## Hobos, Hot Rods & Heroes Festival and Car Show Saturday

The Hobos, Hot Rods and Heroes Festival & Car Show hosted by the West Nassau Historical Society as a fundraiser will be held Saturday, November 16 from 9 a.m. - 4 p.m. This is the non-profit's 3rd celebration held at the historic 1881 Callahan Train Depot.

There will be arts, crafts and food vendors. The car show is presented by Cochrane's Collision Center, Callahan Cruisers and AB&B Auto Parts and will be held from 10 a.m. - 4 p.m. A children's play area will have a bouncy house and youth-oriented games such as a Hobo Scavenger Hunt. Joel Pace Music students will hold a hands-on instruments session on the front platform of the 138year old station.

a.m. and will have a Veteran speaker. Local live entertainment will perform on the main depot stage all day. See the complete line-up on page 7.

Inside the train depot museum, visit the newly designed FAA exhibit, which contains Vintage air traffic control radar, vintage photos and other equipment donated by the Hilliard Center. The display will be augmented with local exhibitors showing their various works on the historic depot grounds.

The Hilliard Town Council met Thursday night for their first regular meeting of November and the meeting wasn't without abnormalities. As the mayor received a unanimous approval on the payables, former mayor Cris McConnell charged to the podium asking, "Was that a unanimous approval?"

"Yes it was," answered Mayor Floyd

"I have a copy of the payables and see that one of the council persons should have not voted on this due to her father is one of the payees. I plan to file a complaint with the ethics committee about this," added McConnell.

"The proper way to handle this is to speak at the end of the meeting, not now," said Town Attorney Christian Waugh.

"Well I will say it again then," said

McConnell.

"I will check on this matter," added

Again, Councilwoman Callie Kay Bishop abstained from voting or discussing for this item.

"This is for my final plat approval only. Once I have received my certificate from DEP I will come back for the sewer approval," said Bishop. The council approved the final plat.

Public Works Assistant Director Greg Grooms addressed the council concerning the purchase of a new dump truck. "You have the three bids. I 3 as we can get a longer bed (16')

for \$1,000 more. We really need the longer bed," added Grooms. "The cost would be \$78,380."

Again, from the back of the room, McConnell added, "You're going to spend more money on a new truck. I've been looking on a website and saw some for \$68,000."

Mayor Vanzant asked McConnell to not speak out again.

The council approved the purchase of the new truck.

Public Works Director Ritchie Rowe addressed the council concerning payment for a Step down transformer for the Eastwood Lift Station. "The transformer was approved back in July for \$5,000. The transformer has been installed and is working," said Rowe. The council approved payment.

In closing comments, McConnell approached the podium. "I apologize for speaking out of turn. I talked to Mr. Grooms about finding a truck for \$68,000 and thought that's what he was going to do," said McConnell. "I haven't seen or heard when the council is going to meet with members of the SJRWMD concerning property that might need permits."

The next council meeting will be Thursday, November 21 at 7 p.m.

# Fish Talk Cool Weather is Here!

The great thing about fall is that you can actually sleep late and not worry about being on the water so early. This past weekend, that's just what Klynt Farmer and I did. Just like most crisp mornings you better bundle up for the ride or it will be miserable! After the 5 mile trip, coffee wasn't needed as both of us were wide awake! We made it to our first location at the top of the incoming tide. There wasn't any rush to start casting so we decided to chase a few finger mullet for a warm up. Boy did that turn into a job! Most of the bait was on the surface and just before cast net distance, they'd dive deep. We had to anticipate where these fish were going then make blind casts. After about twenty attempts and two dozen finger mullet we decided to strike out.

After watching the reaction of bait, we had a feeling that artificial lures would be on fire. Well, that's just what happened as we eased up to the first spot. Klynt struck first with a solid trout and several times thereafter. It appeared as though he was going to have the hot hand. His bait of choice was the Unfair Lure, Rip N Slash 90 in the slow sinking, trout pattern. This time of year as the temps start dropping, fish will feed heavily. That said, most all natural colored suspending baits are absolute killers. I have a passion for throwing artificial lures because of the challenge. Second, there's nothing more exciting than feeling a big fish crushing your bait while on the pause. To be precise, we used the twitch, twitch, pause. As our day progressed, the bite became tough. Klynt never gave up and continued to let the lure rip, literally. He ended up filling the box with some quality fish. Klynt also felt very generous and decided to donate nine unfair lures to the big saltwater pond. So if you see any Rip N Slashes lying around, let us know!

With that said, the bite continues to be very good on the incoming tide. All of our Intracoastal waterways are loaded with red fish and trout. Most of these fish are targeting mullet on the end of the run. So, look for the schools of bait running along the ICW and watch for spooked fish, meaning bait that's being ambushed by predatory fish from below. Areas to target include oyster beds, grass points where the creeks turn and any structure where these bait fish can run along the shallows. Also, downsize your fluorocarbon leaders because of our clearing water. Trout can see very well and most of the bigger fish got that way for a reason. Second, pick up your favorite suspending or lipped baits. Use what you have the most confidence with. When I say that it's time for artificial, I mean it. The bite is really turning on and it's only going to get better.

This Saturday, November 16, look for a great bite right after daylight. We will have an incoming tide until noon. There will be some big fish caught especially if we have any cloud coverage.

Okay let's go! Get ready and I look forward to seeing you on the water!

This past Saturday morning at our Men's Prayer Breakfast, one of the men in the group shared how the Lord kept directing him to read James Chapter 3. 



## Fatal Accident Saturday Night

A Callahan woman lost her life in a single vehicle accident Saturday night on Thomas Creek Road. According to Florida Highway Patrol reports, around 10:21 p.m. Saturday, November 9, Marianne Hand, 34, of Callahan, was traveling northbound on Thomas Creek Road when she lost control of her vehicle. The vehicle traveled off of the roadway and onto the west shoulder. The left front of the vehicle collided with a standing tree. Ms. Hand was pronounced deceased at the scene.

### Hilliard Man Sentenced to Prison

U.S. District Judge Marcia Morales Howard sentenced Richard Earl Carroll, 55, of Hilliard, to 10 years in federal prison for conspiring to distribute 500 grams or more of methamphetamine. Carroll had pleaded guilty on July 26, 2019.

Multiple witnesses identified Carroll as a

methamphetamine supplier in Nassau County. During the execution of two separate search warrants at Carroll's home, local, state and federal law enforcement seized methamphetamine. officers assorted prescription pills (including hydrocodone and Xanax), marijuana plants and baggies containing marijuana, and 24 firearms. During a post-arrest



interview, Carroll admitted to obtaining more than 500 grams of methamphetamine from a source to sell to his customers. He also admitted that, at times, he traded the drugs to his customers for firearms.

Carroll's sentencing follows a series of related state and federal drug prosecutions involving the distribution

of methamphetamine, including Billy Crayton Skinner, 43, of Hilliard, who was sentenced to 37 months in federal prison on September 9, 2019; and Thomas A. Crews, 45, of Hilliard, who was sentenced to 29 months in federal prison in 2017.

This case was investigated by the Nassau County Sherriff's Office, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, and the Drug Enforcement Administration. It was prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney Michael J. Coolican.




