The Callahan Town Council met Monday night for their first meeting of February. The first order of business was a proclamation by Mayor Bobby Rau. The proclamation was in honor of Ms. Ophelia Morgan Judson, a Callahan resident who will celebrate her 104th birthday Thursday,

February 8. The mayor proclaimed February 8, 2018 Ophelia Morgan Judson Day in honor of her birthday. Her son, Eddie, was present to accept the signed proclamation for his mother. Joining Eddie was Mr. Thomas Blue, a dear church friend. Eddie currently lives near Atlanta.

"I left from home early this morning to come back. When I made it to Tifton, Georgia, I took my shoes off and relaxed," said Eddie. "Knowing I was closer to being 'home' in Callahan soon.

The Hilliard Town Council met Thursday night for their first regular meeting of February. The first agenda item was a request from landowner Mr. Wayne Bishop to subdivide property he purchased in August. The property is located at the corner of CR 108 and Eastwood Road. Bishop wants to divide the property into four (4) lots to build homes on. Bishop stated that he had been before the Land & Zoning Board and now is requesting approval from the council. He was told that he would have to follow the rules for the subdivision code and felt like he had done all the correct things. A lengthy discussion for quite some time.

Another presentation was done by John Hendricks, representing the West Nassau Historical Society. "I am here to advise the council about the upcoming Railroad Day Festival. The Town of Callahan has always been a great supporter of the event and we hope you will continue to be," said Hendricks. "Previously, the town has donated \$1000 for the event. We thank you in advance for your support. The Railroad Day Festival will be held Saturday,

April 21 at the Callahan Depot."

Council President Ken Bass advised Hendricks that a resolution will be drawn up and read at the next meeting for the donation.

Wanda Nichols, representing Relay for Life of West Nassau County, was on hand requesting support and a donation. "I am the chair for this year's Relay for Life of West Nassau County. I took this job to turn our Relay around," said Nichols. "Many people ask, where does the money from Relay go? I know from experience where it goes. A few years ago, I was diagnosed with three kinds of leukemia. For many of my treatments I had to go to Gainesville and couldn't be more than one hour away from the hospital. I stayed in the Hope House, which is sponsored by the American Cancer Society and Winn Dixie. This is part of where the dollars go. We would like the support of the Town of Callahan again this year. The Relay will be held April 6-7 at the NE FL Fairgrounds."

Councilman Marty Font

responded, "We have always donated \$500 to the Relay. At least for the last four (4) years we have."

Tim Norman, representing Mittauer & Associates Engineering Firm, was on hand to award the contract for the CDBG Grant the town received. "Construction costs have gone up incredibly since this grant was applied for," said Norman. "We had 10 bids with the lowest bid, \$642,145.50 from Worth Construction Development. The total amount of the grant was \$586,000 leaving a shortfall of \$56,145.50. If the council so chooses to accept the balance of the shortfall, we (Mittauer) will notify the bid winner."

This grant was to extend water and sewer lines. Councilman Fontes made a motion to accept the bid and the council will use money from the general fund to complete the bid. The council approved.

Town Clerk Stephanie Knagge advised the council that she had gotten some reports from the Florida League of Cities concerning how many

people from building houses in Hilliard over 1/10 of an acre," said Councilman Kenny Sims, who was also trying to make sense of it all.

"I think we need to clean up and clarify the intent in the code," added Council President John Beasley. "It shouldn't be this difficult."

"I don't think this is a very good development practice," said Mayor Cris McConnell. "This is like a jigsaw puzzle. We are trying to have uniformity within the town limits."

After much more discussion, Councilman Beasley made a motion: "I make a motion that we (council) will accept the four (lots) after an engineer has platted the property out with the lots and you (Bishop) bring it back before the council," said Beasley. The motion was seconded by Councilman Lee Pickett.

tank on the property. He wanted the council's approval for the exception before he buys the land. The council approved the exception.

Ordinance 2017-05 was approved for six (6) months which concerns a Medical Marijuana Moratorium within the Town of Hilliard. The current ordinance was for one year and is to expire in March. The council chose to extend it for six months and revisit.

Town Clerk Lisa Purvis updated the council concerning getting a price on

having a Capacity Fee Analysis report done. After discussing the report with the towns engineering firm Mittaurer & Associates, the analysis would be around \$7,500.

"I think we need to talk about this and with Tim (engineer) before we make this decision," said Councilman Sims. "That's seems like a lot of money." The council agreed to hold off until they learn more about the analysis.

The council approved Resolution 2018-03 which concerned amending Resolution 2017-10 to set forth the rules and regulations, programs and fees and facilities and properties for the Town of Hilliard Parks & Recreation Department.

Parks & Recreation Department Director Kyle Malucci advised the council about a rental agreement with the West Nassau High School Swim

## Fish Talk

#### Vertical Jigging for Trout

Gator trout, most popularly known as speckled trout, are typically fish that are larger than 4 to 5 lbs. These fish are smart and highly sought after even by the most avid anglers. The best times to target these fish are going to be early morning and late in the evening right? Well, that's usually not the case during the winter, it's very common to snag a few studs during the middle of the day. Because trout are deeper, light doesn't affect them like it does in our summer months.

While out this weekend, I noticed bait sticking to the bottom of our creeks. They were not very active and just flowing with the tide. We started out jigging in 4' to 6' of water and proceeded to vertical jig our way to deeper water with more current. It wasn't long before we found the correct depth trout were hanging out in. There was only one problem, we were getting short strikes. We quickly decided it's time to make a few changes.

With these colder temperatures, I switched to a 1/4 oz. jig head and a 3" plastic. Why a 3" plastic you might ask? Well, this weekend for example, I fished 4" and 5" baits for about an hour. We missed more fish than we hooked up with. I noticed that we were snagging fish and not hooking them in the mouth. Making an adjustment from those larger baits to the short DOA paddle tail made all the difference in the world. So by slowing our retrieval down, keeping the baits near the bottom and decreasing the size of our baits, we increased our catch. Our hook up ratio drastically improved and we ended up putting a limit of trout in the well in a little over and hour and a half. One of those trout happened to be a 24" stud that we released.

As with any sport fish, there's always a bunch of chatter as to what the best artificial baits may be. The bottom line is this, adjust accordingly. What you threw last weekend may not be the correct presentation for today. Hard baits aren't always productive so switch it up.

If I could add any tips to help you become more successful, I'd say this. Lighten up on your leader line, 10 lb. test mono or even smaller diameters may increase your hook ups. Slow your retrieval down as much as possible. That will keep your baits in the strike zone. Lastly, lean into the strikes and don't set the hook as if it were bass fishing. With that said, I hope that you all have a successful weekend on the water.

Pastor Arlie Johns, Hilliard First Assembly of God




For a few years now, our church has been involved with Life Publishers in raising funds to publish "Fire Bibles." The "Fire Bible" is a Study Bible that has been translated into many different foreign languages to help pastors

in foreign countries study God's word. Many of these Pastor's will never have the opportunity to attend a Bible College, that's why these Bibles are so important. The study notes in these Bibles will help the pastors to properly teach God's word without straying into false doctrine.

A couple weeks ago, I was given the privilege to travel as a part of the team that went to Myanmar (former Burma) and dedicated the newest edition of the Fire Bible. This is FREE and open to the public (although any donations are appreciated and happily accepted).

Shrove Tuesday is the day in February (or March) immediately before Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, which is traditionally celebrated by feasting on PANCAKES (and fixin's)! It is also the last day of eating richer, fatter foods before the ritual fasting period of Lent.

Ash Wednesday marks the first day of Lent, a time of reflection and penitence leading up to Easter Sunday. This year the Lenten Season begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14. Lent is the period of 40 days which comes before Easter in the Christian calendar. Easter Sunday this year falls on April 1. Beginning on Ash Wednesday, Lent is a season of reflection and preparation before the celebration of Easter. During Lent we are asked to devote ourselves to seeking the Lord in prayer, to service by giving alms and to sacrifice by self-



control through fasting. By observing these 40 days of Lent, Christians replicate Jesus Christ's sacrifice and withdrawal into the desert for 40 days.

At the Ash Wednesday service, the pastor dispenses ashes (usually made from burning the palm fronds from the previous year's Palm Sunday service) by making the sign of the cross on the bowed foreheads before them. As the ashes are "imposed," the pastor reminds each person of Genesis 3:19, "for you are dust, and to dust you shall return." This is a reminder that our lives are short and we must live them to the fullest.

The Ash Wednesday service will be Wednesday, February 14 at 7:30 p.m. at Bethany Episcopal Church in Hilliard. Everyone is invited and is welcome to attend!



Nassau County School Board Member District 5 Jonathan Petree recently celebrated his first year on the school board. Petree was sworn into office in November 2016. He ran for the seat held by Kathy Burns and won. Burns resigned her position to run for Superintendent leaving the seat vacant. Petree is fulfilling the remaining two (2) years left on the seat and is running for the position again in the 2018 election.

I had a few minutes to sit down with Jonathan and talk about his first year in office. "It's been a great opportunity. I just hit the floor running and look for opportunities to get involved," said Petree. "I enjoy the other members of the board. Even though we are all different, we all work together well and come to a great consensus."

During his first year he has been faithful about being available. "I return 100% of all my calls. Sometimes I have to leave a message, but I do so," added Petree. "I don't always have the answer but I sure try to find out what the caller needs."

Petree is proud of some accomplishments so far in his term. First of all, in December 2016, retirement and healthcare for educators was discussed. Petree fought hard to protect the teachers retirements in the Florida Retirement System versus changing over to a 401K program. He continues to search for ways to lower the healthcare expenses.

Petree was instrumental and consistent on safety at our schools. Callahan Intermediate School has had a problem for years with dropping off and picking up children from schools. Sometimes the line is so long that is actually stops on CR 108. Petree worked diligently with the Board of County Commissioners and the Road Department to get flashing lights during the school zone placed on CR 108. "The best part about it all is making our students safer," said Petree. "The



next part is that it didn't cost the NCSB anything."

Petree has set his goal on getting more Resource Officers at the schools. Last year, he made a personal trip to Washington, D.C. and met with Congressman John Rutherford concerning this issue. Rutherford totally agreed that in the world today, it would be great to have resource officers at every school.

As Petree has toured all of the schools in Nassau County his new passion has become promoting more vocational classes for our students. "Believe it or not, we already have 13 vocational programs going on in our west side schools ranging from Administrative Office Specialist to Building Construction; from HVAC/ Electricity to Nursing Assistants," continued Petree. "Not every student is built for college. Learning a trade is lifetime. Many of these vocational classes are at the local high schools and some are taught at the Bean Center at FSCJ. All are free to high school students."

Petree continues to strive to serve the residents and students of Nassau County. While still being a husband and father of four and having a fulltime job, he still has found time to judge a science fair at CMS, be a judge for FBLA Districts, read in Bryceville for Literacy Week and still handle his school board obligations with a smile on his face. We appreciate your hard work for our students and teachers!
