Disney's Diversity and Inclusion Manager states that the company is ditching the words ladies,

gentlemen, boys, and girls in its theme parks in order to not alienate transgender children." Disney officials explained, "...the company is committed to pushing more "queer stories" and putting in place procedures to ensure that the company is creating enough "gendernonconforming characters." Disney's corporate president Karey Burke said, "She would like to see at least 50% of Disney characters in the future identify as LGBT or a racial minority."

"For Disney to come out and put a statement and say that the bill should have never passed and that they are going to actively work to repeal it, I think, one, was fundamentally dishonest, but, two, I think that they crossed the line," said Gov. DeSantis. He added, "This state is governed by the interests of the people of the State of Florida. It is not based on demands of California corporate executives. They do not run this state. They do not control this state".

Schools have no business teaching or instructing on sexual orientation and gender identity in any grade level. We need to refocus on teaching students about reading, writing, mathematics, civics, true history, social studies and Americanism versus Communism. Our public school system needs an entire revamping. Children are not capable of understanding gender identity unless they are coerced by adults. DO NOT mess with our children! I will go as far to say, anyone who visits Disney World or subscribes to Disney+ or purchase any Disney product is no better than the ones pushing this warped agenda.

Who We Were, What Has Christ Done, And for What Purpose?

With Resurrection Sunday coming up on April 17, I thought it would be a good thing for us to look at what takes place in the life of one who has begun a relationship with Jesus Christ. The Apostle Paul does a great job of laying this out for us, so we will look at a passage from Ephesians 2.

Who Were We? "And you were dead in the trespasses and sins in which you once walked, following the course of this world, following the prince of the power of the air, the spirit

that is now at work in the sons of disobedience; among whom we all once lived in the passions of our flesh, carrying out the desires of the body and the mind and were by nature children of wrath, like the rest of mankind." Ephesians 2:1-3.

Before we met Christ, we were described as dead in our own sin. At first, sin looks incredible and attractive. But after, it turns out to be not as rewarding as we thought it would be. It promises big and delivers little. It leaves us empty, hopeless and worse yet, sin leaves us spiritually dead.

What Has Christ Done? "But God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which he loved us, even when we were dead in our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ-by grace you have been saved and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus." Ephesians 2:4-6.

I love that this section starts off with "But God." We were this, "But God" stepped in and changed it all. Christ made us alive. By the grace of God, we are saved. We can boldly join Him. All of this is a gift that we simply accept. We don't do anything to earn it; we just open the gift.

For What Purpose? "... so that in the coming ages he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. For by grace, you have been saved through faith. Verses 8-9 support Paul's statement about grace in verse 7. Verse 10 continues the "so that." Christ saved us; we are His workmanship; we were created for good works. Now, we should walk in those good works.

So, what about you? Have you opened the gift of God's salvation? His desire is to have a relationship with you. It all starts with simply talking to Him about it.

Fusiform Rust on Pine Trees

Orange or yellow are not considered unusual colors in most settings. However, when you see it on pine trees, it can be a startling and puzzling

sight. Just what exactly is it, why is it on my pine trees and should I be doing something about it?


The cause of the appearance of the bright color is probably fusiform rust. The bright orange (sometimes yellow) spores often appear on galls (swollen areas) on pine trees in the spring. Fusiform rust

is caused by a fungus that spends about half of its life cycle on various oak trees and half on pine trees. Loblolly and slash pine are particularly susceptible. Getting rid of the oak trees to break the cycle is usually not a practical option. The good news is that the fungus does no significant harm to the oak trees.

However, the bad news is that the fungus can do significant harm to pine trees. Depending on the setting (plantation, nursery, or yard tree), fusiform rust can have varying degrees of impact and require different responses. With a yard tree, it may be feasible to prune infected limbs to decrease the chance of a main stem infection. If a main stem infection already exists, the tree may become a

hazard due to the weakened stem and should be removed.

In the nursery, prevention by spraying with fungicides may be effective but costly.



through species selection (longleaf) or through genetically improved seedlings that are "Rust Resistant".

If the stand is not too severely infected, a thinning may allow for removal of the infected trees while still leaving an adequately stocked stand of healthy trees.

Fusiform rust has been infecting our pine trees for a long time and will likely remain a part of our landscape for a long time to come. If you notice bright orange on your pine trees this spring and are not sure what to do, contact your county forester. The setting and severity of the infection will determine what you need to do (if anything). Call your county forester at 904-845-7238 for more information.

Freezer - Pantry Challenge

In the spirit of saving money, try NOT to go grocery shopping next week. Your goal will be to use what is currently in your pantry, refrigerator,

and freezer.

If you accept the challenge, replace your shopping time with spring cleaning your pantry, refrigerator, and freezer. Throw away outdated items, re-organize the items you plan to keep and set aside the items you plan to give away. If you have the space, an open card table is a convenient place to put the food you are sifting through while you make decisions. Have a cooler on hand for the frozen food you plan to give away.

Fun Idea: Have a swap party with family and friends! If the entire group accepts the challenge, everyone will have a small pile of items to trade. Agree on the location, date and time and everyone brings their giveaway items they are not going to use and exchanges their stuff with something they would use. Bring one get one, bring five get five. If you are going to include freezer items (which I personally think is a great idea) have everyone, bring their own cooler or cooler bag. This is another way to re-stock your resources for free. Look at it like, "Grocery shopping without grocery shopping."

If you do this challenge, please let me know. I would love to hear your success stories because they are very encouraging!



Organizational Tips:

1. Freezer - Put like meats together. For instance, put all your beef together, pork together and chicken together. The small plastic bins at dollar tree work well for organizing. I also have a small separate spot for steaks. Likewise, put all similar vegetables together in the freezer. It saves time when I can see and know what I have in my freezer. Create an inventory spreadsheet, place it on the outside of the freezer and mark off every time you pull something out.

2. Pantry - When organizing your pantry put all the breakfast items together, all the vegetables together, sauces together, seasoning packets in a small plastic bin, and paper products together. Rotate stock. Place the oldest food up front or on top, to use first. Use a sharpie to write the expiration date on top of the cans.

By His Excellency: Abraham Lincoln, President of the United States of America. A Proclamation issued on March 30, 1863.





A Great Sportsman's Sunday at Liberty Baptist Church



Relay for Life...Meet Wanda Nichols

Wanda Nichols

My name is Wanda Nichols and I am a cancer survivor. I am also the Event Lead Chairperson for the Relay for Life of Nassau County. The 2022 Relay will be held at the Northeast Florida Fairgrounds Saturday, May 7 from 3 p.m. - 10 p.m. This will be my last relay as the Event Lead Chairperson.

On August 9, 2014, I awoke with a fever and a massive headache. I thought I either had a sinus infection or the flu and I was

in North Carolina. After a few days I ended up in the Emergency Room. They did an EKG and a breathing treatment. After the breathing treatment I felt fine. However, within one hour of my arrival my life would be changed forever. The doctor came in and told me the good news was he knew what was wrong with me; bad news it was either leukemia or lymphoma. A

blood specialist came in and informed me, when you have leukemia or lymphoma and you have breathing problems chances of survival are slim.

From my release I went straight to St. Vincent's Hospital in Jacksonville. When I arrived, I met doctors from Cancer Specialists of North Florida. I was told again I have Acute Myeloid Leukemia (AML). I had a bone marrow biopsy, prepared to start chemotherapy and started the medications to prepare me for chemo. Long story short, my only hope was to receive a bone marrow transplant.

I was sent to UF Health Cancer Center in Gainesville where Dr. Wingard informed me that they found a third leukemia. I was also diagnosed with Chronic Lymphoid Leukemia (CLL). Dr. Wingard also told me

that he did not know if the bone marrow transplant would work. He told me I was running out of time. So, the search for a donor began and soon I received a call from Gainesville saying that we had a match.

On April 6, 2015, I was admitted to the hospital in Gainesville for my transplant. On April 14, my donor went into surgery to have his bone marrow from his hips extracted. Once his bone marrow was extracted it was then put on an "Angel Flight" and sent to Gainesville for my transplant. On

the morning of April 15 I started receiving my new bone marrow. Once I was released from the hospital, I stayed at the HOPE Lodge in Gainesville. The HOPE Lodge, is sponsored by Winn Dixie and the American Cancer Society. The Relay for Life events raise funds to provide for all those amenities. In 2016, a little over a year after my transplant I finally met my donor, Matt

Gilmore. He lives in Bedford, IN.

In January 2019, I was diagnosed with CML again. However, after more treatments, I currently remain cancer free and am still off all medications. On April 15, 2022, I will turn 7 years old. I was given a second chance at life. Most of all, I'm thankful for my number one physician, GOD. HE has it all under control and HE is not done with me yet. I am excited to see what HE has for me in the next chapter of my life.

Donald Gray Braddock, 73, of Callahan, gained his heavenly wings April 5, 2022, after a lengthy illness.

Donnie was born on July 24, 1948, in Jacksonville to Donald Pasco (D.P.) and Claudine Braddock, just minutes before his identical twin brother Ronnie.

Donnie was a lifelong resident of Callahan and member of Callahan First Baptist Church. He graduated from Callahan High School in the Class of 1966. Donnie excelled in sports, lettering in football, baseball, basketball and track. After high school, Donnie continued his education on a football scholarship to Henderson State University in Arkadelphia, Arkansas, playing linebacker, feared by many opponents. He received his Bachelor of Science degree in Biology. Donnie made many lifelong friends at HSU, continuing to attend homecomings and other functions throughout the years. He was inducted into the Reddie Hall of Fame in 2006, along with his brother Ronnie.

Donnie will be remembered as a beloved high school teacher, coach and friend. After college, Donnie spent many years coaching and teaching in Nassau County, at West Nassau High School, Callahan Junior High and Fernandina Beach High School. He wore many hats as head coach, athletic director, and activities director at the schools. His love was in teaching and coaching, and he was an advocate for many students and players trying to navigate their next steps into adulthood and secondary education. Many local graduates from Nassau County continued their education at Henderson State University, and countless other universities, because of his love and knowledge of football and education and his desire to always help another succeed. Later, Donnie also taught and coached at University Christian School in Jacksonville, and was also an adjunct professor of Anatomy and Physiology at Jacksonville University.

Donnie's love of football was well known. 


