His funeral service was held Friday, May 10 at the First Baptist Church of Hilliard. It was less than three months ago, February 16, that his high school sweetheart and wife of 55 years, Ann, passed away. Those two were truly a team and they loved their family. Our prayers continue for their family during this difficult time.

David was a man of many accomplishments. He served his country in the US Army in Vietnam, which we all know was a difficult task.

He was proud to be a Veteran and carried that title with honor. He later worked with the Nassau County School District as the Director of the Transportation Department for many years and eventually retiring. From that experience he learned the importance of

playing his guitar and meeting his friends in the afternoon at Five.5. I saw them many times when I was dropping off papers at the restaurant. They would all smile and say no!

The Buchanans were faithful members of Grace Covenant Presbyterian Church in Hilliard. They were a special couple that loved their family. 



Groundbreaking Ceremony for Fire Station 90

We are excited to announce that the Board of County Commissioners will host a Groundbreaking Ceremony in celebration of the upcoming construction of a new Fire Station 90. This station will be built at the existing Station 90 site located at 3195 County Road 2 in Hilliard.

Following a competitive process, the Board awarded the bid for design/ construction of the new station to ACON Construction Company, Inc. The new, modern facility will consist of 10,891 square feet and will feature four bays with an engine, rescue unit, tanker and brush truck. It will also contain 11 sleeping quarters, four and half bathrooms, a living room, a kitchen and an exercise room. Board Chairman John Martin stated, "The first duty of government is the protection of residents. Proactive planning has

allowed us to further the capabilities of Nassau County Fire Rescue by acquiring new personnel and equipment, as well as adding stations to ensure the department has the capacity to meet the demands of a growing community. The brave men and women of Station 90 need a modern station that meets current national standards and provides a safe, comfortable space for our emergency personnel to use when not responding to calls. This new station will serve the department and the community well for many years to come and we look forward to celebrating this important milestone with our residents."

FSCJ Receives Grant to Support Career and Technical Education

Florida State College at Jacksonville (FSCJ) was awarded an \$897,577 grant as part of a \$25 million Workforce Development Capitalization Incentive Program (CAP), developed to provide Florida students with opportunities for hands-on educational experiences in a broad range of career and technical education. FSCJ's funding will assist dual enrollment programs focused on welding and medical assistance, supporting supply and equipment purchases. It will allow two Duval County Public Schools (DCPS) high schools, A. Philip Randolph Career Academies and Frank H. Peterson Academies, to build out and expand their labs to enhance student learning and prepare them for certification exams. "This is a great collaboration between us and our partners to provide pathways in dual enrollment programs, working closely with DCPS to update equipment, provide industry standard

training experiences and prepare students for their future," said FSCJ Dean of Workforce Education Dr. Greg Wurth.

The upgraded labs and learning spaces will give students access and opportunity to gain valuable skills and begin working on Post-Secondary Vocational Career Certificates while still in high school and with no out-ofpocket costs. In the official press release announcing the award, Governor Ron DeSantis said, "In Florida we have become the number one state in the nation for talent development by making strategic investments in our workforce. We will continue to equip students in our state with the skills they need to succeed, without being burdened by debt."





She nodded and handed me a card to fill out. "Please, get this back to us as soon as possible. We're still scheduling classes for next month."


I smiled, took the card and all of our books and DVDs and headed to the children's area. When I got there, I saw John and Jacob. Story time had just ended.


"That was so fun!" Jacob said as he skipped toward me. "Can we come back next week?"
