The Town of Callahan council met Monday night for their final meeting of April. Bernard Jones addressed the council concerning opening a new business in town. "I just wanted to get your feel about me opening a new Bar & Grill in the old Butt Hut location," said

Jones. "I've been in business for myself in Jacksonville for about 20 years. I thought a respectable eating place would be good in Callahan. A place where people could watch college football games on

Saturday and NFL games on Sundays."

"What kind of alcohol are you talking about?" asked Councilman Marty Fontes.

"Just beer and wine, no hard liquor," added Jones.

"I think any new business is great for Callahan," said Fontes.

The first agenda item was a presentation from Dr. Lynn Hyatt, First Baptist Church Callahan. "Our church family and mission team have partnered with the Town of Callahan on the pavilion project at Ewing Park," said Dr. Hyatt. "We found a contractor to take the job and we're going to supply the labor, however our labor could only work on Saturdays. We realized that the project had a tight time frame. In keeping with our partnership we wanted to present the town \$5,000 to pay for the labor cost for this project. We love Callahan and our community and we (the church) want to do all we can to help out."

Dr. Hyatt presented the check to Parks & Recreation Commissioner Kathy Smith and Mayor Bobby Rau. "We really appreciate this so much," said Smith. "I went to the park today. The pavilions look great. Thank you again."

In other business, the council gave the mayor the authority to approve the municipal election agreement, barring the account abaption the turner and

Mayor Rau advised the council that the town has hired Krista King as the new Water/Sewer Clerk. "I think she is a great addition to our staff," said Mayor Rau.

Councilman David Mellecker advised the council that the west side Chamber had merged with the east side chamber. "What does this mean for the Christmas parade? I don't think the east side is going to do a Callahan parade."

"We'll wait and see where they go with this," said Fontes. "I've done parades before. We can do it. The parade will not die. We've had it here too many years."

"The Chamber director Regina Duncan has already contacted us (the Town)," said Town Clerk Stephanie Knagge. "I will invite her to our next meeting."

Knagge also advised the council that National Day of Prayer will be Thursday, May 3. "Do we want to have it at the park or Fire station and what time," asked Knagge. "Maybe we could also have our unveiling of the park that day and have refreshments."

The council agreed to have the Prayer service at the Park at 5:30 p.m. on May 3. They will further discuss refreshments and finalize plans this week.



In my job, as many jobs, I try to be organized with each day. I do have a planner that I have to write down appointments, interviews and events so I don't forget them. I've learned the older I get, I have to write down everything or I will forget it. My weeks are routine, as when you are on a deadline like we are with the paper, things must be completed in an orderly fashion. And trust me; there are variations to our routine when things happen.

A couple of months ago, my routine changed. It was a Wednesday and I was heading out to do our afternoon deliveries to Callahan and Hilliard. I called Roger as I always do to let him know I was on the road and would be home eventually! It was around 6:30 p.m. when I finally got home. I began fixing us some supper. Roger came into the kitchen and leaned on the counter beside me and told me he wasn't feeling well. He said his chest felt tight. He had me convinced it was probably indigestion or maybe it was anxiety making him feel this way but maybe we should go check it out. "Check it out? Where?" I questioned. "Let's go to the hospital," he said.

We drove to Baptist North both of us silent and holding hands all the way. I thought to myself...this wasn't in my planner. Dear Jesus, help us through this. Everything started moving real fast as we got to the hospital with chest pains. They did an EKG and blood work immediately. The doctor came in and questioned us, as Roger had a heart attack about 11 years ago and received one stent. "At this point, I'm going to transfer you to Baptist downtown for a stress test tomorrow. But first we'll see what the blood work shows," said the doctor.

"Is this really happening?" we both asked. We held each other and prayed. Shortly the doctor returned to say

Roger's blood enzymes were elevated and he had a minor heart attack or still was. Now he would still be transferred but now they would do a heart cath Thursday. Long story short, Thursday morning Roger had a heart cath and received two stents: one on the left side and one on the right side of his heart. Both sides were 90% blocked. The heart muscle was not damaged, thank you Jesus. Roger (and me) continues to heal and strengthen each day.

I say all of this to say even the best of plans can be changed. We can all be so wrapped up in events and activities that we don't make time to rest. We don't make time for the important events in life. I'm so thankful to have a loving heavenly father who takes our weary bodies and mends us. God is so good to me every day of my life. I have learned that through these 'valleys' in my life, God continues to stand tall and make me a stronger better person. There have been many tragedies in our community. My heart breaks to see people suffer. I also pray that they also have the healing comfort of a loving heavenly father. God never changes. He is the same today and every day with an unconditional love for his children.

Our lives have changed for the better through this event. We were reminded to lean completely on God for His direction in our lives. We knew that we should, He just gave us a reminder. If you don't have the Lord as your Savior, I pray that you would take that opportunity today. I'm thankful that God provided a wonderful doctor to give Roger back to me! Let's all make sure to keep God as a top priority in our planners as we go through each day! I certainly do!

In the Kitchen... Sunday Best Fruit Salad

1 (20 oz.) can pineapple chunks, juice reserved 2 apples, peeled and cored

2 bananas, peeled and diced 3 kiwis

1 (21 oz.) can peach pie filling

1 pint strawberries

In a small bowl, toss the chopped apples in reserved pineapple juice. Allow to sit for 5 to 10 minutes. In a large salad bowl, combine the peach pie filling and pineapple chunks. Remove apples from pineapple juice and add to pie filling and pineapple mixture. Add chopped bananas to reserved pineapple juice and let sit for 5 to 10 minutes. Peel and slice kiwi and 1/2 of strawberries. Chop the other 1/2 of strawberries and set aside. Remove bananas from pineapple juice and add to pie filling mixture. Add chopped strawberries; toss together. Arrange kiwi slices around the edge of the serving bowl and alternate with strawberry slices. Chill and serve.

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Fishing Forecast

This weekend should hold a great bite during the early morning hours. Our tide will begin its way in a little after day break. Start with natural colored paddle tail grubs or just tip a Reel Habit Flounder Jig with a live mud minnow or live shrimp. Focus on oyster beds around creek mouths in the Intracoastal. Remember less is more and what I mean by that is don't over work the bait. Allow some pauses in between your retrieval to mimic an injured or dying bait. Redfish and Speckled Trout are targeting bait as they head for cover. Having said that, there are many really nice trout congregating around both the Nassau Sounds and the mouth of the St. Johns River up to White Shell. Trout like the cleaner water so the first of the outgoing and last of the incoming have seemed to produce best. I've had some great reports from Blount Island to down town. Bait has begun to run along the rocks and docks. Larger predatory fish stack up around those bait sources all through the day.

Next, BIG Blues are still a dime a dozen. Nearly everywhere you turn, you have a run in with one. There's not much you can throw that they won't inhale so be prepared to lose some tackle. We've had some huge blue fish caught this month. Many of those have been upwards of 36 inches or better.

Moving on, flounder are moving in but still spotty from Jacksonville south to Vilano Beach. I've seen a few caught in the 2 lb. range most are still running small. Triple Tail has begun to show from Brunswick to St. Augustine. Bull reds are still frequenting our river channels along with black drum. Stud sheepshead are still being caught on all of the Jetty's and of course most of our inshore structure. With that said, look for a great weekend of fishing, if the winds subside. Tides for Saturday the 21st: low tide around 8:30 a.m. and a high tide around 1:45 p.m.

Have a great weekend and I hope to see you on the water!

Any of the over 260 volunteers that signed up had a possibility of receiving a "door prize" if their name was drawn.

One of the simple rules was: if your name was chosen,

you had to be present to receive your gift. I was amazed at the number of people who forfeited a nice gift of a tool, gift card/certificate for food or supplies at a local store, etc. because they were not present.

This principle can be applied to life. There are many opportunities that we miss simply because we do not follow through or are not present when we should be. Perhaps we lost a job because we never arrived to work on time. Maybe there was an opportunity to help someone and now you regret letting that opportunity slip between your fingers.

Young Actors Sought for Music Video



Nassau's Mitigation Plan Will Help County Better Prepare

Nassau County and its municipalities are better prepared for disasters with the recent federal approval of their local hazard mitigation plan, a long-term strategy to reduce the community's vulnerability to natural disasters. Nassau County's Board of County Commissioners, the City of Fernandina Beach, Town of Hilliard and Town of Callahan have each adopted the plan by official resolution.

Nassau County Drafted by Emergency Management planners, this risk-mitigation plan identifies local hazards and potential vulnerabilities throughout the county, and creates a framework to help community officials make decisions that may ultimately protect lives and property. The plan also outlines a strategy for implementing mitigation projects in Nassau County. Through projects such as drainage improvements and structure elevation, Nassau County is taking proactive steps to lessen the impact of future disasters and the costly expenses associated with them.

History shows that the physical, financial, and emotional losses caused by disasters can be reduced significantly through hazard analysis and risk mitigation planning. The planning process encourages communities to integrate mitigation with day-to-day decision making regarding land-use planning, floodplain management, site design, and other activities.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) reviews and approves state, tribal and local hazard mitigation plans, which are required as a condition for states and communities to receive certain types of disaster assistance, including funding for wind, flood and other hazard mitigation projects. State and local mitigation plans must be updated, reviewed and approved at least once every five years.

Maritime Museum Expo This Weekend

Have you ever wanted to find sunken treasures? You can find it now at the Maritime Museum of Amelia Island. On display, there are silver and gold Spanish coins found right off Fernandina Beach, a silver bar from a Spanish galleon sunk off the Florida Keys, a silver cross on a rosary found in Yulee near the Bell River and a 40.2 carat emerald smuggled out of Brazil long ago in a conch shell filled with sand. A mannequin of Luis Aury (aka Jose Gaspar), who raised the Mexican Rebel Flag as the 6th of the 8 flags to fly over Amelia Island, stands guard over the valuable artifacts, weapons and pirate flags. You can also speak with the underwater treasure salvers, some of whom are from Hilliard (Matt Batten and Scott Jensen, Maritime Archeologist) who found some of these and other items that are on display.

If antique firearms spark your interest, you can find a "duck's foot" pistol with 3 barrels like the ones used





by the pirate Blackbeard (aka Edward Teach). Muskets from the 1600s and 1700s are displayed with a musket made of rare African Tiger wood along with a blunderbuss musket used to scatter shot at close range. A variety of musket balls and cannon balls are also on display, including the cannon ball shot on March 4, 1862 at the Confederate train leaving town carrying coal and passengers, including (allegedly) David Yulee. On display is a model of the Union gunboat USS Ottowa that fired a cannon ball from a Dalgren Gun Cannon, also on display. Next to that display is a cannon from the 1715 Silver Plate Fleet from Jupiter, Florida. That cannon is 12 feet long and weighs 3,300 pounds.


Civil war artifacts also include Griswald pistols, Confederate money printed at the Bank of Fernandina and the personal effects of Confederate General Richard Taylor.

World War II artifacts include an I-beam from the USS Arizona, the only

known piece from that ship outside the state of Hawaii. The Arizona was sunk

when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941 ("A day which will live in infamy," as FDR declared). Another artifact on display from that fateful day is a Japanese flag from the jacket of a Japanese bomber pilot, whose plane was shot down by the curator's grandfather.

On April 21 and 22, the Maritime Museum is sponsoring its Annual Treasure Hunters' Expo, which will feature treasures that local groups have



found. Metal detecting equipment will also be on display and will be available

> for purchase. All of these artifacts are on display at the Maritime Museum from Tuesday through Saturday at 9:30 a.m. through 5 p.m. The Museum located is at 115 South 2nd Street, Suite B in

Fernandina Beach, next to the distillery. Tours are available at no extra charge. Additional information may be obtained by calling Curator Billy Taylor at 904-432-7086.

A Hyundai Elantra driven by Brandon Graham whom was also traveling westbound struck Shannon Bollinger and debris from the accident scene.

Shannon Bollinger was pronounced deceased at the scene, Curtis Bollinger was transported to UF Health by Nassau County Rescue in serious condition. The driver of the Hyundai and his passenger Raineys Rowe were not injured.



Garden Talk

Q: What is wrong with my roses? It is happening only on part of the rose bush. CA

A: This was so unusual, I had to photograph it and take it to UF/ IFAS Pathology Diagnostic Center for identification. Initially, they thought the cause was the use of herbicide which typically causes abnormal growth in plants. However, since you assured me



there had been no herbicides sprayed on your property, I asked them to look elsewhere. They

decided to test for phytoplasmas and found them in all the rose leaf specimens. Phytoplasmas are parasitic microscopic organisms which live in the cells of plants and cause various diseases. They are bacterial-like organisms which cannot live outside of living tissue. These phytoplasmas are spread mainly by leafhopper and planthopper insects feeding on the phloem tissues of infected plants. In instances of highly expensive plants like palms, it is possible to inject an anti-biotic into the vascular tissue to manage the disease. This injection into a palm tree will require the expertise of a certified arborist. In this case, the UF/IFAS Pathology specialists recommended pruning out the diseased portion and destroying the cut branches. Do not allow the plant material to remain as litter around the base of the plant as this can provide additional sources of the phytoplasma and disease. If the whole plant is infected then it is best to

destroy the whole plant. As it turns out, some of the roses in our demonstration garden were also affected and we will need to remove several plants too. Very sad. A special DNA type test must be conducted to detect phytoplasmas in the cells. These tests are expensive and take special training and time to complete. The costs of diagnostic tests run from \$40 - \$125 each.

Q: Is bee balm easy to grow here? LW

A. Bee balm or Horsemint, Monarda punctate, is very easy to grow. It will reach heights from 12 to 18 inches. Bee balm plants are classified as herbaceous perennials which means they do not

develop hard, woody stems. Bee balm or horsemint produces fragrant, beautiful pink flowers lasting from the summer through the fall. It is native to moist, coastal upland

sites in Florida including the northeast part of Florida. This wildflower does well in partial shade to partial sun so be sure to avoid full sun exposure in westside afternoon sun. Bee balm is moderately drought tolerant if planted in organic well-drained soil. Bee balm attracts butterflies, bird and other native pollinators. One interesting fact: bee balm was used by Native Americans to make a "sweating tea." This was generally a process done for ritual ceremonies.

ATTENTION LOCAL TAXPAYERS: Many Federal Tax Extender Provisions Retroactively Extended by Congress and You Definitely Need to Know This! Written by Pamela J. Soule, Enrolled Agent

On December 22, President Donald Trump signed into law THE TAX CUTS and JOBS ACT. While many local taxpayers know about that event, very few yet know that congress and the courts (and even IRS) changed and/or "corrected" additional laws even during the recent tax season.

We highly recommend an immediate review of all local tax returns that incurred (check the list and then check the boxes that you might need to review with our office for possible tax return amendments);

• Taxpayers paid mortgage insurance premiums according to their mortgage escrow statements but were first denied that deduction prior to February 9, 2018 and then (and now) permitted to claim it now as mortgage interest as it was before back in 2016.

• Taxpayers were denied cancelation of debt for home acquisition debt up to \$2,000,000 but are now more likely to be approved

• Taxpayers were denied tuition deductions "above the line" on the front of your 1040 tax return... it is likely now deductible with the change in that law

• Taxpayers were denied tax credits for insulation, storm doors, etc. that are now allowable
