HARTSEL LIBRARY CELEBRATES 25 YEARS OF SERVICE

In 1999 enough interest by the people of Hartsel selected an Advisory Bord to formulate a plan for the Hartsel Library. People from all over the area made it a community effort to clean out the "teacherage" and convert it into our library. Book drives were held and books came from the Guffy Library and from as far away as Washington State. Donations were to abound - lumber, furniture, shelves, and cash as well. Training was provided by the head librarian from Bailey. The grand opening was on September 25, 1999.

Since those early days, the library has continued to benefit from memorial funds donated by friends and family of the early supporters of the library and ongoing donations of books and money. Come in and peruse the scrapbooks, photos and accounts of our beginnings that are testimony to the transformation that is now our facility.

This year's library volunteers are the following: Kathy Hill, President; Lark Harvey, Vice President; Charmaine Freeny, Secretary; Lisa Konen, Treasurer; Darleen Darnell, Board Members at large; Librarians – Cassandra Brooks, Charmaine Freeny, Kathy Hill and Karen Dudnikov. We have also recruited several fill-in librarians when a substitute is needed. This trusty group serves our library during operating hours. We are always looking for willing volunteers to fill in for projects and schedules when necessary. Contact us or drop in to visit.

Our open request for donated items has met with a wonderful response, including a box of donated DVD's from someone on the east coast. We continue to expand our offerings of children's books, fiction, non-fiction, vintage books, and DVD selections. We still provide Wi Fi, computers for patron use, and printers for black and white and color copying. "Back Room Book Sale" continues during hours of operation. Children and adult hard cover books are \$1 each or 6 for \$5. All paperback books are 25¢ or 5 for \$1. Buy our new colorful book bag for \$5 and fill it up for only an additional \$1.

The Book Club group still meets at 11 a.m. the first Monday of each month following our board meeting. Come meet new friends and discuss interesting books. Participants select and read their own selection corresponding to the genre for the month and then give their report and critique. A participant for the month brings a dessert to share. Check out the schedule on our social media sources.

Our "Little Library Boxes" at Eleven Mile and Spinney Recreation area are restocked by Memorial Day. Hartsel Days Book & Bake Sale is happening this year the weekend of August 10th & 11th. T-shirt sales and financial donations will be received to bolster our scholarship fund. Come by and check out our ice cream freezer goodies.

BUTTERSCOTCH BLONDIES

1 pkg. Yellow cake mix

1/3 sup softened butter

3 eggs

1 cup chopped pecans, toasted

1 cup butterscotch chips

1 14 oz can sweetened condensed milk

1 t. vanilla extract

Heat oven to 350°. Spray 13 x 9 pan with cooking spray.

Combine cake mix, butter and 1 egg in large bowl; beat at medium speed until mixture resembles course crumbs. Press evenly into prepared pan. Bake 15 minutes. Remove from oven; sprinkle with pecans and butterscotch chips.

Beat sweetened condensed milk, remaining 2 eggs and vanilla in small bowl. Pour evenly over chips and pecans. Bake an additional 25-30 minutes or until center is set. Cool thoroughly. Cut in bars.




BOOK BAG SALES




IT'S SUMMER AT THE HARTSEL LIBRARY

PARK COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY CONTRIBUTION



This is the new look for the republished book first written by Linda Bjorklund. Linda was a participant with the Park County Historical Society and a patron of the Hartsel Library since its inception in 1999. The republished version by Jim Sapp, is available at the library for \$10.

About the Book

Founded in 1880, Hartsel is close to the geographic center of Colorado, and is often referred to as "The Heart of Colorado". The namesake of the community

is Samuel Hartsel, a local farmer and cattle rancher who came to Park County in 1860. He developed the Hartsel hot springs and built a hotel, sawmill, blacksmith shop, and a trading post to lay the groundwork for the town.

HARTSEL LIBRARY FACTS AND STATS

The Hartsel Library is entirely run on volunteers from the community; it is not connected with any governmental agency. Because of this, our funding comes solely from donations by patrons and community members and from our fundraising efforts. We are open 4 days a week during the summer and 2-3 days a week in winter. In addition to the community library on Valley Avenue, the volunteers maintain a free library box at both Eleven Mile Reservoir and Spinney Reservoir for the enjoyment of visitors and campers.

We are **always** looking for additional librarians to help us keep the library open and running. If you're not sure about committing to a regular weekly librarian time slot, why not volunteer as a substitute?

Last year we had 689 visitors stop in the library. We had a total of 44 books and 264 DVD's checked out. As you can see by the numbers, our patrons check out a lot more DVD's than books. Because of this, the library has vastly expanded its DVD collection. We were fortunate to have a few community members donate hundreds of DVDs to us and we thank them immensely!

Last year library visitors used our computers a total of 38 hours; librarians had 73 hours of computer usage time, mainly for library emails, contacting patrons, and researching.

The library board meets the first Monday of every month at 10:00 a.m. and we welcome everyone. Our book group meets immediately following the board meeting, usually at about 11:00 a.m. Our book group format is such that we have a different genre every month and members are free to pick a book of their choice in that genre. Discussion is had on each member's book choice at the group meeting. Dessert is provided. Everyone and anyone is welcome to join the group. We love to see new faces!

Stop by and see what the little Hartsel Community Library has to offer! We are open from 1pm-4pm Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday during the summer and from 1pm – 4pm Friday, Saturday and Sunday during fall through spring. Hope to see you soon!!

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HOOKED ON BOOKS

A while back our Hartsel Library book club read <u>Soul of an Octopus</u> by Sy Montgomery. It was a pleasant surprise to hear how much *everyone* enjoyed the book, which doesn't happen often.

The author "explores the emotional and physical world of the octopus." Traveling around the world to study octopuses, she learned about their different personalities, their curiosity and their problem-solving abilities." She wrote about the way octopuses build their homes, hide from predators, explore their surroundings and find food. This book will certainly motivate you to learn more about these amazing creatures.

The book <u>Remarkedly Bright Creatures</u> by Shelby Van Pelt was another delightful read. The story is about a recently widowed woman, Tova, who begins working the night shift at the Sowell Bay Aquarium. This gives her a purpose after her husband's death, while also mourning the disappearance of her son 30 years before.

Marcellus is a giant Pacific octopus living at the aquarium. Marcellus becomes bored and spends his time looking for ways to escape his home and explore the aquarium. Eventually he becomes curious about Tova, and he uses his intelligence to form a bond with her, and to solve some of the mysteries in Tova's life. Tova eventually realizes that Marcellus had been communicating with her, and they formed an amazing relationship.

This book was entertaining, sensitive, and memorable. Shelby Van Pelt's debut novel "is a gentle reminder that sometimes taking a hard look at the past can help uncover a future that once felt impossible."

"OCTOPUS IN THE LIVING ROOM"

David Scheel, a professor of Marine Biology at Alaska Pacific University, has been studying octopuses for over 25 years. He had always thought of having an octopus in his home and was approached by a film company looking for someone who might be interested in doing just that. David developed a relationship with his octopus, playing with her, cleaning the tank and feeding her, and learning about her personality.

"In 2019, PBS released the documentary *Octopus: Making Contact,* which chronicled the Scheel family bonding and observing their octopus."

I have seen this documentary, and it is very entertaining and educational. I highly recommend viewing the story of an "Octopus in the Living Room."

50 BABY OCTOPUSES

The next review is about a story I saw on the internet. A family in Oklahoma has a son, Cal, who, since he was 2 years old, has wanted a pet octopus!! He would ask for an octopus on every occasion: birthdays, Christmas, all holidays, and he would even dress up like an octopus for Halloween.

When Cal turned 9 his father finally gave in and bought a California two-spot octopus. Dad bought an aquarium and did all the research about taking care of an octopus.

To make a long story short, the family was told the octopus was a male. One morning the father was cleaning the tank when he noticed several eggs floating in the tank. A few nights later a baby octopus popped out of one of the eggs and at the end of the day there were 50 baby octopuses!

The family learned how to take care of the babies and started working with aquariums and researchers to find families that were qualified to take care of the baby octopuses.

Paul Clarkson, director of husbandry operations at California's Monterey Bay Aquarium, would normally have doubts about any octopus being raised in a private home, but what this family has done is "pretty remarkable."

RHUBARB CAKE

Mix the following ingredients together:

½ C shortening

1 egg

1C sour milk

1/1/2 C brown sugar

1 t vanilla

Then measure and mix:

2 C flour

½ t soda

1/t salt

ADD to the flour mixture and then to the first mixture

2 C cut up fresh rhubarb

Spread in a 9 x 13-inch pan, or in two 8 x 8 inch loaf pans, greased and floured.

Before baking sprinkle over cake

½ C sugar

1 t cinnamon

Bake 45 minutes at 375 degrees.
