Callahan Man Arrested in Home Invasion with Stabbing

Last Thursday, January 12, the Nassau County Sheriff's Department arrested Gabreon Brown, 31, of Callahan, and charged him with Attempted First-Degree Murder and Armed Burglary with Battery.

According to NCSO reports, the crime was committed a week ago Sunday, January 8. Brown and another man knocked on the door of a residence on Caulkins Drive in the Swallowfork area in Callahan. When the victim asked who it was, one of the men answered, "It's Michael." The victim had just exited the shower and had wrapped himself with a blanket. As the victim began opening the door, he saw it was



Brown and immediately tried shutting the door as Brown and the other man began forcing their way in. Both men attacked the victim and the fight carried

out onto the front porch. The victim tripped on his blanket and fell to the floor.

A witness told an investigator that is when Brown produced a knife and began stabbing the victim multiple times. The witness also stated that as the stabbing was taking place, she heard a voice from a car that was parked in the driveway. The attackers fled the porch, jumped in the getaway car and sped off. The witness identified the voice of an ex-friend, Somer Edwards. The witness and Edwards had a past disagreement over money. During that disagreement, Gabe Brown was present and told the witness he would "Blow her brains out

with an AK-47." Somer Edwards had also sent a text message to the victim a few weeks ago stating, "Me N Gabe will be paying y'all a visit. U (expletive) with the wrong ones. And keep it up. Ur done."

The victim was transported to a Jacksonville hospital with critical injuries which required emergency surgery to save his life. The following day he was still listed in critical but stable condition and required a second surgery. No further information as to an arrest of Edwards or the unidentified second man.



Relationships are Key

Nothing can replace the importance of relationships in our lives. For those of us that follow Christ, our relationship with Him is the most important. Our families, friends, co-workers, neighbors; these are people we are also in relationships with. Another important relationship believers in Christ share are relationships with each other, as well as those around us. The health of these relationships is a living testimony to the world around us. Whether we realize it or not, people are watching. When they are watching, what do they see? Christians in healthy

relationships of love and mutual caring? Do they see someone they can experience these relationships with for themselves? When they do not, why are we so surprised that they want nothing to do with Christians or churches?

Nothing can replace the importance of relationships. An argument can be made that relationship is at the core of why God created us. God created us in His image (Genesis 1:26-27). God placed Adam in the Garden that He made for him. God talked to Adam, walked with Him. God made us to be relational. Genesis 2:18 reads, "Then the LORD God said, 'It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper fit for him." God did not create us this way to spend just a few hours, once or twice a week together. Acts 2:42-47 gives us a beautiful example of how we are to be in relationship with each other as Christ's Body. Let's look at the relational aspects of these Scriptures. They devoted themselves to fellowship (v. 42). They were together and had all things in common (v. 44). Supporting any that had need (v. 45). Day by Day attending the temple and breaking bread in their homes (v. 46). Jesus did not spend three hours a week discipling His followers either. Christ invited them into His life (Matthew 4:19).

If we are Christ's disciples, we must strive to do the same. We must build and enrich relationships with those around us. It starts in the home with our spouse and children. We must show the love of Christ to our family and friends. Our neighbors and those in our community as well. Here is another aspect of this that is of vital importance. We must seek to build relationships with those around us that are lost as well as saved. We cannot walk up to the lost with no "relational capital" to share the Gospel of Christ and expect real life transformation. This does happen, but it is normally the exception, not the rule. Relationship is how the Body of Christ grows. Christ taught in parable so that others could relate to what He was teaching. He lived His life daily with His disciples to provide a relational example of how to be fishers of men.

Christ taught his followers how to love others too. A loving relationship with God that we put first, enables us to build loving relationships with others (Matthew 22:34-40). Living a loving life in Christ that is worth imitation as a testimony to Christ's glory in our own lives (1 Corinthians 11:1). We must be a person of acceptance when so many others are rejecting and divisive. It is not our responsibility to change people for Christ. We are not to convict or judge, that is the work of the Holy Spirit (John 16:8-11). We are to meet them where they are and love on them. This is what Christ calls us to. The only question that remains is if we are ready and willing to answer the call.



NCSO Officer Involved in Fatal Shooting

Last Wednesday, January 11, Nassau County Deputies were dispatched to a residence on Barbara Lane near Hilliard due to a domestic disturbance. 911 operators received the call at 2:14 a.m., the caller stated someone at that location was threatening to harm herself. According to Sheriff Leeper, the deputies learned that the woman had left the residence prior to their arrival, but was most likely still somewhere on the property. Deputies began searching the property and located the woman hiding in thick underbrush. The deputies tried talking to her to get her to surrender peacefully. One of the deputies observed that the woman was holding a "dark barreled rifle in her hands." "At one point, while the deputies were talking with her," Leeper stated, "she appeared to aim the rifle towards the deputies and that is when one deputy fired a single shot, striking her. She was pronounced deceased at the scene. Upon further investigation it was found that the riffle was a "BB-style rifle"

but in the darkness the deputies had to assume it to be an actual rifle."

Sheriff Leeper stressed, "Nobody wants to do this, it's traumatic for everyone, and it's unfortunate that someone died. But I am thankful that deputies are not hurt. But it's not something we look forward to doing. But they have to protect themselves, and that's just what he was doing."

The victim was identified as Donna Dale, age 47 and a mother to three children. Dale has had other run-ins with law enforcement as recent as the day before this incident. Her past includes arrests for domestic battery, attempted murder, aggravated battery, and five domestic violence injunctions.

The deputy that fired his weapon was identified as Christian Copher. Copher has been with the Nassau County Sheriff's Department since 2015. Copher was placed on Administrative Leave which is normal protocol in this type of situation, until he's cleared to return to work.

Florida Forest Service to Begin Prescribed Burning

The Florida Forest Service's Jacksonville Forestry District will begin dormant season prescribed burning in the coming weeks on state lands in Clay, Duval, and Nassau counties. Approximately 14,593 acres are scheduled to be burned on the 5 state forests within the three counties. This figure does not include privately managed land or land managed by other public agencies.

Dormant season prescribed burns are conducted during the winter months when temperatures are cooler, and trees are in their dormant stage. Burning during the cooler months helps to minimize stress on the timber while reducing heavy fuel loads. Prescribed fire is a safe way to apply a natural process, ensure ecosystem health, and reduce wildfire risk. Other uses of prescribed fire include disease control in young pines, wildlife habitat improvement, range management, preservation of endangered plant and animal species, and the maintenance of fire-dependent ecosystems. Preplanned prescribed burns are carefully analyzed and conducted under specific weather conditions. Specific calendar dates for burn activities are fluid. Only when conditions are right can prescribed burns achieve desired results.



The Florida Forest Service treated 199,572 acres of Florida state forests with prescribed fire during the most recent fiscal year. The Jacksonville Forestry District burned 7,470 acres on state lands during the most recent fiscal





New Retirement Rules for 2023

Urban Fleming, MS-PFP, CRPC

Congress created new rules for retirement accounts in December 2022 with immediate and long-term effects. The new legislation called SECURE Act 2.0 is lengthy and details are still being digested by experts and financial firms but some immediate positive changes have already been identified.

- (1) The age for RMDs (Required Minimum Distributions) has been pushed to age 73 from 72. If you have already started taking RMDs, this change will not impact you. Moreover, penalties for missed RMDs have been reduced to 25% from 50%.
- (2) More exceptions to the 10% early withdraw penalty have been added and include terminal illness, victims of natural disasters and public safety workers with at least 25 years of service.
- (3) Roth SEP IRAs and Roth SIMPLE IRAs have been introduced for small business owners and their employees. However, financial firms will not have products developed or

available for some time.

The IRS has already started hiring for the 80,000+ positions created last year- now is a great time to review your tax and financial planning needs. It is critical to work with a tax professional to ensure compliance with the tax code and a financial planner to develop a plan to meet your retirement goals. I recommend using a CPA or an EA (Enrolled Agent) for your taxes since they have demanding education requirements and have the ability to represent you in an audit.
