The Hilliard Town Council met Thursday night for their first meeting of October. Hilliard resident Ray Schmoldt addressed the council asking if there were any updates about making golf carts legal in Hilliard? "I'm currently working on a draft to bring before the council and I just received another piece of information from the Florida Division of Driver's License that must be discussed," added Town Attorney Christian Waugh.

The first agenda item was a septic tank approval for Jesse and Kristin Pickett for their property off Old Pine Ridge Road. "You do know that you will have to tie into the town sewer when it is within 1000ft of our sewer?" said Councilman Kenny Sims.

"Yes, we'll see when it gets there," said Jesse Pickett.

The next item was also approved which concerned the final replat for Lots 0 36-40 and 58-63 of the Deer Run Subdivision (between Kristie Circle Z South & north on CR 108), to create the SSI Subdivision lots 1, 2 & 3. Ben Buchanan is the contractor for the subdivision.

The following agenda item also pertained to the Deer Run subdivision requiring three (3) septic tank exceptions. The council approved the exceptions but also reminded Buchanan that the properties will have to hook in to the town's sewer once it is available.

and 2 at the Water Treatment Plant in the amount of \$154,622.


The following agenda item was for the capital purchase of a Folder Inserter Application Envelope Stuffing Machine at a cost of \$9,475. "The machine we currently have is 11 years old and at its

The next two items concerned payments to the town's engineering firm Mittauer & Associates, Inc. for the Water Main Replacement CDBG project. The total payment was \$9,575.00 of the total project cost of \$105,700.00.

The following item was to set a workshop to review the Land Use Administrator's duties and work schedule. The workshop will include the Land Use Administrator, the council, Town Attorney and the Planning & Zoning Board. The council names three dates: October 26, November 4 & November 16. The clerk will notify the council once the date is acceptable for all parties.

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
Support the Quilt Guild at the Fair!

Fruits and Vegetables Increase for WIC Families Extended

A continuing resolution of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) has been passed by congress to enhance the WIC benefit for a period of 3 months. The increase expanding the vegetable and fruit voucher from \$9/month for children and \$11/month for women to \$24/month for children, \$43/month for pregnant and postpartum women and \$47/month for partially and fully breastfeeding women.

Florida WIC will be implementing the increase October 1, 2021- December

31, 2021. All women and children 1 - 4 years old who participate in the Nassau County WIC Program will receive an increase in their fruits and vegetables cash vouchers and are encouraged to use all of their fruits and vegetable dollars each month.

Warriors Scalp the Panthers

Last Friday night was the game we have been looking for as Warrior fans! It was a game where we see domination in all aspects of the game; a game where they out play the opponent in offense, defense and special teams. After starting 0-3 the Warriors have won two in a row and are 1-0 in district play.

The first quarter the Warriors set the tone for the game and district play moving forward as a whole. Conner Nobles put the Warriors on the board midway through the first quarter with a rushing touchdown, followed by a Davis extra point making it 7-0 Warriors. On the next Panther possession the ball was picked by Davis giving the ball back to that potent Warrior offense. AJ Miller scored stretching the lead to 14. Quarterback Brady Wright completed his first touchdown pass of the night bringing the score to 21-0, making it a dominant first quarter for the Warriors.

On the first Panther drive of the second quarter, they got on the board but missed the extra point. The next big play of the game comes on vet another interception for the Warrior defense that was returned 65 yards by Leon Whitley for another Warrior touchdown. Davis made the extra point increasing the score to 28-6 for the Warriors. Whitley had a big game with 3 passes defended for the game. Dominant in all areas of the game, the Warriors special team blocked the Panthers punt. Wright completed a touchdown pass to Davis ending the first half with a 34-6 Warrior lead. The Warriors absolutely dominated the half.

In third quarter the Panthers tried to make it a game going into the fourth quarter. The Panthers were able to shut

the Warrior offense out in the third quarter by scoring two touchdowns making the score 34-19 at the end of third quarter.

The Warriors got the ball in the 4th quarter, went down the field and scored on a 20-yard touchdown run by Nobles making it 40-19, after a failed two-point conversion. After a strong defensive stand, the Warriors got the ball back and scored on a long touchdown pass from Wright to Miller adding to their lead and the final score of 46-19.

Offensively, this was Wright's best passing game of the season, finishing the game 17 of 27 for 219 yards and three touchdowns and 23 rushing yards. Nobles lead the way rushing with 109 rushing yards and two touchdowns; Leon Whitley had a monster game for the Warriors with 244 yards in every aspect of the game with yards rushing, receiving, kick returns, punt returns and interception returns. Whitley would be my player of the game because in the multiple ways in which he contributed to this Warrior blow out. Up front, big Wyatt Butler lead the way for the Warrior offensive line with five pancake blocks up front.

Defensively, Brooks Miller led Warrior defense in tackles with a total of 14 for the game. Michael Thorn had 5 tackles for loss and 1 sack; Conner Scaff had a sack.

Friday night was an awesome game for the Warriors in their first district match up for the season. Now winning two in a row the Warriors can go into homecoming week feeling confident. Come out and support the home town team and all of the homecoming court for the halftime crowning. Friday night kick off is 7 p.m. at Warrior field against the Fernandina Beach Pirates.







Mr. Elliott Jones Celebrates 98th Birthday

Mr. Elliott Jones, of Callahan, celebrated his 98th birthday October 14. Mr. Elliott was born October 14, 1923 in Callahan. His parents were Ester and Elliot Jones, Sr. Mr. Elliott still resides beside the home he was born and raised in and is frequently seen riding around Callahan on his 3-wheeled electric bicycle. He plans to ride again in this year's Christmas parade. He is also a WWII US Navy Veteran. He plans to celebrate his birthday with his family!

In celebration of his birthday, Mr. Elliott wanted to share the history, as he remembers it, of Callahan before WWII. Following is his memories of Callahan in the 'Good Ole Days':

Callahan electricity was from an electric plant in Baldwin. In the city, you could have electric light and fans. Some people had a little electricity, all other had hand fans, lamps and lanterns. The telephone office and switchboard was in a home and wires were fastened to trees, light poles and telephone poles. Running water was supplied from a flowing well owned by groups of owners of a well. Some people owned their flowing well while others had hand pumps. Ice was delivered to homes and businesses for ice boxes to keep food cool. Seafood trucks delivered seafood and perishable food. Milk was delivered to homes from several local dairy farms, if you didn't have a cow. The chicken farms in Callahan were from Schwend Insurance to Lem Turner Road and US 1 to Hodges Road. The chiropractor office was in the egg & feed barn. There were over ten more chicken farms around Callahan.





The grocery store was a 2-story building with groceries downstairs and apartments upstairs (where city hall currently is). In the 1930s, the building became a restaurant and the grocery store moved across US 1 (where Hardee's currently is). Also in the 1930s, the Conner's built a 3-part

store with a Drug Store/Soda Fountain & Curb Service, Grocery/Meat & Dry Goods, and Seed Feed & Farm Supplies. There was a grocery store on US 1 and Brandies Avenue. The Post Office was on the railroad

with a horse water tub. Mail delivery began in 1919, and Mr. Elliott's father was the mail carrier, on horseback two days a week. The office later moved to the 2-story apartment next to Ace Hardware, then moved to US 1 next to Ann's Diner, then moved to US 1 where The Link currently is, and to the current location on SR 200.

The school was a 2-story house with 2 rooms downstairs for classes 1-6; 2 rooms upstairs for classes 7-12, with a small auditorium. There was a 2-part outhouse: boys on one side; girls on the other side. We had a clay tennis and basketball court

> to play on. In 1930, a new 12 classroom was built with bathrooms and heating. The community gym was built in the 1930s and we had boys football, basketball & baseball; and the girls had basketball. There was also a colored school on US 1.

> There was a gas station on US 1 & 5th Street and gas was hand pumped to a glass tank above. The pump had marks to

see the amount of gas in the tank. Gas station attendants would clean your windshield, check your tires & oil and pump your gas. Later there was an electric gas pump in the city and a truck stop where CVS currently

is. There were two 2-story hotels, one on US 1 next to Ann's Diner that had a soda fountain & dining room, barber shop and beds upstairs. The other was a 2-story on Mickler and Railroad Street (now Dixie Avenue) that had a buffet 3 times a week. There was one bank, where the Nassau County Record currently is, but went broke in 1929 depression. Residents then had to bank in Jacksonville until the 50s.

There were two sawmills, one where First Coast Shopping Center currently is; and one where the high school baseball field currently is. The sawdust piles were 15-20 feet high. We had 2 turpentine stills: one on Comanche Street & US 301: and the other on Musslewhite Road with a store and living quarters. There was a brickyard and clay holes from US 1 to Page Street and MLK to SR 200. They dug their own clay, they had conveyor belts that took the clay through a brick shaper, cut the clay and made bricks and dried and cured in dungeons. There was a crate mill from the current State Farm Insurance building to Mills Creek. They made thin sheets of wood for cabinets and baskets.

Some residents had large tracks of land and timber. They sold the land and timber and built town houses. Some residents kept part of the land and retired. Seven townhouses were built on Booth Street. Callahan had a 2-story City Hall and jail upstairs. Justice of the Peace for Misdemeanors. Other criminals went to Fernandina. There was swimming pool with covered picnic tables with a snack bar and meeting room and dance floor on US 1 at Gray Gables. We had one doctor, Doctor Brewster, for emergencies. He would call for an ambulance in Jacksonville or we would take the emergency in our cars to the hospital.

These were the 'Good Ole Days' per Mr. Elliott Jones! Happy Birthday, thanks for the history!


HMSHS Homecoming Court

Closing the Achievement Gap

On a recent call with the Florida Department of Education and statewide Exceptional Student Education (ESE) administrators, a shout-out was given to Nassau County Schools for having the lowest gap in performance for students with disabilities of all 67 counties!

For the second year in a row, Nassau County School District ranks #1 in the state for the percentages of students with disabilities who scored at a level 3 or above on the Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) in grades 3-10 for English Language Arts (ELA), Mathematics, and on the combined score for Math and Algebra 1.

Yulee Elementary School boasts the highest gains for elementary schools on the FSA/ELA with a 6.8% increase, and West Nassau High School had the highest gains for secondary schools in the district with a 3% increase.

Sixty percent of all elementary school students with disabilities scored a level 3 or higher on the FSA/Math, which is excellent, but Bryceville Elementary and Hilliard Elementary took home the trophy with 80% or more of their students with disabilities scoring at or above proficiency. For secondary schools,

Yulee Middle had significant gains in student proficiency scores with a 10.4% increase and West Nassau increased their Algebra proficiency results with a 10.6% increase over the last two years!

Patsi Kelly, the Director of Exceptional Student Education, stated, "We are very proud of the hard work that our teachers, paraprofessionals, and especially our students with disabilities, have put forth in order to make these phenomenal gains in closing the achievement gap."

Amidst all the gains, the shining star for achievement in 2021 goes to those students with disabilities who took the Civics end of course exam! Extraordinary gains were made in this area for students at Callahan Middle who increased proficiency rates by 19.5%, Fernandina Middle increasing by 19.9%, and Yulee Middle increasing by 22.9%.

Superintendent Kathy Burns stated, "We are proud of our students, staff, schools, and supportive families. We will continue to work together for the success of students and the improvement of our schools."



But, the Stallions were able to respond with help from their aerial attack with a 25-yard touchdown strike down the near sideline. With the extra point missed, the game was locked in a 6-6 stalemate at the end of the quarter.

After both teams' defenses traded blows in the 2nd quarter, the Stallions broke through the stalemate and answered the call with a 12-yard touchdown run. With the 2-point attempt good, the Stallions took their first lead of the night 14-6. But, the Flashes were able to respond using both their offense and defense to do so. It started when the Stallion offense was pinned inside their own 5 yard line and Carson Newkirk broke into the Stallion backfield and tackled the ball carrier into the end zone for a safety. The Flashes offense capitalized when Bennett connected with Bradyn Matto for a 30vard touchdown strike. After the 2-point conversion was good, the Flashes retook the lead 16-14. But, the Stallions stole the momentum back in their favor with a 69-vard touchdown run on the outside of the defense. With the extra point good, the Stallions went into halftime with a slim 21-16 lead.

In the second half, however, the Flashes were able to steal the momentum away. The Stallions were pushing down the field and were on the doorstep to extend the lead, but the Flashes denied any further advancement and forced a stop on 4th down. The Flashes offense then used the defensive stop and orchestrated a methodical drive capped off with a 44yard touchdown run courtesy of Walker Avera. With the 2-point conversion good, the Flashes retook the lead again 24-21. The Flashes continued to roll on offense

using crucial completions to Dylan Coston and his brother DJ, capped off the drive with a 4-yard touchdown run. With the 2-point conversion good, the Flashes began to stretch the lead to 32-21. Needing an immediate response, the Stallions put a drive together with time running out. But, the Flashes defense rose tall with crucial sacks by Newkirk and Tucker Pickett. With that defensive effort, the Flashes put the bow on another win on the road against the Stallions with the final score 32-21 and advance to 6-0.

Offensively, the Flashes generated 320 yards of total offense with 213 of those vards coming on the ground. Lyle Bennett went 10/21 for 107 yards, a touchdown and an interception; DJ Coston led on the ground with 21 carries for 108 yards and a touchdown; Walker Avera had 6 carries for 74 yards and a touchdown; Braydon Holley had 5 carries for 18 yards; and Bennett had 5 carries for 13 yards and a touchdown. On the receiving end were Matto with 2 catches for 45 yards and a touchdown; Seth Moore had 3 catches for 39 yards; and Dylan Coston had 3 catches for 18 yards.

Defensively, the Flashes pitched a shutout in the 2nd half and sacked the quarterback 4 times. Carson Newkirk led the charge with 6 tackles, a sack, pass breakup, and quarterback pressure; Avera with 5 tackles; Tucker Pickett with 4 tackles, 2 sacks, and a guarterback pressure; Angelo Benjamin and Colton Conner each collecting 4 tackles.


