July Water Increase in Hilliard

The Hilliard Town Council met Thursday night for their final meeting of May. The first order of business was a discussion concerning approving an application for funding for the Sixth Street paving project. "I want to first congratulate the Town of Hilliard for the approval on appropriations funding from the state. Hilliard was the number one small town in Florida to receive appropriations," said Doug Adkins. "There is still money available in the American Rescue Plan and I'm asking you (council) to be the willing applicant for the funding of \$225,000 for the paving project on Sixth Street and possibly Orange Street. The funding is coming from the Department of Economic Opportunity."

"So, if approved for the money from

DEO, this wouldn't cost the town a penny?" said Councilman Lee Pickett. "I want to make sure I understand this!"

"All the town is doing is being the willing applicant as the funding must go through a municipality. There will be no cost to the town," added Adkins.

The council approved completing the application, pending they receive a letter from Adkins stating that the town would not be responsible for any funding and also providing a new drawing including the roundabout that was discussed.

The council approved a septic tank exception for David Bishop on his property located on West Twelfth Avenue in Hilliard.

The next agenda item concerned amending Resolution 2022-08 Water and Sewer Rates. This resolution will amend Resolution 2021-23, amending Water and Sewer rates; Tap-in Fees; adding a fee for Septic Tank Applications; adding a fee for Right of Way Permit Applications. The residential Water and Sewer Fees will increase around \$4 per month for normal usage. The fee for Septic Tank applications will be \$250; and the fee for Right of Way permit applications will be \$2,000. The council approved Resolution 2022-08 by a 4-1 vote with Councilwoman Callie Bishop voting no.

The Water and Sewer rates will not increase until July. The other fees will be effective immediately.

In other business, the council approved the \$7,500 payment to Kynex, Inc. for half of their portion of the payment for the fireworks display to be held on July 2 in combination with the Town of Callahan.

"I attended a meeting at the fairgrounds concerning the fireworks. We are in the process of checking with food trucks that would be available prior to the fireworks for residents," said Council President John Beasley. "We will have another meeting in early June to finalize plans."

The council approved the payment of \$9,461 to Strength Depot for the purchase of new exercise equipment for the Hilliard Fitness Center. "Most of the equipment is already up and running at the center," said Parks and Recreation Director Gabe Whittenburg.

The council also approved the payment of \$2,532 to American Precast Structures, LLC for the Culvert Bundle. The lump sum of the contract is \$22,000.

The next meeting of the council will be Thursday, June 2 at 7 p.m.

Slow-Cooker Shredded Mexican Chicken

1 package (28 oz) boneless skinless chicken thighs 24 oz (or 3 cups) salsa 1 package (1 oz.) taco seasoning mix

In 4-5 quart slow cooker, toss chicken with half of the taco seasoning mix to coat evenly. Top chicken with salsa. Stir until well combined. Cover; cook on low heat 4 to 4 1/2 hours or until chicken is very tender. Remove chicken from slow cooker to bowl. Shred chicken with 2 forks. Return shredded chicken to slow cooker along with remaining taco seasoning mix. Cover; cook on low 30 minutes longer. Serve warm.

The Proclamation of Jesus: Acts

Repetition, repetition, repetition. Repetition is the key to learning. We are homeschooling our children and our family has considered alternative ways of learning. One of the most fascinating methods of learning that we have discovered was the Suzuki method. The Suzuki method of learning seeks to ensure mastery of the material that is learned. The focus of the method is repetition and review before building on the new material. This method of learning applies to all areas of life. Let's take the following illustration to prove a point. If someone is learning how to play the piano and they focus on learning

a new piece of music. The individual may spend all of their time learning the new piece, but they are losing competence in the pieces that they have already learned. They can play a new song, but they cannot continue to play the songs that they have previously learned. The Suzuki method focuses on mastery of the material that has already been learned and then the new pieces are added, but they are not forgotten. They are continually reflected upon. The same is true of our knowledge of any subject and this is especially true of the Bible.

So, let's review what we have covered about the Bible up until this point. The Bible is one book and the message of the Bible is how God makes everything perfectly, sin destroys it all, but Christ redeems it all. Christ is the hero of the Bible and the whole Bible is the redemptive history of Christ's removal of the curse and how he makes all things new. The Bible is made of six parts according to Driscoll: Creation, curse, covenant, Christ, church, and consummation. I have been following Kiel's overview of the Bible in my previous articles.

- Christ Anticipated: Old Testament
- Christ Manifested: Gospels
- Christ Proclaimed: Acts

The Old Testament anticipates the coming of Christ. The Gospels are the manifestation of Christ. The Gospels begin with the birth of Jesus and conclude with the ascension of Jesus. The book of Acts is called the proclamation of Jesus. In Acts 1:1-4, Luke tells us that he writes his sequel to Luke to show us all that Jesus continued to do after his ascension. The book of Acts begins with Jesus' ascension and the book concludes with Paul's arrival in Rome. At the beginning of the book of Acts the apostles are empowered to preach Christ by the Holy Spirit (Acts 1-2). The book of Acts closes with the Gospel going out into the whole world. Paul was imprisoned, but the Gospel was not chained, and Paul preaches Christ unhindered (28:30-31). The key verse for the book of Acts is found in 1:8. You will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, Judea and Samaria, and to the uttermost parts of the world. This is an easy outline for the book of Acts.

- Christ is preached in Jerusalem: Acts 1-7
- Christ is preached in Judea and Samaria: Acts 8-12
- Christ is preached to the ends of earth: Acts 13-28

Acts tells the history of the early church. Christ is proclaimed throughout the whole world. Jesus is the ascended Lord, but he is continuing his work in the world through his church. This is why the miracles and the sermons that were preached by the apostles were done in the name of the Lord. Jesus is the ascended Lord who has authority over the world. This is why the church proclaims Christ.



Tips for Avoiding the Summer Slump

Summer is here and as we, as educators, along with our students, are gearing up to enjoy our much-needed summer vacation, we can't help but worry about that "summer slump" that students seem to fall into. The Summer Slump is also known as Summer Learning Loss. On average, a student can decline as much as 2 months of school, over summer vacation, simply by not using skills that were taught throughout the school year.

Being in Early Childhood Education for the past 15 years and graduating with my Bachelor's Degree in Early Childhood Education in 2012, I've learned simple ways to keep those little ones (ages 2-7) engaged and avoid the Summer Slump. After all, during the early childhood ages their brains absorb everything like a sponge and most are eager to learn, so why not capitalize on learning with a little bit of fun!

5 Tips to Keep Early Childhood Students Learning During Summer:

DAILY REVIEW: Talk about school, things they learned in school, ask questions. This helps the child recall specific lessons that were taught during the year. Switch it up often. Ask questions about certain things you know were covered in lessons and have them tell you all about it.

READ, READ; READ: Books, Signs, Labels. Read with them or to them. It doesn't have to be a lot, maybe just a short story a day throughout the week. Ask questions about characters, get them to tell you things they think will happen next or why their favorite character is who it is. For the littles VPK

age to Kindergarten, ask them to tell you the letters on a sign. Ask them to find a letter on a sign and tell you what sound it makes. This will keep letters and their sounds fresh in their minds

COUNT EVERYTHING: Everything is a math problem. I tell my VPK parents, if they are struggling with their numbers, COUNT everything. Green beans at dinner, skittles after lunch, how many steps from your room to the bathroom and everything is a math problem. You have 5 green beans on your plate if you eat 2 how many do you have now? Simply using what you have to keep them engaged and learning.

TAKE A FIELD TRIP: It doesn't have to be an actual field trip but go. Go to the park, the beach, or to the library. Don't just focus on the reading and math of it all. Use our world as your classroom. Look for different insects or birds. Examine their different colors or skin types. Then, go to the local library and find a book on something you've seen on your trip.

GO OUTSIDE and PLAY: Yes, all of the above is IMPORTANT for staying engaged and out of that crazy, Summer Slump, but so is just having fun. Take a break and go outside, get away from the books and screen time and enjoy making up a new game and interacting with family and friends their age. Just by getting young kids up and moving, they'll be able to concentrate better when you do want to focus on academics at different times throughout the summer.

Stay at home parents and working parents, have a great BRAIN boosting summer with your children and enjoy making memories while keeping them out of the Summer Slump.

Flashes Win Spring Football Game

In an off season of change and a new face leading the charge in new Flashes head coach Waylon Cox, the Hilliard Flashes returned to the gridiron for their spring game in Jacksonville against the Bishop Snyder Cardinals. The start of the game was delayed an hour and a half due to heavy rain and lightning.

With it being a spring game, there are two important rules to consider: noncompetitive special teams and each drive starting at the offense's 30-yard line. The Flashes began the contest with a strong run game. The drive was capped off by a 10-yard touchdown run courtesy of Walker Avera. Following a good extra point, the Flashes were up 7-0. The Cardinals answered going 70 yards down the field. After the extra point, the game was tied at 7. The Flashes, were just getting started. After a couple of runs by Braydon Holley, the Flashes scored on back-to-back drives with Avera completing a 3-yard and a 2-yard score respectively. The first quarter ended with a solid Flashes 21-7 lead.

The Flashes used their aerial attack when Lyle Bennett connected with Bradyn Matto for 28 yards. After the extra point hit the cross bar, the Flashes strengthened their lead to 27-7. The defense got involved when Jacob Hoover forced a fumble recovered by Prestin O'Quinn. The Flashes capitalized with Bennett scoring from 10 yards out.

With the extra point good, the Flashes extended the lead to 34-7. The defense continued to cause havoc to the Cardinal offense by causing back-to-back turnovers. Two drives later, Bennett connected with Holley into open space for a 37-yard score. After the extra point was good, the Flashes had a commanding 41-7 lead heading into

It was a tale of two halves as the Cardinals began to fight their way back into the game. It became a defensive struggle in the 3rd quarter with the Cardinals finding the end zone again with an 11-yard touchdown run. With a missed extra point, the Flashes were still in good shape with a 41-13 lead. In the 4th quarter, the Cardinals caught a furious rally. The Cardinals scored again. Despite charging back with 27 unanswered points in the second half, it was not enough as the Flashes closed out the spring game with a 41-34 win.

Offensively, Bennett went 6/11 for 197 yards and 3 scores; Avera had 8 carries for 72 yards and 3 touchdowns; Holley had 5 carries for 61 yards and had 2 receptions for 65 yards and a touchdown; and Matto had 3 receptions for 113 yards and a touchdown.

Defensively, the Flashes forced 3 turnovers. Hoover had 4 tackles, a sack, and a forced fumble; and Colton Conner had 3 tackles.

The Flashes will continue workouts throughout the summer preparing for fall.
