FSCJ's Florida Apprenticeship Grant Receives National Recognition

Florida College State Jacksonville's (FSCJ) Florida Apprenticeship Grant was recognized nationally as one of the top 15 performing American Apprenticeship Initiative (AAI) grantees. Led by FSCJ, along with consortium members St. Petersburg College and Broward College, the Florida Apprenticeship Grant Program is helping to address the state's workforce challenges related to the vast number of retirees and the skills gap that they will leave behind.

The program promotes the expansion of apprenticeships in manufacturing and cross-sector construction and trades occupations, health care and information technology. Over the course of the five-year grant, the program aimed to serve 1,000 workers. Currently 1,245 workers are being served with ten months remaining in the grant cycle. "We are proud to support the work of the American Apprenticeship Initiative through the Florida Apprenticeship program," said Grant College

President John Avendano, Ph.D. "By engaging with various industries who welcome apprenticeship programs, our representatives have seen great success in establishing similar programs for other high-need occupations that have not traditionally explored the opportunities that apprenticeships may provide for their workforce."

Each of the top grantees will be featured in the AAI Final Report, which is intended to help other apprenticeship program administrators learn from the institutions' successes. FSCJ Program Manager Dr. Melanie Ferren and Program Coordinator Cheryl Duff will participate in the writing of the report. They will travel to Washington, D.C. to represent the Florida Apprenticeship Grant in a full-day workshop on January 9, 2020, where they will meet with the other top performers to share strategies and success stories designed to promote future growth in the world of apprenticeships.



A Warm Christmas Winter

When our children were young, we lived on the tropical island of Papua, Indonesia. The only snow they had seen was flying by the glacier on top of Pupua's 16,024 foot mountain, Puncak Jaya. However, our mission leader and his wife were from Canada and had made the statement that they missed the snowy Christmas.

So Scott and Denise, our children, decided to give the Worsleys a white Christmas. They cut out snowflakes, made a big cardboard snowman, painted a wintery snow scene on a white sheet, etc. Very early Christmas morning

we drove down the hill with all the props and started hanging the snowflakes and stretching the snow scene between the pillars on the front porch. They did a great job transforming the front of the house to "winter." We worked quietly but did have to explain to the guards at the head of the army's home next door what we were doing before sunrise!

Since our kids were the only MKs (missionary kids) in the city at the time, it did not take long for the Worsleys to figure out who did it. The decorations were still all up when we went for Christmas dinner at their home. It was a lot of fun but it was lacking substance for it was not cold and snowy but hot and humid in the 90s.

Often do you feel like things around you are lacking substance and meaning? Everything is like fake snowflakes and backdrops! Stop and look at your schedule. You are busy with work, taking the kids here and there, putting up Christmas decorations and finding time for some shopping, etc. In the midst of all this do you have the peace and joy of Christmas?

True joy is not found in the things we do or the things we buy. Peace is not achieved with a certain amount in the bank or the security of the job you have. True joy and peace are found in a person. That person is the one whose birth we are remembering at Christmas. The writer wrote in Luke 2:10-11 (NIV), "But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord."

County Officer Offers Veterans Service

Bob Sullivan never thought he would work with the military all of his life, but he did think he would stay with aviation forever. After 20 plus years in the U.S. Navy, Sullivan retired as a Jet Engine Air Craft Chief and had even earned his private pilot's license at 40.

But as life would have it, his duty to the military was not over. In 2018, Sullivan became Veterans Service Officer for Nassau County.

In reflecting on his first anniversary on the job and the recent 100th U.S. observance of

Veterans last month, Sullivan thinks about the Nassau County families who all share the bond of their service to the military and how much they have in common. "It's rewarding meeting veterans from all eras and their families and knowing I've been put in place to make their lives a little easier," said Sullivan.

Sullivan's job is to offer benefit claims counseling and referral assistance to the Florida and U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs Benefits. He helps file and follows up on claims, seek financial aid and gives assistance on insurance and rehabilitation programs. His office falls within the Nassau Clerk of Court and Comptroller Office and is located in the Robert M. Foster Justice Center in Yulee.

In the past year, he has seen his responsibilities grow. Calls to his office are up 65 percent and average more than 200 per month. "And that's just the

calls for appointments," added Sullivan. "We take walk-ins and do not count the random questions and emails."

With nearly 9,000 veterans living in the county, according to estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau, Sullivan expects even more growth to come. Sullivan estimates the top reasons

> people call him are for survivor pension and aid and attendance. would be veteran claims for disabilities for all ages - including the 30 percent who are under the age of

> J.D. Hunnicutt, a US Navy Veteran who lives

between Callahan and Hilliard, falls in the category of older veterans. The 85-year-old said he contacted the Veterans Service office recently after hearing about the services at his Vietnam Veterans meeting in Yulee. "I served in the Navy 20 years and worked at the naval base for another 23 years and still didn't know about some of the benefits available. Bob got the ball rolling," said Hunnicutt. "I couldn't ask for better services."

"This is a service we offer to those who have made sacrifices to our country," said John A. Crawford, Nassau Clerk of Court. "We want to be advocates for veterans. Trying to navigate through the military bureaucracy can be daunting. We just want veterans here to know they don't have to do it alone."

Arrest Made in Another **Arcade Robbery**





Keep Nassau Beautiful Announces Planting Nassau's Future

Over a five-month period beginning December 2019 and running through April 30, 2020, Keep Nassau Beautiful (KNB) volunteers, partner organizations, and community residents will plant up to 300 trees in Nassau County.

The Adopt-A-Tree project is launched in response to the loss of trees in Nassau County due to development, weather events and age. Trees may be adopted by individuals, businesses, and organizations, and will be planted on

private and public property as approved for the tree species. A limited number of legacy trees will be available for those wishing to donate funds for the planting of a larger tree on public property, and if desired, the donor will receive public recognition. Educational support for the Adopt-A-Tree project is being provided by University of Florida's Nassau County Cooperative Extension Service. The project is being generously funded through dedicated grants, fundraising activities and private donations.

Q: What can you tell me if this plant is native? SM

A: Thanks for sending me photos of your plant, which always makes it easier to identify. I believe the



plant is one of the native saltbushes which belong to the genus Baccharis. This time of year (fall), they can be very showy with their white flowers and seed head in many areas along the roadside. Saltbush is dioecious, meaning the plants are either male or female, with both plants capable of producing many small flowers in the fall. The female saltbush has the showy white flowers remaining on the tree for weeks; the male plants have a more yellow bloom. Saltbush, also called groundsel tree, falsewillow or sea myrtle. It is sometimes it is considered a weed. I believe it is most likely underutilized in the landscape. It would make a very nice backdrop dwarf shrubs or flowering perennials. It would make a nice hedge plant too. It is often found growing in the same areas as Southern Wax Myrtle. Saltbush is very tolerant of most any soil type and can tolerate some occasional wet soils but adapt well to no irrigation once established. It can grow to heights of 8-10 feet tall with a 5-6 feet spread. In South Florida, it is considered an evergreen, but it is deciduous in the more northern areas of Florida. Saltbush is a terrific pollinator attractant for adult butterflies (monarchs) and native bees. Be aware, if you have allergies, the pollen of this tree can cause problems. The seeds of saltbush are poisonous if eaten.

Q: What is the name of this weed? DB

A: I appreciate your photos, especially the close-ups of the leaves which made identification much easier. The weeds found in your lawn are most likely Heartleaf Drymary, Dyrmaria cordata, also called West Indian Chickweed. This weed is weak-stemmed which means it breaks easily and therefore the seeds can effortlessly spread to other areas. It is an annual and therefore can only reproduce by seed. The seeds and fruit will stick to shoes, socks and clothing as well as pet fur and distribute to other areas of the yard. Heartleaf Drymary prefers moist to





wet soils and this can mean the area where this weed is located might be receiving too much

water or the area is not well drained. Heartleaf Drymary can be found in all parts of Georgia, Louisiana and Florida. India and Sri Lanka use it as erosion control, especially on tea plantations. Heartleaf Drymary is also commonly found under coffee trees in Ethiopia and East Africa. It does have one redeeming quality - the leaves are edible and can be used in salads. Best method of control is to use a pre-emergent in fall and spring. You should also check the amount of water the grass is receiving in this area. Remember apply ½ to ¾ of an inch of water to the lawn if it is in full sun, shady areas receive less water and fertilizer. St. Augustinegrass prefers to be watered deeply but less often. Shallow, frequent irrigation produces short roots. Long roots (4"-6") help grass survive. Hand pulling weeds is always an option, especially for annuals and the sooner the better. As soon as the plant starts producing flowers and seeds, it is too late for chemical control.



Local Children Enjoy Shopping with a Cop!






