Groundbreaking Held for Westside Senior Life Center

What a beautiful day Monday was for a groundbreaking ceremony for the renovation of the NCCOA Westside Senior Life Center in Hilliard. While it was a great celebration, having some of the senior clients there would have made it even more special. Since the pandemic, the center has been closed for clients to come to the facility. Currently, all of the clients are being ministered to at their homes versus coming together.



Nassau County Council on Aging President & CEO Janice Ancrum welcomed the small crowd of residents and dignitaries to the ceremony. "This has been a long time coming and we are looking forward to getting this project started," said Ancrum. "I want to thank all of you for coming to share in this special moment with us."

"I just want everyone to know, this facility isn't just getting a facelift it is going to be a 'state of the art' facility. Some parts of this building are over 50 years old," said Geoff Clear, Chair of the NCCOA Board of Directors. "We were approved for a \$600,000 appropriation grant from the state of Florida. In conjunction, we must raise at least \$50,000 for other needs at the facility. We have Senator Aaron Bean and Representative Cord Byrd to thank for all their hard work on this. The governor only approved 6% of the projects and we were one of them."

The first part of the project will be to improve the drainage on the entire property. The next step will be to work with the Town of Hilliard to connect to their water & sewer lines. The entire parking lot including the bus parking area will be resurfaced along with a new roof over the entire facility. The inside will be expanded completely with a new kitchen work area and offices. Work is scheduled to begin following the holidays and completed by June 2021.

Callahan Swears in Two Councilpersons

The Callahan Town Council met Monday night for their final meeting of November. Councilman Ken Bass and new incoming Councilwoman Jaquelyn Fleming were both sworn into office to begin the meeting. Councilman David Mellecker was out of town and will be sworn in when he returns. Fleming ran for a council seat against three incumbents, Bass, Mellecker and Shirley Graham. Prior to the election, Graham withdrew her bid to run.

The council voted to continue to keep Bass as Council President however changed up the other positions. They are as follows: Councilman Ken Bass, Council President & Fire Commissioner; Councilwoman Janet Shaw, Parks & Recreation Commissioner; Councilwoman Jaquelyn Fleming, Water/Sewer Commissioner; Councilwoman Ashton Bishop Vargas, Street Department Commissioner; and Councilman David Mellecker, Zoning & Planning Commissioner.

In other business, Town Clerk Stephanie Knagge advised the council that Ethics Training is coming up. The council set Saturday, January 16, 2021 to do their virtual training.

Councilwoman Bishop Vargas


advised the council that she had contacted NCSO Sheriff Bill Leeper concerning the vandalism and possible drug use at Ewing Park. "Sheriff Leeper directed me to the Captain of Patrol Ryan VanTassell, who is here with us tonight," said Bishop Vargas. "I have some suggestions to make the park safer. I think we need to look at putting security cameras up; place a fence or gate at the entrance; perhaps more patrol concerning drug use."

"We will definitely increase patrol at the park. I will suggest that sufficient signs must be put up for defined park hours. Ten p.m. is too late to allow people there unless you have plenty of lights," said VanTassell. "Then you can set a curfew for the park. After that time, if anyone is in there we can take care of the situation."

"I'm going to look into adding some new poles with lights near the rear of the new parking area," added Town Manager Mike Williams. "The more you light things up the less inviting it is for vandals and illegal activities to take



Volunteer Fire Department. Assistant Fire Chief Larry Downey advised the council about the need for a new QRV for the department. "Our current brush truck is in need of updating and more service. When talking over the issue with Mr. Mike Williams, he suggested pricing out a new truck versus using our old one and adding to it," said Downey. "You all have a copy of the new pricing with a total of \$155,000. The former price we received to rehab our old truck was \$103,000 and that is still an old truck with some new parts. This truck will all be new with warranty. We have plans to sell the old brush truck and also one of the engines we received as a donation. Monies from these sales will go towards the purchase of this new truck. Then we will not have to finance as much. We also can apply for the Forestry 50/50 grant for some of the money, about \$10,000."

After much conversation, the council gave approval for Downey to proceed with ordering the new truck and move forward with selling the other trucks.

Next, the council discussed whether to join the Chamber of Commerce. The fee to join is \$350 per year. "You all remember that many chamber members came to our last meeting to encourage us to join the chamber again," said Bass. "What are your (council) thoughts?"

"I thought he (Tracy Stocksdale, Chamber Chairman) provided some Continued from page 1

things that they (chamber) had been doing," said Fleming. "I didn't however hear what they plan to do in the future for us. I wasn't really convinced of any help to the town."

"I know it's been a long time since the town has been a part of the chamber but why not try again," added Mayor Matthew Davis. "We can try for a year and if we aren't happy we don't have to join again."

The council unanimously approved joining the Chamber at a cost of \$350.

Resolution 2020-R12 was approved which concerned donating \$250 to Callahan Boy Scout Troop #351 to assist with sending a scout to camp.

The council approved the new cleaning contract for Tonya Butler Cleaning. However, after much discussion, the council agreed to ask Ms. Butler if she will do four (4) extra cleanings per year at no additional cost, which would include just cleaning the fire department bathrooms and tidying up. Knagge will talk with Butler to see how she responds.

During closing comments, Knagge advised the council that she has put her home up for sale and when it sells, she will be moving out of the Callahan City Limits, prior to the end of her 2022 term.

The next meeting of the council will be Monday, December 7 at 7 p.m.

Nothing seems to stay the same. Everything is in constant change and in the last number of years these changes have happened exponentially in travel, building and especially in electronics. Who would have thought they could ever pinpoint the landing of a used rocket booster to a barge, miles out in the ocean? Now Dick Tracy watches are not fiction in a comic book but are a real thing. The first computer I put my hands on was a Radio Shack TRS 80 with a total of 64K memory and used 8 inch

Callahan Community Thanksgiving Dinner this Saturday

The First United Methodist Church of Callahan will be sponsoring the Callahan Community Thanksgiving Dinner again this year, however it will have a different look. Instead of eating in, the meal will be carryout only due to the pandemic. A traditional Thanksgiving dinner will be served this Saturday, November 21 from 12-1 p.m. Along with dinner, Blessing Boxes will be given (while supplies last) and

a bag of groceries for each

family.

Forty years ago, a Thanksgiving tradition began at the Methodist Church in Callahan. Just the thought of this annual event screams tradition! Who could have imagined that this event would still be happening 40 years later? It has spanned a generation, with the first year's cooks now reaching their own senior citizen years, and the 1980 members of the Methodist Youth Fellowship becoming the newest church leaders and most recent kitchen co-workers! It all began with a church youth group headed by Steve Pickett called the CTC (Christians That Care). Steve, and his girlfriend, Susan Cason of Jacksonville, were the youth leaders at the church at that time.

Nationally, Ronald Reagan was president, the average cost of a new home was \$68,700.00, a new car was a major expense at \$7,200.00, one gallon of gas was \$1.19, and the average income in 1980 was under \$20,000! Talk about change! Preparations for this community dinner began weeks ago. Church members were asked to donate green beans, corn and cranberry sauce.

The members will also be providing desserts and congealed salads. Turkeys were purchased and the church ladies signed up to cook the turkeys.

In the 80s, the church had a singlewide trailer that had a working kitchen, refrigerator and sink. So much of the preparations were done there by Steve and his assistant and 'Chief Cook' Cheryl Sloan, two to three


> days in advance. Invitations were sent to local churches, posters displayed in area

businesses, and by word of mouth. Remember, these were the days before social media and email became the norm! Many senior citizens arrived several hours before the noontime meal to enjoy a fresh cup of coffee or cold glass of iced tea, as they would visit with longstanding

acquaintances and catch up on the previous year's happenings. Vans from the Hilliard area would make several trips to transport seniors to the dinner. Youth members served as maître d', waiters, and waitresses for the day so that they could interact with the community's senior age group.

With the pandemic still restricting close gatherings, this year's meal will be served to the community in carryout containers this Saturday, November 21 from noon to 1 p.m. or until the food runs out!





The defensive most valuable player has to be Carson Murray, who leads the state in tackles this year. He was a tackling machine for the Warriors at

This wasn't the year that we all wanted but this team did not quit and worked hard all year long. Let's not forget this Warrior team has played some of the top teams in the area and kept it close. They finished the season strong and I see lots of potential looking into next season. Best of luck to all of the seniors. Until next season...Go Warriors!



Hilliard Defeats Lafayette in Overtime

Flashes to Host Regional Semi Finals Friday at Flashes Field

It is the time of year that sports fans circle on their calendars, the playoffs! The Hilliard Flashes, who rolled into the game with a perfect 7-0 record, played host to a playoff game for the second year in a row. This time, they welcomed a different opponent, the Lafayette (Mayo) Hornets, who came into the game with a 5-4 record. The Flashes came out the victor in an overtime win of 22-21. The evening started with former quarterback and walking miracle, Nathan Dowie carrying the American flag as the Flashes stormed onto the field. With a sold out crowd, the atmosphere was electric and hopeful.

The Flashes won the toss, but elected to defer. The Hornets used a steady diet of the run game with the quarterback leading the charge. It only took 12 plays to score with a 1-yard touchdown run off of the quarterback sneak. With the extra point good, the Hornets sprung out to an early 7-0 lead. Both teams traded possessions but the Flashes found a way to answer with only 2 plays to score. Lyle Bennett connected with Jason Sheffield striding down the sidelines

for a 65-yard touchdown pass. With a missed extra point, the Flashes cut the deficit down to 7-6.

Outside of the first quarter, both teams struggled to gain traction. After halftime, it was more of the same. Eventually, the Flashes broke the stalemate and gained some momentum with their special teams, when a high snap forced the punter to retreat and was tackled near the Hornets' 15 yard line. Two plays later, the Flashes used some trickery to score when Tywuan Lee ran outside the defense and made the cut up field to score from 7-vards out. Using Lee to get the 2-point conversion, the Flashes took their first lead of the night, jumping out to a 14-7 lead. The Hornets responded with a drive of their own. The Hornets' offense made a critical error when a mishandled snap was recovered by Cameron Chavarria. The Flashes gained traction when Bennett connected with Sheffield again to get the offense past midfield. But, the Hornets' defense rose up and created a stop to set their offense with good field position. The Hornets used the field position to score from 1-yard out. With

> the extra point good, the Hornets evened the score with 14. Following, both defenses created critical stops and the game was forced to overtime.

> In overtime, both teams have a possession with each team starting at the 10 yard line and have 4 plays to score. The Hornets scored using

the air for an 8-yard touchdown pass. With the extra point good, the Hornets regained the lead with the score 21-14. It was the Flashes turn to keep the game going. It didn't take long to answer when Bennett connected with Dylan Coston for a 5-yard touchdown pass. Instead of taking the conventional route and kicking the extra point, the Flashes went for

the win and decided to go for 2. Bennett rolled to his left and dropped a dime in the middle of the end zone to Sheffield for a successful 2-point conversion. After a back and forth defensive battle, the Flashes were poised, resilient, and advanced to the regional semifinals of the playoffs by defeating the Hornets 22-21 in an overtime thriller. With the win, the Flashes improve to 8-0 on the season, the first time in school history.

Offensively, the Flashes struggled to gain traction with 56 yards rushing and 238 yards total. Lee had 16 carries for 29 yards and a touchdown; and Bennett had 5 carries for 18 yards; Bennett went 9/20 for 182 yards, 2 touchdowns and 3 interceptions. Sheffield had 5 catches for 135 yards and a touchdown; Coston had 3 catches for 43 yards; and Dylan Coston had a touchdown catch for 5 yards.

Defensively, the Flashes generated some crucial stops on 4th down, forced



a turnover, and held the Hornets to 79 yards passing. Leading the charge were Lane Beasley and Huntley Moore, who both had 7 tackles with Moore recording a pass breakup; Blake and Malik Farahkhan both had 6 tackles with Blake having a sack; Carson Newkirk had 3 tackles and a pass breakup; Chavarria had 3 tackles, a sack and a fumble recovery; Dylan Coston had 3 tackles and a pass breakup; and Angleo Benjamin had 3 tackles and a pass breakup as well. Brantley Hengerer and D.J. Coston both had 3 tackles; Sheffield had 2 tackles; Lee, Chandler McGee, Josh Johnson and Seth Moore each shared a tackle.

The Hilliard Flashes return home for the second round of the playoffs as they welcome a rematch with the defending state champion, Madison County Cowboys. Kickoff is at 7:30 p.m. Friday night on Flashes Field.
