Both Exciting and Procedural Changes Await PV Students Starting School

School begins this week and Plateau Valley Staff are excited to see the faces of each and every student, with or without a mask. While the goal is to return to fulltime in-person learning for all students, protocols could still change at any time. But no matter what happens, Principal Trevor Long emphasized his goal of maintaining a positive environment for each and every student as they begin the new school year. Teachers started back last week and worked collaboratively with administration to help make the transition seamless and welcoming.

Families have two options. Students can return to in-person

learning at the school, Option 1, or they can choose to enroll in their fully online learning program through Colorado Digital Learning Solutions (CDLS), Option 2. The online option allows for students to maintain enrollment in PV School with a full class schedule following all district requirements for curriculum/policies, a district issued computer or device, and tuition paid for by the school district. They may also participate in extracurricular activities but may not attend functions on campus during the day. Students and parents are responsible for monitoring their progress.

Option 1 participants will want

to double check the protocols listed on the school's website to make sure they are following suggested procedures. All students will be expected to wear a face mask when entering the building at designated entrances and when in the halls. Each high school student will be required to wear a mask for the entirety of the day as their mixed schedule prevents them from establishing set cohorts. Junior High Students will be allowed to remove coverings when inside a classroom. Teachers will move to the cohort classroom, reducing transitions. Students will once again wear masks when





Meekness

Something I find interesting in my life story, is my understanding of being meek or humble. I grew up being told that men don't cry, that men are strong, that real men don't ask for directions and that we were never to show weakness. The word meek in many people's eyes is translated as weak or milk toast, or someone's doormat. There is still a generation of men with this understanding, but my concept of the word changed when I became a Christian.

You see the scripture in Matthew 5:5 "Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth," has been a struggle for many throughout the years. What does it really mean though? The word we translate as meek in Greek is *praus*.

The Greek word "praus" (prah-oos) was used to define a horse trained for battle. Wild stallions were brought down from the mountains and broken for riding. Some were used to pull wagons, some were raced, and the best were trained for warfare. They retained their fierce spirit, courage, and power, but were disciplined to respond to the slightest nudge or pressure of the rider's leg. They could gallop into battle at 35 miles per hour and come to a sliding stop at a word. They were not frightened by arrows, spears, or torches. Then, they were said to be "meeked." To be "meeked" was to be taken from a state of wild rebellion and made completely loyal to, and dependent upon, one's master (an excerpt from Sam Whatley in River Regions Journey).

So, if that was the understanding for the word in the time of the writing of scripture, and it was, then many have misunderstood what was being asked of them. In Matthew 11:29-30 it says, "Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle (meek) and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." When Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 10:1 "... meekness and gentleness of Christ..." he is describing this kind of obedience. Jesus did not suffer on the cross because he wasn't strong enough to resist, but because He was strong enough to be obedient as is displayed in Philippians 2:6-8 "who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross." And we, too, are called to demonstrate power under control. Through the Holy Spirit we can forgive those who hurt us. We can withhold our spiteful replies. We can be the first to apologize. We can be a servant to others. We can be meek (another

excerpt from Sam Whatley in River Regions Journey). So, let us meet to-gather as a church displaying meekness. Coming together in Him,

traveling in the hallway to the bathroom, cafeteria, and other transitions. K-6 students will be allowed to remove face coverings when inside the classroom.

But there are other exciting changes occurring at PV this year. Teachers Jacque Satterfield and Bert Hill will team up for the new 5th/6th grade group. Moving 6th grade back down to elementary will allow the 6th graders to grow more socially, emotionally, and physically, along with meeting their academic needs in a more appropriate manner. Sixth graders will also take on new leadership roles within the elementary. Switching to a junior high better meets the school's mission and vision for the students. High school teachers are also teaching junior high classes allowing for

more vertical alignment between the schools. Junior high students will transition to high school more seamlessly as they have had exposure to consistent teaching practices and increased rigor. The junior high and high school bell schedules will be the same, they will have semester grades with quarter progress reports, and high school students will be able to serve as positive role models to junior high students through limited, but monitored, exposure with the younger students. A morning break after 2nd period and an afternoon break after 6th period have also been added allowing an opportunity to get a snack, socialize or get some fresh air each school day.

Another positive change is for the Senior Class of 2021. Each senior will have an independent

Senior Seminar where they will be required to create and complete a post high school plan for either joining the work force, continued education, or the military. Each student will also have five hours of community service required along with various interviews or steps specific to the path of their choice.

The masks and varied entrances for each school might cause the school to look a little different than before, but those changes are superficial compared to the growth occurring on the inside. The community already had reason to be proud of its local school, but with these changes, the school will only continue to strengthen and challenge the students, readying them for a quality life after high school, no matter where their paths may lead them.

Beginning the 2020-21 school year, Plateau Valley School students will experience school-wide programming features, <u>Cowboy GRIT</u> that provides clear expectations for what behaviors they are expected to know and be able to perform in the school setting(s)-that will help develop PV students into happy and successful individuals that are prepared for life after graduation!

With newly revised mission and vision targets developed by our board of education, along with staff member and community survey input, our school has worked collaboratively to identify new core values. " **R**esilience – Overcome Obstacles, Hard Working, and Desire.

"Inspiration – Motivate, Hope, Confidence.

"Teamwork – Cooperative, Respectful, Supportive

Our PK-6 grade programs will include a positive behavior support (PBIS) system that includes regular student celebrations for

accomplishments and growth toward GRIT value development. Secondary students (7-12) will be involved in a newly developed

Advisory class that provides exposure and opportunity for life af-

ter high school that includes GRIT values outside of our school building

within the real world setting, that will teach our student why GRIT skills are relevant and of value.

We are working with our local businesses to form partnerships that support student recognition and reward behaviors that

exemplify Plateau Valley GRIT. Together, our school and communities will be successful in developing students with our district's core

values and, at the same time, we believe kids will develop essential qualities that will ultimately make our community & world a better

place!





Drought Conditions Worsen as Ranchers See Major Crop and Pasture Losses Across the State

With the entire state in some form of drought, PV CattleWomen and Colorado CattleWomen wanted to remind ranchers about the FSA programs which may be helpful if eligible.

The Agriculture Department's Farm Service Agency announced Friday, August 7, that emergency requests for haying and grazing on Conservation Reserve Program acres will be based on drought severity as determined by the U.S. Drought Monitor, rather than requests that originate with FSA at the country level and require state and national level approval.

Check the FSA website for fact sheets about each program, but your local FSA office is the expert about eligibility and the ins and outs of each program. LFP (Livestock Forage Program) covers grazing losses due to drought on improved or native pastureland and also covers losses of forage of rangeland managed by the federal government and loss forage due to wildfire. ELAP (Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm-Raised Fish Program) covers losses not covered by any other program (LFP or LIP) and provides financial assistance for disease, weather or other loss, but does include hauling water to livestock.

Fires Ravage Western Colorado

Fire Danger remains incredibly high as dry and windy conditions continue to threaten all of Colorado. The Pine Gulch Fire began on July 31 and after two weeks, the fire is still only 7% contained and is still unpredictable. It has reached more than 42,000 acres and continues to grow. Parts of Garfield County have been evacuated and Mesa County is on alert for possible evacuation. Hundreds of firefighters have gathered to fight the Pine Gulch fire.

In DeBeque, a local restaurant, Wild Horse Roadhouse, organized pre-paid meals for the firefighters from community members. Within a short amount of time, the owners had received enough donations to provide a meal to every firefighter.

Resources are stretched even further with the addition of the Grizzley Creek Fire which started on Monday, August 10th. Traveling along I-70, the fire closed the highway in both directions from Glenwood to Dotsero from Monday on. The fire has grown to over 1300 acres, is 0% contained, and some evacuations are under way.
