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Growing Things

Irish Soda Bread

Even folks who are not of Irish descent may enjoy the tasty dishes traditionally served on St. Patrick's Day. A nice brisket of beef, cooked with onions, potatoes, carrots, and cabbage is standard fare and Irish Soda Bread is a lovely addition. This bread is fairly quick and easy to make and has a light, fluffy (but substantial) texture, likely due to the buttermilk used. What follows is my favorite recipe, borrowed from the "Sunset Book of Breads."

Utensils

- Large mixing bowl.
- Pastry blender or two knives.
- 4-cup size glass beaker.
- Cup for beating egg.
- Breadboard.
- Two 8" or 9" round pie or cake pans.
- Large, sharp knife.
- Wire racks for cooling.

Ingredients

- 4 cups all-purpose flour (unsifted).
- 1 tsp. salt.
- 3 tsp. baking powder.
- 1 tsp. baking soda.
- 1/4 cup sugar (optional).
- ½ tsp. cardamom or coriander, finely ground (optional).
- ½ cup butter.
- 1 egg.
- 1-3/4 cups cultured buttermilk.

Directions

- 1. Place a rack in the middle of the oven (halfway between top and bottom). Heat the oven to 375 degrees.
- 2. In the large mixing bowl, combine flour, salt, baking powder, baking soda, and sugar and spice (if used).
- 3. Add butter and cut in with pastry blender or two knives until crumbly.
- 4. Measure the buttermilk into the glass beaker.
- 5. Beat the egg slightly in a cup and mix the egg into the buttermilk.
- 6. Pour the buttermilk and egg mixture into the flour mixture and stir until well blended.
- 7. Flour the breadboard, turn the dough out onto it, and knead for two to three minutes (or until dough is smooth).
- 8. Divide the dough in half and place each half in a cake or pie pan, pressing down until the dough fills the pan.
- 9. With the sharp knife, cut a cross on each loaf, about ½ inch deep in the middle.
- 10. Bake the loaves for 35 to 40 minutes.
- 11. Remove bread from oven and allow to cool for a few minutes, then remove bread from pans and place on wire rack to finish cooling.
- 12. Cut into wedges for serving.

Variations:


- Replace 1 cup of the flour with whole-wheat or whole-wheat pastry flour.
- Add 1 to 2 cups of raisins, currants, or cut up dates to the flour mixture before adding the buttermilk and egg mixture.
- Add 1 cup of chocolate chips to the flour mixture (which makes this bread officially a desert) and use the cardamom (rather than the coriander).
 You can increase the cardamom up to ½ tsp. if you like.

Sunset Book of Breads

I've owned a copy of the Sunset Book of Breads for over forty years now. It contains recipes for breads of all kinds from many different countries. My copy is now quite stained and close to falling apart. I was surprised to find that the book is still in print and available on Amazon: https://www.amazon.com/Sunset-Breads-Editors-Books-Magazine/dp/BoooRGO7EW.

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Lookin' Back

Nothing can take you down memory lane quicker than going to the closet and finding your old recipe box.

When we first got married it was always meat, (usually deer or elk) potatoes, gravy, a vegetable, and a jar of canned fruit usually apricots or peaches. We'd also have some bread, homemade of course, and rolls for Sunday. This was the way everyone in Plateau Valley, for the most, ate. We all ate what we grew and ate the meat we got during hunting season.

I can remember the first pig we butchered. What a treat. Out came the big old crocks and the hams and bacon were put in to cure. Ron always liked to slice and eat some of the fresh bacon before it was cured, with just salt and pepper to taste. Can you hear it sizzling as it cooks? I can. We had

fat on our meat then.

We saved the lard and rendered it out for cooking. I used the cracklings on the bottom in my corn bread. Lard was wonderful for flaky pie crust. It was also the best thing to fry donuts in!

You could also have your meat butchered and cut up at the locker plant. Wendall Crane was the one who owned it. He'd send the lard out to be rendered and it would come back in little red cans. The smells coming out of the locker plant were mouth watering when he was smoking the meat.

I found the recipe I was looking for. It's from the Farm Journal Magazine, January 1986. New ideas for cooking were coming out in the farm magazines. Something different to make was Aztec Bread with Pork Picadillo filling. It reminds me of when the Mexican Restaurant showed up in Grand Junction. It was in a white building off

of North Avenue. They had waiters in black and white with white towels over their arms. Soft music played in the back ground; I believe they had a strolling guitarist. It really was quite elegant and everyone dressed in their best; it was place for a special date. It wasn't a place everyone would ran to for a quick supper with their kids. In fact, I don't really remember seeing kids there. (I'm love kids, but wouldn't it be nice to have a nice, quiet, affordable place for a meal with a special someone right now.) There was a death in the family several years after they opened and they closed the restaurant down. It was a very sad time for their family and the community.

It's been quite a good morning, looking at old recipes and remembering back. Time to get my meat cooking. Have a good weekend.

Colorado Now Offers \$100 College Fund for Kids Born or Adopted in the State It's never too early to start saving for an education.

Colorado legislature and CollegeInvest, a non-profit arm of the government, are serious about funding education in the future. Through a program called First Steps, all U.S. citizens (and those with social security and federal tax numbers) are eligible to receive \$100 to set up a child's college fund. The one-time funds come entirely from CollegeInvest, and no taxpayer dollars are part of the program.

"Children ages 12 to 18 who have a college savings account are twice as likely to expect to go to college as those who do not have a college savings account. Knowing this, the Colorado legislature passed a bill in the 2019 session that creates Child Starter Accounts (CSA), giving every child born or adopted in Colorado a \$100 contribution to their CollegeInvest 529 college savings account," says CollegeInvest.

Kids born or adopted into Colorado staring January 1, 2020, are eligible to receive the \$100 for college savings. Parents only need to start a 529 savings account with CollegeInvest (no money down needed) to get the process rolling.

"First, open a NEW CollegeInvest 529 Savings Account naming the child as the Beneficiary. Next, apply for the program. You will need the account number of the CollegeInvest account you just opened, and a copy or PDF of their birth certificate (or adoption documents). Click on the APPLY NOW button in the reference section above. If you and the Beneficiary meet all of the eligibility requirements, you will be notified by email from CollegeInvest and the

\$100 contribution will be deposited in your CollegeInvest account within 30 business days," says the organization, adding you will also be notified if you are ineligible.

The savings and earnings from the account grow free, contributions to the account are eligible for state tax deductions, and the savings can be used an almost any college, university, community college, trade school, or vocational program.

While the interest accrued on the \$100 of savings won't be enough to pay for an entire college education, the idea is to get families started on the path to saving. Every little bit that can be set aside helps, and any contributions to the account only help savings multiply.

More information is available at collegeinvest.org. Applications are currently being accepted and will continue on a rolling basis.

"Check Out State Parks" program offers free park entry for experiential learning opportunities

Looking for ideas to help you plan your next outdoor adventure? Colorado Parks and Wildlife, in partnership with the Colorado State Library, offers the "Check Out State Parks" program to help Coloradans visit state parks at no cost and experience everything the great outdoors has to offer through handson learning.

The program is available statewide, makes Colorado state parks easily accessible, and provides a backpack filled with educational materials that recommend a range of outdoor activities to help you decide how to spend your time in nature.

Nearly 300 Colorado libraries, Collbran Library included, are participating in the "Check Out State Parks" program, including all public libraries, three military base libraries and publically funded academic libraries.

Local libraries promote the program with seasonal displays, and have one or two adventure backpacks available for check out. Each backpack contains the following:

- Annual Colorado State Park Pass for free park entry (hang tag)
- Your Guide to Colorado's State Parks
- An activity ideas list
- Binoculars
- Leave No Trace Outdoor Ethics Card
- Educational materials: Fishing Basics Instruction Sheet, Colorado Trees and Wildflower Guide, Colorado Wildlife Guide, Night Sky Guide, etc.

Library patrons can check out the backpack and park pass for up to seven days and use it to visit any Colorado state park. Colorado's 41 state parks are as diverse as the state itself, and they offer something for everyone. 

Being Pragmatic

Pragmatism is basing your actions on practical judgments rather than timeless principles. Other adjectives associated with being pragmatic are "hardheaded, efficient, logical, and utilitarian." I am a very pragmatic, nuts-and-bolt-kind-of-guy. This really helped me in construction work over the years. I'm also analytical and decided to look at how pragmatism works in relationships. The most important relationship to look at was the one I have with God.

The first thing that jumped out at me was that God is a God of principals, He gives parameters for our life based on His principles. Now, by definition, these principles are actually His nature or attributes, but for this article, I will call them principles. So, by being a pragmatic sort of fellow and the definition of pragmatic is "practical judgments rather than principles", I could see that my difficulties were based on my perception. I wrote a couple of weeks ago about perception, reality, and truth, and my perception (pragmatic focus) was not in line with Gods truth (principles). I needed to realign my thinking with Gods truth, and I recognized how this could change my understanding of reality.

An example of this might be: God's principle says to love your neighbor, but my pragmatism might say to ignore my neighbor until he can help me in some way. God's principles say not to lie, but my pragmatism might say, if I lie, it will help me get out of this situation. Therefore, a more positive way of looking at this is stated in Philippians 4:8. It says, "Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things."

I really was going to write about how I thought the church was too pragmatic in its approach to society, and it is, but what really was exposed was I was too pragmatic in my life. If I want the church to change, then I need to be sure my life is in line with God's principles (truth).

Truth, reality and perception are the keys to living a life pleasing to God. Come join us this Sunday.
