Winter greetings ACF sponsors, donors and friends!

WE DID IT!!! Every single student and their family received the gift of light for their home this past Christmas. I want to extend a big THANK YOU to everyone who gave to our holiday solar light campaign. What an amazing group of people you all are!

Other exciting news; our first two students have graduated and two more are on their way to university in the spring! That makes a total of seven post secondary students in five different institutions.

Dori (sponsored by Mike & Jan McKinley) hopes to work in the Serena Hotel (a 5 star lodge where Leonard worked years ago) which is close to her home in Amboseli. Therefore she has decided to go for the Pastry & Baking certification.



ACF Scholarship Fund

One of the key elements that sets ACF apart from many other child sponsoring charities, is that we provide funds for universities or vocational and technical schools. We feel this higher education is absolutely vital in breaking the cycle of poverty for these youth and bringing about real change. That being said, school fees at this level along with room and board are quite a bit higher than our regular sponsorship covers.

First, we provide the student with a cell phone (cost approximately \$200) which allows us to have direct communication with eachother for reports, money transfer and so forth. Secondly, we provide their student housing furniture (which consists of a bed, desk, hot plate, kitchen utensils and cookware, bedding, towels and school supplies - approx cost \$350).

We pay their monthly rent which includes wifi, electricity and water. Cost is typically \$120 per month. (This is the first time in their lives that they will have an actual toilet and running water!)

Parents are responsible for food and personal items - which may not sound like a lot, but for

Charity (sponsored by Basia Christ) has set her sights on a Clinical Medicine & Surgery diploma which is similar to being a physicians assistant. She will be able to work in hospitals or community clinics. (I'm giving you all the details because I feel like a proud Mum of these kids!!)

We've also had some excitement at the primary school level. Five of our children were accepted into the prestigious Presentation Academy in Kimana. Caleb, Collins, Susan, Benson and little Amy. They had to sit for a personal interview plus an entrance exam. This is a fairly new school - I visited last August and it's impressive even by U.S. standards.

Thankfully most of our students are flourishing but for those that are having some challenges, Anne has arranged for tutoring. It is typically Math and English that they struggle with, but regardless we are committed to ensuring their success.

Other exciting happenings include possible collaboration with similar non-profits working in Kenya. These NGO's do not necessarily sponsor education, rather their focus might be on providing clean water or micro-loans or agriculture/livestock as a business...etc.

Our Maasai families and villages are so very remote that most non-profits simply won't consider this area. Yet our families desperately need the services I mentioned above. Education will always be our first priority, but we are in a position now to campaign for even more. How amazing would it be if we can partner with other organizations and bring water and various services and opportunities to the people of this region?

What we envision for the future allows for continued expansion. And as more of our students graduate, Leonard and Anne can have some assistance which will enable us to add greater numbers of sponsored children.

And don't forget, in 2026 we will be offering a group trip to Kenya. Sponsors will be able to meet their student and everyone will see firsthand the work we are doing with the Maasai in Amboseli. It will truly be a lifechanging experience! (See box below for more information.)

In conclusion....please let me reiterate - regardless of the challenges we face in

those with so little it can be a challenge. However, we want the student and family to have some "skin in the game" as the saying goes.

Finally we cover their tuition fee which can range from \$800 to \$2500 annually depending on the program and institution.

As you can see, it's quite a bit more than the \$576 annual sponsorship fee that covers primary and secondary schooling. **But when compared to a college education in the** *U.S.* it is incredibly inexpensive.

Ofcourse, not every sponsor is able to cover these additional costs, so a few years ago we started the **ACF Scholarship Fund.** This benefits our post secondary students, but it also helps pay for the school break gatherings three times a year and miscellanous costs (such as transport or emergency dental or medical care or children waiting to receive a sponsor).

The Scholarship Fund has proven to be the perfect fit for individuals who may not be ready to sponsor a child and/or organizations that just want to show their support of our mission.

That being said - this fund always needs replenishing and even small amounts go a long way. We're asking your help to spread the word with co-workers, family and friends.



My original idea was to have a business that would help preserve our culture while utilizing the tailoring and beading skills that I have.

With the funds raised by ACF I was able to rent a shop in a Maasai market which gets a lot of foot trafic on market days - both local people and tourists.

Each item sold in the shop is handmade, showcasing the intricate beadwork and detailed craftsmanship that the Maasai are known for. The shop is also a celebration of the rich heritage of our people.

The opening of the shop is not just a business venture but a step towards economic empowerment for the Maasai women. We believe that through our art and craftsmanship, we can create sustainable livelihoods while keeping our traditions alive.

The sewing machine helped me create more fashion and designs with the Maasai shukas (body wrap), bringing a unique blend of traditional craftsmanship and modern styles. Your support made all the difference. THANK YOU and may God bless you!


