



When it comes to obedience, I can think of a dozen reasons why we should follow God's instructions, but in Philippians

2:12-18, Paul gives us three. After we talk about the first two verses, I hope you will search this passage and see if you can find the three. "Therefore, my beloved, as you have always obeyed, so now, not only as in my presence but much more in my absence, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling." Philippians 2:12 ESV.

Paul is writing to believers in the city of Philippi, a church he planted. He instructs them to work out their salvation. This should not be confused with working for your salvation, as we simply can't do that. "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God" Ephesians 2:8. Our salvation is a gift and we should work it out with fear and trembling. This term is a sign of the necessary humility that goes along with our salvation.

We are humble because of what we find in verse 13: "For it is God who works in you, both to will and to work for his good pleasure." This lifelong process of working out our salvation is something we are called to do daily. But it is God at work in us. He makes the difficult work of obedience achievable. Enraged Father Shoots Daughter

On Tuesday, December 27, a family discussion escalated into an argument and ended with a woman being shot. The Nassau County Sheriff's Dispatch Center received a call stating there was a woman sitting in a car at the old Ratliff Road Volunteer Fire Station

that has been shot. Upon arrival of deputies, the victim explained that her 81-year-old father had shot her. She advised the deputies her father's name is Robert Hall and the shooting occurred at his residence where he was still located. Deputies made contact with Hall and placed him under arrest. Upon consent from Hall, deputies searched the home where they located a .38 caliber revolver with three rounds discharged. They also noted two bullet holes in a wall which would account for the three spent casings, two in the wall and one round striking his daughter in the shoulder.

The daughter was transported to a hospital in Jacksonville with nonlife threatening injuries. When interviewed by NCSO at the hospital while she was awaiting surgery to remove the

bullet from her shoulder, she provided information concerning the shooting. The daughter stated she and her dad were discussing a family issue that occurred the previous day. While talking about the incident, a verbal argument ensued. Reportedly

Hall began calling her names and she responded by yelling, "Are you serious dad?" Hall responded back saying, "You won't raise your voice to me in this house you stupid bi***, I'll kill you." She stated again, "Are you serious?" Hall told her to sit down or he would kill her as he was rustling underneath his chair. That's when Hall pulled out the handgun. Hall fired the gun and the daughter began exiting the room, then another shot rang out and she felt the bullet strike her. One more shot was fired.

The daughter had been living with her father for about three months and being his caretaker. Based upon the circumstances, Robert Hall was arrested on attempted murder. The daughter is expected to make a complete recovery.



The Real Santa Visits Callahan

Beverly Baker Miley, of Callahan, wanted to share the story of a student she taught years ago, who continues to make a difference in this world. "Little did I know that one of my former students, Thomas

Herrington, would become a famous Santa Claus that is a hero to many families," said Beverly. "I taught Tommy while teaching at Highlands Elementary School several years ago. I had the pleasure of visiting with Tommy at Junior's

Seafood in Callahan. It's such a joy to keep in contact with former students. Knowing that they have done well in life is my

Tommy shared his story: It all began in 2009, while working for the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office during the Holidays, Tommy saw a real need for the Christmas Spirit in some of Jacksonville's lower income communities. Citizens were losing their loved ones and children, to the war on drugs and there seemed to be general unhappiness in these communities. As a child growing up on the Northside of Jacksonville I remembered Santa Claus driving through neighborhoods on Christmas Eve perched on top of a JFRD Fire Truck and happily waving at kids and families throughout the night, a tradition that had long since stopped. With that in mind I gathered up my superior officers with JSO and pitched my idea of bringing that tradition back, but with JSO vehicles. I simply called it the Oceanway Santa Parade. I created a parade route throughout the community and purchased hundreds of candy canes and set in motion a parade which would take place on Christmas Eve. Once I had the approval, I purchased my own Santa Suit and began to

set the plan in motion.

That single night on Christmas Eve in 2009 began a tradition like no other. The community was elated, our volunteers really got into it, and the spirit of Christmas

became more alive than ever, however I felt like I could do more. The following year as the Christmas Season approached I partnered several businesses that allowed me to place donation boxes at their business for new unwrapped toys and

the local community paper on the Northside advertised the parade route and toy drop off locations. The response was overwhelming. What had begun as a simple Christmas Parade handing out candy canes became a real toy drive, for children and adults. In 2016, I retired from JSO and passed the

I moved away from Jacksonville but I still felt the need to be a part of my community somehow. With the help of a good friend "The Real Santa Claus" Facebook page was created. This was a page where everyone could join Santa Claus live from the North Pole (via Facebook Live) and interact, ask questions, and listen to stories, all free of charge. Since creating the page in 2016, with only about 100 followers, "The Real Santa Claus" page has grown to almost 5,000 followers from all 50 states, including England, Germany, Italy, The Bahamas and Ireland.

Since serving 26 years with the JSO as a Detective, it's now my vision to keep love and kindness throughout the year, not just in December. Santa Claus is real and his vision belongs to us all. At the end of the day all Santa can do is plant the seed, it's up to you to make it grow.



Dr. Chuck Pearson, the Natural chair of Department Sciences and professor of Natural Sciences at Tusculum University, has been named the Dr. Ronald H. Meen Distinguished Professor of Chemistry at the higher education


