Your kitten's poop tells you a lot about how they are handling their food and about their overall health. Below are two guides to help you assess the deposits in your kitten's litter box.

| Bloody                                    | A small amount of blood is normal and should pass in a day or two.   | Monitor. If it continues more than 24 hours, call Kitten Central.                  |
| Mucous                                    | Yellowish/white/clear slimy substance. Often found in newborns.  | Treatment is Pen G injection. Call Kitten Central.                                 |
| Black                                     | True dark black color to stool. Usually indicates bleeding high in the bowel.  | Call Kitten Central for advice   |
| Brown                                     | Normal color. Be happy!!   | Do a 'Happy Dance'.  |
| Orange                                    | Usually indicates too much bile in the stool; can occur with reflux.   | Treatment is Pepcid. Call Kitten Central.  |
| Yellow                                    | Almost always indicates bacterial imbalance in the bowel. If the kitten also has diarrhea, usually related to coccidian. | Treatment can be Marquis Paste or Panacur/Flagyl combination. Call Kitten Central. |
| White                                     | Grossly abnormal color, usually indicates severe bacterial imbalance and severe infection in the bowel.                  | Treatment is Clavamox with FortiFlora. Call Kitten Central.                        |

## FECAL SCORE CHART

Fecal consistency is primarily a function of the amount of moisture in the stool and can be used to identify changes in colonic health and other problems. Ideally, in a healthy animal, stools should be firm but not hard, pliable and segmented, and easy to pick up (Score 2).



Score 1

Very hard and dry; requires much effort to expel from the body; no residue left on ground when picked up. Often expelled as individual pellets.



Firm, but not hard; should be pliable; segmented in appearance; little or no residue left on ground when picked up.



Score 3

Log-like; little or no segmentation visible; moist surface; leaves residue, but holds firm when picked up.



Score 4

Very moist (soggy); distinct log shape visible; leaves residue and loses form when picked up.



Score 5

Very moist but has distinct shape (piles rather than distinct logs); leaves residue and loses form when picked up.



Has texture, but no defined shape; occurs as piles or as spots; leaves residue when picked up.



Score 7

Watery, no texture, flat; occurs as puddles. Leaves residue.
