

Chris Cockerham, Reel Habit

My favorite season is drawing near! While many prepare for deer season, I will begin prepping my gear for the excellent fall bite. The pressure on the water will soon be transferred into the woods. Not sure about you but I'm ready for some relief from this heat regardless!

So what's the word? Well, if you do get out, red fish have been biting on the incoming tide. The use of cut baits such as mullet and crab are producing very well. Try to find cleaner water and focus on structure where they are most likely to hold. Right now, you can find reds throughout the Northeast Florida region and all along the Intracoastal waterways. Browns Creek has had great reports this week if you're headed to Jacksonville.

Next, the flounder are still on one day and off the next. Look for them around creek mouths and on the back side of ovster beds where bait is being funneled. They are being caught from Brunswick all the way down to St. Augustine. Finger mullet and live mud minnows are still the preferred bait but if you like throwing plastics, pick up a 3" gulp shrimp and try it on a weighted hook or a jig head. Again, many times gulp will out fish live bait. Focus on docks but don't overlook the small feeder creek run outs. Vilano Beach continues to have a decent bite and that will only improve from now through October.

If you are just out to bend a rod, Bull reds are making their yearly runs along the St. John's River. Reds, tarpon and sharks are everywhere. You can find them at either of our Jetties in huge numbers. You can bet that they won't be far from schooling mullet.

As for offshore, if you are interested in trolling for King Fish we still have good numbers near shore. Several kings are being caught over wrecks while free lining pogies as well. Grouper, lots of Snapper and an occasional Cobia are being caught on these wrecks also.

If you get some free time, stop by Callie Kay's in Hilliard and check out their sportsman's section. They are stocked with the latest hunting and fishing supplies! With that said, I hope you all have a great week. Till next time, I'll look forward to seeing you on the water! Be safe!





Just three short weeks ago, longtime Callahan resident, Jeanette Wingate passed away. Saturday, August 11, her sweet husband of 67 years, Roy Wingate, Jr. passed away.

The Wingates have been a family name around Callahan for years. In fact, I can remember Mr. Roy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Wingate, Sr., who were also members of the First Baptist Church Callahan. They, too, were precious people. All three of Mr. Roy, Jr. and Mrs. Jeanette's children, Janet, Leesa and Keith, attended school in Callahan and graduated from West Nassau High School.

Mr. Roy, Jr. was the owner of the Chevron Station in the middle of Callahan (where Fast Mart now is). He was the first employer of many, many young men. There weren't too many

job opportunities around but Mr. Roy was always happy to try someone out. He not only told these young men what their job description was but also to have respect, patience and be kind to his customers. Mrs. Jeanette taught fourth grade, I think. She was always so pleasant and proper. She had a beautiful smile and loved her students. She worked hard to make sure all the students understood and if they didn't, she took the extra time to help them out. She was sweet but firm in her classroom and always was in charge of her students. They respected her and she in turn respected them.

throughout the lawn. The cups are used to determine the amounts of water spraved by the irrigation system. Once the amounts are identified, the irrigation system can be "calibrated" (set time run per zone) to give out the correct water amounts. Several of the neighbors participated in measuring the water collected from various positions of Mr. Hubb's front yard. Jordi began the session in Mr. Hubb's garage, where she discussed proper fertilizer application, tree pruning and turf grass disease management, among other topics.







Affordable Housing in Nassau County

The lack in affordable housing has been a long-standing issue in Nassau County and with our growing population, one that needs to be addressed soon. In 2017, the United Way presented the ALICE Report which focused on individuals who are just above the poverty level and do not have services available to them. (ALICE is an acronym for Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed). In the report, we found that Nassau County is one of four counties in which the affordability of housing dropped more than 20% from 2007-2015. We also see in the data that 37% of low to moderate income households are struggling to make ends meet. These concerns led the Nassau Board of County Commissioners to create a committee to address the vital issue and provide recommendations on how to move forward. A group of 11 community leaders have come together to form the Nassau County Affordable Housing Committee (AHAC) to ultimately serve as a catalyst for innovative solutions. However, before we can address the issue, we must first answer, "What is affordable housing?" and "Where is it needed?"

With the assistance from Nassau County and the City of Fernandina Beach, we are contracting with the University of Florida Shimberg Center to create a comprehensive housing needs study to help us define and determine what the needs in the County truly are. Once we learn of the detailed needs, we will then begin crafting policy to effectively improve affordable housing countywide.

Many people have compared affordable housing to government subsidized homes and that is not within our plan and has not played any role in our discussion. To be clear, Nassau County is not creating a housing authority, but instead working through strategic partnerships, targeted ordinances, and meaningful incentives that assure that critical members of our workforce can find safe, dignified, housing within the proximity to the neighborhoods they enrich and serve. In fact, the more common term being used is "Workforce Housing."

According to the Housing and Urban Development website (hud.gov), "Families who pay more than 30% of the income for housing are considered cost burdened and may have difficulty

affording necessities such as food, clothing, transportation, and medical care." Using an example of a new college grad making an annual salary of \$32,000/year, federal guidelines say that their monthly rent should not be more than \$800. With the growth we are seeing in Nassau County, we need to be proactive and encourage developers to include affordable housing within their developments. In order to thrive and encourage successful communities, we need to provide better opportunities for our residents that include affordable living.


Housing affordability affects more people than some may realize. While we need adequate housing for all of our residents, many are on the brink of an even greater downfall. As a young child, I can remember my mom working two, sometimes three jobs just to put food on the table and a roof over our head. As a single parent she struggled just to get by. Many of the places we lived were areas with high crime and very few opportunities for success. Our living arrangement changed when I was 10 years old and we found ourselves sleeping in our car in a church parking lot. A 1986 Plymouth Gran Fury with no air conditioning is not how I envision a 10 year-old living, yet that was our home off and on for the next few years. In between sleeping in our car or at a friend's house, my mom still worked a few jobs to help provide for us, but the opportunity for quality affordable housing just wasn't there.

My personal goal for this committee is to ensure that people will not have to struggle like I did as a child and we can find quality housing that will provide opportunities for much of our county's workforce. While affordable housing may not directly affect you, I bet you know someone who it does directly affect.

Are You Ready, YET?

The Nassau County Youth Emergency Team (YET) completed its inaugural year in 2017-2018 with 17 graduates. This innovative program partnered Nassau County 4-H and Emergency Management utilizing the fundamental curriculum from Teen CERT and partnering it with the philosophies of 4-H.

Several of these graduates have since continued on with the program volunteering at events as first-aid responders, conducting public outreach and communication, applied for National positions, competed in local and district speech competitions and even leading a massive service learning event teaching

over 400 teenagers at 4-H University. Our graduates have impressed their parents, friends, instructors, and practically everyone they encounter. This is attributed due to their wealth of knowledge and wholesome character.

What is YET? So what exactly happens in a Youth Emergency Team class? Youth ages 11-18 sign up through 4-H. Participants attend several classes

spanning a few months. This allows the training to be more in-depth and strengthen the team mentality of the cadre. The youth complete a final written exam and drill, then attend a graduation ceremony. Once graduated they are able to participate in community events as official YETies!

The program is free unless the

participants seek outside activity in 4-H, which would only require a \$20 a year fee. Older youth who show good leadership are tasked with being a group mentor. These group mentors oversee 2-3 other YET members for group activities and evaluation preparations. Group mentors are also tasked with other assignments such as helping instructors, checking homework, or leading class activities. These mentors also receive extra community service hours for their additional responsibilities. All graduates earn a minimum of 40 community service hours and there is no maximum allowance.

Each week will tackle multiple subjects involving emergency response

or disaster preparedness. These topics include: Disaster preparations, evacuation routes, and supply kits; Animal sheltering and behavior; Search and Rescue; Stress Management; Terrorism; Practice Drills; First-aid; and Fire Safety.

This year's team will include everything from last year with the addition of another level of mentors. Graduates

from the inaugural class are dedicated to helping the next team and will have a large role in leading this year's YET!

Why Join? Our graduates have given us quotes about YET stating that by completing the program they have/are: A sense of "family" and belonging; Increasing Confidence; Feeling empowered with skills to help themselves and others; Overcoming emotional issues; Leadership skills; and Public Speaking confidence. Beyond this our graduates earn large amounts of community service, have opportunities to practice their skills, join a team that is committed to helping Nassau County and have access to careerreadiness opportunities and support.

Up for it? If your family is interested in YET, consider joining us for our interest meeting Thursday, August 30 from 5:30-6:30 p.m. at the Nassau County Emergency Operations Center. No RSVP required but it is appreciated.

Pete and Barbara Smith live in a lovely mid-century modern home on Amelia Island and their backyard abuts the thick and wild natural area which is a part of Egan's Creek and the Greenway. Barbara has ten 4'x 8' raised vegetable garden beds and Pete enjoys tending his bees as they make their delicious



honey. Look at his beekeeping activities at info@hivepirate.com. The vegetable gardens support rotating crops of basil, lettuce, squash, turnips, kale and more. They have wonderful compost piles near the back of their property. The compost uses leaves from pine, magnolia and coastal oaks and maintains a constant 130-140 degrees most days which encourages the material to break down quickly. This means the Smiths have a constant supply of homemade, rich soil to add to their vegetable garden.

Pete first heard about beekeeping in Boy Scouts. Then he learned how good the local Florida environment was for keeping bees and how the native plants provide plenty of nectar for the bees which enable the bees to produce delicious honey. In the spring, the local honey is produced primarily from native holly and in the summer the bees

use palmetto plants. Other bee friendly native plants blooming in July and August are the more common nectar sources. Those plants are elderberry, loblolly bay, Mexican clover and many

local wildflowers. Bees collect pollen, which is a protein, to raise their young. They also collect nectar and consume the honey as their food supply. If there is not enough honey stored in their bee hives, beekeepers must leave the honey in the hive. This spring was a wonderful time for bees to make honey,

so there also are many delicious bottles of honey available to sell.

So how do we keep our own yards bee friendly? First, we should never prune or trim anything while it is in bloom. A good time for pruning is in February and March. You can also reduce or eliminate the use of pesticides in your landscape. Remember to always follow label





instructions. Planting indigenous plants, such as cabbage palm, saw palmetto, yaupon holly, gallberry, wax myrtle and redbay would be a good start. Pete and Barbara are very happy together with their vibrant interests and

their enthusiasm for bees and native plants is inspiring.
