Passion 2022

Right now (Monday morning), as I write this article, I'm sitting in the Mercedes-Benz Stadium in Atlanta, GA. No, I'm not here to see the Falcons play a football game. I'm here to join 60,000 young people, 18 - 25 year old college students. The room is filled with students from 1,400 universities, representing all 50 states and 41 countries. Last night we heard from four speakers: Levi Lusko, David Platt, Sadie Huff and Tim Tebow. Today we will hear from many more. Why do we

gather? As Tebow put it from the stage, "We are not in this stadium to play a game we are here to lift up a Name." He went on to share that the Name above every other name is Jesus. These students are worshipping the risen King. They stand with arms raised singing praises to Christ as I sit and simply take in the moment of 60,000 voices praising.

David Platt raised an interesting question that I think needs to go beyond this stadium. Will we be the church who chases the American dream or will we go to the 1.2 billion people who have little to no access to Jesus and/or the Bible? He's not talking about people who are not saved. He's talking about people who have never heard the name Jesus.

As I contemplate Platt's challenge, I think of the definition of the word passion: willing to suffer for. So here's my question to us: What's our passion? What are we willing to suffer for? Many of us will suffer 40 hours a week at a job so we can enjoy all the things we have. But a thousand years from now, will any of the "stuff", the possessions, really matter?

Platt read to us a passage we all know, the Great Commission: "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." These are Jesus' words to His followers. I think often we fail at this. The first word is GO, yet we stay in our churches. We don't go to where the unchurched are, we just kind of expect them to come to us. Going is hard. Some may describe it as suffering. But, do we have enough passion for people who don't know Christ to suffer through going. We all have people we know who don't know Jesus. But are we willing to go to them and build relationships and share Jesus with them. Are we willing to support those who go globally to those least reached people?

This week, I want to challenge you to say the name of Jesus to someone outside of your church. It's a small step, but it's a good one. If you want to go a step further, tell someone outside of your church your Jesus story, the story of what Christ has done in your life. It doesn't matter who, just get used to sharing what Christ has done in you. If you see me in town, at ACE or anywhere else, tell me your Jesus story. The unchurched need to hear about Jesus, we are the ones charged with sharing Him. What is your passion, what are you willing to suffer for, are you willing to go?

Callahan Town News

The Callahan Town Council met Monday night for their first meeting of 2022. Mr. Douglas Conkey, Interim Coordinator of St. Johns River Water Management District approached to podium. "I'm here to introduce myself but also to share some good information for your town," said Conkey. "SJRWMD has begun a Cost Share Program for municipalities. Of course, our main concern is about water conservation. Towns can apply for the program with any projects that concern Water supply; Water quality; Flooding concerns; aging infrastructures, etc. I wanted to make sure you were aware of the program to see if the town may have a need to apply for."

The town clerk received a letter from the Take Stock in Children organization to consider being a sponsor. The council agreed to donate \$500 to the program. A resolution for the donation will be available at the next council meeting.

The council set the qualifying dates as August 1st – 12th to send to the Supervisor of Elections Office for the upcoming 2022 election. Seats up for election will be Mayor Matthew Davis; Councilwoman Janet Shaw; and Councilwoman Ashton Bishop Vargas.

Town Manager Mike Williams addressed the council concerning the Peddling and Soliciting ordinance in the town code. "We need to make some upgrades and changes to the entire code concerning these items," said Williams. "Many things have changed in the code. I advise this to go to the Planning & Zoning Board to look over and make some of the upgrades and deletions."

Williams also advised the council that he (the town) has been advertising for a new auditor. No one responded to the request. Williams talked with Powell & Jones Auditing Firm and recommended the council approve their services at \$25,800 per year in a 3-year contract. The council approved the recommendation.

In the next agenda item, Williams also addressed the council. "We (the Town) are finishing up on the final grouping of water lines around town. This has been a long project but we are nearing the end," said Williams. "The CDBG Grant we received was for \$675,000. After engineering and other fees we have around \$523,000 left. The bid we received from TG Utility was for \$722,334 leaving us a balance of a little over \$200,000. We have the money in the general fund to pay it off. However, I just need to know if you (council) want to go ahead with TG Utility so the work can be completed?"

"I make a motion that we go with TG Utility to finish the work and we will plan to use money we received from the Department of Economic Opportunity to pay the balance," said Councilman David Mellecker. The council approved unanimously.

The next meeting will be held Tuesday, January 18 at 7 p.m. due to the Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday.

The City of Jacksonville will be celebrating its 200th Anniversary in 2022. The city was founded by Isaiah D. Hart, who moved from his farm on the St. Mary's River in Georgia. According to the book Jacksonville's Architectural Heritage, there were about 250 people living in the area. Hart's dreams for a booming town were slow to materialize. A December 20, 1825 St. Augustine newspaper described Jacksonville: There are not more than eight or ten houses erected of any description, most of which are rudely formed of logs and affording only a feeble protection against the cold, the wind and the rain. There is not a sash window in the whole town; but few of the houses even have a chimney.

By 1830, however, the population of Jacksonville had reached nearly 100.
