NCSO Partners with NE FL INTERCEPT



Nassau County Sheriff Bill Leeper is proud to announce that the Nassau County Sheriff's Office will partner alongside other Northeast Florida law enforcement leaders, the U.S. Attorney for the Middle District of Florida, State Representative Sam Garrison, Operation Lightshine and the Tim Tebow Foundation to help combat child sexual exploitation and human trafficking. Together this group created the newly formed Northeast Florida INTERCEPT Task Force by combing public-private partnerships. INTERCEPT stands for Inter-agency Child Exploitation and Persons Trafficking Task Force. Operation Lightshine, is a non-profit organization dedicated to combating Child Sexual Exploitation and Human Trafficking.



Along with help from the Tim Tebow Foundation, both organizations are funding this project and providing resources to local law enforcement. During the press conference on Thursday Tim Tebow read a letter from a young girl who had been a victim of human trafficking every night for six years. "She's crying out to everyone for help. 'Rescue me.' Today, we want to listen. We want to act," said Tebow.

The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children Cyber Tipline received over 29.3 million tips in 2021 with over 99% of those regarding incidents of suspected Child Sexual Abuse Material. That was an increase of 35% from 2020 when just under 22 million tips were received. In 2022, Northeast Florida accounted for over

2,300 combined child exploitation and human trafficking cases. "We all have one mission in common. Our goal is to protect our children in our communities. That's why it's important that we bring these traffickers to justice and make sure they

The Callahan Town Council met Monday night for their first regular meeting of March. The first order of business was honoring the West Nassau High School Varsity Cheerleaders with a Proclamation. The cheer team recently competed and won the FHSAA State Title, UCA National Title and UCA World Title for the Small Varsity Non-Tumbling Division in Orlando. The proclamation was read by Callahan Mayor Randy Knagge. The proclamation read, "The governing body of the Town of Callahan stands firmly committed to the promotion and celebration on the achievements of the West Nassau High School students and their accomplishments toward academic and athletic success; the sport of cheerleading fosters

The law enforcement agencies partnering in the NEFL INTERCEPT TASK FORCE include the Nassau County Sheriff's Office, Clay County Sheriff's Office, Jacksonville Sheriff's Office, Putnam County Sheriff's Office, St. Johns County Sheriff's Office, Florida Department of Law Enforcement and Homeland Security Investigations. All seven of these agencies have dedicated full time investigators and resources who will work tirelessly to investigate child sexual exploitation and human trafficking cases within the Northeast teamwork, dedication and life skills that prepare participants for the future; the cheer team is coached by Samantha Beazley; the Mayor and the Council of the Town of Callahan congratulate and recognize the West Nassau Varsity Cheer Team for their achievements."

Mayor Knagge presented the proclamation to Coach Beazley and each of the cheerleaders also received a copy of the proclamation.

The other agenda item concerned Resolution 2023-R03 which concerned returned checks from customers. The town will now place a fee of \$20 on returned checks and will not accept checks from a customer after a returned check. The council approved the resolution.

The next meeting of the council will be Monday, March 20 at 7 p.m.

In the Kitchen... Easy Sour Cream Cheesecake

1 (9") prepared shortbread pie crust 2 (8 oz.) packages cream cheese 1 cup white sugar

2 large eggs 1 cup sour cream 2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Preheat the oven to 325°. Place pie crust in a pan. Cream together cream cheese and sugar. Add eggs one at a time, blending well. Add sour cream and vanilla. Pour into prepared crust in the pan. Bake in the preheated oven until the cake is set and jiggles evenly across the top when lightly shaken, 60 to 70 minutes. Run a knife around the outside edge but leave the cake in the pan. Let cool on the counter, then place in refrigerator. Remove from pan when completely chilled, and serve.

Hilliard Town News

The Hilliard Town Council met Thursday night for their first meeting of March. The first order of business was the discussion again concerning a process to close, abandon or vacate, streets, alleys, easements or right-of-ways, within the Town of Hilliard. Town Attorney Christian Waugh addressed the council to request another brief workshop on this issue. Waugh is currently working on an ordinance to address this however would like a little more input from the council. The workshop was set for Tuesday, March 14 at 6:30 p.m.

The next agenda item concerned awarding the mowing contract for the town. Public Works Director Ritchie Rowe advised the council he received three bids for the 3-year contract. The bids included: North Florida Lawn Maintenance,

of NE FL, \$68,000.00; and Dixon Tree & Lawn Service, \$70,840.00. The council questioned the bids concerning the lowest price being so much lower than the other two. The council chose North Florida Lawn Maintenance at a cost of \$32,989.68. The owner will have until Monday, March 6 at 5 p.m. to accept or reject the bid.

The following item was a request to hold a Car Show, organized by David Taylor, to be held on the Town Hall property at the new Town Hall Park in September. Taylor plans to have the Callahan Cruisers of North FL to be involved and also maybe some vendors. The town approved the request and asked that the final details, once discussed, come back to the council for approval.

The council approved Resolution 2023-06, which concerned a Manual of Standards and Specifications for Utilities Construction for Waste and Wastewater Utility Specifications and Documents.

Public Works Director Rowe recommended approval to hire Justin C. Tuten as a Streets and Water & Wastewater Technician at \$15 per hour as a non-exempt, introductory or probationary employee. The council approved the recommendation.

The council approved the new

contract for Audit and Accounting Services for the fiscal years ended September 30, 2023, 2024 and 2025, with Powell and Jones, CPA.

The following item concerned Town Attorney Waugh entering into a discussion with CSX Railroad concerning and old contract. "Recently, the town received an invoice from CSX Railroad concerning maintenance at the 6th Street crossing," said Waugh. "An old contract was found however there was no money amount mentioned and the town never received a bill until recently. This is only giving me approval to negotiate on the Town's behalf concerning

this old contract." The council approved Attorney Waugh to

discuss this issue with CSX. Resolution 2023-05 was approved which concerns Resolution amending а Resolution 2022-08, adding a

fee for Development Investigation Applications; adding a deposit in addition to consultant cost plus 10% for the Town of Hilliard.

The next item was a request from the Hilliard Gardening Club to landscape around the 'Welcome to Hilliard' sign on US Highway 1 northbound. "The Hilliard Gardening Club would like to landscape around the 'Welcome to Hilliard' sign on the northbound side of town," said Jacqui Galbreath, Garden Club member. "The landscaping looks pretty rough and we'd like to take care of it. We plan to use crossties to surround the area. We are also asking for the council's support to pay for the supplies."

The council approved the request and allowed \$1,000 for the landscaping of the area.

The following three items were approved which concerned finishing out the FRDAP Grant money for the Town Hall Park Phase I, \$82,217.73, to CXT Incorporated; Oxford Street Park Phase IV, \$10,936.00, to MAE Contracting, LLC; and Oxford Street Park Phase IV, \$15,267.00, to MAE Contracting, LLC. The lump sum for all three of the grants was \$200,000.00 for each project.

The next meeting will be held Thursday, March 16 at 7 p.m.







When I was around age six or seven, Mrs. Boughner's store was located where Teenie's now stands. I lived within walking distance. That is, I was allowed to walk there as long as I was with my older friend, Raymond Fachko. Mrs. Boughner was elderly, and so was the store. It was mostly empty except for a glass case that held candy. At least, that's the only merchandise I noticed. For a dime, I could stuff a small, brown paper bag with enough old-fashioned penny candy to satisfy a little boy's sweet tooth for at least a day.

When I was a little older, maybe eight, Raymond and I would cut

through our block to the old Conner Building and Long's Sundries, owned and operated by Stanley Long. There, perched up on a stool at the counter, I was introduced to cherry cokes from the soda fountain, banana splits and ice cream sundaes. This last concoction was a delectable combination of ice cream, walnuts in maple syrup, chocolate syrup and whipped cream, topped with a sweet, red cherry. The anticipation of watching Stanley create it was nearly overwhelming, and the taste did not disappoint. Proper etiquette demanded saving the cherry for the last bite.

My Callahan visits these days are short, but that's just as well. My life is elsewhere. The structures that housed my childhood treats are long gone. Only sweet memories remain. Yes, I think nostalgia is a disease. And the only cure is one more serving of Stanley Long's chocolate sundae, with a bright, red cherry on top!

WNHS Key Club Donates to Pinky Promise








Do you hear what I hear?

Young people, "between the ages of 19 and 35, need to get their lives in order!" That line was from a story, with a high-ranking anonymous source in the pentagon, a couple weeks ago. We didn't hear much about it as it was buried very fast. But the message rings true.

We had a visitor stop by the other day, much as he has done for years, on a weekly basis. He was checking up on his 'ole mom and dad and letting us know how things are in his life. Of our two sons, he has made his life here, in northeast Florida. When asked why, his answers vary. But when pressed for the truth, it is very much the same as of generations ago. "To be here when, and if, my folks need me."

We did not encourage this, nor did we discourage it. We raised both our sons to explore their interests and follow their dreams, much as many of us did from the "Baby-Boomer" era. If that took them to other parts of the world, so be it. If that prompted them to move not far away, that was ok too. The primary joy of all parents, is to watch their kids develop into responsible adults, who have values that are cherished and that their endeavors are the rewards of doing something that they love to do. In that light, we have been very blessed. Neither son will become the target of the IRS, for their vast earnings, but both will always be able to say that they are doing what they love and are more than rewarded by the self-worth that they have experienced. They have also become a very good barometer of the generations, as they experience life.

So, what does all this have to do with the opening paragraph? When he left that day, he stopped short, before getting to the front door. Something he does when things are bothering him. "Dad," he began, "for the first time in my life I'm truly afraid for our safety and the places where we are in life." He further expanded his thoughts about national security and financial concerns. It was my turn to admit that he was not alone. We, like many, have thought of all those issues too.

As someone who was brought up in the '50s, educated in the '60s, served this nation's military in the '60s and '70s, worked in a career for nearly 36 years and has been retired for nearly 20 years, I can honestly say that the evolution of the United States of America, in recent years, has me very concerned.

With the knowledge that it took the U.S. nearly two years, following Pearl Harbor, to gain a good "toe-hold" on the aggressions of the German and Japanese governments, the next time we won't have that luxury of time to rely on preparedness. If, as some of the generals have speculated, we'll be in a war by 2025, then those in the armed forces now will just be a buffer before the wealth of the U.S., our draft age youth, will be called upon to just put up a defense, let alone any chance of being successful this time around. It will happen quickly, and very fast. So young people, men AND women, you better follow the advice and get your lives in order. The draft will be quickly activated and, with all the D.E.I. initiatives, EVERYONE will be called upon to serve.

Why am I scared? The government's own statistics show that more than 80% of people in that age group are physically unable to qualify to serve in the armed forces. That leaves (+or-) 20% that might be able to meet the requirements. However, of that number how many would meet standards and/or security concerns? Then, and only then, will we know if the Tom Brokaw book, "The Greatest Generation," has a rival or not.

For over 75 years, I've felt very comfortable that we had a country which fostered national security for families growing up. Now, for the first time in my son's 47 years, he is scared and I cannot reassure him on this one. If you're not yet at least a little concerned, then apparently, you've mastered that great ability to "Stick your head in the sand" and ignore what is going on around you!"
