Growing Things

Winter Care for Fruit Trees

Our fruit trees may look like they barely exist this time of year, but they are really just resting up for the upcoming production of leaves and fruit in spring.

Winter Care

Despite their apparent lack of activity, fruit trees need winter care. They need protection from hungry animals that will eat their bark and, if there is now snow, they will need to be watered.

Vole Control

Voles are small rodents, kind of like mice, with rounded bodies and with very short tails. They eat the bark around the bottom of fruit trees, going around in a circle, eventually girdling the trunk. Girdling will kill a tree. Weed whacking too close to the trunk of a tree will also girdle (and kill) it.

While some vole control methods are more effective at other times of the year, "vole stompin" can and should be done throughout the winter months. Voles make tunnels in the grass beneath the snow. Vole stompin crushes those tunnels.

Vole Stompin'

Dress warmly in layers. You will be cold at first and will heat up with the stompin'. Wear shoes with fairly flat soles. Muck or snow boots should work well.

- Determine the drip line by looking at the farthest reach of the branches and then go straight down to the ground.
- Stomp around the drip line, which should roughly be a circle.
- Stomp moving inward towards the tree trunk in sections, stopping a few inches from the trunk. Be sure to stomp every bit of snow down well.

I find that singing or listening to music makes the vole stomp more like a dance. Some of my favorite vole stompin' songs are:

Vole stompin' is a great activity for beating cabin fever. It's a good way to give antsy kids some exercise and something to do outdoors.

<u>Water</u>

If you don't have a nice, deep snow cover, apply two gallons of water per inch of trunk diameter from the drip line inwards to the trunk once a month.

Dirty Work to get Easier for Public Works

Some may notice Keith Encke and Mike Nichols around town using new equipment. This new equipment will not only save Keith and Mike time as they take care of your streets, water lines, sewer lines, and parks, but will also save the Town money in the long-term and reduce our risk of violating requirements from the State.

One of the new pieces of equipment you will see is a Jet Vac. This piece of equipment is on a trailer and can be hauled anywhere it is needed in Town. This piece of equipment allows us to do several things. First, and foremost, it allows us to clean sewer lines, gutters, and drains preventing backups and damage that could be caused by a sewer line or drain block.

The new Jet Vac will also help us prevent a closure at the school. Did you know that the Town operates a lift station which moves sewage from the school to the Town's sewage treatment facility? In the event the lift station should experience a service issue, such as equipment failure or serious power outage, the School district would have to shut the school down. If the school isn't shut down, it is possible that that sewage could spill into Plateau Creek. The State would not like that, and the Town would end up with violations and possibly fines. The new Jet Vac can be used to pump and transport that sewage to the sewage treatment facility while repairs are made to the lift station preventing a disruption in school. A catastrophic failure could still potentially lead to a school closure, but smaller issues are now something we can address with little impact to our kids.

Public Works has also acquired a new UTV. This vehicle will replace older run down ATVs, and will allow Public Works to get to hard to reach places, move between our parks, water, and sewer facilities easily, and are less expensive to operate than our standard trucks. We will save money on repairs and maintenance of older vehicles, and as a small bonus, can also use the UTV during events such as Heritage Days to quickly maneuver between different events occurring across town.

Wolves and the Cost of Romance

Our state is a champion of equality; yet it's on the brink of a great inequity as we head towards the November ballot and a vote on wolf introduction in Colorado. The ballot measure asks voters to approve forced wolf introduction; even though most voters won't be impacted by the consequences; even though we already have wolves in the state; and even though experts at Colorado Parks and Wildlife and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service have repeatedly chosen not to release wolves in Colorado. Wolf advocates are in overdrive as they rush to restore the howl in Colorado. While some may be enthralled with the romance and wildness of wolves; to others the howl is a death knell, a forewarning that on the landscape, something will die.

The inconvenient truth is wolves don't recognize property boundaries and don't stay on public lands. Approximately fifty percent of wolf depredation (wolves killing livestock) in Idaho and Wyoming occurs on private property. The ballot initiative gives a token nod to livestock losses, but there's no guarantee that money will be available. Our high-country winters drive elk and deer herds (prey base for wolves) down to lower elevation, more densely populated areas which ensures conflict between wolves and people.

Trying to find a parking place at the congested trailheads and campgrounds in our national forests should give one pause for thought about the wildness of Colorado. Our state aggressively promotes Western Slope tourism and outdoor recreation. The days of yesteryear are gone, and wolves roaming unfettered across the landscape is problematic at best.

The ballot measure is devoid of any redress for the many wildlife species impacted, and costs created by the presence of this apex predator. Where wolf packs are present,

elk, moose, and deer populations decline due to predation and relocation. Relocation of prey species (fleeing from the presence of wolves) brings its own suite of unintended consequences. Of particular concern for Colorado is the spread of chronic wasting disease, when wolves change distribution patterns of infected wildlife; and also serve as a vector to spread the disease. In other states with established wolf populations, deer and elk seek a protected haven on farm and ranch land which may increase the potential for human health concerns such as lyme disease and hydatid (gray wolf) disease.

The wolf issue is rife with irony. The latest pitch is that wolves aren't very successful hunters, they're often injured and their small, weak jaws can barely hold onto prey. This leads you to believe that wolves can barely feed themselves. However, wolves are doing just fine, and naturally migrating into Colorado. Wolves are highly adaptable, and very successful at expanding their territory. There are now more than 2,100 wolves roaming the northern Rockies, including Colorado.

To their disciples, wolves occupy an infallible ecological pedestal, but the cost of romance is high for those that pay the price...our elk, deer, and cherished moose herds; our brave and valiant livestock protection dogs that give their lives to protect their flocks; our cattle and sheep; and most assuredly someone's beloved dog or horse. No amount of reimbursement money can mend a broken heart when our four-legged best friends meet a terrifying and horrific death because wolves passed by.

Colorado is touted as the "missing link" to "restore" wolves to their "historic" range from Canada to Mexico. Some of you may remember, the call to action to restore the Mexican wolf to its historic range in New Mexico and Arizona. The Mexican wolf recovery pro-

gram was created to preserve the distinct population segment and unique genetic characteristics of this small desert wolf. Now to complete the "missing link", Colorado may be poised to cast upon the landscape, untold numbers of larger, more aggressive, more resilient northern gray (Canadian) wolves. I cannot suppress my cowboy colloquialism as hypocrisy runs roughshod over the \$44 million dollars spent to preserve the Mexican wolf. "If you saddled the horse, ride it; and don't change horses midstream." Distinct population segments used to be the darling of the carnivore advocacy world, but now they sing a different tune, "a wolf is a wolf." Apparently, they forgot which horse they rode into town on.

We live in a valley filled with men and women who have ensured our freedom. These service members have offered their lives in the defense of the greatest country on Earth.

NAME: Skip Clifton BRANCH: US NAVY

This is a six-part series submitted by Faith Clifton. These stories highlight one family's military service to our country dating back generations. If it were not for fami- and was sent to Florida for lies like these, we would not be enjoying the freedoms we have today.

Skip Clifton was from the greatest generation our country has seen. We were attacked at home, he flew hundreds and many like him decided to take the fight to the enemy. Thank you Sir for your service to our Community and Country.

- Commander, Post 86

Kermit (Skip) Clifton was in his senior year in Collbran Union High School when Pearl Harbor was attacked in December 1941. He insisted his parents sign for him (he wasn't quite old enough

to enlist) so he could join the Navy. They said when he graduated from high school he could the Grand Junction area and join up. He pestered them for months to sign for him (the school graduated the seniors a month early that year).

Skip enlisted in the Navy Basic Training, then to flight school. He eventually flew airplanes on and off aircraft

carriers. He of missions as dive bomber pilot in the Pacific Theater.

After the war heattended Denver University where he earned a Degree in Law. He married Lois Kraai and

they had 5 children, 3 boys and 2 girls. He livedmost of his life in Ground Hog Gulch - the ranch up Buzzard Creek in Collbran. He later married Jill Sorenson Kincaid.

Skip was killed on a 4-wheeler while checking fences in Ground HogGulch in 1997.
