Community Saturday at Collbran's Public Library on January 11th brought Kyle Compton, the administrative assistant at Vega State Park, along with a stuffed owl, to teach guests all about the majestic night predators.

If asked what sound an owl makes, most might say "who, who", but owls make a variety of sounds and one local owl sounds similar to a woman screaming. Their eyes are on the front of their face as they are predators, not prey. They eat rodents, and skunks. After consuming their prey, the owl's gizzard "packages" up all the parts they cannot digest, like hair and bones, and it forms a "pellet" which they can later regurgitate. Guests then had the opportunity to dissect owl pellets themselves with the help of tweezers and other tools useful in dissecting. The brave patrons dissected the pellets and the squeamish ones looked over the printouts in order to identify the variety of bones discovered. One pellet contained an intact jaw bone of a mouse. Another patron found the remains of more than four mice in one pellet.

Kyle also shared the importance of

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being mindful of animals while enjoying nature. A guest at Vega left a fishing pole unattended for a long period of time and an owl flew close and got tangled in the line. Growing Things

Asparagus

One of my favorite late springtime activities is searching for wild asparagus. Unfortunately, it is also everyone else's favorite springtime activity! I caught someone

around in one of our fields (near a wild asparagus patch). When I asked him what he was up to, he said he was "Looking for a machine part that someone stole from my place. Thought they might have thrown it over here." Yeah, right!

A few years ago, on a very hot day, I failed to bring water along with me as I searched for wild asparagus. Instead, I just ate some of the asparagus I had picked when I felt thirsty. As the day wore on, I got thirstier and thirstier and ate more and more asparagus. By the time I got home, I was extremely thirsty and pretty dehydrated. I suspected that asparagus was possibly a diuretic and an online search bore this out. Please see <u>https://</u> <u>pubchem.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/</u> <u>compound/Asparagine</u>.

Growing Asparagus

Asparagus is fairly easy to grow and maintain. It is a perennial and can live up to twenty years with proper care.

Varieties

The two varieties that I am familiar with are Mary Washington and Purple Passion. Mary Washington is an old, historic cultivar. It produces fairly small green stalks and goes to seed at the end of summer. Purple Passion is a more recent cultivar with large, purple-green stalks. It is an "all male," type, which means that it does not produce seed. I get my root crowns from Nourse Farms: <u>https://</u> <u>www.noursefarms.com/search/?</u> <u>query=asparagus&submit</u>=.

<u>How Many Plants?</u> We have 21 plants and there are just two of us. We occasionally have enough left over to freeze.

<u>Planting</u>

Asparagus does not like company (even its own). Choose a spot far from other plants and also where lily crops (onions, garlic, chives, etc.) have not been grown and that has easy access to water. Make a plan for putting the root crowns at least three feet on center from each other. Place each root grown with roots spread out in circular fashion on the ground and measure the diameter. Add an inch and that will be the diameter of the planting hole. For Martha Washington, dig down twelve inches. For Purple Passion, dig down eight inches. Trim about 1/2 inch off of the ends off of the crown roots with a fingernail or toenail clipper to encourage them to grow. Soak the root crowns overnight in compost tea. Place each root crown in its hole and cover with three inches of soil. followed by about 2 Tbsp. of well-composted cow manure. Every few months, add another layer of soil plus cow manure until the hole is filled in. We sometimes mulch with the charcoal from old wood fires. It has a high pH and asparagus likes that.

<u>Care</u>

Keep the plants well watered. Do not allow them to dry out. Fertilize with vegetable fertilizer and/or well-composted cow manure every spring and fall. The asparagus beetle is the main pest. It is dark orange with black spots and looks a bit like an elongated ladybug. Get a bucket of soapy water. Pick off the beetles, larvae, and any eggs you may see on the spears and put them in the bucket.

<u>Harvesting</u>

Do not pick any spears the first year. The second year, pick only a few. The third year, pick a few more. In subsequent years you can pick even more but always leave some stalks in the ground.

To harvest a stalk, hold it fairly close to the ground and bend it until it breaks. If it doesn't break, move your fingers up the stalk and try again.

Sautéed Asparagus

Sautéed asparagus is so very easy to make. All you need is a cast iron skillet with a lid, some butter and/or oil (olive, sesame, or whatever you like), washed asparagus cut to any size that you like (as long as it will fit in the skillet), and, optionally, some fresh, peeled garlic cloves, or dried ground or powdered garlic.

- In a skillet, heat the butter or oil on medium heat until melted and runny.
- Add asparagus pieces and stir to coat with butter/oil and cook for about three minutes.
- Add garlic (if using), stir for about a minute.
- Cover skillet with lid and allow to steam for a couple more minutes.

Serve as a side dish with breakfast, lunch, and/or dinner or in pasta.

Asparagus for Later

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Perseverance

Jesus is clear. This is a really a good thing but in today's world it also ruffles some feathers. In Matthew 12:30, Jesus draws a line in the sand. "Whoever is not with me is against me." There are a couple interpretations of this statement, but they are complementary in application. The second interpretation says those who do not come together with Him in fellowship as the Body of Christ actually scatter His people instead, meaning they help push people away from Christ. While these are different understandings, the differences don't matter if Jesus has commanded us to gather for His purposes. Church provides that opportunity.

Paul, in Ephesians 2 describes Jesus as the Chief Cornerstone. "In Him the whole building is joined together and rises to become a holy temple in the Lord. And in Him you (plural) too are being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit. (vv. 21-22, NIV). The Church is a spiritual assembly, but Jesus intends His home, His abode, to be a physical expression of His presence in the world, one that is instrumental in carrying out His purposes. As a Christian who desires to be obedient to your Lord's purposes. Are we guilty of scattering instead of gathering? BEEF PROMOTION OPERATING COMMITTEE

Another piece outlined by The Act and The Order is the Beef Promotion Operating Committee. This important group of 20 producers and importers is created by appointed positions from the Cattlemen's Beef Board (10 members) and the Federation of State Beef Councils (10 members). This committee oversees the distribution each year of nearly \$40 million of national Beef Checkoff dollars to beef industry contractors to do the work outlined in The Act and The Order. Funding decisions must be made together by both national and state-level decision-makers, with great consideration to the balance between the national and regional needs of producers. No funding decision can be made without approval from at least two thirds, or 14 of the Operating Committee members, so neither the CBB nor the Federation can dictate where funding goes. As such, programs must show great benefit to the industry as a whole to get approved.

BEEF CHECKOFF CONTRACTORS

The Beef Checkoff currently partners with eight national non-profit, beef industry-governed organizations we call contractors. All contractors are vetted, audited, and reviewed regularly by the Cattlemen's Beef Board. Each contractor must meet specific criteria to receive Beef Checkoff funding, a process that can take up to a year to facilitate. In fact, the U.S. Cattlemen's Association just became a new contractor this year.

The Act and The Order states that contractors to the checkoff be national non-profit industrygoverned organizations that are gov- • erned by a board of directors representing the beef industry, and have been active and ongoing for at least two years. All contractors work on a cost-recovery basis, meaning they must do the work outlined in their funding request and then seek reimbursement for their costs. This allows for the Cattlemen's Beef Board to have direct oversight of expenses that use checkoff funds. If expenses are submitted that do not meet The Act and The Order, they are not reimbursed. Thus, the checkoff does not pay for anything it should not. In addition, if a contractor has a lobbying arm, they must prove they have an accounting "firewall" between their checkoff and lobbying dollars. The Cattlemen's Beef Board works closely with these organizations so that checkoff dollars aren't used outside of the scope of the Act and Order.

I've been spending time up in Collbran watching kids, the past few weeks. I sit out on the porch and watch my grandchildren go sledding down the hill by the side of the house. It brings back so many memories.

A few weeks after we got married, Jan & George Lyons came to visit. George brought his snowmobile up and a rope and a tube. The moon was full and the snow was crusted. Jan stayed in the house to keep the fire going as she was expecting Cindy in a few weeks. I was the crazy one to go out to play. They tied the rope to the tube and then they stretched it out behind it. I laid on the tube and held on to the

attacked. He joined the Navy but was drafted into the Marine Corps because he was a medical student and the Marines didn't have a medical unit and they needed one.

He completed basic training and medical training and was eventually sent to Iwo Jima during a time of very heavy combat with the Japanese and he was seriously wounded. His folks received a Purple Heart in the mail but for a long time they didn't know if he was dead or alive.

He came back stateside and spent a long time recuperating in the hospital (which was a hotel converted to a recovery place for wounded veterans) in Glenwood Springs, Co. He didn't talk much about the war or his injuries until

No one else lived on Little Creek so the hill in front of our house became a wonderful place to sled. We got a couple of old skidoos and the kids ran them up and down pulling the sleds up. Then it would be time to come in and warm up and have hot donuts and something to drink.

Before too many years people moved up past us and the road wasmuch later in his life.

Clell received a Medical Degree from the University of Colorado at Boulder and completed his residency at Good Samaritan Hospital in Portland, Oreaon.

He moved to Portland and set up his medical practice. Hemarried Twila Detrick. He had 4 children, 3 boys and a girl.

He later married Marsha Fisk. They had 2 boys. Clell died in 2000 at the age of 80.



Eyewitness account plus scavenged elk carcass indicates likely presence of multiple wolves in northwest Colorado



MOFFAT COUNTY, Colo. - Colorado Parks and Wildlife officials say an eyewitness report of six large <u>canids</u> traveling together in the far northwest corner of the state last October, in conjunction with last week's discovery of a thoroughly scavenged elk carcass near Irish Canyon - a few miles from the location of the sighting - strongly suggests a pack of gray wolves may now be residing in Colorado.

According to the eyewitness, he and his hunting party observed the wolves near the Wyoming and Utah borders. One of the party caught two of the six animals on video.

"The sighting marks the first time in recent history CPW has received a report of multiple wolves traveling together," said CPW Northwest Regional Manager JT Romatzke. "In addition, in the days prior, the eyewitness says he heard distinct howls coming from different animals. In my opinion, this is a very credible report."

After learning about the scavenged elk carcass, CPW initiated an investigation which is still ongoing. At the site, the officers observed several large canid tracks from multiple animals surrounding the carcass. According to CPW wildlife managers, the tracks are consistent with those made by wolves. In addition, the condition of the carcass is consistent with known wolf predation. (Photos below)

"The latest sightings add to other credible reports of wolf activity in Colorado over the past several years," said Romatzke. "In addition to tracks, howls, photos and videos, the presence of one wolf was confirmed by DNA testing a few years ago, and in a recent case, we have photos and continue to track a wolf with a collar from Wyoming's Snake River pack.

Romatzke says from the evidence, there is only one logical conclusion CPW officials can make.

"It is inevitable, based on known wolf behavior, that they would travel here from states where their populations are well -established," he said. "We have no doubt that they are here, and the most recent sighting of what appears to be wolves traveling together in what can be best described as a pack is further evidence of the presence of wolves in Colorado."

Romatzke adds CPW will con-

tinue to operate under the agency's current management direction.

"We will not take direct action and we want to remind the public that wolves are federally endangered species and fall under the jurisdiction of the US Fish and Wildlife Service. As wolves move into the state on their own, we will work with our federal partners to manage the species," he said.

The public is urged to contact CPW immediately if they see or hear wolves or find evidence of any wolf activity. The <u>Wolf Sighting Form</u> can be found on the CPW website.
