



Relay for Life ... Meet Emily Hehn

Editor's note: As Relay for Life Nassau County West draws near, we will be sharing stories of cancer survivors for the next few weeks. The Relay will be held Friday, April 6 at 6 p.m. at the NE FL Fairgrounds. Survivors may sign up at the Westside Journal office.

Emily Hehn

Aloha! My name is Emily Leilani Hehn and I am a Warrior and a Survivor! I was diagnosed with Invasive Ductal Breast Cancer, which was successfully removed on December 23, 2016 by the amazing surgery team at UF Health North. I will never forget that date. My life changed forever and I cherish every new day. In addition to the lumpectomy removal of the cancerous and surrounding tissue, my surgeon performed biopsies on three lymph nodes. By the grace of God, the cancer was caught early in Stage 1 and was contained in the duct. Three weeks after my surgery, I began radiation treatments. I received radiation every morning, Monday through Friday then went to work at 11:30 a.m. for 4 weeks straight. I never missed one day of work throughout the 4 weeks going to Proton Therapy. My last radiation treatment was on Valentine's Day, February 14, 2017. After my last treatment, my husband Randy asked me if I wanted to ring the celebration chimes in the lobby to indicate that my time there was over. When I grabbed the rope and rang the chimes, to my surprise, everyone in the whole lobby started clapping, even the security guard who I came to know on a first name basis. Each person in that lobby has an incredible



story to tell and my time there was both therapeutic and humbling. By God's grace, my oncologist determined that I did not have to undergo chemotherapy. However, she did prescribe medications for me to take for the next five years and to undergo diagnostic mammograms every six months as a precaution. I agreed to have my cancer cells tested by the UF Health Genetic Testing Department. The tests determined that the cancer was sporadic and not genetic, which was great news to pass along to my children and grandchildren.

To me, one of the most incredible chapters of my cancer story is my job as a custodian at West Nassau played in discovering my diagnosis. My husband's grandmother told me when God closes a door he opens a window. Looking back, I can see how this applies to how I found out I had cancer. Prior to working as a custodian I had been a Store Manager of a franchise in Jacksonville for 8 years with no benefits. Although I loved my job, my bosses and my customers, the store's landlord did not renew our lease so it closed and I was without a full time job. I had previously worked for private and public businesses and have a degree in Business Administration. I updated my resume and applied at the Nassau

County School District for a job as a Substitute Teacher, passing the comprehensive Sub Training requirements. I told the head of HR I really wanted to work. She suggested that I sign up for sub everything: Teacher, Paraprofessional, Food Service Worker and Custodian. One day I was training with the Cafeteria ladies at West Nassau. I found out that Food

Workers are nine month employees, but custodians are 12 month employees. I applied for the custodian fulltime position at the school, and again, by God's grace, I got the job and started working fulltime in May 2016. An insurance benefit fair was held and

I signed up to receive benefits for the first time in 10 years. Their Wellness Program includes a free mammogram for employees 50 years old. The mammogram showed an abnormality, which led to a diagnostic mammogram,



then a biopsy, then my diagnosis. This is how I found out that I had cancer. I am so grateful to so many people that played a part in saving my life.

I'm so thankful to all of the doctors, nurses, hospital staff, coworkers, teachers, staff and students, church family and especially family members all over the globe who lifted me up in your thoughts and

prayers. Because of you and the grace of God I am living cancer free. My goal in life is to see my five grandchildren (Gabriel, Leilani, Liam, Colton and Kaelyn) graduate from high school, preferably at West Nassau High School! Go Warriors!

Do You Not Know?

I am not a flower person. Oh, I know the difference between an orchid and a rose bush but don't ask me details about the names, types and sizes of different flowering plants. Don't misunderstand. I enjoy the beauty and the smell of many kinds of flowers. Judith, my sweet wife, enjoys growing flowers and talking about them. This past week Judith and I were in Asheville, NC. We were invited to go to the Biltmore House and were able to walk through their beautiful gardens and greenhouses. One room, dedicated to orchids had many sizes, shapes and colors of orchids; bright red, yellow, blue, big, tiny and even one that looked like fingers

hanging down. The only other time I have seen so many kinds of orchids in one place was in Indonesia in a collection of orchids from the jungle.

These orchids remind me that behind everything there is a Creator. It is impossible to imagine that each flower just "grew" or "decided" to be yellow or white or very tiny. When the plant reproduces another set of flowers they are exactly like the previous ones. Just like when we looked at the huge Biltmore House, we knew that there was an architect behind the planning and building. So it is with all creation.

We marvel at the detail and development of each orchid flower. It is more mindboggling to consider the minute details God designed in each person. We each have characteristics uniquely different and yet we have each been created in the God's image and for His glory. Each person has a mind and heart with the power of choice. In Psalm 139:14 we read, "I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well."

Q: I live in Yulee, and I am having problems with grassy weeds in the shady area on the lawn. I did apply a turf-builder in August 2017 and fertilized again with a winter guard in November 2017. Can I apply Bonus S Weed and Feed now? RH

A: We recommend using 15-0-15 on any of the warm season grown grasses in this area. The other

fertilizers you have used are generally too high in nitrogen compared to the last number which is potassium. We have found using too much nitrogen can contribute to insect and disease stress ultimately causing its demise. If too much nitrogen is combined with too much water then I generally give the grass about 3-4 years and it will need to be replaced.

While applying fertilizer and weed killers together is convenient, it is not the best practice for the grass. We suggest applying a pre-emergent weed killer in March to manage spring and summer weeds then again in October for fall and winter weeds. This does not need to be done annually unless you notice a weed problem. The chemical label indicates the active ingredient in the weed killer can cause damage to the lawn if applied in the heat of the summer. No reason to do it in the dormant season (cooler temperatures) as the grass is not actively taking up substances through the roots this time of year.

We recommend applying 15-0-15 on April 15 and again September 15 when the grass is actively growing. We suggest applying 1-2 pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet annually. and then make the two applications. If you want to fertilize in the summer months - take care to apply small amounts as the weed, disease and insect populations are at their peak in these hot months, too.

One other important thing to know about grass: it normally requires 6-8 hours of full sun to perform well. Grass growing in shade will become thin and allow for weeds to become established. If shade is a problem, consider expanding the area under the tree canopy with mulch and possibly other types of ground cover. Grass growing in shady areas need less fertilizer and less water.

Lastly, I am available on the first and third Mondays of the month (unless it is a holiday) from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. You can dig up a section of the lawn where you are having problems and I will look at it for you. If it has a disease, I will find it. If the grass has insects, I will find them. Be sure the grass roots are attached and you must bring me living tissue. Dead grass it just that dead grass. I cannot give an accurate diagnosis. Take a section just outside of the area where it is doing poorly and be sure the portion is fresh.

I know I gave you a very long answer to your question. To recap: do not use winterizers, turfbuilders or weed and feed products as they generally contain too much nitrogen compared to potassium. For more complete information, we will have a lawn grass class taught by Nelson Peterson, Master

Gardener volunteer, on June 6 at the Yulee satellite office at 10 a.m.

Q: Can you identify this weed for me? SM

A: The weed you brought to the Yulee office is called Florida Pellitory, Parietaria floridana. This is a native, annual or short-lived perennial with small leaves. It does a green flower but the flowers are very small and nondistinct. It really has no outstanding physical characteristics. The only means of propagation is by seed. Most often this weed is found in grasses grown in moist, shady sites where the grass becomes thin and allows for seeds to reproduce. Florida Pellitory can be found from New Hampshire south to Florida and west to Texas. However, before you decide to destroy the weed, please consider this plant is the larval host for the Red Admiral butterfly. Here

is your chance to provide a food source for a beautiful and beneficial insect. Hopefully you will decide to leave the plant alone. Keep me posted!


Q: I came back from a trip to find my pine tree looking like this. What could be wrong? LT

A. This looks like mechanical damage. It appears to have been hit hard by something possibly backing



into it. The linear line of the sap running indicates it is something manmade. The sap you see is the tree's

response to the damage. It will most likely not kill the tree but the damage is permanent. This means the tree is working on sealing off the wound but the vascular tissue will probably no longer allow for water and nutrients to go to the rest of the tree in this specific area of the tree. However, 3/4 of the vascular tissue will be operating which is enough to provide the sustenance to the rest of the tree.

• If indeed you owe money to the IRS and fail to make a fairly-accurate estimated payment with the extension then you still will be assessed

(1) Interest on the debt owed;

(2) 5% each month (or part thereof... even one day late) of the tax due penalty for the first 5 months $(5 \times 5\% = 25\%)$ for delay of payment;

(3) And additional kinds and types of non-deductible penalties for failure to file and/or for failure to pay by or before the first due date of your tax return if you actually owe IRS money.

The bottom line: Extensions only grant you an addition time to file your final return ... it does not grant you more time to pay the taxes you owe as of Tuesday, April 17, 2018.

WHAT IF YOU DO NOT OWE MONEY TO THE IRS?

1. You can still file for an automatic extension just in case you suspect that you might still do owe money...kind of a "fail safe" thing.

2. You can file later (one day later ... and more) without penalty (but remember, if you take too much time (3 years maximum) to file then you lose the refund(s) you might otherwise care to get).

3. You can simply file for an extension, then relax and use the additional time to see your tax pro and get the chore accomplished when the rest of the taxpayers that owe take up his or her time before April 17, 2018.

In any event, if you have not yet filed, or if you need to change the return information you already sent in and wish to amend your return within 30 days of your error discovery, you should contact:

WILLIAM LENON WALTERS





Identity Theft What to do if You Are a Victim

Identity theft occurs when someone uses your personal information without your permission. They can buy things with your credit cards, get new credit cards, open a phone, electric or gas account, steal your tax refund, get medical care, etc. The thief can get your personal information in person or online. In 2016, an estimated 15.4 million consumers were victims of identity theft. Fraud losses totaled 16 billion dollars. About 1 in every 16 adults were victims of identity theft. The implementation of EMV (Europay, MasterCard[®] & Visa[®]) chip is reducing thieves from duplicating credit cards. Counterfeit credit cards are down 52%.

If someone uses your personal or financial information, follow these steps:

Step 1: Call the companies (fraud department) where you know fraud occurred – explain that someone stole your identity. Ask them to close or freeze the accounts. Then, no one can add new charges unless you agree. Also change logins, passwords and PINS for your accounts.

Step 2: Place a fraud alert and get your credit reports. A fraud alert on your credit report notifies lenders and creditors who pull your report to take additional steps to verify your identification before they extend a credit line or loan in your name. This can help prevent a thief from opening any new accounts in your name and reduce your chances of becoming a victim of identity theft.

Under the Fair Credit Reporting Act (FCRA), consumers may place fraud alerts on their credit reports with the three major credit bureaus, free of charge. The bureau you contact is required to notify the other two credit bureaus to place an alert on your file. You will get a letter from each credit bureau confirming they placed a fraud alert on your file.



Get your credit reports from all three credit reporting bureaus at annualcreditreport.com or 877-322-8228 and review all your reports.

Step 3: Report your identity theft to the FTC (Federal Trade Commission) at IdentityTheft. gov or 877-438-4338. It is important to report identity theft to the FTC and get your report because it guarantees you certain rights: Place a 90-day initial fraud alert on your credit report; Place a seven-year extended fraud alert on your credit report; Get free copies of your credit report; Get fraudulent information removed (or blocked) from your credit report; Dispute fraudulent or inaccurate information on your credit report; Stop creditors and debt collectors from reporting fraudulent account; Get copies of documents related to the identity theft; Stop a debt collector from contacting you.

Based on the information you enter on IdentityTheft.gov or give when you call 877-438-4338 an Identity Theft Report and Recovery Plan will be created. For more detailed information about what to do after completing Step 3 go to www.IdentityTheft.gov/Steps.

Leadership Youth Nassau is a 4-H program composed of high school students from all over Nassau County. The program convenes once a month and is dedicated to nurturing the leadership abilities of Nassau County's future leaders. On February 21. the group focused

their attention on art, history and the quality of life in Nassau County. The day began early, as the students gathered at Amelia Community Theatre





in historic Fernandina Beach. They were led on a tour of the theatre's two main components, Studio 209 and the mainstage theatre, by ACT's Linda McClain and Tener Wade. Studio 209 is a black-box theatre, meaning that it is a smaller and more intimate environment than the main stage. ACT had a minimal set for the show Fly by Night in place, exposing the students to how detail varies with sets and across styles of theatre. its principles were demonstrated by Philippe Boets and Jimmy Weinsier; the latter being the president of the Fernandina Beach chapter of Petanque America since the chapter's founding in 2010. After spending a very relaxed hour with these two lively men, the group returned to the other side of Brett's to begin their final excursion of the day: a go-with-the-flow history tour with Amelia River Cruises.
