


Nassau Art Show Impressive

I agree with one comment from Ms. McCosh, "...we cannot let a select few dictate our way of life." More fact...as of the 2010 census Nassau County is no longer considered "rural" based on the density of population

per square mile. Nassau County is now in the suburban category as being an extension of Jacksonville. The majority of the influx of expected new residents to Nassau County will be east of I-95. As we see these new residents arriving, we hear their surprise as to how little Nassau County has progressed relative to other areas on the animal anti-cruelty path. That "select few" she references is seemingly becoming west Nassau County, e.g. hunters, farmers, etc.

No doubt Ms. McCosh loves her animals but unfortunately animal shelters including NCAS are filled with malnourished, diseased, behavioral challenged animals, through no fault of their own. Inhumane animal care is a reality in Nassau County and unfortunately as statistics show, the majority of these animals entering the shelter are coming from west Nassau. Perhaps visiting the shelter might give her a better perspective about how irresponsible animal owners treat their animals. Per the facts, unattended tethering is a practice of irresponsible animal owners and that practice needs to end.

In the Kitchen.

1 sweet potato 1/2 medium sweet onion, chopped 2 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves 2 tablespoons barbecue sauce

Winter Chicken Bake

1 medium apple - peeled, cored, and chopped 1 cup cranberries

3 carrots, peeled and chopped

Preheat oven to 375°. Lightly grease a baking dish. Pierce the sweet potato several times with a fork and cut in half. Place in a microwave-safe dish; pour water to about 1/2-inch deep. Cook in microwave 10 minutes. Arrange the onion, apple, and carrots into the bottom of the prepared baking dish. Brush the barbecue sauce on both sides of the chicken breasts and lay atop the vegetables. Peel the sweet potato and cut into large chunks; scatter into the baking dish. Sprinkle the cranberries over the dish. Bake in the preheated oven until the chicken is tender and no longer pink in the center, 45 to 55 minutes. Allow to cool 5 minutes before serving.


Wiggins Sets Record at WNHS








Help Save My Parents Home

Editors note: If you have lived in Callahan very long, you are familiar with 'Billy' who works with the Town of Callahan Public Works Department. Billy has been a faithful employee of the town for years. He is the smiling face that is fixing troubles on the water lines during the night or a busted line in the middle of town. He is a familiar face at local restaurants at lunch and is a

friend to all. Billy has helped out many people when they were going through rough times. He has worked hard at the ballparks when his children were growing up. Unfortunately for Billy, he has run into hard times and at no fault of his own. He was only trying to improve his home and got taken. Following is a brief story written by his daughter about the troubles that was posted on Facebook and on their GoFund Me account: Help Save My Parents Home. Erica Carroll

My parents' names are Billy and Angie Everly. They have been married for 27 years and are residents of Callahan. They have worked very hard for what they have now and are at risk of losing it all because of a crooked company. My parents paid a contractor by the name of American Solar Energy, LLC to install solar panels on their property some time last year. They had to put a lot of money into this, including hiring someone else entirely to finish the installation, because American Solar Energy, LLC did not even complete the job, despite being paid to do so.

On top of that, American Solar Energy, LLC, it turns out, did not pay the sub-contractors and filed for bankruptcy when approached to do so. The subcontractor attempted to make a deal with them to settle the debt, but could



never get a response. Now my parents have been summoned to court because a mechanics lien has been placed on their home. They have been given two weeks to come up with \$8,400 or they are going to lose their home. We have spoken with numerous attorneys and even the news to see if there is any way around this. Unfortunately, under Florida law this is somehow perfectly legal.

Many of you know my father, Billy Everly, who works for the Town of Callahan. He has helped numerous people in the community when they have needed it, but he now finds himself in need of your help. Please donate if you can. My parents would definitely do the same if the roles were reversed. (American Solar Energy, LLC did this to several other families too. However they are not to be confused with another company with a similar name, American Solar Energy Systems, Inc. They are a separate company and have shown my parents nothing but kindness. Unfortunately, they have gotten a lot of bad rap from people mistaking them for American Solar Energy, LLC.)


Fruit Tree Class Held



The HMSH RoboFlashes, led by Christiana Morgan, and FBHS RoboPirates, led by Bradley Bean, smashed the other rookie teams in programming and mechanical design skills. The North Florida League Championship brought the alliance of YHS RoboStingers and the WNHS RoboTech Warriors together as they battled against the opposing alliance in the last round of the regional competition. While victory sided for their opponent's robot, both teams were winners. The Connect Award went to the YHS RoboStingers inspired by YHS rookie

coach, Carrie Hensley and the Inspire Award went to WNHS RoboTech Warriors led by Coaches Shari Braddock and Karol Siusta.

Nassau County sent seven FIRST Lego League (FLL) teams to tournaments in Jacksonville and Orange Park: Callahan, Hilliard, Fernandina Beach and Yulee Middle Schools and Bryceville, Hilliard and Wildlight Elementary Schools. The Fernandina Beach Middle School team, CHIK Hydo, and the Hilliard Middle Senior High team, Flashes, both won their competition and will compete for the Regional FLL Championship on Saturday, February 3, at the Prime Osborn Center in Jacksonville. The event is open to the public and will have robotic exhibitions for ages 6 to 18.

The Nassau County School District's robotics teams are sponsored by the Nassau Education Foundation and other donors. In 2015, the district first competed with a total of five teams. This has now increased to a total of eleven robotics teams, one in each middle and high school, and three in elementary schools.
