Hilliard High School Names New Head Football Coach

Hilliard Middle Senior High School administration called a special meeting Wednesday afternoon to announce the new Head Football Coach. After posting the position, a interviewed committee three candidates for the position.

HMSHS Athletic Director Jason Collins opened the announcement in front of a crowd of football players and parents. "We have made a decision. Mullin Retires Amid Scandal

After four years of back and forth litigation between Nassau County and Rayonier's subsidiary Raydient (Wildlight Developers), County Attorney Mike Mullin will retire from his position with the county effective March 31, 2022. A memo from the 4th Judicial Circuit State Attorney's office concluded Mullin broke the law while dealing with Raydient Properties.

The state found evidence that Mullin indeed committed criminal acts by allowing a failure to preserve public records, failing to truthfully and timely respond to Raydient's public records request, and allowing deletions of text messages that should have been public record. The State Attorney's Office released a 10-page memo acknowledging that Mullin's acts are considered criminal. The criminal charge is a misdemeanor violation of State laws requiring all government agencies to retain and provide access to public records.

The memo from the State reads, "The evidence supports criminal violations of Florida public records law and Mullin has disqualified himself from service as county attorney." The memo also stated that the State Attorney's Office agreed to forgo criminal prosecution in exchange for Mullin's resignation.


On Monday, March 14, Mullin delivered a formal letter to Nassau County Commission Chairman Aaron Bell, announcing his intent to retire effective "the last day of March, 2022." This came one day before the release of the State Attorney's Office memo declaring their findings of criminal acts by Mullin. On Tuesday, March 15, 2022 Mullin released a statement through a communication representative: "My decision to retire and the reasons set forth in my letter of

March 14, 2022 stand as stated. I have reviewed the state attorney's statement released today and with all due respect, I strongly disagree with those findings. The messages which are the subject of the civil suits, were turned over to the requestors beginning in January 2019 and also provided to the State Attorney's Office in March of 2019. In addition, I drafted new procedures for maintaining and addressing personal messages on private devices. The procedures are set forth in an ordinance adopted in the fall of 2019. The ordinance placed all public record requests and maintenance under the County Attorney's Office. These procedures remain in effect today. While I do not want to be a distraction for the County, I do want to reiterate my appreciation to have represented Nassau County, Florida."

The Westside Journal also received a press release from Rayonier: Rayonier is grateful for the State Attorney's Office's efforts seeking accountability for the crimes committed against Rayonier, Raydient and the citizens of Nassau County. Rayonier raised its concerns regarding Mullin's conduct years ago, but instead of taking simple steps to mitigate the issues, the County ignored them and instead gave Mullin more control over County affairs, doubling his salary in the process. Rayonier is disappointed that the County failed to act on their own to remove a clearly compromised County Attorney, all the while wasting tax dollars litigating to defend his bad advice and him personally in multiple litigation matters. Even now, the County continues to waste significant resources defending Mullin, despite several judicial decisions finding his advice to be wrong and, according to the State Attorney's Office, criminal.



Who Are We Witnessing For?

One of the most common arguments that lost people use to justify their refusal to follow Jesus is the hypocrisy of those that profess to be followers of Christ. In 1 Corinthians, chapters 5 and 6, Paul refers to two different occurrences where some in the church body were sinning in such a way "...that is not tolerated even among pagans." (1 Cor 5:2). In chapter 6 Paul addresses a problem where church members are pressing lawsuits because other members of the church were

"defrauding" them even though they were acting the same way themselves (v.7). They were more concerned with themselves than acting as a child of God should.

We have the same things going on in the Body of Christ today. The effect on church unity is alarming. Yet, more important is the effect this has on our witness for Christ. Scripture reminds us that we were washed, sanctified, and justified by Jesus Christ (1 Cor 6:11). We were bought with a price (1 Cor 6:28). Paul also reminds the Corinthians something that we too need to be reminded of. We know how we should be witnessing for Christ's glory, yet many chose to witness only when it is convenient. We cannot pick and choose; we must be consistent. We must act like washed, sanctified, and justified followers of Christ.

The Gospel of Christ is a loving, accepting, inclusive Gospel. Jesus does not discriminate because of where we are from, how much money we have, who our friends are or what language we speak. If this is true of the Gospel of Christ and we as His followers are called to share the Good News, shouldn't we act like it? How we live our lives is our witness. If we are judgmental and critical of those around us, the lost who are witnessing our behavior will think that all Christians behave this way. If we simply go to church on Sunday professing our love for Christ, then on Monday profess our love for our flesh through worldly behavior, we are missing the point.

Being a disciple of Christ means that we are doing our very best to be disciplined. We are showing whoever may be watching that the Holy Spirit of God is alive inside us. That Jesus is shaping us into loving, caring, people who want to bless and love on others. We must be ready to accept those who have experienced rejection. We must love those who have been spurned and cast aside. We must also be prepared to love whomever the Lord Jesus Christ puts in our path. Worldly concerns of ego, popular reputation, social standing, and financial security are distractions that the enemy will use to spoil our witness to the lost. Do not let the devil win!

Those of us that have given our lives to Christ should act like it. Our witness should be consistent, loving, accepting and have no part in worldly concerns. Be the living testimony to the love, grace, and mercy of Jesus not just today, but every day.

Financially Fighting Back -High Gas Prices Part One

Last year Florida's average gas price was \$2.93 a gallon. Now with the steady increase of gas prices we face the question, "How can I afford these prices?" Since I cannot control gas prices, I am challenged to look at what I can control.

Ways to fight back:

- 1. Carpool even if your friend or neighbor does not work at your same location you can still work out the details and plan accordingly. Alternate days or weeks of driving and paying for gas. You may only be able to rideshare for one or two days a week. Savings is savings. The more people in one car the more savings. Do not be quick to dismiss this idea. Give yourself permission to "test" this idea to see if you like it.
- 2. One trip versus three Grocery shopping needs to be more intentional: one time a week, or twice a month. Use a list and stick to it. Pro tip: Look high and low. The highest priced items are at eye level and the best deals are on the outside of the aisles.
- 3. Pharmacy If you take monthly prescriptions, use your time and gas wisely by utilizing your grocery store pharmacy to avoid another stop.
- 4. Buy in bulk Consider bulk buying for things like toilet paper, detergent and large family packs of meat. The fewer trips, the more gas saved! Pro tip: I buy the large packs of meat and divide it into several meals. I

wrap each meal's worth of meat in Glad Press and Seal. It wraps the meat tightly to avoid freezer burn, plus I can see what meat I have wrapped.

5. Use help provided – First Baptist Church of Callahan, The Storehouse: Free food is available twice a month, the first (10:00 a.m. -Noon) and third (4:30-6:30 p.m.) Thursday of every month. Gracie's Kitchen: through and receive a hot meal for your family for free! Located at the old Yulee Middle School (86029 Pages Dairy Road, Yulee, Florida) Offered 2nd and 4th Monday of each month from 4:30-6 p.m. All of us need help sometime.





Great coaches are positive, enthusiastic, supportive, trusting, focused, goal-oriented, knowledgeable, observant, patient and a clear communicator. Great leaders have a vision, are an inspiration and introduce strategic critical thinking, responsibility, accountability and dependability.

I've worked hand-in-hand with Coach Pate for the past two football seasons as a parent and member of the Pride of Hilliard Football Club (booster club). I have to commend him on the amount of respect he has gained from his players. He's tough, serious and uses tough love to get the job done. As a photographer, I've been on the sidelines and witnessed him pour determination

into our young men like fertilizer. He has a great coaching staff behind him and they are all very goal-oriented. They set the bar and challenge the players to reach it every day. He respects his players and with that, he makes them dig deep to do things they never knew they could. It's been said that, "The greatest leader is not necessarily the one who does the greatest things. He is the one that gets the people to do the greatest things". In my eyes, no other words describe Coach John Pate better. He's given our young men inspiration when needed, chewed them out on the sidelines when needed, listened to them when needed and instilled in them a love for the game of football. Thank you for being tough on them, loving them, mentoring and maturing them into productive young men who are sure to do great things on and off the field.
