

Nye Inducted into National Softball Hall of Fame

On November 9, 2019, Mike Nye, of Callahan and owner of Nye's Auto Sales for 38 years, was inducted into the National Softball Hall of Fame in Reno, Nevada. Nye, who graduated from Ribault High School in 1968, signed with

the Chicago Cubs right after high school. He played with the Cubs for two years before returning home and making Callahan his home. "Growing up, I played ball all the time. I played in Little League and baseball all through school," said Nye. "I started playing tournament softball when I was only 16. From then I learned about the game and to be the best I could at it. Now it has paid off with the Hall of Fame. I am so honored."

Nye played with numerous teams, Jacksonville Metro, Warren Motors, Nelsons Paints, Ken Sanders Ford, Steele's Sports Company and professional softball with the Detroit Ceasars. During his 3-year time in Detroit he was named All Pro all 3 years. He has taken home numerous MVP awards. His credits are many for his some 30 years of playing softball including: 12 World Championships; 12 time All American; Record holder for most MVP's in a 2 year span at 15; Held Highest Batting Average Record in the Country for 17 years; Won MVP in 40 year era, 50 year era and Open Division. Over the years Nye has been called the

greatest player to every play the game and said to be the purest hitter ever! He played on the greatest team ever with Warren Motors as their season had 94 wins and 2 losses.

Nye's team won Softball World Series twice and he was named MVP in the 1977 World Series. He won Professional Athlete of

> the Year in Detroit in 1977: and won Amateur Athlete of the Year in 1976. He had a lifetime batting average of .725. In his younger years, he loved lifting weights and at one time benched 530 pounds

while weighing 190 pounds.

At the Hall of Fame induction service he was introduced as: Mike Nye: Winner; crowd favorite; one of the best pure hitters in the game who

had a 25-year upper level career. "Mike was one of the greatest all-around athletes and competitors to ever step on a softball field," said former manager of the Detroit Ceasars, Robert Brown. "In today's vocabulary, he



he did it all. He is a true superstar who brought excitement every time he suited up." Mike and his wife Tammy attended the induction service in Reno, Nevada.

Keeping America Safe

This past week, President Trump did the world a huge favor and in the process took a bold step in honoring his promise to keep America safe when he ordered the drone strike that took out the notorious terrorist, Qasem Soleimani, an Iranian Major General and commander of the Quds Force, the Iranian force involved in clandestine (i.e., terrorist) operations, had been directly responsible for killing approximately 700 Americans and seriously wounding and maiming many more. Most recently, Soleimani had directed an attack that killed an American contractor and orchestrated the attack on the American Embassy in Baghdad. Fish Talk

The Ghost Fish of Brackish Waters

I was just taking a look over the local forecast. Although we can't see too far out, it appears as though some decent days are ahead. This weekend is going to be mostly cloudy which is typically when I have my best times. Yes I know we can't rely on the meteorologist but, there is a little hope ahead. Some of my best trips have come from the worst weather days, so don't let that bother you in the least. So, let's get to the fishing!

We haven't spoken about striped bass in quite some time. None the less, there has been a great bite going on behind the scenes. While everyone targets the typical inshore species, our brackish waters have been firing off. Where to look? What kind of baits should I throw and what are the best tides? Well, just like most predatory fish, you need tidal movement and I love the outgoing. Funnels, rip rap, tree tops and rubble of any sort is key. Pay attention for the slightest flickering of bait and look for fleeing fish as the tide recedes the grass when the water's moving out. All of these items are huge in being successful for catching what I call the Ghost Fish of Northeast Florida. Striper can be on the surface one minute and gone before you make your next cast.

As far as lures go, I typically target them with hard baits and plastics. Rapala skitter walks, Bomber Pro Long A's and Spook Jr's are fantastic search baits. Whether it be top water or sub surface, you can't do wrong as long as you adjust to the conditions. During low light, I will use bright colors. As the day progresses and the sun begins to peak, I will switch to large paddle tails to get down deep. Weighted chartreuse jig heads will need to be switched out to compensate for the tidal current you're fishing.

Lastly, where are we catching striper? Well, because they move so much, the best starting points always seem to be at our bridges. This could be US 17 on the Nassau River, I-95 at the St. Marys River and the Buckman Bridge on the St. Johns River. All of these waterways provide great fisheries for striper. Stay focused and get into the mindset of really searching for them. If you can focus on the hunt, you will be surprised of the outcome. Hope you all have the opportunity to enjoy your weekend. Until next time, be safe out there and tight lines!

In the Kitchen... Chicken Tetrazzini for a Crowd

- 1 lb. spaghetti, broken into pieces
- 3 (10.75 oz.) cans cream of mushroom soup 12 oz. shredded Cheddar cheese
- 6 cups shredded boiled chicken breast meat
- 1 lb. sauteed mushrooms
- 1 (4 oz.) jar sliced pimento peppers, drained
- 2 cups reserved chicken broth

Preheat oven to 350°. Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Add uncooked spaghetti (broken into thirds) to the pot and cook for 8 to 10 minutes or until al dente. Drain and set aside. In a large saucepan, heat soup over low heat. Add shredded cheese (reserve some for topping) and stir together. Then add the cooked shredded chicken, mushrooms, pimento peppers and cooked spaghetti and stir all together. Add enough of the reserved broth to make it 'sloppy' and mix all together. Pour mixture into a 9x13 inch baking dish. Sprinkle reserved shredded cheese on top and bake in the preheated oven for 25 to 35 minutes or until bubbly.

Have you ever struggled with what gift to get for someone? As most men, I wonder what to get my wonderful petite wife for her special days. Over the years she has often clued me in. When our children were babies, she wanted a rocker. Some of the more interesting ones for working in the yard included a Sawzall, a JawSaw (small enclosed chainsaw for limbs) and her own toolbox.

Hannah, our 10-year-old granddaughter, is a person that likes to do things with her hands. It is sometimes hard to buy gifts for her. This past Christmas her Dad made her

a potter's wheel. It was amazing to watch her turn on that wheel and begin to work the clump of clay. She would wet her hands and wrap those little hands around the clay and before long a beautiful bowl was formed. We asked if she had ever worked with clay before and how she learned to work the clay so well for a beginner. Her simple answer was "No, just YouTube!"

Hannah's older sister, who is usually very proficient in everything she tries to do, could not make the clay do what she wanted. She exclaimed, "This is hard! Hannah makes it look so easy!" Hannah seems to have a gift of shaping the clay. It reminded me that each person is gifted in some way.

In Jeremiah 18 we have the picture of a potter working at his wheel. It reminds us that the potter can do what he wants with the clay. If he finds the vessel has a fault in it he can remold and reshape it. The potter does this to make the vessel just the right size and shape for the intended use. 



Senator Aaron Bean (R-Fernandina Beach) hosted a recognition event for firefighters last Thursday at Nassau County Fire Station 20 in Fernandina Beach. The event was a reception for firefighters in recognition to a successfully passed bill that he cosponsored last session, CS/CS/SB 426 "Firefighters," which helps firefighters diagnosed with cancer to receive disability payments. In addition, Senator Bean unveiled a new bill for the 2020 legislative session, SB 1092 and HB 487 "Fire Prevention and Control," relating to decontamination of firefighter equipment.

"Our firefighters are the first ones to rush into a burning building to save lives and it is time to make sure they are not in harm's way from the residual fire contamination that comes back with them," said Senator Bean.


SB 1092 creates the Firefighter Cancer Decontamination Equipment Grant Program within CFO Jimmy Patronis' Division of State Fire Marshal of the Department of Financial Services to fund this effort to protect the firefighters. It will require the division to administer the program and annually award grants, and distribute equipment and training to qualifying fire departments.





Climate Change at Callahan Middle

Something feels different at Callahan Middle School. Students are smiling, words of encouragement are the norm and being a silent bystander to bullying is now a thing of the past. The big change is in large part due to the implementation of Advisory.

Advisory is teaching young adults the fundamentals of effective communication, listening, and problem solving in their homeroom classes. It allows them to reflect on relative issues and learn life lessons with their peers. Teacher Whitney Kibler describes, "Our overall goal is for our students to

be able to take these lessons and apply them to life outside of the classroom." The most important part of this program, however, is what the students have to say about it.

Eighth grader Charlotte Robinson explains, "Students are communicating more

with each other. In the beginning of school, teachers made us talk to each other, so now we are connecting and problem solving on our own."

"The biggest difference from last year, that I noticed, is people are more respectful to each other. Students are acknowledging each other, either with a 'Good Morning' or 'Hello,'" says Casselli Ingraham, eighth grader.

As sixth grader, Khamani Way, expresses, "Advisory makes people happier throughout the day, even though they wouldn't ever admit that they like advisory. It sets you off for having a good day."

County Begins Historic Resource Survey

In 2018, Nassau County submitted a Small Matching grant application to the Florida Division of Historical Resources to complete a Historic Resource Survey for the County. The County received the grant award in July 2019. The project began in Fall 2019 and will be completed by June

The first goal of the survey project is to update existing Florida Master Site File forms. The Florida Master Site File is the state of Florida's official inventory of historic and cultural resources. It does not have a regulatory component; it is simply a record of historic sites. Nassau County has many listings already on the Master Site File that describe a range of historic and cultural resources. Archaeological sites, homes, commercial buildings, churches, barns, chicken houses, syrup sheds, bridges, railroad beds, and cemeteries are just an example of the diversity of historic resources already included on the Master Site File. However, many of these site file listings are thirty or forty years old. It is not known whether many of these sites still exist and an update will help determine what is still in existence.

The second portion of the survey project will be to survey areas for new additions to the Florida Master Site File. Areas of unincorporated Nassau County should be included, in addition to possible sites in the incorporated towns of Callahan and Hilliard. Sites for possible survey and inclusion are included but not limited to: underrepresented history sites, cultural landscapes, sites related to agriculture and transportation, and mid-century resources and sites related to early and mid-century tourism. Properties built in 1970 or earlier will be reviewed for the project, as the threshold for historic properties is 50 years.

The last part of the project will recommend preservation strategies for the County. These strategies will be utilized to inform planning efforts throughout Nassau County. The County does not currently have a historic preservation

program. A baseline survey updating our historic resource information will help in bringing the Comprehensive Plan and Land Development Code up to date and inform future steps in preservation planning.

The County has contracted with Environmental Services Inc./Terracon to complete the survey work. Representatives from ESI/Terracon will be in the field in Nassau County completing field work over the next few months, including documentation of sites. This involves their team members photographing a site and recording information about the site, such as construction and architectural details. Information is shared with the State Division of Historical Resources. Requests for information require approval of the Division of Historical Resources and are granted only to researchers, local government, and others with a qualified reason for obtaining the information. All work is completed from the right-of-way and does not involve going on private property.

General information from the survey will be shared with local historic societies and museums. Education and outreach programs around the survey information will be conducted to generate interest and support for preservation projects in Nassau

The Nassau County Planning and Economic Opportunity Department is charged with leading long-range and current planning for the community, with a focus on technical planning, implementation and management of the Land Development and Comprehensive development and site plan review, and assistance to citizens, the Board of County Commissioners, County Manager and other staff, advisory boards, government agencies, and the private sector regarding growth and development in Nassau County. 

More Opportunities to File for Exemptions

The Property Appraiser's Office will be available at various locations around the county so all property owners may have the opportunity to file for exemptions and ask questions.

"Many homeowners have to rearrange their day just to come apply. This is a customer service initiative that will make the process easier and less time consuming for the homeowner," said Property Appraiser, Mike Hickox.

Our office understands that because of their schedules, people are not able to come into the office to fill out exemption applications. Therefore, we will be present at the Hilliard and Fernandina Beach public libraries and the Callahan and Fernandina farmers markets to assist you with exemptions and questions. The list of dates and times are listed at the bottom of this article.

Homestead exemption is a constitutional guarantee that reduces the taxable value of residential property for qualified residents. If you own property in Nassau County and it is your primary residence, you may qualify for an exemption of up to \$50,000 off your assessed value. Per Florida Statutes, homeowners must own and occupy the residence prior to January 1st in order to receive the benefit for the 2020 tax year.

If you are unable to come to the office, or one of the events the Property Appraiser's Office will be attending, you may still file for homestead online at nassauflpa.com

Q: Can we grow tulips here? JM

A: The quick answer is no. However, you can plant them if you want to treat them like annuals or you want to go through the tedious process of refrigerating the bulbs for next year

once the flowers are spent. Tulips will need to have a period of cold which is why



placing them in the refrigerator can mimic the required cold. The chilling process takes about 2-4 months. The bulbs can be planted in the late fall, probably around November here. I would recommend planting them in containers where the soil can easily be manipulated. There are too many disease issues and nematodes (microscopic worms) which could damage the bulbs and spoil all your hard work. The ideal soil should be mostly sand, welldrained with plenty of organic material. Soil pH should range between 6.0 to 6.5. Overwatering can cause the bulbs to decay and encourage diseases. Bulbs generally do not grow well in clay soil because clay tends to hold too much moisture. Your local garden centers will have the perfect soil made specifically for bulbs. Here is other bulb type or rhizome perennials we can easily grow in Northeast Florida so please consider

of few of those instead: African iris, agapanthus, amaryllis, caladium, cannas, crinum, crocosmia, gladiolus, hurricane lily, rain lily, society garlic, or spider lily. All of these can be planted directly in our sandy soil.

Q: What is the name of this moth and is it good or bad? SR

A: This large caterpillar is the larvae of the imperial moth, Eacles imperialis. It really does not do enough damage for



us to worry about trying to control it. The imperial moth is found from southern New

England south to the Florida Keys and west through the southern Great Lakes region to eastern Nebraska and central Texas. The larvae feed on pine (preferred source), maple, oak, sweetgum and sassafras. Mature larvae come in a variety of colors ranging from light to dark brown, burgundy, or green. The dark brown forms may be marked with burnt-orange patches dorsally and surrounding the breathing holes or spiracles. The area immediately



around the spiracles is white in brown larvae and yellow in green larvae. The external spines

of green larvae are yellow. Brown larvae are more common than green ones. Adults do not eat and live only a short period of time. They live long enough to find a mate, lay eggs then die. Eggs hatch in 10 days to two weeks depending on the temperature. Newly hatched larvae eat their egg shells. One other interesting fact about this caterpillar: they swallow air and expand to a length of 7-8 mm within about five minutes of hatching and it sounds like they are filling a balloon.

Q: What is this weed? JK

A: This weed is called Carolina geranium, Geranium carolinianum L. is a semi-erect, grows 8-28 inches in height. It is often found in shady areas. Here

in Northeast Florida, it is a winter annual. It can be identified by the greenish-pink to red, densely hairy stems as well as its round to



oval, hairy leaves, with blunt-toothed margins. The leaf lobes are very distinct and once you recognize this plant, you are unlikely to forget it. Carolina geranium produces tiny flowers which can be either pink or white. Carolina geranium can be found throughout the United States and Hawaii. For best control, apply a pre-emergent herbicide in October to prevent the seeds from germinating. Remember, annuals have only one way to reproduce - seeds.
