Honoring Our Veterans...Meet William 'Bill' Marsh

Veterans Appreciation Ceremony Saturday

As Veterans Day draws near, I hope everyone takes a moment to think about what Veterans Day really is and how much we owe our military men and women. This Saturday, a Veterans Appreciation Ceremony will be held at the American Legion Post 401 in Hilliard. This event is open to all, and our military Veterans

will be honored and recognized for their service. The event begins at 9 a.m. with coffee, donuts and conversation. The ceremony begins at 10 a.m. and lunch will be served at 11 a.m. The event is

As we celebrate Veterans Day, we always try to have a Veteran to spotlight. This year I wish to introduce Retired Master Sergeant William Marsh. What an honor it was to interview such a wonderful person. Mr. Marsh served in the U.S. Air Force for 23 years from 1947-1970. He spent his entire military career traveling. He served in aircraft crash rescue and (POL) fuels. He was stationed all over from Greenville, South Carolina to Germany to the Philippines. "I was in charge of 10 men offloading tanks near the South China Sea. We also supplied fuel to Air Force troops," said Marsh. "While serving in Vietnam, I was an advisor to the Vietnamese Air Force. I was proud and counted it as an

time to get out." Being away from his wife and family was difficult. And each time he received his orders they were far away. While serving, MSGT Marsh's proudest accomplishments were being awarded three Air Force commendation medals from three separate Air Force commands. The

honor to serve. His last three tours

were remote and he decided it was

first from the 8th Air Force (SAC) Strategic Command; the second from the Pacific Air Force (PACAF); and the third from Air Training Command (ATC). "Things are so different now. Of course technology is much better. It's really a world of difference in today's times," added Marsh.

Following retirement, after talking with a friend,

Marsh decided to be an owner/operator of his own trucking business. "The economy was not the most stable and my friend told me this would be a good thing to get into," continued Marsh. "So we (he & his wife Marge) bought a truck and started hauling."

They continued the trucking business for 38 years traveling and seeing the country. Several times their travels brought them through Callahan for one reason or another. When they decided to retire, they chose to make Callahan their home base. They bought some property and a home and have been there for 30 years now. They have two children, one in Arizona the other in New Jersey. They are members of Our Lady of Consolation Church in Callahan. Last June, he became very ill, so ill that he was actually put into Hospice care. He was in their care for several months however he beat the illness, regained his strength and now is




good as new.

Most Veterans are familiar with the Honor Flight Network. The mission of Honor Flight is to transport America's veterans to Washington, D.C. to visit the memorials dedicated to honoring those who have served and sacrificed for our country. This is an all-expenses paid trip. In January, Mr. Marsh found out that the Honor Flight was going to do their first flight directly out of Jacksonville. He got all the information and completed all the forms. He was so afraid that his recent illness might hamper his chances of going but he

checked out fine and his doctors gave him the okay to go if chosen. Each Veteran has to have a guardian to accompany them but it could not be their spouse. Mr. Marsh asked his nephew, Mark McGowan, who lives in Deltona, and he accepted. Mr. Marsh, didn't find out until a few weeks

prior that he was chosen to go. Only 25 Veterans are chosen to go on the flights and Mr. Marsh was one of them. "The trip was a once in a lifetime experience for me. It was very emotional the way we (Veterans) were taken care of and respected," said Marsh. "At the airports



of us being WWII Veterans. It was such an honor and I am blessed beyond words to have experienced this trip."

What an honor to share just a small portion of Mr. Bill Marsh's military career and life. Listening to him talk about the Honor Flight was so special

as tears filled all eyes listening to his continued passion for our country and his military service. Thank you, Mr. Marsh for your service and to all our Veterans for your service to our great country.

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

The facility is currently undergoing renovation, and will reopen early next year. In the meantime, our seniors are meeting each week at a local church where we offer staff-supervised programming. Home Health services, as well as Meals on Wheels and Meals on Wheels for Pets, are continuing throughout the renovation process.

This past Sunday, many people celebrated Halloween. But, may I suggest that we don't overlook a much more important event? Reformation Day. If you don't know, this is the day German Monk, Martin Luther, 504 years ago, walked up to the castle church in Wittenberg and nailed 95 Theses to the door of the church.

For us today, this is a strange way to communicate. Could you imagine if today, I went to the door of our church and posted 95 things I had problems with in the Church today?

What Martin Luther did had huge impact on the Church worldwide. If he hadn't brought up these issues, we would all be catholic instead of the different denominations we see today and this coming Sunday your pastor would be delivering their message to you in Latin.

Most historians believe on this day, Martin Luther started the Protestant reformation; but I saw a meme that read: "John Calvin and Martin Luther are not responsible for the protestant reformation. The Word of God is responsible for the Protestant Reformation." The passage that struck Martin Luther so powerfully was Romans 1:16-17: "For I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes, to the Jew first and also to the Greek. For in it the righteousness of God is revealed from faith for faith, as it is written, The righteous shall live by faith." (ESV)

Martin Luther discovered this key theology: "The righteous shall live by faith." In fact, by the end of the reformation, 5 Solas (Latin) came out: 5 solos or onlys or alones. Sola Scriptura (Scripture alone): Scripture, the inspired Word of God, the Bible, is God-breathed (2 Peter 1:21). It is our authority for faith and practice as Christians. Solus Christus (Christ alone): Only Jesus Christ can save us (John 14:6). Sola Fide (Faith alone): We can only access Christ's salvation through faith (Philippians 4:9). Sola Gratia (Grace alone): The gift of salvation is free. It is a gift from the Grace of God (Ephesians 2:8-9). Soli Deo Gloria (Glory to God alone): No one deserves the Glory except God (Galatians 1:5).

How do we respond to all that the reformation has shown us? We place our faith alone, in Christ alone, relying on His grace alone, as we see in Scripture alone all for His Glory alone!

John M. Drew, Tax Collector, has received the 2021 Nassau County Tax Roll as certified by A. Michael Hickox, Property Appraiser. The Tax Roll is now open for payment of 2021 taxes via the internet at www.nassautaxes.com by E-check (no service charge) or by Visa, MasterCard, Discover and American Express (service charges apply). Payments are also accepted via U.S. Mail and at the office locations listed below.

The tax roll includes real estate taxes, tangible personal property taxes, centrally assessed items and special assessments listed as ad valorem taxes and non-ad valorem assessments. These taxes are collected on behalf of the following taxing authorities: Nassau County Board of County Commission (including MSF - Municipal Service Fund), Nassau County School District, City of Callahan, City of Fernandina Beach, Town of Hilliard, Amelia Island Mosquito Control, St. Johns River Water Management District and Florida Inland Navigation District.

According to Florida Statute 197.122 Lien of taxes; application.—All owners of property are held to know that taxes are due and payable annually and are responsible for ascertaining the amount of current and delinquent taxes and paying them before April 1 of the year following the year in which taxes are assessed.

Therefore, if you do not receive your tax bill at your current billing address or if you are a new property owner and do not receive a tax bill, <u>you must contact</u> the Tax Collector's Office to confirm the amount of taxes due.

Discounts for early payment shall be: **four percent** in November; **three percent** in December; **two percent** in January; **one percent** in February; and **zero percent** during the month of March. If payment is made by U.S. Mail, discount amounts will be determined by postmark date. If a discount period ends on a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday, the discount period extends to the next working day.

Winn Dixie Recalls Fisherman's Wharf Brand Jumbo Cooked Shrimp

Southeastern Grocers (SEG), the parent company of Fresco y Más, Harveys Supermarkets and Winn-Dixie stores, is recalling its Fisherman's Wharf brand Jumbo Cooked Shrimp, Frozen 16-20 count. The recall is due to the detection of possible listeria on the product, which can cause serious and sometimes fatal infections in

young children, frail or elderly people, and others with weakened immune systems. Although healthy individuals may suffer only short-term symptoms such as high fever, severe headache, stiffness, nausea, abdominal pain and diarrhea, Listeria infection can cause miscarriages and stillbirths among pregnant women.

This product was sold in all Fresco y Más, Harveys Supermarket and Winn-Dixie stores. Should a customer still have this product, it should be thrown away or returned to any store for a full refund.

The affected product and corresponding UPC code is: Fisherman's Wharf brand Jumbo Cooked Shrimp, Frozen – 16-20 count 16 oz. bag, UPC: 2114003262 with best by date of 04/05/2023.

The potential for contamination

was noted after routine testing revealed the presence of Listeria in 16-20 count 16 oz. bags of Fisherman's Wharf brand frozen Jumbo Cooked Shrimp. Sale of the product has been suspended while FDA and the company continue to investigate the source of the problem.

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Callahan Hires New Town Clerk

The Callahan Town Council met Monday night for their first meeting of November. Council President Ken Bass advised the council audience to



welcome the new Shawna Gugliuzza

Town Clerk Mrs. Shawna Gugliuzza. Shawna is currently a member of the Florida Association of City Clerks. She will be attending training at the International Institute of Municipal Clerks to obtain her Certification as a Municipal Clerk.

Wanda Nichols, representing the Relay for Life of Nassau County, advised Callahan Mayor Matthew Davis that she wanted to present the town with a letter of appreciation. "This is just a letter of appreciation for the Town of Callahan's support for this year's relay," said Nichols. "Though the relay was hard with all the distractions, we were still able to raise over \$21,000. We look forward to your support again."



Renee Stoffel and Jamie Reynolds, representing the Barnabas Center, were on hand to share a video of the many services the Barnabas Center provides. Recently a countywide food drive was held for the Barnabas Center and they collected over 22,000 pounds of food. The NE FL Fair collected 6,000 pounds during the fair. "We are so blessed with all the partnerships we have made," said Stoffel. "We couldn't do what we do without partners. Barnabas now offers dental care along with medical, and food." Town Manager Mike Williams updated the council on the Branch Creek issues. "All of the property has been changed back through the Property Appraisers office to Branch Creek LLC a Ken Greene property," said Williams. "Probably in January a letter will be sent to the homeowners about what is going on and we can discuss the assessment."

A Branch Creek resident was present at the meeting and said he was told that Greene sold the property to the Town for \$100.

"Mr. Greene went and did a quit claim

deed on the property, paid \$100, and put it in the town's name without our knowledge," added Williams.

Councilman Ken Bass advised the council that he, Mayor Davis and Williams had all met a few times with the Brandies Ace Hardware owners. As everyone knows, Hagan Ace Hardware has plans to build a new Hagan Ace on SR 200 and the Brandies Ace will close. The owners offered the buildings and property to the town first option to buy it. "The owners had the property appraised and are offering \$2.5 million, which includes all the buildings, lumber yard and 1.6 acres," said Bass. "The buildings are old and we're not sure how much we would have to put into them to get them up to code."

"The owners really want the buildings to stay as they are historical. I think it's worth getting another appraisal before making a decision," said Mayor Davis.

"There are several options to consider. We could apply for historical grants, rural development grants, etc.," added Williams. "I've talked with County Manager Taco Pope about the county taking over all of this property and he was on board with it."

"We can keep this and get rid of the county fire department. We could move our offices upstairs and have lots more space," said Councilman David Mellecker. "Why would we (town) go buy that when we have this prime property here?"

The council agreed to get another appraisal and talk about possibly making an offer or making a decision one way or the other.

In other business, Williams advised the council about the need for a new operations truck. "The truck we currently have is a 2002 utility truck is about at its life span," said Williams. "We've found a 2008 Ford 6.7 liter diesel with a bucket that I'm asking for approval to purchase it. It runs great and we even used it for a day to test it."


The council approved the truck purchase at a cost of \$17,588.25.

In closing comments, Assistant Fire Chief Larry Downey advised the council the department (Callahan Volunteer Fire Department) had just received a donation from Rayonier (Woodlands Division) for \$1200. "We (CVFD) would like to have a Movie in the Park event the night of the Christmas parade, Saturday, December 4. We plan to purchase a blow up screen to show the movie," said Downey. "We wanted to see if the council would give us their blessing? We want to make this a family fun event."

Councilman Mellecker advised Downey to bring back the final plans for the council to review.

"It sounds like a great event," said Councilwoman Jacquelyn Fleming. "I'm already thinking about bundling my son up and going to the park that night!"

The next council meeting will be held fonday, November 15 at 7 p.m.

While packing up my son's bedroom we set aside his favorite t-shirts in a particular box. As a special surprise, for



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

Food for Thought:

What is a trillion? A trillion is a one (1) followed by twelve zeros 1,000,000,000,000. A trillion is a thousand billions. A billion is a one (1) followed by nine zeros 1,000,000,000. A billion is a thousand millions.

Imagine: A package of printer paper, two inches high, contains 500 sheets. Thus a stack one inch tall contains 250 sheets. 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

Crawford Rd. Ribbon Cutting Wednesday

The Board of County Commissioners will host a Ribbon Cutting Ceremony on Wednesday, November 10 at 1:30 p.m. in celebration of the re-opening of the newly improved Crawford Road. 

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
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












Genealogy Tidbits
