Honoring Our Veterans...Meet Elliott Jones

As Veterans Day draws near, there is no better time than now to recognize a special Veteran right here in Callahan, Mr. Elliott Jones. Many of you know Mr. Jones and many of you have seen him around town, and I mean that literally. He has been spotted many times riding his 3-wheel motorized bicycle around town. Mr. Jones, a young 97, enjoys getting on his bike and riding into town to buy some lunch. His favorite time to ride his bike is in the annual Callahan Christmas Parade. Not only is he a lifelong resident of Callahan, he is also the oldest living WWII Veteran in Callahan.

He was born in the little white farm house that sits right beside his current home. He attended all 12 years of school in Callahan. Following graduation, he worked at the Jacksonville Shipyards. "I worked there as long as I could stand it then I joined the US Navy in December of 1942," said

Mr. Jones. "I was 19 and had to go to downtown Jacksonville to join."

Shortly after he joined, he was sent to Bainbridge, Maryland to do his basic training. He recalls there wasn't really a base there, as they were in the process of building it. From there he was sent to the University of Chicago Quarter Master Signal School. It was there that he learned in 4 months, what was normally a 4-year class, to be a Signalman. His first duty station was on Treasure Island in California. It is located between San



Francisco and Oakland. The job of a US Navy Signalman combined both visual communication and advanced lookout skills. Each ship had to have a signalman to guide the ships through the different buoys, flags, lights etc. There are many ways of communication in the oceans. "Once I guided the ship out of

the harbor, my job was easy," added Mr. Jones. "My first trip out was to the Guadalcanal, one of the Solomon

Islands in the Pacific Ocean. We took 500 troops there because there was trouble with the Japanese. We delivered the troops and supplies and headed back home." He recalls having 12 days off after that. He took a train to Chicago and then another straight to Jacksonville and was home in two days.

On another trip he remembered they were in a big convoy from the Solomon Islands to the Philippines that actually took three weeks. "We picked up over 100 landing ship transports (LSTs) and at one point there was a Japanese submarine under out ship. Two fleets ahead of us had one Japanese plane get close," continued Mr. Jones. "I can still remember watching the ammunition leaving the ship and getting closer to the planes until they hit it. That was pretty exciting."

He was also commanded to pick up a new ship in Beaumont, Texas and go get a load of silver ore, used to make an atomic bomb. On his return, the ship was stopped by a US Destroyer asking for credentials on the ship. It was then that he realized the ship was new and did not have an I.D. Thankfully they quickly got the problem resolved. In Key West, Florida, to work with the weather station until he received his discharge papers as Signal 3rd Class Elliott Jones.

After discharge, he returned to the shipyards but there wasn't much work. He traveled to Wisconsin and began working with his uncle. It was there that he met and

married his wife Marilyn in 1951. He returned to Callahan, attended carpentry school and built several schools in Jacksonville and then began building subdivisions. He has since retired and enjoys the quiet side of life. The Jones have three children Scott and Donna Jones, Debbi Alden and Danny and Debby Jones, who all live in Callahan. What an honor and privilege it was for me to spend time with Mr. Jones.



Fish Talk

Early morning lows with a side of Rain?

Yes, this weekend you will see early morning low tides with an incoming tide the majority of the day. If we can ever get past the heat, I look for the bite to really pick up. Last week, we had a low pressure system move in from the Gulf. That change in pressure actually turned our fish on a couple days prior to the storm. You can bet that when our water temps actually stabilize, the bite's going to be the best it's been in a while. With mullet finalizing their migration, larger predatory fish will soon be triggered into feeding consistently throughout the day. So, where does that put us in this mix? Well, we are in the same pattern we've been in since early October. Continue to use mullets, quartered crab and fresh dead shrimp. It's just a matter of time before plastics and hard baits really turn on.

Where do we focus? Oyster beds during the lower tide for reds, then fish those same beds on high tide because trout will move in. They'll both acquaint the same structure at different tides and many times the same. Docks and trees are another good focus point. Currently puppy drum are showing up and they'll be in these deeper holes. Our mullet haven't completely made their fall run. With that said, there are still some flounder in our inlets. Look for them around the docks of Mayport and Nassau Sounds on the incoming tide. Remember to find clean water!

My hot spots for this weekend will include Clapboard and Simpsons Creek. This is the time of year those areas really start firing off. Make the deep holes in these creeks the focus point first. Fish the bends in the river where you find good current and eddies. Structure is going to be the key for success.

Keep an eye out for the next report as we will be discussing Sheepshead. The bites heating up and you don't want to miss out. As for the weekend, make sure to pack rain gear for those pop up storms! As always, be safe out there and I hope to see you on the water!

Uninsured? In Need of Medical and Mental Health Services?

Meet Lisa and Tammy. They live in Nassau County and never expected to ask for help from Barnabas Center, the county's only nonprofit comprehensive service center that provides health services, crisis assistance and food assistance to residents in need.

In-person visits are available at Fernandina Beach, Callahan and Hilliard offices by appointment only during specific office hours. 

"Why couldn't it go behind the Depot? Can't it go somewhere else around town?" said Bass.

"We have worked hard to make Callahan beautiful," said Jaqueline Fleming. "Where are other places to put it? We must keep up with our vision to beautify our city."

A motion to accept was made by Councilman David Mellecker but no second was made. The ordinance died for lack of a second to the motion.

Resolution 2020-R10 was approved which concerned donating \$500 to the West Nassau County Relay for Life Event.

Resolution 2020-R11 was also approved which concerned donating \$300 to the Take Stock in Children Program.

The council approved donating the old American LaFrance Fire Truck to The Anchor Church. The town had a prospective buyer however he never came through. The church requested the truck just for looks. The truck no longer runs and the pumps don't work either.

Currently, the town has collected \$3350 towards the Out with a Boom Fireworks display.






Deebo placed the microphone down and unzipped his jacket to reveal Georgia Tech as his choice. His father

Former Georgia Police Officer Sentenced to Prison

District Judge U.S. Harvey E. Schlesinger has sentenced Jason Kelly Register, 42, of Woodbine, Georgia, to 10 years in federal prison for conspiracy to distribute 50 grams or more of methamphetamine. Register had pleaded guilty on October 23, 2019. Register was employed as a police officer in Camden County Georgia from June 19, 2006 to December 12,

2010 and Darien Georgia from October 22, 2012 to September 16, 2013.

In mid-August 2018, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, along with the Nassau County Sheriff's Office (NCSO), began investigating Brian Russell Schell, Brian Paul Davis and Leslie Ericka Lewis for distributing methamphetamine in Nassau and Duval counties. Throughout the course of the investigation, an officer, acting in an undercover capacity, made controlled purchases of methamphetamine from Schell, Davis, and Lewis. Agents learned that Davis's source of supply was Register and on October 2, 2018, the agents conducted two controlled phone calls to Register placing an order for 3 ounces of methamphetamine. Register indicated that he was on his way, but that he only had two ounces. NCSO deputies stopped Register for a traffic



violation, and he had a firearm in his waistband. A K-9 was deployed around the vehicle, gave a positive alert to the presence of illegal drugs, and a subsequent search revealed a marijuana grinder, scales, marijuana, fentanyl patches, hypodermic needles, and approximately 70 grams methamphetamine.

Throughout the course of the conspiracy, Register was accountable for distributing approximately 250 grams of methamphetamine.

Schell, Davis, and Lewis previously pleaded guilty and were sentenced for their roles in this case. Schell was sentenced to 30 months in federal prison, Davis was sentenced to 6 years in federal prison, and Lewis was sentenced to 4 years in federal prison.

This case was investigated by the Nassau County Sheriff's Office and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives. It was prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney Beatriz Gonzalez.

"We continue to work closely with our federal partners to keep our community as safe as possible from these poison peddlers who prey on the addiction of others for profit," said Sheriff Bill Leeper.

Names, Addresses and all information appearing in the Police Reports are taken from the Sheriff's Department files and do not necessarily indicate guilt, only that arrests were made or charges were filed.




