The main entrance to the fair is on Musslewhite Road and parking is in the paved lot. Handicap parking is on the front service road. The Hilliard Town Council met Thursday night for their first meeting of October. The first item was a proclamation read by Hilliard Mayor John Beasley concerning proclaiming the month of October Emily Adkins Blood Clot Awareness Month. The proclamation included: Whereas, the nonprofit Emily's Promise works with medical professionals and the public to educate Floridians about the lifethreatening risks associated with blood clots; October is a significant month as Emily Adkins, the namesake of Emily's Promise, passed away on October 21, 2022, from a pulmonary embolism caused by a preventable blood clot; and Emily Adkins was a rising star in Nassau County health care, a dedicated



community volunteer, and a proud graduate of Fernandina Beach High School and the University of North Florida; and according to the National Blood Clot Alliance, an estimated 900,000 Americans are affected by

Callahan Approves Community First Credit Union Site Plan

The Callahan Town Council met Monday night for their first meeting of October. The first order of business was the Second and Final Reading concerning the Town of Callahan applying for a Small Cities Community Development Block Grant. The council agreed to apply for the Neighborhood Revitalization Category in the amount of \$650,000. The grant would help for the rehabilitation of 36 manholes; and the replacement of several sewer lines in town. The council approved to move forward with the grant.

The next agenda item was the approval of Resolution 2024-R09 which concerns authorizing the implementation of the long-term and short-term objectives of the CDBG.

The following item, Resolution 2024-R10, was approved which concerned approving the match payment of \$25,000 for the town's portion of the grant.

Resolution 2024-R11 was also approved, which concerned the submission of the application by the Town of Callahan for the CDBG Grant in the amount of \$650,000.

The next agenda item concerned the council's approval on the Site Plan for Community First Bank. Barbara Bartley, representing Community First Credit Union, was on hand, along with their chief marketing officer, contractor, engineers, etc., to answer any questions the council might have concerning Community First or the



project. "Community First was actually in Callahan back in 2010. It was following the collapse of the economy and wasn't a very good decision," said Bartley. "Currently, we (Community First) still have 1,700 members in the Callahan area, that are still banking with us. We feel it's time to come back. Community First is very community focused and likes to be involved in what's happening around the area."

The following item was a request for Mickler Street to be closed from US 301 to Second Avenue on Saturday, October 26 for The Old Farmhouse Fall event. Callahan Mayor Randy Knagge said, "I've looked this over and the only concern I have is that closing the Mickler to Second Avenue will block a resident's home driveway. If they can make sure to not block their driveway, I think it is okay."

Town Clerk Shawna Gugliuzza advised the council she would contact The Old Farmhouse.

The next agenda item was the approval of Resolution 2024-R12 which concerned the approval to hold the Callahan Christmas Parade Saturday, December 7 at 11 a.m. hosted by the West Nassau Historical Society.

The next meeting of the council will be Monday, October 21 at 7 p.m.

Beasley presented the proclamation to Douglas and Janet Adkins, Emily's parents.

"I'm asking you all (council) to meet them prior to the October 17 meeting to hear the complete presentation," said Lee Anne Wollitz.

The council approved a workshop at 6 p.m. prior to the October 17 meeting to listen to the 2025 Vision Plan from the county.

Generic-Brand vs. Name-Brand

As a financial coach I discovered one area of over-spending is typically in the food category of the budget. Years ago, I took a deep dive into this and found that an easy way to save money when buying groceries is to buy generic brands.

It is time to really put generic and namebrand prices to the test: Can you save more by buying generic ingredients for meals? Most of the time you can. The only time I



buy brand-named items are when they are on sale, or a coupon makes them cheaper than generic brand.

I compared three dinner recipes for a family of four based on today's prices at Winn Dixie. Here is the breakdown:

Recipe #1: Spaghetti (93% savings choosing generic)

I encourage you to spend time looking at various generic brands when shopping.

If you are frustrated and have not been able to make ends meet with your grocery budget, try going completely generic for a couple of months. You might be surprised by the extra cash you have at the end because it all adds up!


especially the individuals who prepared the pork dinners.




available through the sheriff's office. In today's interconnected world, our children face unprecedented online risks






