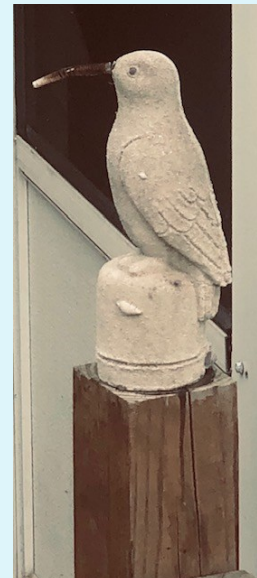

Kiwi Blueberry Mojito

Ingredients

- 6 kiwis peeled and cut in half or quartered
- 4 kiwis peeled and sliced – to be used as garnishes
- 6 ounces of blueberries to be crushed
- 6 ounce of blueberries to be kept whole as garnishes
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup fresh lime juice from 1-2 limes
- $\sim \frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar adjust to taste
- 4 ounce pack of mint leaves only
- $1 \frac{1}{2}$ – 2 cups of sparkling water
- 1 to $1 \frac{1}{2}$ cups of rum adjust based on your preference
- Ice as needed

Blue and/or green sugar to decorate glass rims

Instructions

Place the cut kiwis in a small food processor with the sugar and lime juice, pulse until you have coarse puree. Mix the kiwi puree with the rum, you can start by adding the lower amount and then adjust as you prepare the drink.

Gently crush the first 6 ounces of blueberries using a muddler.

You can make the mojitos in pitcher or in individual glasses.

Moisten the rims of the glasses with a slice of lime and garnish the rims with the sugar. If you can't find blue and/or green sugar, you can use blue/green cookie sugar sprinkles.

To make it in a pitcher, pour the kiwi puree into the pitcher, add a layer of ice, add a good amount of mint leaves and kiwi slices. Next add a few more ice cubes, and then add the crushed blueberries, some more mint leaves and whole blueberries. Top off with the sparkling water and mix gently. Taste and add more rum, sparkling water, or sugar if needed.

To make the drink in individual glasses, follow a similar process as for the pitcher, but add a few whole blueberries at the beginning. You can also add a slice of kiwi with the blueberries at the end.

Notes

To make this as a mocktail variation, just leave out the rum and replace it with additional sparkling water or sparkling lemonade.



DOG DAYS OF SUMMER

To prevent your pet from overheating, take these simple precautions provided by ASPCA experts:

We all love spending the long, sunny days of summer outdoors with our furry companions, but being overeager in hot weather can spell danger.

- Visit the vet for a spring or early-summer checkup. Make sure your pets get tested for heartworm if they aren't on year-round preventative medication.
- Pets can get dehydrated quickly, so give them plenty of fresh, clean water when it's hot or humid outdoors. Make sure your pets have a shady place to get out of the sun, be careful not to over-exercise them, and keep them indoors when it's extremely hot.
- Know the symptoms of overheating in pets, which include excessive panting or difficulty breathing, increased heart and respiratory rate, drooling, mild weakness, stupor or even collapse. Symptoms can also include seizures, bloody diarrhea and vomit along with an elevated body temperature of over 104 degrees.
- Animals with flat faces, like Pugs and Persian cats, are more susceptible to heat stroke since they cannot pant as effectively. These pets, along with the elderly, the overweight, and those with heart or lung diseases, should be kept cool in air-conditioned rooms as much as possible.
- Never leave your animals alone in a parked vehicle. Not only can it lead to fatal heat stroke, it is illegal in several states!
- Do not leave pets unsupervised around a pool—not all dogs are good swimmers. Introduce your pets to water gradually and make sure they wear flotation devices when on boats. Rinse your dog off after swimming to remove chlorine or salt from his fur, and try to keep your dog from drinking pool water, which contains chlorine and other chemicals.
- Open unscreened windows pose a real danger to pets, who often fall out of them. Keep all unscreened windows or doors in your home closed, and make sure adjustable screens are tightly secured.
- Feel free to trim longer hair on your dog, but never shave your dog: The layers of dogs' coats protect them from overheating and sunburn. Brushing cats more often than usual can prevent problems caused by excessive heat. And be sure that any sunscreen or insect repellent product you use on your pets is labeled specifically for use on animals.
- When the temperature is very high, don't let your dog linger on hot asphalt. Being so close to the ground, your pooch's body can heat up quickly, and sensitive paw pads can burn. Keep walks during these times to a minimum.
- Commonly used rodenticides and lawn and garden insecticides can be harmful to cats and dogs if ingested, so keep them out of reach. Keep citronella candles, tiki torch products and insect coils out of pets' reach as well. Call your veterinarian or the [ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center](#) at (888) 426-4435 if you suspect your animal has ingested a poisonous substance.
- Remember that food and drink commonly found at barbecues can be poisonous to pets. Keep alcoholic beverages away from pets, as they can cause intoxication, depression and comas. Similarly, remember that the snacks enjoyed by your human friends should not be a treat for your pet; any change of diet, even for one meal, may give your dog or cat severe digestive ailments. Avoid raisins, grapes, onions, chocolate and products with the sweetener xylitol. Please visit our [People Foods to Avoid Feeding Your Pets](#) page for more information.
- Please leave pets at home when you head out to Fourth of July celebrations, and never use fireworks around pets. Exposure to lit fireworks can potentially result in severe burns or trauma, and even unused fireworks can contain hazardous materials. Many pets are also fearful of loud noises and can become lost, scared or disoriented, so it's best to keep your little guys safe from the noise in a quiet, sheltered and escape-proof area of your home.

FISHING REPORT written by veteran Delaware angler Eric Burnley, Sr

Delaware Bay

Thursday, July 1, marked the opening of the Delaware Bay Summer Slot Striped Bass Season. This applies to Delaware Bay and River and all of its tributaries on the Delaware side including the Lewes and Rehoboth Canal to the Freeman Highway Bridge.

Those who target rockfish will use cut bunker, peeler crab, Gulp!, live eels and bloodworms. The best time to fish will be early in the morning or late evening or even at night. It is not unusual to find rockfish schooled up at night just outside the lightline cast from dock lights or bridges.

The Upper Bay continues to hold good numbers of white perch and catfish. Bloodworms or Fish Bites for the perch with cut bunker or a catfish stink-bait for the cats.

A few keeper trout have been caught around the bases of lighthouses on peeler crab. The shoreline at Bowers Beach has also produced a few trout on the same bait. Flounder, croaker and spot are available on Middle-Bay reef sites and will take Gulp!, minnows or squid for the flounder with bloodworms, or Fish Bites for the croaker and spot.

In the Lower-Bay the reef sites also hold flounder, croaker and spot with the occasional keeper trout. The same baits will work here as well.

The Outer and Inner walls and the Ice Breakers should begin to see some sheepshead, triggerfish and tog now that tog season has reopened. Sand fleas or green crab will be the most popular baits with peeler crab always good if you can get some. The Lewes and Rehoboth Canal continues to produce flounder on minnows, squid and Gulp!. I expect to see a few anglers target rockfish around the Savannah Road Bridge early in the morning with live eels. Croaker will be moving into the Canal as the water warms.

Indian River Inlet

Captain Aaron Hurd has been producing flounder and keeper rockfish out of the Inlet during his daytime half-day charters. He has discovered just how to work the current and around the rocks to find the fish.

The rest of us haven't had much luck during the day. This may change now that tog season has reopened. I am sure we will see more daytime fishermen now and they will not only catch tog, but sheepshead and trout on their sand flea and green crab baits.

Night time fishermen drifting sand fleas have been catching the occasional keeper rockfish. Working live eels can also attract the larger stripers.

No sign of blues or Spanish mackerel at the inlet so far this year.

Surf Fishing

I fished Three Rfs Road on Tuesday morning and never had a bite except from the always hungry flies. On Wednesday they had bluefish there. And so it goes.

A few scattered kings, croaker, spot and blues along the surf, but mostly it is barren.

I was surprised on Tuesday by the very few fishermen on the beach when I arrived around 6:30 a.m. I left between 10:30 11 a.m. and still there were very few trucks on the sand. I can promise you it won't be that way this weekend.

Inshore Ocean

The inshore waters have been a bit rough, but when the boats can get out, they are still catching sea bass and flounder. Limits of sea bass are still possible, but flounder limits are rare. Spanish mackerel are available at Fenwick Shoals.

Offshore Ocean

Both yellowfin and bigeye tuna have been caught at the Poorman's and Washington canyons. The number of yellowfins dropped off last week, but the size of the bigeyes increased to over 200 pounds. If you have ever seen 200 pounds of tuna fish explode on a lure behind your boat, it is a sight you will never forget.

Deep-dropping is still good for tilefish. Both golden and blueline hit the cleaning table last week.

Holiday Weekend

This is the 4th of July weekend and while it seems impossible that we could possibly get any more people at the beach, I am sure we will.

The state parks will most certainly fill up quickly and the waters will be full of boats. It will be very difficult to avoid a crowd. If you seriously want to catch a fish, plan to be on the water at least a half-hour before sunrise. Do this even if you only plan to fish the surf or the Inland Bays.

Getting out this early has several advantages. First you will have the water pretty much to yourself. Second, you will be there when the fishing should be the best. Third, you will be fishing during the coolest part of the day.

Finally, those late afternoon thunderstorms will find you napping in air-conditioned comfort.
