Consumers and some businesses in Delaware will no longer be able to use or distribute single -use plastic carryout bags at the point-of-sale starting January 1. Plastic carryout bags are commonly used to take items home from convenience, grocery and other retail stores. The Delaware Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control urges consumers to bring reusable bags to stores instead and to clean/disinfect those bags between uses. The ban is designed to reduce beach and roadside litter, save landfill space, increase recycling efforts and help recycling facilities from having to shut down when plastic bags get stuck in the machinery.

"Each Delawarean uses about 434 plastic bags and that means nearly 2,400 tons of plastic bags end up in our landfills annually," said DNREC Secretary Shawn Garvin. "A decrease by the public of plastic carryout bags can mitigate a large portion of this waste, and help our environment by reducing the amount plastic bags on our roads and waterways that can harm us and our wildlife."

House Bill 130 implementing the ban was sponsored by 12 legislators led by Rep. Gerald Brady and Sen. Trey Paradee, and was passed in 2019 and signed by Gov. John Carney. Retailers can choose to offer paper bags, or cloth bags, or a thicker type of plastic bag that is designed to be reusable. The law allows retail stores to charge a fee for the bags they provide at point of sale. DNREC advises consumers to wash or disinfect their reusable bags by turning them inside out and wiping them down with a disinfecting agent after each use. Under the law, plastic carryout bags will no longer be available from larger stores (more than 7,000 square feet) as well as smaller stores with at least three locations in Delaware of 3,000 square feet each or more. Supermarkets and big-box stores are affected, as well as chains of convenience stores. Restaurants are not subject to the ban, nor are small stores with one or two locations.

All retail stores affected by the law are required to provide an At-Store Recycling program for plastic bags and other specific plastics, like cereal box liners, newspaper sleeves, and single-use produce or meat bags. The drop-off locations should be visible and accessible within the store. Bags that are no longer reusable or unwanted should be recycled at these locations. Plastic bags should not be placed in carts that are part of the state's curbside recycling program but should instead be returned to stores for recycling.

Ingredients


Ingredient Checklist

Pets At The Port



Good day to all the pet owners in the Port. My name is Betsy Hickman and I am the pet liaison to the Board. I have recently moved my site in the park and I can now be found on site 20.

I just want to remind all the pet owners, primarily dog owners of a few rules that you are expected to follow.

- All pet paperwork such as rabies certificate and a copy of your homeowners insurance must be handed in to Kim Carroll, the Boards President not me. I am not doing the paperwork anymore. I realize every pet gets their vaccines at different times, but to start off this year, regardless of already handing it in last year, it would be appreciated if you could get that info in ASAP. Kim has already given everyone instructions on how to send it to her. If you have a hard copy just put it in the mailbox at the office. Thank you.
- 6 foot or less, are the only leashes allowed in the park. No flexi leashes regardless of the length.
- Always carry a bag to clean up behind your pet. Please continue to keep our park clean. Disposal of waste should be thrown into the dumpster rather then gather in piles on your pads.
- See me for a blue reflector to be placed about 6 feet from your hitch when you go out and leave your pet behind. This alerts your neighbors your pet is in the trailer in case of the power goes out. Leave your phone number with a few friends so they can get in touch with you during an emergency.
- If you have a complaint about someone's dog, please try and talk to them first before coming to me. If that doesn't work please feel free to come and discuss your concerns with me.

Last but not least, enjoy sharing your summer with your dog, cat or birds and be safe.

Governor John Carney issued the 10th revision to the COVID-19 emergency order, easing outdoor table size restrictions in restaurants and suspending Delaware Interscholastic Athletic Association (DIAA) masking regulations to ensure consistency with the Governor's emergency orders and guidance from the Division of Public Health (DPH). **In effect as of 4/28/21**

For Restaurants (effective immediately):

- Tables <u>inside</u> food and drink establishments are limited to <u>parties of six (6) persons</u> (no restrictions or max number of adults).
- Tables in <u>outdoor spaces</u> are limited to <u>parties of ten (10) individuals</u>
 (no restrictions or max number of adults).
- Signage can be removed, stating that parties at each table should be of the same household.
- Condiments and place settings may now remain on tables (no longer required to removed or wiped down between each use).
- Hand-washing/Sanitizing/Cleaning & Disinfecting guidelines have also been updated (removal of high frequency cleaning requirements and return to pre-COVID standards).
- No change to bar seating at this time.
