Callahan Approves Top Hat Billiards

The Callahan Town Council met Monday night for their first meeting of February. Marilyn Armstrong approached the podium to address the council requesting an exception to place a billboard within the town limits. "On August 24, 2020 I submitted an application to Callahan Town Hall with one of the clerks for a billboard with the location and size. On August 28, 2020 I received approval and charged for a permit of \$80.98," said Armstrong. "We entered a contract with the landowner and also contacted a company for construction of the billboard. I contacted Town Hall January 14, 2021 to see if building permits were needed and was told Callahan does not allow billboards in the city limits and the money would be returned. We have not received any money back at this time. I'm asking the council to consider an exception for this sign."

Town Manager Mike Williams advised the council that the permit was given but when it was brought to his attention, the matter was given to the former Attorney Jeb Branham that

emailed a letter to the Armstrongs about the matter and that a check would be mailed to them. "The email on the application was not correct but has since been corrected," said Williams. "The check for the refund has already been processed and

mailed, as the town code does not allow billboards in the city limits."

In other business, Ms. Shirley James addressed the council concerning some issues on her property. "I purchased the property on Evelyn Street and have had nothing but issues since I did it. There is a waterline next to the box (which

is the town's) that needs to be fixed," said James. "I don't want to mess with it as I don't want to be responsible for messing up something of the town's. Also, there is a manhole on my property that is not maintained by anyone and I think the town should maintain it. It is really nasty and a mess. I just need someone to check it out."

"If the council advises us (public works) to fix it, we can. It would only take about 1 ½ hours," said Williams. "The manhole issue, we will look at it and see what can be done."

The council approved donating \$500 to Episcopal Children's Services, as they do each year.

John Hendricks, representing the West Nassau Historical Society addressed the council concerning the upcoming Railroad Day Festival. "I just want to let the mayor and new members of the council know a little about the Historical Society," said Hendricks. "We are an all-volunteer 501c3 non-profit organization whose mission is two-fold: First, to highlight and preserve the rich and diverse history and culture that is Nassau County, focusing on the



western half of the county. Second, to maintain the historic 1881 Callahan Train Depot, which has become an icon of our community. We hope we can count on the town's support of \$1,000 donation for the Railroad Day Festival, not as a donation but as an investment."

Drag Strip Planned at Callahan Speedway

The longtime vision for Callahan Speedway continues for Callahan businessman David Hicken. Getting approval to add a Drag Strip at the speedway from the Nassau County Conditional Use and Variance Board last Thursday was another step in the right direction. Hicken had a dream of making his property a place that friends and family could go to for fun and enjoyment. His go-kart track is always going on Saturday nights and normally packed. He has been able to add outlaw sprint karts and also motorcycle racing for special events. Last year, his RC (remote control) track opened and has been a hit by big time RC racers. RC racing is a big deal as the racers are in a circuit and race for points. It's quite entertaining if you have never watched them. They have their own area and track to race on separate from the regular go-kart track.

Another addition was the idea to build and operate a Drag Strip. The drag strip will be 1/8 mile 2-lane strip on the south side of the current speedway. The public hearing was held Thursday night with a packed house of mostly support for the new addition to the track. There were a couple of people not really opposing but they are neighbors to the speedway with questions and comments. Even the neighbors commented to the board that Hicken is a great person and tries to make things the best for the neighbors.

Several people spoke before the board in support saying, "This would be a great thing for Callahan and the surrounding area for businesses and the youth. Teens love to race their vehicles and why not have a safe environment for them to do that?"

Callahan

The council approved donating \$1,000 to the West Nassau Historical Society.

Heather Hagan, representing Top Hat Billiards, addressed the council concerning the completion of her application for the Alcohol Vendor's license. Hagan has purchased the old Bingo Hall property, north of town, and plans to make it a billiard/pool hall. She was requesting approval for a beer and wine license. The council approved the request and application.

The council set a date to have a joint meeting with the Nassau County School Board on Monday, March 15 at 6 p.m. prior to their regular council meeting at 7 p.m. The joint meeting will be held in the fire station meeting room; and the council meeting will move back to council chambers for the regular meeting.

In closing comments, Councilwoman Bishop-Vargas advised the council that she has received information from FDOT concerning adding additional traffic lights. "The report stated that a traffic light at US 301 & Mickler Street would not be done as it is less than a half mile from another light," said Vargas. "A traffic light at the intersection of SR 200 and Stratton Road may still be a consideration at some point."

Councilwoman Jacquelyn Fleming advised the council that she would like the council to consider having bi-weekly

operational briefings on the opposite weeks of meetings. "These would be emails sent out to everyone about any events that may have happened to keep us up to date with what's going on in town," said Fleming. "Not all of us are able to be at town hall all week and sometimes miss things. Just something to think about."

Town Clerk Stephanie Knagge added, "We have talked about purchasing I-Pads for everyone and maybe this is a good time to consider it again?"

Councilwoman Janet Shaw advised the council that she has received three bids on surveillance cameras and will receive another one on Friday.

Williams advised the council that he had been in contact with the Town of Hilliard concerning joining together for fireworks. "Hilliard is on board for joining together and having it at the fairgrounds but they want to continue to have them July 4th. That is up to you to make that decision," said Williams. "Also, you (council) need to vote as to whether you want Attorney Christian Waugh to continue to act as Interim Attorney until we hire someone."

The council voted to make Attorney Christian Waugh Interim Attorney until an attorney is hired.

The next meeting will be held Tuesday, February 16 at 7 p.m. due to the President's Day holiday on Monday.

Fish Talk Time for some Spec Fishing!

There's always a bunch of discussion as to which freshwater pan fish is the best table fare. You can argue that with old timers but the answers still the same. People up north know them as crappie and white perch...around here we call them Specks. You'll know when the bite's hot. There'll be droves of people headed south pulling Jon boats. It's almost as if the fishermen were migrating with our birds.

With that being said, speck season is here. They usually spawn in Florida from February to April. It's not uncommon for them to spawn year round especially if our winter isn't too harsh. You can find them congregating in depths of 3-8 feet of water. The big fish can sometimes be found in deeper depths. Literally a foot of water may make all the difference, so switch up.

Best tackle? Well, B "n" M makes a great rod called Sam's super sensitive. It's actually an 11' rod but, with that length, it allows you to get out past your trolling motor. You can fit that with a B "n" M pro-staff spinning reel. Overall, it's a great combination for these thin mouthed fish and it'll work in a variety of scenarios. While you're at it, spool your reel with a 6lb. to 8lb. test gamma line. Rig it with an 1/8 ounce jig and a Southern pro stinger skirt. Keep in mind that you may need to adjust for depth, current, if any, and wind. If you have no results with artificial, just tip it with minnows and use a cork to help find the depth where they're suspended. Just like most fish, minor adjustments could be the difference between catching fish and getting skunked. Adjustments can be as minor as colors, weights or even presentation.

As far as locations, there have been great reports between Lake Woodruff and in Palatka, Lake George and everything south of the St. John's River is firing off. Find some Lilly pads and make some holes to drop down in. Give it a little time to produce and if nothing big comes from it, move on. Numbers don't mean anything if the fish aren't very big. If the pads aren't producing you can simply find old lay downs and focus on the deeper points. As I've already mentioned, the difference between catching fish and not could be affected by minor depth adjustments. Always keep that in mind if things aren't very productive. As we move closer to spring, look for those fish to get bigger while the females move in!

I hope you all have a great weekend and as always, I look forward to seeing you on the water!



Church Shopping

Ever been church shopping? This event usually happens when you move into a new town or if you have left a church you previously attended. It's the act of going to different churches to see which one you will begin to attend.

Many years ago my wife and I were church shopping. We had finished an assignment in the city we were in and knew we would be there 7 more months. In our search, we may not have been looking for all the right things. We were interested in a place that had sound Biblical theology, good contemporary worship and something engaging for our kids.

We visited a Bible Chapel and found all those things and more.

After the service, the man sitting in front of us welcomed us and shook our hands. We mentioned that we were in the process of moving. That afternoon, he and his buddy were at our house helping us load and unload boxes all afternoon. This guy was not a pastor or on staff at the church. He was just a regular church-goer who desired to love God and others and he did so. We knew this was the place for us and shopped no further.

How do you evaluate a worship service? We've all heard the question "How did church go this morning?" The way we answer that question tells us a whole lot. Often, we measure the church service by what it did for us. We might ask: "Did we feel the presence of God in our spirit? Did we come away feeling good? Did others say or do what we hoped for? Did we have the opportunity to do or to say what we wanted? Did anyone come and help me move furniture after?" Many times, self-indulgence becomes a motive or a goal even in our worship. We worship in hope of what we will get. This is a very dangerous goal.

Instead of self-indulgence, we should be pursuing self-sacrifice at the core of everything we do as Christians, including worship. The question we should be asking to evaluate our worship is, "What did I give up, and what did God gain?" All too often we worship expecting God to give and for ourselves to gain. Throughout 1 Corinthians, we see Paul calling the church to sacrifice for their fellow-believers might gain, so that they might be built-up. Self-sacrifice was missing in Corinth, as it is often missing in our worship today.

When you are in church this Sunday, even if it is your first time there, ask God what he asking you to give over to him. This has been the most profitable question I have asked God. "What do you want me to do?", but only when I follow his instruction after

When it comes to self-sacrifice, we are given the ultimate example in Jesus. He showed us what it looks like to sacrifice Himself as instructed by the Father and for our benefit: "Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross." Philippians 2:5-8 ESV

What is God calling you to stop indulging and begin sacrificing?





Genealogy Tidbits

Five hundred years ago (1521) Ponce de Leon brought the first cattle to Florida, as stated in the book Florida Cowman, a History of Florida Cattle Raising, by Joe A. Akerman, Jr. By the mid 1600's there were Spanish ranches scattered over much of northern Florida. Later the Alachua Seminole Chiefs, Cowkeeper and Micanopy of Paynes Prairie became large cattle ranchers.

After the Spanish left Florida in 1821, Americans, mostly from Georgia, traveled down the Old Woodpecker Trail into Mid-Florida. Some family names of these early cattlemen are Chaires, Hardee, Summerlin, Parker, Alderman, Lykes, Widden, Carlton and Hendry. After the Seminole Wars many of these families relocated to central and south Florida. Today many of these families still remain active in cattle ranching.



Lee-Jackson Celebration Held

On a recent Sunday evening, members of Kirby-Smith Camp #1209, Sons of Confederate Veterans, along with family and friends gathered for their annual Lee-Jackson Celebration, honoring

the memories of Robert E. Lee and Thomas Jonathan 'Stonewall' Jackson. This is a yearly event that all S.C.V. camps are encouraged to participate in to celebrate the birthdates of Lee (January 19, 1807) and Jackson (January 21, 1824). After enjoying a wonderful meal at Maggiano's Little Italy, the group was treated to a presentation by local historian Larry Skinner of

Bryceville. Mr. Skinner spoke about the skirmish at Cedar Creek and Camp Mooney Cemetery. The skirmish occurred on March 1, 1864, ten days after the Battle of Olustee and took place near present day Lane and Lenox Avenues on Jacksonville's westside. As



result, the Union losses were one killed, four wounded and captured with the Confederates losing seven killed and twelve wounded. Among those killed was Captain Winston Stephens of the 2nd Florida Calvary.

Shown are two attendees that won wooden replicas of the Confederate Battle Flag and General Lee's Headquarters Flag. Following the program, Camp Commander Calvin Hart presented Mr. Skinner with a commemorative plate in appreciation of his time and historical knowledge.


