
Back to his 1974 Ford truck, he has always done the required oil changes and maintenance when needed. He has had to put a new engine in it and completely restored the interior with all





### Hash Brown Casserole

1 (2 lb.) pkg. frozen hash brown potatoes, thawed

½ cup chopped onion

1 (10.5 oz.) can condensed cream of chicken soup

½ teaspoon salt

2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese 1 (8 oz.) container sour cream

½ teaspoon ground black pepper 1 cup crushed cornflakes

1 cup butter, melted, divided

Preheat the oven to 350°. Mix hash browns, Cheddar cheese, condensed soup, sour cream, 1/2 of the melted butter, onion, salt, and pepper in a bowl. Transfer mixture to a 9x13-inch baking dish. Sprinkle cornflakes on top, then drizzle with remaining melted butter. Bake until sauce is bubbly and top is golden brown, about 1 to 1 ½ hours.

### Understanding the Bible: Part #1

Pastor Benjie Loyd, River Road Baptist Church, Hilliard



One of the biggest passions of my life is to help people understand the Bible better. The Bible is a life-changing book that God uses to bring spiritually dead people to life. Jesus said in John 17:17 that word of God is truth and that God's people are sanctified by the truths of the Scripture. I would like to take this year and help people get a grip on the contents of the Bible. The Bible can be a very intimidating book. You think about the Bible and you think about this large book, that is difficult to read. The reality is that the

Bible is larger than most books, but the way that you read a large book is by reading a little bit a time. The Bible is composed of two testaments, 66 books, and 1,189 chapters. If you read 4 chapters a day, every day for a year, you will read through the Bible in a year. This can be done in under 15 minutes a day.

As you read the Bible, understand that the Bible is not 66 disconnected books. The Bible is one book, telling one story. I don't remember who this quote is original to, but the message of the Bible can be summarized in one sentence. The sentence is as follows: Slay the dragon, get the girl. This is the story. Satan is the dragon. The girl is the bride of Christ. The dragon slayer is Christ. The grand story of the Bible involves 4 movements. The drama of the story is creation, fall, redemption, and consummation. The 66 individual books of the Bible tell this one grand story. The hero of the Bible is Jesus. Every story in the Bible points to Jesus.

There are many ways that you could summarize the message of the Bible. I have shared this in the past. When looking at the whole Bible in light of Christ, we could say the following:

- Old Testament: Christ anticipated
- Gospels: Christ manifested
- Acts: Christ proclaimed
- Letters: Christ explained
- Revelation: Christ returns

Throughout this year, I am going to give you tips on how to understand the contents of the Bible. It is imperative to keep the story focused on Christ. Next month, I will overview the first 5 books of the Bible. It is my desire that these articles will help us all understand the Scriptures better in order to know God better.

The Hilliard Town Council met Thursday night for their final regular meeting of January. The first order of business was the Second and Final Reading of Ordinance 2023-17 which

concerned the Vacating of an Alley. The ordinance relates to Public Right-of-Way or Alley; Making Findings; Vacating Public Right-of-Way or Alley within or surrounded by Block 166; Plat of the West Portion in the Town of Hilliard; Authorizing Recording of a Certified Copy of this Ordinance for applicant Ursula Jones. The council approved the ordinance.





### Sheriff Attends Task Force Summit



"I want to thank Citrus County Sheriff Mike Prendergast for hosting this meeting and showcasing the equipment that will be used as we respond quickly and safely to affected areas, helping citizens to receive the assistance they need."

The FSA Task Force is divided into seven regions and is Chaired by Bay County Sheriff Tommy Ford. Citrus County Sheriff's Office was selected to maintain the Region Four Disaster Base Camp for lodging personnel during mutual aid missions. This is the first of many FSA planned base camp setups, which include two large inflatable tents, cots, portable air conditioners, bathroom trailers, a water trailer, generators and a mobile kitchen.



# January marks Human Trafficking Prevention Month



FSA's President and Nassau County Sheriff Bill Leeper, attended and spoke at a news conference at the Florida Capitol last Wednesday on combating human trafficking throughout the state. "Fortunately for Florida, we have strong legislative voices dedicated to this concern," Sheriff Bill Leeper said.

Sheriff Leeper believes it is important that we continue to advocate for strong legislation that holds traffickers accountable and provides law enforcement with the tools necessary to combat this crime effectively. According to the U.S. Department of State, there are an estimated 27.6 million victims of human trafficking worldwide at any given time. Victims of human trafficking include children, women, and men who are subjected to sexual exploitation or forced labor through force, fraud or coercion. "Human trafficking is a heinous crime that preys on the vulnerable in our society, and it demands our collective attention and action," Leeper said.

The event was hosted by One More Child which highlights the fight against child sex trafficking. It is part of a statewide campaign, "Traffick Stop," which coincides with Human Trafficking Prevention Month in

January. One More Child is bringing awareness to how widespread child sex trafficking has become while calling upon policymakers to support legislation designed to better protect minors and help survivors.

The following are just some key red flags that could alert you to a potential trafficking situation that should be reported: The potential victim is living with an employer, the potential victim is surrounded by poor living conditions, there are multiple people living in cramped spaces, the individual appears too afraid to speak, is submissive, or there are signs of physical abuse.

As a reminder, Nassau County residents who suspect human trafficking or child sexual abuse can report any information by calling the Nassau County Sheriff's Office at (904) 548-4009, or you can report it to Law Enforcement in Florida by calling 1-855-FLA-SAFE or remain anonymous by reporting the information to First Coast Crime Stoppers at 1-866-845-TIPS.

"Yeah, so?"


