Nassau Deputy Fired and Arrested on Perjury Charges

Kyle Tholl was hired as a Nassau County Deputy on December 8, 2014 and he was fired on December 20, 2017. Previously he was a law enforcement officer in Texas.

NCSO received a complaint from the State Attorney's Office and began an internal investigation as to the facts

of their allegations of being untruthful. Once determined he was not being truthful in some of his reports, he was immediately terminated and a criminal investigation began. The Nassau County



its employees violating the public's trust. Once aware of the situation, NCSO took immediate action investigating the allegation. "We take our obligation to protect citizens seriously and any abuse of power will be met with swift consequences," said Sheriff Leeper.

It was determined by our investigators and the State Attorney's Office there were four separate traffic stops, which he stated in his arrest reports and affidavits that he field tested drugs for accuracy, when October 30, 2017 and November 5th, 6th, and 14th, 2017. Reviewing incar camera video and other evidence, showed that he failed to field test drugs on four separate occasions (traffic stops) when he stated in his reports that he did.

Deputies receive training during their 18-week field training program on narcotics identification and the use of field test kits. All narcotics are submitted to FDLE for testing. They are an independent state agency with the lab expertise in testing the accuracy of drugs.

NCSO immediately instituted a policy where all field testing of drugs must be captured on the officer's car

officer must have another officer as a witness. The results of the drug field kit tests are presumptive establishing probable cause for arrest, but the actual drugs are sent to FDLE for verification for any prosecution.

In all of these cases, there was a reason to arrest the individual, either because of a suspended driver license or having a concealed weapon without a license regardless of drug possession.

"Why he would throw away his career for no reason, by not field testing drugs that were found, I'm not sure, but certainly we will not tolerate anyone not being truthful," continued Leeper. "Once a law enforcement officer's credibility is

My social security went up \$25 putting me \$8 over the income limit so I lost everything. My next month check is going to be \$400 less because they took out 3 months of back premiums. I have heard of other people in the same situation.

There is a woman who is blind and has no legs who lost everything because she was \$2 over the limit. So my question is, what guidelines do illegal immigrants have that come in our country every day? Just because

they have children they automatically qualify. I don't want anyone to think that I want to see any children suffer but I wish we would take care of the people that worked and contributed to our country their entire lives. I worked in the restaurant business most of my life and there were many workers from Mexico. I will never forget what one of them told me, "Our company gave us health insurance." I asked her if she bought it and she said, "Why? The government pays for everything, even diapers." She has worked there over 5 years with papers that she purchased when she first came in the country. The company knew that this was going on but said as long as they had documentation they were legal.

I am sure that this is still going on and I don't know about you but I am so sick of

### **Genealogy Tidbits**

Claude Arpen

As you drive east on A1A toward Fernandina Beach you pass through the community of O'Neill. Henry and Margaret O'Neill came to Florida from South Carolina after the American Revolution. Henry was a Major in the Loyalist Militia of South Carolina. In 1782, O'Neill came to the British Colony of East Florida, hoping to get a land grant. However, Florida was returned to Spain after the treaty of Paris in 1783. Henry decided to remain in Spanish Florida. The Spanish governor of East Florida appointed O'Neill 'Magistrate of Northeast Florida.' O'Neill was killed in 1788 chasing an outlaw on Cumberland Island, Georgia.

O'Neill's widow, Margaret received a land grant from the Spanish government in 1792 for her husband's service. The grant covers all land east of Lanceford Creek along Barnwell Road and west of the creek that includes Black Rock. Margaret passed away in 1802 and is buried in Bosque Bello Cemetery in Fernandina Beach.

Henry and Margaret had 11 children but only three: Eber, Margaret and William married and had families. William married Jane King of Camden County, Georgia. Margaret married James King, Jane's brother. Eber married Mary Andrews. Some of the pioneer families from Henry and Margaret are Higginbotham, Wingate, Sheffield, Blount, Bachlott and Bedell.

#### Chris Cockerham, Reel Habit

No, I'm not talking about those bright lights on the 4th of July. I'm referring to the high flying action of one of the most sought after sport fish found along Florida's coast. If you've ever seen one bursting out of the water after setting a hook, then you know exactly what I'm talking about. There a many names for tarpon such as big scales, poon, sabalo or one of the most common Silver Kings. Right now, tarpon can be found all over the region. They have acquainted pretty much all of our inlets from St. Mary's south. They are feeding heavily on pogie pods and ambushing large mullet running along the rocks.

If you're game, you can also join in on the action! Just float a live mullet along the river channel under the Nassau Sounds Bridge or you can run the beach and find them targeting the bait pods just outside our jetties. I typically use 60 to 80 pound flourocarbon and a popping cork rigged with an 8/0 or 9/0 hook. Then I add a live pogie or just free line a large mullet behind the boat. I've had the best luck when I clip the tail off a large roe mullet. Cutting the tail off keeps the fish up close to the surface and it also gives the bait that injured action. Make sure your drag is set correctly and hang on!

Moving on to flounder or maybe we should stick to tarpon (ha ha). All kidding aside, we really have seen a few nice fish caught inshore. Mud minnows have given the best results and artificial baits are a really close second. For the most part, many of our fish are coming from the jetties around Mayport. Further south, the docks around the Matanzas Inlet have been very consistent as well. A few of our friends have brought in some really nice stringers from down that way. If I was going to put money on any given place it'd definitely be St. Augustine though. They've seen rain but they aren't experiencing the amount of fresh water river run off that we have just to the north. Fish the top of the outgoing tide and the incoming when the "water clears." As far as I'm concerned, that will yield your best results.

My flounder hot spots for the weekend will include: the Mayport Jetties, the docks and structure along the St. Johns Inlet and the docks around Matanzas Inlet. Focus on the edge of the river drop off and keep an eye out for bait. Fan cast the area and fish thorough. Once you find the depth these fish are holding, keep pitching that same depth while looking for their pattern. Stay focused and be consistent!

With that said, I hope you all had a great 4th of July! May you all have a good weekend and be safe out there on the water!







### Spotlight on Nassau Gardens

Marva and James Mitchell both grew up in Callahan and enjoy living there. They have been married 56 years and moved into this lovely home, also in Callahan, over 50 years ago. A cedar tree planted itself there, but they have planted everything else in their yard. The century plant, (Agave Americana 'Marginata'), is monocarpic, meaning it will bloom once in its lifetime. The name "century plant" comes from the fact that the slow-growing plant takes years - but not 100 - to flower. The Century plant is a hardy survivor, tolerating heat, drought and salty seaside conditions. It grows best in full sun but can adapt to shade. After 10 years or more (though not a century), a lofty flower spike is produced, sometimes reaching a height of 20 feet or more, with

terminal panicles of pale yellow to white blooms. The plant dies after blooming. The Mitchells' century plant has not bloomed in at least 30 years. The upwardfacing yellow flowers grow in clusters at the end of the horizontal branches near the top of the tall stalk that may be even 25 feet tall. James and Marva are enjoying its beauty! This plant has many baby plants around the bottom and there are also other smaller century plants on their property. Marva









Additionally, the School Safety Specialist is responsible for serving as a liaison with local public safety agencies and national, state, and community agencies and organizations in matters of school safety and security; conducting an annual school security risk assessment at each public school; reviewing policies and procedures of the school district for compliance with state law concerning school safety; providing training to students and school district staff; and providing annual recommendations concerning strategies and activities to improve school safety and security.

At its meeting on Thursday, June 28, the Nassau County School Board voted to hire Detective Alfred 'Al' Smith to serve as School Safety Specialist for the Nassau County School District. Detective Smith is a twenty-seven year veteran of the Fernandina Beach



A: I see no advantage to removing the Red Bay, Persea borbonia, tree before the ambrosia beetle attacks it.

This invasive beetle is still here. There are literally dozens of species growing in this area in which it can live and survive quite



well. At least one of the favored species (camphor tree) is considered a pest here. I have noticed many of the leaves on the local camphor trees, which are evergreen, have turned yellow. The leaves are normally a dark, green color year 'round. Thriving on little care in full sun or partial shade, Redbay can tolerate a wide range of soils, from hot and dry to wet and swampy. So, to answer your question, I would say leave the native bay tree alone and let's hope for the best. If you decide to cut the bay tree down, do not transfer the wood from one area to another – this is most likely how the beetle moved from Georgia throughout Florida.

all over my yard? I have fertilized with sludge, turfbuilders, weed and feed products and several weed killers. It does not go away. RR

A: I am going to take this opportunity to remind everyone – the appropriate fertilizer for all grasses grown in Northeast Florida is 15-0-15 applied April 15 and September 15 only. The sludges, turfbuilders and weed and feed products contain too much nitrogen compared to the last number (potassium). We do not recommend any of these products. With the freezing temperatures we experienced this winter, it is perfectly normal for St. Augustinegrass to go dormant and the

leaves or blades of grass to turn brown. If the grass has a healthy root system, it should return once our



temperatures remain warm several days in a row. The weed you brought to me is called knawel, Scleranthus annuus. This weed is a winter annual which is found all along the Eastern Seaboard of the United States, from Canada to Florida. Its only means of propagation is by seed. The thin, multi-branched leaves are attached directly to the stem (this is called sessile). It looks like lawn burweed but does not have the sharp spines. Since it reproduces only by seed, it is best managed by putting out a pre-emergent herbicide (atrazine or trifluralin – NOT both!) in October to keep the seeds from germinating in the winter. You can apply these products in March to help control summer weeds. As always, please read and follow the directions on the label – "The Label is the Law." Knawel weed will soon die off in our summer heat but the best thing to do right now is hand pull them.

Q: My large oak tree has dozens of growths on the trunk. Several people have advised me it should be cut down because it is diseased. I hate to lose it. What should I do? PA

**A.** Your question was sent to me from a fellow certified arborist and I am so glad you called him rather than trusting someone who wants to

cut the tree down. His answer was correct regarding the condition on the oak tree being only cosmetic and not structurally damaging to the tree. The trunk galls can be caused by bacteria or fungi found in the dark, growths you see on the bark but the good news is, it generally only penetrates the bark tissue and goes no deeper. Therefore, this condition is superficial and warrants no



chemical application and certainly there is no need for removal of the tree. Having said that, it is important to give the trees an area around the roots with no other plant competition.

If possible, don't plant anything underneath tree canopy especially lawn grass. It is best to leave plenty of root space for the tree to grow without having to share or fight for water and nutrients. Allow a foot or two with nothing but soil and air then outside this area place an inch or so of pine bark or pine straw. The tree will thank you by living a long, long time and provide a strong healthy canopy. Look at other areas of the bark. If you see large, deep, longitudinal cracks or bark sloughing off then you have cause for concern.
