In the Kitchen...

- 1 large clove garlic
- 1 teaspoon coarse salt
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- ½ teaspoon cayenne pepper

Spicy Grilled Shrimp

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 2 pounds large shrimp, peeled and deveined
- 8 wedges lemon, for garnish

Preheat a grill for medium heat. Crush garlic and salt together in a small bowl with a fork. Mix in paprika and cayenne. Stir in olive oil and lemon juice to form a paste. Combine garlic paste and shrimp in a large bowl and toss until shrimp are evenly coated. Lightly oil the grill grate. Grill shrimp until opaque, 2 to 3 minutes per side. Transfer to a serving dish, garnish with lemon wedges, and serve.

The Gift and Loss of the Land- old Testament Historical Books: Part #1

In the previous article, we overviewed the first five books of the Bible. The first five books of the Bible are called the Torah (law of God). The Bible begins with the creation of the world in Genesis. Then Moses zooms in on giving the first couple paradise (the gift of land) in Genesis 2. In Genesis 3, the first couple sins and they are expelled from the land. Adam and Eve experience an exile and they are in need of restoration. God does not throw in the towel on his

purpose for mankind. In Genesis 12, God promises Abraham that he will be a great blessing, a nation will emerge from him, that God will give his descendants a land, and that the whole world would be blessed through his descendants. The pattern of giving land and the experience of exile because of disobedience is repeated in the historical books. The historical books under consideration this month will be Joshua-II Kings. The rest of the historical books (I Chronicles-Esther) will show how God graciously puts his people back in the land. That is the story for next month's article. Let's see the story of how God gives his people the promised land and how his people experience exile from the promised land this month. Remember, this is a repeat of Genesis 1-3.

Joshua: God Gives the Land: The book of Deuteronomy comes to a close with Moses giving the people the law of God as they prepare to take the land. Moses prepares the people for a time of transition to Joshua's leadership. Under the leadership of Joshua, the people are given the land as a gift. In Joshua, the promised land is claimed (1-5), conquered (6-12), and colonized/divided (13-22). The end of the book of Joshua makes it very clear that staying in the land is contingent upon keeping the covenant (23-24).

Judges: Chaos in the Land: Joshua shows how Israel got the land and the book of Judges shows how chaos erupts in the land. Judges is the darkest book in the Bible. The most often used phrase in Judges is that in those days, there was no king. Everybody did what was right in their own eyes. Judges chronicles this chaos. Judges is a book of apostasy (1-2:5), apathy (2:6-16), and anarchy (17-21).

Ruth: The Fix for the Chaos in the Land: The problem in the book of Judges is that there was no king. The book of Ruth shows us how God is going to correct this problem though an unlikely family. The book of Ruth closes with a genealogy that shows how God's king is going to come from the family of David and his descendants. The book of Ruth begins with grief (1), moves to hope (2), God graciously provides a redeemer for a family (3-4:17), God graciously supplies a redeemer for the nation of Isarel and the world (4:18-22).

I-II Samuel: A Kingdom in the Land: Ruth has given us clues that God's king is going to come from David's household. When we come to the books of Samuel, we see Isarel in the land, but they still do not have a king. I Samuel is a time of transition. Samuel is the last of the Judges (1-7). In chapter 8, Saul becomes the

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first king in (8-15). Saul is not David and Saul is not a king after God's own heart. The rest of the book of I Samuel deals with the self-destruction of Saul and the rise of David (16-31). The book of II Samuel chronicles the life of David. In chapters (1-10) we see David's finest years. In chapters (11-19) we see David's failures and their fallout. As the book of book II Samuel comes to a close, we see David's final years (20-24).

I-II Kings: The Loss of the Land/Exile from the Land: The books of I-II Kings deal with division of Israel into two kingdoms and the loss of both of the kingdoms. As a result of covenant unfaithfulness, the kingdom of Israel is divided and the land is lost. I Kings begins with Israel united under the reign of King Solomon (1-11). The kingdom is divided into two kingdoms (Israel Northern Kingdom and Judah Southern Kingdom). The story of how this all unravels is given in I Kings (12-22). II Kings tells the story of the decline and fall of the Northern Kingdom/Israel in (1-17). The remainder of II Kings (18-25) tells the story of the decline and fall in the southern kingdom.

We leave the historical books with the people experiencing the pain of exile because of covenant unfaithfulness, like Adam and Eve and the rest of us in Genesis 1-3. Is the exile final? We will look to the rest of the historical books to answer that question.

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Callahan Garden Club News

Welcome Spring from the Callahan Garden Club! We hope your plants made it through the winter weather and the ones that appeared to be dead are bursting in buds and new growth. Now is the time to complete garden bed preparations and start your seeds and seedlings outside. When using an old bed from last year follow these preparation tips before planting:

- 1. Clear the bed of all weeds and dead plants.
- 2. Turn the soil and work in fresh dirt and compost/manure, about 6" 8" deep. The desired texture of soil should be fine for seed germination and root growth. Note-if using animal manure, use only that of herbivores and make sure it has rested over the winter so it is not steamy fresh, as it will burn your plants. You can also make a manure tea (not for human consumption).
- 3. Check the seed packets for instructions on planting, i.e. required sunlight and when to plant in your zone. Nassau County is zone 9a/9b. Remember our sun gets hot in the late spring and summer. Plants requiring full sunlight should receive sun in the morning and early afternoon, with shade

protection in the late afternoon.

4. If you have questions about your soil, you can get it tested for pH at the UF/IFAS extension offices in Yulee and Callahan.

5. Get out there and work the earth, get your hands dirty and grow green.

Speaking of getting your hands dirty, Master Gardeners Sarah McCullough and Lynn West will be presenting information and a hands-on workshop on plant propagation at our Wednesday, April 3 meeting at 10:30 a.m. There will be a fee of \$5 for materials. If this interests you, please join us at our clubhouse, 45251 Fourth Avenue, Callahan. Also, our club will have a booth at the Callahan Railroad Day that will be held Saturday, April 20.

At last month's meeting, Steve Davies, assistant director of District IV, FFGC (Florida Federation of Garden Clubs), came and spoke to the club members about the upcoming FFGC Convention in Jacksonville and discussed ways to maintain our clubhouse.

The Hilliard Town Council met Thursday night for their final meeting of March. The first order of business was Resolution 2024-05, which concerned accepting a Florida Department of Transportation offer of a state funded grant agreement and authorizing and directing the Town Council to accept such agreement. The funding grant is in the amount of \$750,000 and will be for the contract, engineering and design for the 6th Street paving project. The council adopted the resolution.

The next item was the approval of a capital purchase, from the Parks & Recreation Department for a Kawasaki Rebel, 72" FX1000, 35hp mower in


the amount of \$9,463.30 from Franklin Equipment Sales. The budget for this item was \$10,000, making the purchase below the budgeted amount.

The following item concerned a payable to Core & Main for the Ingham Road project, Culverts and Drainage Improvements in the amount of \$36,501.98. The council approved the payable.

The final item concerned the council approval of a payable to Energy Engineering Systems, for project Waste Water Treatment Plant Panel View in the amount of \$1.537.00.

The next meeting of the council will be Thursday, April 4 at 7 p.m.







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Beware of Unlicensed and/or **Inexperienced Contractors**

Dear Editor,

In early March 2024, I hired a landscape company to wash the exterior of my home. The contractor suggested using his pressure washer. I asked him not to use a pressure washer on my property. He went behind my back and used it on my concrete porch slab and damaged it. I contacted him, he denied causing the damage and said the damage already existed. When I asked for his license number and insurance information he refused. My home is a new build and less than 3 years old. This company was advertised as licensed and insured. I am currently seeking legal actions against this contractor.

Hiring an unlicensed and/or inexperienced contractor to save a buck can bring great risks to you and to your family home. While embarking on a home improvement project can be an exhilarating endeavor, doing so requires you to place your trust, future happiness, and well-being in the hands of strangers. That is why it is essential that you choose a contractor carefully and without cutting corners. Saving a dollar in the short run, can cost you dearly in the long run.

Unlicensed contractors and/or inexperienced contractors tend to be unreliable and perform work in a shoddy fashion. An unlicensed and/or inexperienced contractor is unlikely to follow your instructions leading to inferior and substandard workmanship that can end up costing you significantly more than if you had hired a licensed contractor at the outset. An unlicensed and/or inexperienced contractor is unlikely to possess liability insurance. That means that if your neighbor is injured or its home becomes damaged as a result of your contractor, you can be held personally liable for any such damages or injuries. Since your homeowners' insurance policy likely excludes claims arising from unlicensed construction practices, you face the risk of financial ruin to satisfy such liability. Even if it is your own home that is damaged and damaged as a result of a later casualty, your insurer may deny your claim if it can be shown that unlicensed work was performed on your home. As unfair as it sounds, you may

also be responsible for the medical bills, lost wages, and other damages sustained by your unlicensed and/or inexperienced contractor if he or she is injured while working unlawfully on your home.

Be careful to protect yourself. Confirm that your contractor possesses liability and worker's compensation insurance, and the requisite licensure from the State of Florida. In addition, make sure that your contractor has been in business for a significant period of time. The contractor that I mentioned, also has a fulltime job which means that his business is not his meat and potatoes so he doesn't have to take his side business seriously, it is just extra money on the side.

Being prepared from the outset is often the difference between being an exhilarating home improvement experience and a nightmare. To verify licenses, unlicensed activity and file a complaint with the State of Florida visit: www.myfloridalicense.com.



Presidential Primary Voter Turnout

Nassau County Supervisor of Elections Janet H. Adkins shares voter turnout from the March 19, 2024, Presidential Preference Primary. After completing 11 days of Early Voting, 8 of which are statutorily mandated, followed by Election Day on March 19, Nassau County had a 22.5% voter turnout during the Presidential Preference Primary. This represents 3,554 Vote-by-Mail ballots, 3,570 Early Vote ballots, and 2,838 Election Day ballots.

Supervisor Adkins applauds Nassau County voters for having one of the highest voter turnout rates in Northeast Florida for the Presidential Preference Primary Election. Voter turnout for surrounding counties are as follows: Baker 20.58%, Clay 16.5%, Duval 19.27%, Flagler 25.3%, and St. John's 18.88%. "We are working diligently to build trust and transparency in our Elections Process in Nassau County," said Adkins. "That starts with providing more opportunities for our voters to cast their ballots."

OREMC Announces Rate Increase Effective April 1



Okefenoke REMC has announced a base rate increase effective April 1. While the co-op issued wholesale power cost adjustments (increases in 2022 and a decrease in 2023), this will be the first base rate increase in over three years. As a result, residential rates will increase by 3.11 percent resulting in a \$5-\$6 increase on members' monthly electric bill depending on usage. "We understand this is not welcome news for our members given how the cost of living has increased in so many other aspects of lifegroceries, fuel, dining out, clothing, vehicles, housing," acknowledges General Manager John OREMC Middleton, "But the utility industry is no less immune to inflation, which has resulted in significant prices increases in materials necessary to maintain and build our distribution system to enhance reliability."

Materials and labor costs are the leading drivers of OREMC's cost increases, followed by system growth and improvements, and cost of power. With system growth, development and improvement comes the need for more plant and material: poles, wires, transformers, reclosers, etc. Availability of materials, long-lead times and labor shortages in manufacturing have resulted in large cost increases for many

components. Along with growth on OREMC's system due to the ongoing real estate boom, new technologies are being invested in, and integrated into, the system to improve reliability and minimize the number of members affected for the shortest amount of time when an outage does occur.

Additionally, the cost of power generation has increased. While OREMC had power cost adjustments in 2022 and 2023 to adjust for an unprecedented increase in natural gas, and then a subsequent reduction and leveling off, natural gas isn't OREMC's only source of power. The power supply mix also includes renewables, coal and nuclear.

The timing of this rate increase is the result of OREMC's most recent rate study. Rate studies are scheduled every two to three years to evaluate changes in costs and revenue, determine if rates are under-collecting, over-collecting or neutral, and adjust accordingly. OREMC's last base rate increase was in November 2020.





Hilliard Mural Unveiled Saturday

I decided that if the only source of revenue was going to be from the sale of the State of the Arts license plate, then this organization cannot meet the mission," continued Restiano. "We were not allowed as a City Commission to accept donations, apply for grants or get any funding from the city. Since we were staffed by the City of Fernandina Beach Parks and Rec Department and because of the Florida Sunshine Laws, this only complicated the ability we had to make a difference."

The new 3-year-plan called for Arts and Culture to have 4 strategies: Sustainability; Relevance county-wide, Impact and Awareness. Ultimately the board decided in December to dissolve the city maintain commission and create a nonprofit 501(c)3.



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Transparency in the School District

Recently, I read an article about the importance of transparency in our public school system, and I could not agree more. However, I thought it would be pertinent for readers to understand transparency from the viewpoint of an educator within the system. For 20 years, I had the privilege of teaching English to middle and high school students, and I will soon enter my 15th year as an instructional coach, all within the Nassau County School District.

I remember years of working long, arduous hours after school and on weekends, desperate to understand my profession in my efforts to impact students' lives. Often, that meant locking up school gates long after others went home. I loved every minute of those 20 years, but I worked in solitude. Today in our school district, I see teachers working collaboratively to design curriculum maps, teaching units, and daily lesson plans explicitly guided by state standards (no, not a hidden agenda) to better instruct students and prepare them for the world of tomorrow. When I began my teaching journey, these practices were not in place. Today in our school district, I am thankful (although admittedly, no one relishes higher taxes) that the beginning teachers with whom I work can feel a little less stress regarding personal finances since learning how to teach along with trying to meet weighty state certification requirements are frequently overwhelming and cause many to exit the field faster than they entered.

Today in our school district, with a total population of 104,911, we have had to embrace growth whether we like it or not. While my brain has been hyperfocused on instructional pedagogy and supporting teachers and students, I know that others have had to strategize and plan for the future of an expanding district in an inflationary economy. I remember our district mission defined

in 2000 by a long-range planning team: "...to develop each student as an inspired life-long learner and problemsolver with the strength of character to serve as a productive member of society." This was the mission under which former Superintendent Dr. John Ruis operated.

Today in our school district, under Superintendent Dr. Kathy Burns, that mission is still in place. As an instructional coach, I go into secondary classrooms daily to observe and coach teachers trying to accomplish this mission. Is it easy? Absolutely not! Do they have it all figured out immediately? Absolutely not. Teaching is far too complex for there to be an easy solution, but we are making continual progress, and our district score reports prove it.

I remember the year I was fortunate to be chosen to represent all the amazing teachers in our district and state as the 2009 Florida Teacher of the Year. As I traveled across our state and nation, I often met people who had never heard of Nassau County. I still chuckle when I recall their queries: "Is that in New York or the Bahamas?" Today, when I go outside our school district, people KNOW Nassau County. The mere mention of where I live and work invariably sparks comments such as, "Oh, I've heard great things about your school district." Remarkable, for sure, but those successes did not happen by accident. They happened because our school district worked together to accomplish our district mission for the 12,731 students in Nassau County, led by a smart, strong, God-honoring superintendent who loves education and most importantly, kids.

Instead of our district reflecting the dissension that unfortunately characterizes today's politics, I, for one, would love to see our district and community join hands with each other to support the strong school system I am fortunate to serve in daily.

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
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ALMA MARIE CALDWELL

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
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HELEN JOHNSON

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Man Nabbed in Multi-County Robbery Spree

Raheem Davis, Jr., 22, and another suspect allegedly carried out a scheme to defraud Home Depot stores across multiple locations in Palm Beach,

Nassau, Miami-Dade, Duval and Martin Counties between November 21, 2023 and December 1, 2023. The suspects are accused of using counterfeit bills to attempt to purchase merchandise from these locations. In several suspects incidents, the took off with cash and merchandise from various Home Depots throughout the state.

On December 1, 2023 an attempted robbery occurred here in Nassau County at the Home Depot on State Road 200 in Yulee. A Nassau County Sheriff's Office detective with the Criminal Investigations Division (CID) reviewed surveillance video of the robbery and identified the suspect as Raheem Davis, Jr. The footage showed the suspect attempting to purchase several items in the Garden Center of Home Depot using counterfeit money. While the cashier called for a manager, Davis Jr. tried to forcibly open the cash register. Although the victim managed to push the suspect away, the suspect ran from the store leaving the merchandise behind.

A detective with the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office determined that Davis, Jr. was also implicated in similar criminal cases with the Miami Dade Police Department, Stuart Police Department, Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office, Jacksonville Sheriff's Office, and Nassau County Sheriff's Office. Surveillance video and fingerprints linked Davis, Jr. to the

> crime scenes across multiple jurisdictions. "Cooperating with other law enforcement agencies allows us to solve cases more effectively," said Sheriff Bill Leeper. "If criminals are committing they're crimes here, likely committing crimes elsewhere too."

On December 15, 2023, Davis Jr. was arrested on outstanding warrants in Fulton County and subsequently booked into Camden County jail in Georgia. He faces charges including three counts of Burglary with Assault or Battery; one count of Robbery with a Weapon; one count of Robbery; three counts of Attempted Robbery; Battery on a Person over 65; and one count of Organized Scheme to Defraud (less than \$20,000).
