Westside Senior Life Center "Sneak Peek Sign-in" Event Saturday

Nassau County's west side will have an opportunity to leave their mark on Nassau County Council on Aging's (NCCOA's) Westside Senior Life Center in Hilliard, 37002 Ingham Road. While renovation is in progress, plan on joining your friends and neighbors on Saturday, October 30, from 10 a.m. - 12 noon to get a "sneak peek" and sign your name or leave a message on an interior wall before the facility is complete. Sharpies® will be provided! All signatures and messages will eventually be covered with drywall and paint, and will become a permanent part of the Life Center.

Here are a few important event reminders: The Life Center property is still an active construction site, safety is the top priority (however, hard hats will not be required); Parking will be located behind the building; Barricades and cones will mark the entrance path to the "sign-in" location; this area WILL NOT be wheelchair accessible; Visitors must wear hard-soled, enclosed-toe shoes (no sandals or flip flops).

Thanks to local residents and the



State of Florida, the more than 50-yearold building is in the process of a major renovation to meet the expanding needs of our seniors. The Life Center is set to re-open to the general public in Spring or Summer 2022. NCCOA projects doubling seniors served from 1,500 to 3,000. "This 'sneak peek' will provide a glimpse of the new and improved Westside Senior Life Center, as well as encourage the community to be a part of our progress," said Janice Ancrum, NCCOA President & CEO. "Our westside seniors deserve the best kind of facility to congregate with their peers, eat nutritious meals, and fully participate in wellness classes and educational opportunities. It will be a home away from home."

To date, the following has been completed: resolved drainage issues; connected to Town of Hilliard sewer system; replaced the roof; extended the footprint to include a commercial kitchen with large pantry, larger communal spaces, increased storage, new restrooms and office space for the staff. The building's exterior has also been refaced.

Next steps include resurfacing the parking lot with accommodation for handicap-accessible spaces and NassauTRANSIT buses; obtaining a generator (for use in the event of a hurricane or natural disaster); outfitting the commercial kitchen; and purchasing an additional outdoor freezer for our expanded nutrition support program.

In the meantime, our seniors are meeting each week at a local church where we offer staff-supervised programming. Home Health services, as well as Meals on Wheels and Meals on Wheels for Pets, are continuing throughout the renovation process. NassauTRANSIT is also in service on the westside.



He sees his job as telling Americans they are getting screwed by greedy white men. "The fact is our economy faced challenges long before this pandemic struck. Working people were struggling to make it long before the pandemic arrived."

Struggling? The fact is Americans have one of the highest living standards in the world coupled with the most opportunity anywhere on the planet. That's because of capitalism. We produce far more than any European nation per capita. No one is even close. Not enough for Joe Biden. He wants the federal government in charge of distributing wealth, not the private sector. His giveaways in the so-called "infrastructure bill" are endless with the goal of creating citizen dependency on Washington. In response to Biden's massive spending proposal, even some liberal economists are worried about the deleterious effects of higher taxes on those who drive the economy. Writing in The New York Times, Harvard economics professor N. Gregory Mankiw says this: "Compassion is a virtue, but so is respect for those who are talented, hardworking and successful. The entire \$3.5 trillion package is too big and too risky. The wiser course is to take more incremental steps rather than try to remake the economy in one fell swoop." But President Biden and the word "wise" are not compatible. The progressives want a European-style socialist system immediately and old Joe has bought in. There is no deception in that analysis. It is absolutely true. No joke.



The Hilliard Town Council met Thursday night for their final regular meeting of October. The first item of business was the First Reading of Ordinance 2021-10 which concerned Amending Chapter 42 of the Hilliard Town Code, Streets, Sidewalks and other Public Places, to permit the use of Golf Carts on roads within the Town limits. Town Attorney Christian Waugh advised the council that the ordinance is a rough draft, as he knew the council might want to have a workshop for some of the changes. "The council may add or change anything within this ordinance such as: Making Golf Carts just on certain roads within the town for safety concerns; Allowing Golf Carts out from sunrise to sunset," continued Waugh. "Perhaps roads with a 35 mph speed limit; Crossing US Highway 1 only at the traffic light; and Golf Carts must be registered with a \$15 registration fee with the Town. These are just a few of the items the council might want to consider making changes to."

A workshop was set for Thursday, November 18 at 6 p.m. prior to the regular meeting to discuss the ordinance and make corrections or additions.

The following three items concerned quarterly reports from the town

Building Official/Inspector; Code Enforcement Officer; and the Land Use Administrator. All the reports are available on the town's website at: www.townof hilliard.com.

The council approved another workshop on Thursday, November 4 following the next council meeting to have a performance review of the Land Use Administrators duties and job.

Following, Parks & Recreation Director Gabe Whittenburg provided an annual report of the recreation department, as he just celebrated his first year as director. "We have seen increases in all of our programs and are offering many more programs. We're looking forward to kicking off our basketball season and starting signups in two weeks," said Whittenburg. "My long term goal is to purchase some new equipment for the fitness center. We have a lot of people enjoying the facility but our equipment really needs to be updated."

The council approved the termination of the Right-of-Way Mowing Services Contract with Richard Smart dba Smart Quality Lawn Care.

The next regular meeting of the council will be Thursday, November 4 at 7 p.m.

Flashes Cage Tigers on Senior Night, End Regular Season Undefeated

Senior night is one of the most emotional times during the high school sports season. Families coming out in full force in support of their senior as that kid's ambitions for life after high school is being called out over the loudspeaker before the game. For the Hilliard Flashes, it was no different as the Flashes honored the senior class of 2022 before their matchup against the visiting Trenton Tigers.

After losing the coin toss, the Flashes began the contest on offense and set up shop near midfield. The Flashes offense grinded their way deep into Tigers territory and converted two crucial 4th downs, including on a 4th and goal from the 4 yard line when Lyle Bennett used improvisation after a botched snap under center and ran outside on the right side for the score. With the extra point good, the Flashes jumped out to an early 7-0 lead. Uncle Mo continued to take residence on the Flashes side as the defense took the field on their first drive. On the first offensive play for the Tigers, District 1A Region 3 all District defensive lineman Carson Newkirk



forced and recovered his own fumble and set the Flashes up with prime real estate inside the Tigers 30 yard line. The Flashes' offense wasted no time and took full advantage of the freshly baked turnover, this time using the skies to do it when Bennett connected with Dylan Coston who was left alone for a 13-

yard score. With the extra point good, the Flashes extended the lead to 14-0 to end the 1st quarter.

While Uncle Mo enjoyed his time with the Flashes, however, he took a visit to the tigers as well in the 2nd quarter. The Tigers used their potent ground game to generate the momentum need to get back into the ballgame and limited the Flashes offense any opportunities to see the field. To put the icing on the cake, the Tigers scored on back-to-back drives using the run game to score from a yard out and 6 yards out. With both extra points good, the Tigers evened the score at 14 heading into halftime.

The 3rd quarter went by in a blur, and it began with the Tigers getting the ball to start and going down the field in a drive that took almost 9 minutes off the game clock. The Tigers were knocking on the door to take their first lead of the game, but on 4th and goal from the 3 yard line, the Flashes defense rose up and stopped the Tigers courtesy of a 12-yard sack by Newkirk on a bootleg pass. As the 3rd quarter ended with the score still tied at 14, the Flashes broke the scoring drought deep into the 4th quarter when Bennett



connected with Bradyn Matto on a slant route for a 16-yard touchdown strike. After the 2-point conversion was missed off a botched snap on the extra point attempt, the Flashes took the lead back 20-14. However, the Tigers would respond with a score of their own with a 12-yard touchdown pass after a miscommunication in pass coverage by the Flashes defense. With the extra point good, the Tigers took their first lead of the night as they went up 21-20 with under 3 minutes to go. The Flashes used the time to their advantage using a key catch by Matto on the slant route and a 25-yard run by DJ Coston to get inside the Tigers' 5 yard line. The drive was capped off with a huge surge from the offensive line to escort Bennett into the end zone for a 1-yard score. With the 2-point conversion good, the Flashes regaine the lead 28-21. Needing a big stop on defense, the Flashes answered the call when Angelo Benjamin intercepted a pass that sealed the victory for the Flashes and ends the regular season 8-0.

It was a struggle on offense for the Flashes as they were able to only muster 207 yards of total offense with 100 of those yards coming on the ground. DJ Coston, who received the honor of being named the District 5 Class 1A Player of the Year, had a tough day at the office with 19 carries for 91 yards. Walker Avera had 3 carries for 11 yards, and Lyle Bennett had 7 carries for 9 yards and 2 touchdowns including the game winner on the quarterback sneak and went 7/18 for 107 yards and 2 scores. On the receiving end were Bradyn Matto with 2 receptions for 38 yards and a touchodwn, Dylan Coston had 2 receptions for 28 yards and a touchdown, Braydon Holley had a catch for 19 yards, Seth Moore had a catch for 12 yards, and DJ Coston had a catch for 10 yards.

Defensively, the Flashes forced 2 turnovers and a turnover on downs on the night. Avera, who was named All District Defensive Utility player, led the team with 11 tackles. Contributing to the effort was Damon Kibler with 6 tackles and a quarterback pressure, Carson Newkirk with 6 tackles, a sack, force fumble and recovery, and a quarterback pressure, Colton Conner with 5 tackles, Dylan Coston and Tucker Pickett both had 3 tackles and Pickett with a quarterback pressure, Angelo Benjamin ended the night with 6 tackles and a game sealing interception.

Also, congrats to coach John Pate for being named the District 5 class 1A Coach of the Year for the second straight year in a row.

The quest for a championship begins for the Flashes as they look to defend their home turf and remain unbeaten against the visiting Blountstown Tigers, who come in at 6-1. Kickoff is at 7 p.m.
