplant is fully cooked, simply stir it in with the rest of the ingredients and allow it to cook for 2 to 3 minutes or so together, then finish with fresh parsley and mint. Eggplant caponata is better the next day, but if you need to serve it on the same day, let it sit at room temperature for 1 hour before serving.

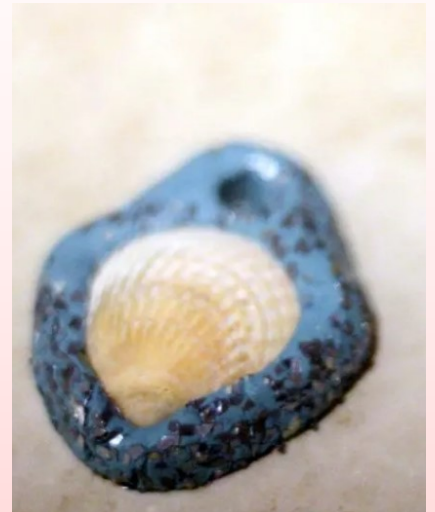

How to Make a Seashell Necklace



What you need to make a seashell necklace:

[Air dry clay](#)

[Water-based paint](#) in your choice of colors

[Glass glitter](#) (optional). Glass glitter has a higher quality finished look than regular glitter, so I prefer it for jewelry making crafts. It also has more substance and can easily be pressed into the clay

[Chalk pastels](#) (for richer color) or sidewalk chalk (optional)

[Small seashells](#)

[Sculpey Glaze](#) or [Mod Podge Super Gloss](#) + a paintbrush

[Cotton twine, thin chain](#), or similar string, Wood or glass beads (optional)

A skewer, clay tool, or the back of a paintbrush - anything that can poke a hole...

Something to protect your surface from the clay and paint.

How to make a seashell necklace:


1. Soften your clay with your fingers.
2. Flatten it and create a well in the center for your paint.
3. Add a few drops of water-based paint and mix it up.
4. Add color as needed, a little bit at a time. If you do too much at once, you'll find that the clay cakes onto your hand.

Experiment with different colors for different necklaces.

5. Press it into a coin shape at least 1/4 inch thick and larger than your shell.
6. If you want, add texture in the form of glitter or pastel shavings.
7. Press your shell into the center and shape your clay around it however you want. I did round, a teardrop, and pressed against the shell.
8. Poke a hole using a skewer or the back of a paint brush.
9. Paint on two layers of glaze, allowing it to dry in between.

When you're done, add your string, knots, and finish it off how you want.



