West Nassau 2021 Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony Held

Friday night, prior to the West Nassau High School football game, the 2021 Hall of Fame Ceremony was held. Each year five new members are selected to the Hall of Fame. This year's inductees were: Charlie Wilkie, Dale Braddock, Dr. Drew Sauls, Freddie L. Johnson, Jr. and Dr. Tyrone Blue.

Charles 'Charlie' Wilkie was selected as an alumni member. Charlie is a 1977 graduate of West Nassau High School and four (4) sports letterman in football, baseball, track and golf. He set a high school record in weightlifting with a 420 lbs. bench press while weighing only 180 lbs. He served 30 plus years in his Law Enforcement career and 18 plus years with the K-9 Unit. He is credited with the apprehension of hundreds of the most dangerous suspects. He is a nationally recognized Law Enforcement Expert. He has interviewed many times by local stations and national networks FOX and CNN for his knowledge on high profile cases.

Dale Braddock was selected as an alumni & faculty member. Mr.



Braddock served in Nassau County as a teacher, coach, Athletic Director, Media Specialist, Assistant Principal, Principal and Director of Secondary Education. He was a 1968 graduate of Callahan High School and was the Class President. He served as the Coach of the 1991 West Nassau Softball State Champions. He also served in the Air National Guard from 1969-1975.

Dr. Drew Sauls was selected as

faculty member. Dr. Sauls earned a football scholarship to Valdosta State University where he earned his BS in PE, MS in Education; Leadership Specialist in Education; and achieved Doctorate in Education Leadership. He has served 35 years in education including: Head Football Coach at West Nassau; St. George Elementary School Principal; Charlton County High School Principal; and Brantley County School

Superintendent.

The late Mr. Freddie L. Johnson, Jr. was selected as a faculty member. Mrs. Helen Johnson accepted the award on behalf of her late husband. Mr. Johnson served 34 years in education and many of those years at West Nassau High School. While serving as the West Nassau Girls Basketball Coach, they won 12 consecutive District Championships; also making it to the State Final 4 Championship one year. He was chosen as the Coach of the Year and served as Dean of Students for 25 years.

Dr. Tyrone Blue was selected as an alumni member. Dr. Blue was chosen as the 1984 Most Valuable Player in Nassau County Football/Baseball. He currently serves as a Principal for Duval County Public Schools from 2007-present. He is the President of the Concerned Citizens of Nassau County; and Pastor of the First Missionary Baptist Church in Gainesville from 2008-present. He is also a Board Member of the Nassau County Planning & Zoning Board.

NCFR Awarded Life-Saving Equipment Grant

During the most recent grant cycle, the Foundation awarded 126 grants to public safety organizations nationwide. The 126 grants totaling nearly \$2.7 million were given to organizations in need of critical lifesaving equipment and resources.

I was sharing with my some of my





Reacting to Reaction

Witnessing to others about the glory of Christ can be a daunting task for many people. Even those who are extroverts tend to have some difficulty with this. Sometimes, sharing about the love and grace that we can find only through Jesus Christ is peacefully received. Sometimes it is not. How we react in those times when our testimonies are met with scoffing, or even anger, is more important than when they are peacefully received.

There are some very important things we must remember. First we are Christians. That means that we are ambassadors for Christ. We are to show the love of Christ in every situation. Second, we cannot take negative reactions personally. Those that reject our testimonies are not rejecting us. They are rejecting the Gospel of Jesus Christ. It is His Gospel and His truth, not ours. Third, no amount of finger wagging, or fault finding will help the situation. Pointing out the sin in their life will only complicate things and make it harder for your audience to hear Christ's truth in the future.

There are a few things that I try to remember when I am experiencing a negative reaction to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The most important is why they are being so aggressive in their rejection. It may be that there have been times that someone was too aggressive with them. Someone that had previously witnessed to them may have been judgmental and critical. Brow beating someone about what a dirty rotten sinner they are only makes things worse. It is not for us to convict. The work of the Holy Spirit is to convict the world about sin and righteousness and judgment (John 16:8). Another reason for aggressive rejection of the Gospel of Jesus Christ is cultural. For many, they have been told all their lives that their behaviors are perfectly acceptable, that there is nothing wrong with what they are doing. When they are faced with the truth of the Gospel, and the truth of their behaviors, conflict is unavoidable. Coming to terms with our sin nature is a bitter pill.

There are several Scriptures that we can draw strength and counsel from in these situations. Proverbs 15:1, "A soft answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger." Our words should represent the love of Christ. Ephesians 4:15-16 tells us not only to speak truth in love, but to strive toward spiritual maturity. If this means that we stand there and listen to someone call us hypocrites and bad-mouth Jesus, so be it. Our reactions must be just as strong a testimony to the grace and forgiveness of Jesus Christ as the words that we share.

Callahan Town News

The Callahan Town Council met Monday night for their final meeting of October. The first order of business was the approval of two resolutions. The first, Resolution 2021-R13 was approved by the council to donate \$700 to the West Nassau JROTC program. "The ROTC cadets have helped us (the town) with clean ups around town. I provided pizza for them but felt like we need to

donate money to the program," said Councilwoman Janet Shaw.

In looking back at the records, the town had previously donated \$500 to the program but agreed to add \$200 more for all the cadets have done for the town. The last time the town donated to the program was in 2019, for \$500.

The next, Resolution 2021-R14 was also approved which concerned donating \$600 to the Callahan Middle School Band. "The town received a letter requesting a donation to help defray the costs from the CMS Band fair booth," said Town Clerk Stephanie Knagge. "They also are collecting money to purchase new band instruments."

The final reading and Public Hearing was held on Ordinance 2021-O04 which concerned 1.76 acres of property that is Voluntary Property Annexation in to the town limits. This means the land owners want to voluntarily tie into the

town water/sewer system. The council approved the ordinance.

Town Manager Mike Williams addressed the council concerning the Branch Creek subdivision. "Several residents have been approached about starting another HOA in Branch Creek however none want to move forward to get it going," said Williams. "You (the council) need to decide how you

> want to handle this situation. The roads will soon need repairing, the storm drains need to be

maintained and mowing of the subdivision needs to be done. The town cannot take on this property and maintenance for free. I need direction from you on what

you want to do."

The council advised the Town Attorney Reba Pearce to draft a letter to be sent to the Branch Creek residents of their options and giving them 45 days for action.

Williams also advised the council that the town received two paving bids. The lower bid, Duval Asphalt at a cost of \$147,641 was approved. This will include paving of Booth, Dixie and Page Streets in Callahan.

The council also agreed to make the town employees Christmas holidays as Friday, December 24; Saturday, December 25; Sunday, December 26; and Monday, December 27.

This is primarily an outdoor event so please bring your blankets and lawn chairs. The West Nassau Historical Society is an



Attempted Murder Arrest Made

Flashes Sink Buccaneers on Homecoming

It was Homecoming week for the Hilliard Flashes as everyone from all walks of life flocked to and packed the stands of Flashes Field to welcome the Branford Buccaneers, a team they were very familiar with from the 2019 season when the Flashes beat them in the regular season and playoffs in overtime. The weather was fair, the atmosphere was beaming with joy and anticipation and the stage was set for a much anticipated matchup in front of hopeful parents and alumni.

After winning the coin toss, the Flashes made the executive decision to open the game on offense. They set up shop at the 34 yard line and used 11 plays and a steady diet of both the running and passing game. The Flashes capped off the balanced breakfast on 4th and 6 when Lyle Bennett connected with Dylan Coston down the near sideline and evaded would be tacklers for a 19yard score. With the extra point good, the Flashes sprung out with an early 7-0 lead. The Buccaneers answered right back. After the Flashes defense forced a stop on 4th down, the Buccaneers defense answered back intercepting



Bennett's pass and returned it 30 yards for the score. After extra point blocked, the was Buccaneers answered back and chopped the score down to 7-6. However, the Flashes answered right back on 3rd and long when Bennett floated a dime into the arms of DJ Coston on a wheel

route for a 34-yard score. With the extra point good, the Flashes closed out the opening quarter with a 14-6 lead.

The action slowed in the 2nd quarter, but the Flashes continued to add to their lead on offense this time using the legs of Coston for a 3-yard touchdown run. After the extra point was no good, the Flashes stretched their lead to 20-6. Even when the scoring stalled, the Flashes defense continued to strengthen their grip on the Buccaneers offense with back-to-back turnovers on downs and went into halftime with a comfortable lead.

The action picked back up in the 3rd courtesy of the Flashes' defense. After the Buccaneers crossed midfield, the Flashes countered a pick 6 from the Bucs when Carson Newkirk got his arms up and intercepted a pass and returned it 55 yards for the score. With the 2-point conversion no good, the Flashes continued to roll, extending the lead to 26-6. The Buccaneers answered right back using their potent run game and capped the drive off with a 3-yard touchdown run. With



the 2-point conversion good, the Bucs cut into the deficit now to 26-14. The Flashes responded with a scoring effort of their own using explosive plays from the perimeter and a little help from officiating and then put the bow on the drive with a 12-yard touchdown run from Walker Avera. After the 2-point conversion was no good, the Flashes closed the quarter with a healthy 32-14 lead

As the game was coming to a close, the Buccaneers had one more chance to try and make the game close. Relying on the run game, they were able to do just that when the scoring drive was all on the ground and ended it with a 4 yard touchdown run. With the 2-point conversion good, the Buccaneers trimmed the deficit down to 10 with the score being 32-22. However, the Flashes offense kept their foot on the gas and continued to add to their lead using explosive perimeter plays and then used an incredible surge from the interior of the offensive line to escort Bennett into the end zone from 1 yard out on the quarterback sneak. With the

2-point conversion good, the Flashes extended the lead 40-22. At the final sound of the siren, the Flashes sent the crowd at Flashes Field home with smiles all around as they sink the Branford Buccaneers 40-22 and extend their record to 7-0.

Offensively, the Flashes generated 335 yards of total offense with 242 of those yards coming on the ground. DJ Coston was the front man of the rushing attack with 16 carries for 172 yards and a touchdown; Walker Avera with 8 carries for 46 yards and a touchdown; and Braydon Holley with a carry for 7 yards. Lyle Bennett went 4/11 for 93 yards, 2 touchdowns and an interception and also had 5 carries for 15 yards and a touchdown. On the receiving end was Bradyn Matto with 2 catches for 40 yards; DJ Coston with a 34-yard touchdown; and his brother Dylan with a 19-yard touchdown grab.

Defensively, the Flashes generated a defensive score, 3 sacks, 6 pass breakups, and 4 turnover on downs. Leading the charge was Angelo Benjamin with 8 tackles, Tucker Pickett with 6 tackles and a quarterback pressure; Colton Conner with 6 tackles; Walker Avera with 5 tackles; Damon Kibler with 4 tackles and a sack; and Carson Newkirk with 3 tackles, a pass breakup, 2 quarterback pressures, and a 55-yard pick six.
