
the boy and girl statues in front of the Sago Palm were brought to their home from France.

1/2 (12 oz.) jar pepperoncini juice 1 (1 oz.) packet au jus gravy mix

Combine chuck roast, pepperoncini, pepperoncini juice, au jus mix, buttermilk ranch dressing, salt, and pepper in a slow cooker. Cook on Low until roast is fork-tender, about 8 hours. Pull chuck apart with 2 forks. Cover with aluminum foil to keep warm.

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Fish Talk

Ice fishing in northeast Florida, say what?

Wow, where do I start? It has been absolutely brutal on the water! No, it wasn't literally ice fishing but pretty dog gone close for Florida. We've had the worst winter in years and record low water temps. Reports of fish kills came in from St. Augustine over the weekend. This week isn't going to help with rain in the forecast for nearly every day. What does that do to our fishing? Well, it slows everything down for starters. Second, it's going to move many of our fish species to deeper holes. Don't be discouraged just slow your presentation down dramatically. Use cut baits and live shrimp on the bottom and give those fish a little more time than normal.

I spent the weekend with my buddy Ryan Hall in Southeast Georgia fishing the St. Mary's and Satilla Rivers. Red fish, trout and striper were all acquainting the same water column and both wanted the same presentation. Basically a slow rolling Down South Lure with an occasional twitch. Most of the fish that bit just sat in place until we set the hook. There wasn't much of a fight bringing these fish to the boat. We caught several nice striper, many nearly 5 to 6 lbs. Most of the trout and red fish were 15 to 23 inches long but for the most part, all were legal. That pattern shouldn't change until the water temps rise back into the mid 50's. That may be tough since the following week looks to be cooler as well.

Moving on, the sheepshead bite has been slow but there are a few guys that have put quality fish in the box. This weekend Reel Habit Jigs sponsored the first annual St. Mary's Sheepshead Showdown out of Buccaneers Bait and Tackle. Forty boats entered and only two boats weighted fish. Chris Beasley, Troy Carver and Scott Sullivan took first place representing Nassau County with Tripp Lang and Jay Stein taking second out of Kingsland, Georgia. Way to go fellas! If that doesn't say something about the bite, I don't know what does. The key until we have a little warm up is going to be fresh live baits. The fish are hungry but aren't exactly feeding as aggressively as normal. Focus on slow moving water near structure and drop straight to the bottom.

Did Your Well Run Dry?

I have heard stories of people in our community where their well has gone out on them. When that happens, it creates all kinds of troubles. Sometimes when the water stops flowing, it might be because the well pump has gone bad, or a pressure switch has stopped working or in a worst-case scenario the well might have run dry or stopped up. When that happens, most likely you will have to dig a new well. I'm certainly no expert on wells, but I do realize that water is necessary to sustain life.

In the Middle East, we see that towns and villages were built around a source of water. Whether the town was built around a well, a spring, or some type of body of water, we know that it takes water to sustain life. Without clean water, you can't survive.

In Genesis 26, we read of a famine that had come on the land. God instructed Isaac not to go into the land of Egypt during the famine, but to go and live in the land of the Philistines. During Isaac's time in the land of the Philistines, the Philistines became envious of Isaac, because the Lord's blessings were upon his life. When they saw Isaac's great wealth and prosperity, the Philistines began to stop up the wells that Isaac's father Abraham had dug, filling them with the earth. These non-profit organizations have worked diligently since the aftermath of World War I to the present, being a vital outreach to the families of our military men and women, not only to those that gave their lives for our country but to surviving Veterans and those who serve in all parts of the world today. Both of these organizations had their founding organizational roots established in the month of January. There are many among us that do not know enough about these outstanding organizations, what they do and the support they bring to millions of families over the past 90

The Stars That Shine Brightest for Our Military

American Gold Star Mothers, a non-profit, was organized in 1928 by American mothers who had lost sons or daughters in World War I and holds a Congressional charter. It became a custom that most families of service men and women would hang a

banner predominately in their window for each family member serving. Those who had lost their lives in combat were recognized by a 'gold star' and those living were represented by a 'blue star'. Thus, the term 'Gold Star Mothers' was coined and adopted and continues to this day.

The first Gold Star Mother was Grace Seibold, who lost her pilot son in France in 1918. She started to visit hospitalized Veterans in the Washington, D.C. area and while working through her sorrow, still clinging to the chance that her son's death was incorrect, Grace helped ease the pain of the many servicemen who returned so war ravaged that they might never be capable of returning to a normal life.

Grace became convinced that her and her son's wife's grief was unhealthy and totally self-destructive. She started to not only work with soldiers in the military hospitals but with other mothers whose sons had been lost in the military to lesson their grief and help them regain their lives.

She then organized a group of 25 other mothers and in January 1928, officially organized the Gold Star Mothers, Inc. and it has grown to huge proportions since then in every state.

The rules have changed through the years to include mothers of those lost in World War II, Korea, Vietnam,

> Iraq and other conflicts, and do not consider the circumstances of death, whether they are missing in action. They have made way for any woman who is a U.S. citizen or permanent legal resident, who is a mother, adopted mother or

Desert Storm, Afghanistan,

a step mother of a military man or woman at the time of induction. Gold Star Mother's Day is now celebrated on the last Sunday

in September.

To learn more of outstanding these organizations please check their out websites if you would like to learn more, join as a Gold or Blue Star member or volunteer.

In January, 1942, Army Capt. George Maines conceived the idea of the Blue Star Mothers, ran a newspaper article in Flint, Michigan

requesting information about sons and daughter of mothers serving in the military and immediately received over 1000 responses! A meeting was held and the organization was formed before February 1, 1942. That year alone chapters formed in 9 states across the country.

The Blue Star Mothers original goals and mission were to 'bring their sons and daughters' home safely during World War II and help insure their benefits upon returning, but the parameters have broadened since then.

Over the years, their goals and services include helping returning military and Veterans to achieve their benefits due them, Veterans hospital volunteerism, children's welfare of military Veterans, working with Veterans and military with not only physical disabilities but PTSD and TBI, civil defense with Homeland Security, assists Veterans organizations and much more.

> living in other countries outside the United States are eligible for membership to any local chapter in every state. Their son or daughter must have survived military service.

> > The most notable and

honored Blue Star mother is Anna Matthees who sent 7 sons in World War II in various branches of the services and they all returned safely.

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

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Q: I have found this weed all over my shady flower beds and under my trees. What is it? KS

A: Mulberry Weed (Fatoua villosa), is a common weed often found in ornamental pots in green houses, nurseries



and shady landscapes. It is extremely happy in moist landscape beds where it can receive good irrigation and fertilizer. It is generally a summer annual but may carry over from season to season if winter temperatures are mild. Mulberry weed was originally from Eastern Asia and has been seen in the south (Louisiana) since the 1950s (Bryson and DeFelice 2009). Mulberry weed has naturalized throughout much of the eastern US and is found from Texas to Florida and north to Michigan and Delaware. Mulberry weed occurs from spring to fall in Florida, primarily growing in moist, shaded areas. Plants flower from early spring through late fall and then die after the first freeze. Hand pulling provides good control, especially if pulled before seeds are produced. Remember, since it is an annual, it has only one way to reproduce - by seed. Two inches of pine bark mulch will help keep weeds down.

Q: Can you identify this plant for me? JB

A: I love it when identifying a plant comes easy. Your cool season blooming plant is called Bolivian sunset, Seemannia sylvatica, in the family of gloxinia. It is best grown in cold hardiness zones 9a-11 so it is a risky plant to put outdoors in our area. However, I planted several outside in the shade three years ago and late in the fall, it pops back up for me. You might also consider planting it in a pot knowing it will only show up when temperatures drop in the 50 - 60s. The bright red, tubular flowers are easy to

spot. I positively never do anything to it – the perfect plant in my opinion. Bolivian sunset apparently has the potential to grow up to 3 feet tall, but my plants have never grown any taller than 1 foot. I suspect if I fertilized it and



paid even the smallest amount of attention to it, it would probably be much larger. Consider it as a potential ground

cover but note it really cannot tolerate full sun, especially late afternoon sun; it prefers filtered sun. Bolivian sunset is classified as a tender perennial meaning you may only have a few years of reblooming before it totally disappears.

Q: Can you eat the little ornamental peppers? CC

A: Ornamental peppers, Capsicum annuum, won't hurt you if you eat them but they often look better than they taste. Ornamental peppers come in a variety of colors from creamy white to yellow to red and purple. If you are looking for a pretty pepper with a sweet taste think about growing 'Pretty N Sweet'. Just like its name implies, this pepper is a sweet, ornamental pepper which grows to about 18 inches tall and well suited for containers. If you are looking for multicolored peppers you might consider Nu Mex Easter ornamental peppers which has all the colors at one time. This pepper will provide "medium heat." 'Aji Omnicolor' has longer, thinner peppers in multi-colors with heat like cayenne pepper heat. Then there is an extra hot ornamental pepper variety for you to try called 'Prairie Fire'. It will probably take the taste buds right off your tongue! I have a container of multi-colored ornamental peppers at my front door and they give me tremendous pleasure when they are flowering and fruiting. Ornamental peppers I



have few disease or insect problems. They produce flowers and fruit from spring through first frost.

Q: I was given a Christmas cactus as a gift but I don't know how to take care of it. CK

A: No worries, caring for Christmas cactus will be easier than you think. Be sure to use well-drained sandy soil. The kind of soil used for other types of cacti will work perfectly for Christmas cactus. One of the biggest mistakes most people

make is over-watering. It is best to water them only once they have become completely dry. You can test the dryness



of the soil by putting your finger in the first few inches. Place a saucer under to the plant to catch any excess water and empty the saucer after a few minutes. You may find they need to be watered only once every few weeks. Water only around the roots and not on the leaves. If the leaves become limp then they desperately need water or there is root decay. It is too cold here in Northeast Florida to plant Christmas cactus outside; they should be left in pots and kept inside especially during cold months. You can move them outside to a screened porch or patio once the temperatures consistently reach the high 50s. Christmas cacti love bright sunny areas but do not let them be exposed to direct sunlight – especially hot, western afternoon sun. Use a good, complete fertilizer specifically formulated for houseplants. Liquid formulation works best. Avoid over fertilization as this will limit the number of buds and flowers. Start fertilizing in the spring but stop in the late summer to encourage blooming in the fall and winter.

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Ewing Park Tennis Courts to be Resurfaced

The Callahan Town Council met last Tuesday night, due to the Monday holiday, for their first regular meeting of January. The first order of business was to decide when to do the ethics training for the council and mayor. Everyone agreed to set the training for Monday, February 26 from 4:30-8:30 p.m. at Town Hall. The next agenda item was approval of quotes for new tires for the tanker for the Fire Department. The tanker is in need of eight (8) new tires. The council approved a bid from Power Tire for \$3200 which also included installing the tires.

The next agenda item concerned adding a Conditional Use clause to Chapter 195-82 of the town code Commercial Town District (CTC) to allow Funeral Homes/Crematoriums. Town Manager and Public Works Director Mike Williams advised the council that the town has been approached by an individual about possibly opening a crematorium in the town limits. "The Commercial Town District is the area along Brandies Avenue," said Williams.

"Callahan Funeral Home was actually grandfathered in because the business was already there," said Councilman Marty Fontes. "This will not change anything for their business except to make it legal in the city (which it is) instead of grandfathered."

"What kind of building does a crematorium need? Is it like industrial?" said Councilwoman Kathy Smith. "I'm just asking because I don't know anything about them."

"They, like funeral homes, have very strict guidelines by the state that must



be followed." said Williams. "I don't know much about them either however that are regulated closely by the state."

The council advised Town Attorney Jeb Branham to prepare the ordinance for the next meeting and first reading on the ordinance.

Williams also advised the council concerning approving the Traffic Signal Maintenance Agreement. "I have looked over the contract and it is much more favorable for the town," said Williams. "The contract gives an allowance with some leeway for unexpected expenses. The company will also be installing cameras on each traffic light to watch the flow and the amount of traffic. Each

light will also have sensors on them alerting when there is a problem with the signal." The council approved the

Another agenda item covered was approving quotes for the improvement of the tennis courts at Ewing Park. The council approved K & T Seal Coat at a cost of \$3,000. "The cost will include filling in the cracks of all the tennis courts, resurface and paint the courts, and install new nets," said Williams. "This is still a part of the FRDAP Grant Phase III & IV."

Larry Downey, representing the Callahan Volunteer Fire Department updated the council that the department will be applying for more Forestry Service Grants and other grants available for the upcoming year. The department also requested for the council to consider allowing the fire department to have a purchase order for \$3,800-\$4,000 to take with them to Fire Rescue East Convention. The department is in need of 500 feet of hose for the tanker.

"At the convention we will be able to purchase the hose at a much cheaper price than if we ordered it outright. We are asking for your consideration," said Downey.

In around the council table, Mayor Bobby Rau advised the council that he was appointed to the board of the Florida League of Cities Mayors and is looking forward to mentioning Callahan as much as possible.

Councilwoman Kathy Smith advised the council that Lem Turner Road continues to be a dangerous place where it joins US I. "Drivers continually fly up to the intersection at high rates of speed," said Smith. "Can some rumble strips be added prior to the intersection or maybe flashing signs alerting traffic of the intersection ahead?"

"I will contact FDOT about the options and report back what they say," said Williams.

"I am turning in my resignation, effective November 6, 2018, as I will be running for Mayor in the upcoming election," said Councilman Marty Fontes. "It is law that you can't hold two positions within the town. If I win the seat, I can't still hold a council seat."

Town Clerk Stephanie Knagge advised the council that the following seats would be up for election in November: Councilwoman Kathy Smith and Janet Shaw, Mayor Bobby Rau, Town Clerk Stephanie Knagge and Treasurer Donna Kirk. She also advised the council that there will be a joint meeting of the council and the school board on Monday, January 22 at 7 p.m.

The next regular meeting will be Tuesday, January 16, due to the Monday MLK holiday, at 7 p.m.



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
