Forestry Career Day Held at the Fairgrounds

More than 170 high school juniors and seniors flew drones, operated heavy equipment, learned about forestry and met local employers and college reps one-onone at the first-ever Forestry Career Day held Thursday, September 26 at the Northeast Florida Fairgrounds.

Early in the day, Dr. Kathy Burns, Gail Cook, Lissa Braddock, Laura DiBella, David Nunes, Shelby Pyatt, Ed Carter, Josh Steiger, Jody Davis, Tiffany Wilson and Keith Wingate participated in the ribbon cutting ceremony that opened the event.

Forestry Career Day was made possible by the support and participation of over 100 volunteers from more than two dozen local businesses and organizations in the forestry industry in Nassau County. Spearheaded by Rayonier Inc., the event gave students hands-on experiences as they learned about the wide variety of forestry careers.

Forestry is a key industry for Florida. Almost half of Florida's total land area is forest land. The forestry industry employs more than 124,000 people and contributes \$25 Billion to the state's economy every year. Forest products play a key role in our daily lives. More than 5,000 everyday products are made from wood, including lumber and plywood as well as LCD screens, rubber tires, bath products, even diapers.

"We are excited to work with great partners to bring this event to Nassau County high school students and expose them to the many career paths the industry



has to offer," said Rayonier President and CEO David L. Nunes.

Forestry offers a wide variety of careers, with career paths that involve flying drones, operating heavy equipment, creating complex mapping systems, using intricate software systems, and caring for the environment. Also, career opportunities in the industry range in educational requirements, from those that provide on-





the-job training to high school grads to those that require advanced college degrees.

The Callahan Town Council met Monday night for a special meeting to finalize their millage and budget resolutions. The first item concerned a presentation from Jim Bush, representing Florida Power & Light. "We (FPL) have been serving the town for many years," said Bush. "Callahan has demonstrated their desire to continue to grow as a town and have been supportive of us (FPL). We are proud to donate two (2) checks: one for \$1,000

to sponsor the Callahan Parade and Fireworks; the other for \$10,000 to go towards the new Depot Park project."

The next item was the approval of Resolution 2019-R19 which concerned the second and final reading and Public Hearing for the Fiscal Year 2019-2020 millage. The council approved the millage rate at 2.6079 mills.



Real Faith?

When it comes to reading the Bible, we must understand that it is not a book of systematic theology. Meaning it does not lay out every doctrine in a systematic way like our churches Statements of Faith would. It instead is the story of God's love. Along the way, we receive all the theology and doctrines we believe. But if we had to pick one book that looks most like a text book of theology, it would be Romans. Romans is our greatest explanation of the Gospel (Good News) of Jesus Christ. Normally, when we think of the Gospel, we think of our sin, our deserving of the penalty for our sin, Jesus coming as our

savior, and our relationship with Him. And while that is all true, Romans brings us the Gospel from a different perspective. It comes more from God's perspective. It shows us salvation from an eternal perspective. Romans puts on display for us the Righteousness of God.

When I read Romans, I walk away with 'God is righteous' and I am not. Fortunately for us, in the absence of our righteousness, God desires to put His righteousness on us. It is by faith that we have access to this righteousness.

"Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. Through him we have also obtained access by faith into this grace in which we stand, and we rejoice in hope of the glory of God." Romans 5:1-2 ESV

Faith is our way in. Faith allows us access to God's grace that provides His righteousness. If faith is the door into our relationship with God, if we can only receive God's righteousness by faith, doesn't it stand to reason that we should be certain about our faith?

The question we should ask ourselves is do I have real faith? This week, read Romans 5 and see the example of Abraham as one who "...*believed God, and it was counted to him as righteousness.*" Romans 5:3 ESV

What sets Abraham apart is that he believed God even when his circumstances said he shouldn't have. He believed God when he didn't have the details. He believed God for His promises when God didn't tell him how or when. And of course, trusting God paid off, at the age of nearly 100 years old Abraham finally received the son God promised Him almost 25 years earlier.

Do we trust God for His promises like Abraham? Is ours a real faith or do we only have faith in God when He does things the way we want Him to, or when we want Him to? I encourage you this week to trust God, for His promises, without conditions.

"Examine yourselves, to see whether you are in the faith. Test yourselves. Or do you not realize this about yourselves, that Jesus Christ is in you?—unless indeed you fail to meet the test!" 2 Corinthians 13:5

Students Learn About Organ Donations

The West Nassau High School Health Class of Ms. Jane Hicken learned many things about organ donation besides signing up to be an organ donor when you get your driver's license. All day, during all four of her classes, students heard from three different people that have dealt with organ donations in one way or another. Pamela Rittenhouse of LifeQuest Organ Recovery Services was on hand to explain to the students how important it is to be an organ donor. Several of the students advised Ms. Rittenhouse that they knew someone that had donated organs or received an organ through a donor. Rittenhouse, who was formerly an anchor at a Jacksonville news station, was in a bad car accident and almost lost her life. Following her recovery she went to work for LifeQuest.



The three guest speakers were Robert Paton of Yulee; Jenna Rowland of Yulee and Jim Mangold of Callahan. Each briefly shared their stories for each class. Robert Paton shared his story: "I was a healthy happy man with a job and a family. My wife had just had our second son about 3 months earlier. I began to feel a little weird at work one day and brushed it off. This went on for a few days until one day I got

home and took a shower and started throwing up uncontrollably. After several doctors and hospital visits, I was back in the hospital because I was so weak and couldn't breathe. I was later briefed that I needed a heart transplant. How quickly my life changed. Shortly after I was prepped for surgery as a heart was found. My thoughts were someone lost their life today. I'm so thankful for the donor so I could have life again.

Jenna Rowland shared her story: I am here because I lost my brother



(24) to a tragic accident. He was trimming limbs and trees after Hurricane Irma. The tree was leaning one way but when it was cut, fell directly on him. Some time went by at the hospital however, he had no brain activity. My family was asked if Scott was an organ donor. We had no idea until we checked his driver's license and saw that he was. At that time we were asked what organs would we like to donate. It was one of the hardest decisions to make but Scott had already made the decision that he wanted this done. That's the kind of person he was. Our family knows that at least six people have a better life because of Scott. It just shows you how important that decision to be a donor is.

Jim Mangold and his granddaughter Ally shared his story: My grandfather has had three kidney transplants. The first was in 1998; 2009; and the most recent in 2018. The last one he was getting desperate. He was on the list but was getting sicker by the day. He actually advertised that he needed a kidney on the back of his truck with his phone number. That's where I came in. I posted the picture of my grandfather's truck with the information along with his picture on my Facebook, Instagram, Twitter and anything else I could think of. The picture was shared by numerous people. We found someone (Sarah) in Virginia that answered the call. She went through the testing and






Sheriff 'Walks' in Bryceville



The Nassau County Planning + Economic Opportunity (PEO) Department offers the following clarifying information regarding the proposed Pit Sisters facility in Callahan.

County PEO staff was not previously contacted by anyone affiliated with Pit Sisters regarding any necessary planning or zoning procedures. Due to a Jacksonville news story, Nassau County PEO staff became aware in July 2019 that Jennifer Deane, property owner and operator of Pit Sisters, intended to utilize her Callahan property for Pit Sisters operations. PEO staff immediately contacted Ms. Deane to assist in facilitating required County processes.

Ms. Deane was directed to pursue a conditional use application per Section 22.03(E) of the Land Development Code for her facility because of the requested use and zoning district (Open Rural). Conditional use applications go before the County's Conditional Use and Variance Board as a public hearing. This is consistent with how the County has applied the code to other similar property owners and uses in the Open Rural zoning district. Another animal rescue facility received a conditional use in August 2019, and a dog training facility is pending a conditional use hearing on September 26, 2019. These projects also require review by the County's Development Review Committee.

Ms. Deane initially submitted a

conditional use application to be heard in August 2019. Staff recommended continuation of the case, needing more information for a complete review. Ms. Deane agreed and requested continuance to the September 26, 2019 hearing. However, as of last week, Ms. Deane is electing to appeal the County staff determination that she needs a conditional use. Administrative appeal applications are submitted through the County Clerk. PEO staff are awaiting her application to set a public hearing for the appeal. Public hearings for administrative appeals go before the County Planning and Zoning Board.

No denials have been issued at this point, as Ms. Deane has not gone through either of the processes yet.

After a failed 2-point try, the Wolfpack ended the 3rd quarter with a 27-12 lead.

The Flashes went down the field on the doorstep to the end zone. The Wolfpack quickly put an end to any hope of a Flashes comeback with a 102-yard pick six. After a successful extra point, the Wolfpack





Leading the team on defense was Seth O'Neil with 5 tackles and 2 fumble recoveries; Tristin Moody with 4 tackles; Jason Sheffield with 3 tackles and a forced fumble; D.J. Coston also had 3 tackles and a pass breakup; Cody Bright had 2 tackles and a forced fumble; Josh Johnson had 3 tackles; and Lyle Bennett and Nathan Wilson had 2 tackles.




