Hilliard Honors the Life of Donald Humphrey

The Hilliard Town Council met Thursday night for their final regular meeting of January. The first item presented, was a Proclamation to recognize the life and service of former Councilman Donald Humphrey, who recently passed away. The proclamation was read by Hilliard Town Attorney

The first agenda item was the approval of Ordinance 2022-01 which concerned an ordinance vacating the Public right-of-way within the proposed Greenbrier PUD with the Town of Hilliard. Final reading on this ordinance will be Thursday,



Christian Waugh. The proclamation included: Donald J. Humphrey, Sr., passed away on January 6, 2022, at the age of 60, following a battle with cancer. Councilman Humphrey was one of the Town of Hilliard's most pre-eminent citizens; Councilman Humphrey first served the Town as a member of the Town of Hilliard's Planning and Zoning Board from March - December 2005; and next served Hilliard on the Town Council for 7 years from January 2006 - December 2012; Councilman Humphrey may have best served Hilliard as he served the rest of the country, as a proud veteran and member of the United States Army for 22 years; Councilman Humphrey was active in the community, mentoring students as a coach, particularly of girls basketball at Hilliard Middle-Senior High School, that he remains fondly remembered by those he coached, and even those he refereed; and he will always be remembered in the Town of Hilliard, especially as a man who had the courage of his convictions and always sought to act in the best interest of the Town.

The proclamation was presented to Donald Humphrey's family, who were present at the meeting.

The agenda item brought much discussion. The item was to approve the Final Plat Application for the Pine Street Estates Subdivision. The item has already been before the Planning & Zoning Board and had been recommended for approval by Land Use

Administrator Janis Fleet. However, Councilwoman Callie Bishop questioned whether there was a preliminary plat? "I don't remember looking at one and I don't see sidewalks or water & sewer on the plat or fire hydrants?" said Bishop. "It doesn't look like there is an infrastructure on this plat

at all." After much discussion and searching,

Town Clerk Lisa Purvis found the preliminary about a year ago that went through P/Z Board.

"I amend my second until see a preliminary plat on this subdivision," said Councilman Lee Pickett.

"I've gone through many hoops and now I'm hearing we have to see a preliminary plat?" said Ralph Bennett, property owner. "I have had many wrong instructions of what was needed from the P/Z Board. This is pretty frustrating and costly for me."

The item was not approved and the council will wait until they can see

a preliminary plat on the Pine Street Subdivision. The property in question is bordered by West 6th and West 7th Streets and Pine and Oxford Streets and will contain 9 lots (homes).

The next item was tabled until the Land Use Administrator can be on hand for her quarterly report to the council, in case of any questions or concerns from the council.

The council approved Building Official/Inspector Bryan Higginbotham's quarterly report for October 2021 – December 2021.

The Code Enforcement Officer, Del Miley's quarterly report was tabled until he could be present at the meeting for questions if necessary.

The council approved a capital purchase in the amount of \$46,885.00 of a 2022 Ford Super Cab Truck for the Public Works Department. The truck is equipped with accessories for water and sewer line repair. The item was budgeted for \$60,000.

The Callahan Town Council met last Tuesday due to the Martin Luther King, Jr. Holiday on Monday. Port Commissioner Mike Cole addressed the council concerning if the the town needs any help from the Nassau County Port Authority with the Crawford Diamond project or any other large projects. 

Best Peanut Brittle

1 cup peanuts 2 tablespoons butter, softened 1 teaspoon baking soda

Grease a large cookie sheet. Set aside. In a heavy 2 quart saucepan, over medium heat, bring to a boil sugar, corn syrup, salt, and water. Stir until sugar is dissolved. Stir in peanuts. Set candy thermometer in place, and continue cooking. Stir frequently until temperature reaches 300°, or until a small amount of mixture dropped into very cold water separates into hard and brittle threads. Remove from heat; immediately stir in butter and baking soda; pour at once onto cookie sheet. With 2 forks, lift and pull peanut mixture into rectangle about 14x12 inches; cool. Snap candy into pieces.

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



Fatal Accident Monday Morning



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
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FSCJ Receives Grant to Develop Educational Opportunity Center

Florida State College at Jacksonville (FSCJ) received a five-year, \$1,160,250 grant from the U.S. Department of Education to establish a TRiO Educational Opportunity Center (EOC) to support adults from Duval and Nassau counties, specifically those who belong to traditionally underrepresented populations, have limited English proficiency or are living with disabilities. Focus will also be given to homeless children/youths, students who are in foster care/aging out of the foster care system, other disconnected students, and veterans, military spouses and their dependents.



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The EOC will identify and serve 850 eligible participants yearly, eliminating the barriers to postsecondary education. A team of dedicated EOC Enrollment Coaches will also assist and connect participants to the following:

- Guidance on secondary school reentry or entry to a GED/Alternative Program
- Individualized career and academic counseling
- Tutoring services
- Career workshops/counseling
- Veteran workshops on benefits, military spouse education, etc.
- Education and counseling designed to improve financial and economic literacy
- Mentoring services
- Support with college admission and financial aid applications
- Preparations for college entrance exams

"We know that education can provide economic mobility and positive social outcomes that have the ability to change the trajectory of one's future," said College President John Avendano, Ph.D. "Through comprehensive service offerings, the EOC will work to turn around the lives of individuals who have found themselves in hopeless situations due to generational and situational poverty and limited access to critical services."

EOC services will be provided by trained staff at each of FSCJ's five campuses located throughout Duval and Nassau counties and at field/satellite offices provided by partnering agencies. During the initial intake process, the EOC will assess postsecondary barriers and needs and will work to remove them by connecting participants with financial resources and other wraparound support services. Enrollment Coaches will maintain contact with participants throughout their journey, with the goal of leading them to further their education to earn a postsecondary degree.
