Prescription Drug Take Back this Saturday Fentanyl: The Deadly Drug Affecting our Community

Fentanyl is a powerful synthetic painrelieving medication, also known as an opioid, typically used to treat patients with chronic severe pain or severe pain, usually following a surgical procedure. To put the potency of this substance into perspective, DEA.gov states that Fentanyl is similar to Morphine but about 100 times more potent. Due to the high potency and pain reducing characteristics of this medication it has a high risk for addiction and dependency. This substance is highly abused in the United States and remains at the forefront of the opioid epidemic, contributing to over 56,000 overdose deaths in 2020, with fatalities steadily increasing across the nation.

When illegally produced, this dangerous drug is manufactured in foreign labs and smuggled into the United States. It is then purchased by the drug suppliers, who are pressing the fentanyl into "Fake Pills." These fake pills are made to look like real prescription medications that are used to treat pain or anxiety, such as Percocet, Oxycodone, or Xanax and a commonly abused ADHD medication, Adderall. It is also added intentionally, or unintentionally by contamination, to other drugs such as marijuana, cocaine and methamphetamine. Drug suppliers are using fentanyl to make pills or as additives because it is cheaper and easier for them to obtain and profit from. These fake pills are killing unsuspecting youth, as young as 13 years old, and adults every day. It is important to note that 2 millimeters of Fentanyl can be a lethal dose, which is small enough to fit on the tip of a pencil.

Why is this significant to our Nassau County Communities? Many people who have died from Fentanyl, did not even know that they ingested it. Fentanyl is on the rise in our communities and has



and overdose deaths in Nassau County. Fake pills, or counterfeit pills, have started to circulate in our County, which brings immediate and critical concern to education and awareness of the dangers associated with buying and using illegal drugs. This is especially critical for our youth, who often go through phases of curiosity with substances and can end up obtaining what appears to be a regular prescription pill, like Percocet, but unknowingly end up with a lethal pill containing Fentanyl.

One of the most effective ways to reduce fentanyl use in our community, both intentional use unintentional, and is to reduce access unneeded opioid to medications, that can cause misuse and ultimately lead to adults or children

seeking out these medications illegally.

Please help keep our community a safer, healthier place by turning in all unneeded or old medications at a Medication Take Back Day location this Saturday, April 30 from 10 a.m. -2 p.m. at Callahan Winn Dixie, Hilliard Pharmacy and the Yulee Community Center. Collections will be located in the parking lots of these locations for quick drop off, making the process easy for everyone.

We will also be providing free

Narcan Distribution and information on how to properly administer it, in the event of an emergency. This, in addition to 2 free Deterra Disposal bags will be available at all 3 locations. Narcan is a lifesaving tool that should be included in all first aid kits. Narcan can save the life of someone who is experiencing an opioid overdose, including fentanyl, by reversing the effects of the overdose. This reversal medication can be used for accidental overdose, common in our senior population, who are prescribed multiple medications, and in our youth, who may accidentally take a fake pill and become in need of lifesaving measures.

The Hilliard Town Council met Thursday night for the final meeting of April. The first order of business was a presentation from Sherri Mitchell, Executive Director of the Nassau County Economic Development Board. "We (NCEDB) have done some restructuring and have come up with different roles. Some of these include to Offer Incentives and services to businesses," said Mitchell. "Our goals are to focus on Business Expansion and Business Retention. The NCEDB has some prospects looking at the Crawford Diamond: a Data Processing Center and a Beverage Company. We appreciate the Town of Hilliard's support and of course, are asking for it to continue. We

to consider."

"Do you have David Buchanan listed as a representative from Hilliard on your board?" asked Council President John Beasley.

"Yes, we do," added NCEDB Assistant Stephanie Knagge.

In other business, Public Works Director Ritchie Rowe requested consideration to purchase 5 acres of land that adjoins the Wastewater Treatment Plant from Hilliard resident Chad Brock. "This purchase could definitely benefit the town as we are going to have to expand the WWT Plant at some point," said Rowe. "This would square up our property at the northwest corner. The cost he is asking is \$27,500 (\$5,500 per acre). The property is

"I think it's a great idea but we probably need to wait until we can budget this item," said Councilman Lee Pickett. "The Town Clerk Lisa Purvis just told me we have the funds now if we choose to purchase the property."

Town Attorney Christian Waugh advised the council to let him draw up a contract before the council completely decided on the purchase. The council agreed.

Three items were approved which concerns the Hilliard Airpark and improvements being made there. All of the work is paid for in full by the FAA and FDOT. Improvements include: Equipment Storage Building, payment \$2,099; New Box Hanger & Hanger Repair, payment \$5,894; and Turf See 'Hilliard Town' on page 2



The next meeting will be held Thursday, May 5 at 7 p.m.



The Manifestation of Jesus: The Gospels

We are up to our third installment of making sense out of the overall story of the Bible. Remember, we are dealing with one book that tells one epic story from beginning to end. Jesus is the center-piece and ultimate hero in the Bible. In writing these articles, I'm combining the schemes of Kiel and Driscoll. Our second installment involved an overview of the Old Testament. Much more could have been written about the fascinating body of literature called the Old Testament, but for

brevity I chose to only focus on the anticipation of Jesus' coming.

The anticipation stage involved three movements: Creation, curse and covenant. So, as we parted ways with the Old Testament, we were anticipating the coming of Jesus. We are looking for the one to restore creation by removing the curse and anticipating the descendant of Abraham who will bless the whole world and simultaneously be a prophet, priest, and king. The Old Testament leaves us anticipating the Messiah who is God in the flesh and will be the Suffering Servant who lay down His life as an atoning sacrifice for the sins of his people.

The New Testament begins with four Gospels. Each of these Gospels tells the story of the manifestation of Jesus. The Gospels are not biographies. The four gospels that we have tell us about the person and the work of Christ. The first verse in the New Testament lets the reader know that the wait for the arrival of the Messiah is over. Matthew 1:1 declares: *"The historical record (literally genealogy or genesis) of Jesus Christ, the Son of David, the Son of Abraham."* Each aspect of the opening verse of the New Testament is pregnant with meaning.

• Genesis or record: this points the reader to the beginning of a creation


• Jesus: a name that means he will save his people from their sins: Matthew 1:21

• Christ: Christ is not Jesus' last name; Christ means the Lord's anointed. Christ is God's king and the long-awaited Messiah.

• Son of David: Jesus is the fulfillment of the Davidic covenant which God made with David in II Samuel 7

• Son of Abraham: Jesus is the fulfillment of God's covenant with Abraham to bless the whole world through his descendants in Genesis 12

The wait is over. The Jesus that was anticipated in the Old Testament is manifested in the Gospels. The gospels tell the story of Jesus' incarnation, baptism, temptation, sinless life, crucifixion and resurrection. The next installment of the story will give us the church's response to the manifestation of Jesus.

My name is Vicky Price. I am a wife of 23 years to Mike, a mother of four children and I am a survivor! I was

diagnosed with cervical cancer in November 2021. For years I went to the ER for severe cramps and bleeding. All I would get was Ibuprofen and told to go home and rest. I had no insurance, so I was not able to go to the doctor. When I was finally able to get insurance, I went to the doctor and she ordered a

bunch of tests. At that point I finally got answers. I was scared and happy all at the same time.

On January 25, 2022 I underwent surgery for a full hysterectomy. During my hysterectomy they even repaired a hernia as well. I am currently still healing. I was going to radiation, on a weekly basis for 5 weeks. I finished my radiation Wednesday, April 13, 2022. I meet with my gyn oncologist on May 5, for a follow up, as long as everything is still clear. I will start seeing her every 3 months. I will continue this for one year. If everything is clear after a year,



then I go every 6 months for a year. After the year, if all is clear, I will go to yearly visits for 3 years.

> Currently, I feel good and I don't have any more issues at this point. Blessings to everyone who supports fighters like me. I am a fighter and I will not let cancer define who I am. My future is very bright. I am looking forward to growing old with my husband, watching my grandbabies grow up, but

most of all I am looking forward to being cancer free and ringing the bell very soon.


West Nassau's Lee Signs with FSCJ
