in the virus are hidden to us, but this does not mean that we cannot look at the Scriptures and see what God could be doing during the church at this time.



Maybe we should hear the prophets cry out as they declared that their worship was nauseating to God. The prophet Amos would even declare that God hated the worship of the people (Amos 5:21-23). Maybe God wanted us to realize that worship was never about us, but it was always about God. Maybe God would want us to think about how worship made Him feel, instead of how worship makes us feel. Maybe, God is trying to get his church to stop worshipping worship and start worshipping God. Maybe it is time for the church to simplify and declutter. 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Hilliard Town News

The Hilliard Town Council met Thursday night, in person, in Town Hall. It was probably a good thing as the council had a full agenda to cover. The first item was a presentation from Mr. Milton Locklear via phone, representing the North Florida Transportation Planning Organization (TPO). Locklear visits the council prior to each public yearly meeting of the TPO, which was held Wednesday, May 27 at 4 p.m. in Jacksonville. He went through any projects that are scheduled now until

the next 3 years for the Hilliard area. Only one item concerned a roadway, the remainder was work at the Hilliard Airpark. Projects included: CR 121 from SR 2 to US Highway 1, Signing/pavement markings, 2020/21, Cost: \$394,368; the remainder of the items concerned Hilliard Airpark, land

purchase along Eastwood Road, 2020/21, Cost: \$175,000; Master Plan/ALP update, 2023/24, Cost: \$400,000; Acquire tractor and attachments, 2020/21, Cost: \$86,000; Design & construct new maintenance building, 2023/24, Cost: \$125,000; Hangar 2024/25, development, \$1,000,000; Relocate displaced threshold, 2023/24, Cost \$110,000; Design & construct hangars, 2022/23, Cost: \$340,000; Install security fencing, 2020/21, Cost: \$360,000; Realign Pea Farm Road on north end, 2020/21, Cost \$504,000; Security fencing for newly acquired land, 2021/22, Cost: \$600,000; and Construction realigned Pea Farm Road; 2020/21, Cost \$870,000.

The next two agenda items were to set workshops for the restructuring of the Mayor's duties; and the other to discuss a complaint from the town clerk and response. Both workshops will be done the same night, Monday, June 1 at 6 p.m. at Town Hall.

Town Clerk Lisa Purvis covered the next item which concerned a malfunction with the time clock system throughout all the town departments (town hall, recreation center, WWTP, etc.). "I feel like we (council) need to adopt by resolution some timekeeping procedures," said Purvis. "Forms will be provided at each time clock when problems occur. The forms must be signed and turned in immediately."

Several council persons had questions and concerns about changing procedures until the problem is fixed. Purvis assured the council that she has been in touch with the company, Tyler Execu Time, numerous times each week to address the issues. The council approved the 401 timekeeping procedure but will be revisited once the problems are fixed.

Public Works Director Richie Rowe requested approval to sign and submit the grant application form for the Trash Trap Grit removal at the WWTP. The town will be allowed to piggyback off of a City of council approved the request.

Parks & Recreation Director Kyle Malucci requested approval to sign the Nassau County School Board bus rental agreement for the Summer Camp fieldtrips. "We (the town) will still provide the driver and this year, the bus will be coming from the Yulee bus yard," said Malucci.

The council approved the request.

Malucci also advised the council that he has the agreements for Hilliard Middle-Senior High School and West Nassau High

School swim teams to use the pool facility for summer 2020. The contracts will begin in August. Clerk Lisa Purvis advised Malucci that the contracts must be signed by the schools first and then by the town.

Town Attorney Christian Waugh addressed the council concerning rules and procedures for anything that comes before the

council. "In the next few weeks, you (council) will have a Zoning Board Appeal," said Waugh. "The previous Zoning Board meeting turned out to be a free-for-all, instead of a meeting. This type of action is not a good procedure to follow. I just have a few guidelines and rules to consider. The council will be presented information from the P/Z Board to make a decision."

Waugh went on to explain six guidelines to keep the meeting in order.

"I don't think we should amend the ordinance at this time, not when we have an acting appeal going on," said Councilwoman Callie Bishop. "If we're not changing anything, why do we have to vote on it?"

After much conversation, the council agreed to table this item until after the pending appeal.

Council President John Beasley questioned the council concerning the upcoming July 4th Hilliard Fireworks. "Should we (council) cancel or postpone the fireworks..." said Beasley.

Before he could finish, Councilman Kenny Sims said, "NO!"

The council unanimously agreed to continue plans for the fireworks display on Sunday, July 4, 2020.

The final item was from Town Clerk Lisa Purvis who explained, "Mr. Bobby Franklin's property, at the corner of West Eighth Street and US Highway 1 that was rezoned to R-3 Multi-Family, should have been rezoned PUD in order to accommodate the eight apartments facing West Eighth," said Purvis. "I am requesting that the fees associated with rezoning PUD be waived since he has already incurred rezoning and engineering costs based on his original proposal.

After much discussion, the council approved the request to waive the fees.

The next council meeting will be held Thursday, June 4 at 7 p.m. at Town Hall.

JUST MY OPINION

Some have obviously never read these, others have read and forgot. We all need to hold these words dear to our hearts. The Bill of Rights are not time sensitive, they are relevant today just as they were in 1791. Here are the first six:

Amendment I: Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

Amendment II: A well-regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

Amendment III: No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

Amendment IV: The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched and the persons or things to be seized. Amendment V: No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offence to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

Amendment VI: In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defense.

I will share the remaining "Rights" in the near future because each and every one is indeed important to all of us.

Gifted Students Share Distance Learning Projects

Each school year, during the second semester, the Elementary Gifted students of Nassau County partner with White Oak Conservation to learn about a particular animal species. Students learn about the animal, the dangers and threats facing this species as well as the habitat and environment the animal lives in. While studying the animal they also take part in a project-based learning activity.

This January, students kicked off a study of the Cassowary. They had started learning about the Cassowary and their natural habitat when school shifted to distance learning due to Covid-19. While the actual field experience that was planned for March had to be cancelled, it didn't stop these students from learning more about these endangered creatures from home. Through a series of research activities, students learned about the population of the Cassowary in Australia and New Guinea. They learned what type of environment is best suited for its survival. They also focused research on what threats the Cassowary currently have with emphasis on solutions to these problems. Students were challenged to create a public awareness campaign for the Australian government



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

Memorialization will be by cremation.


A memorial service will be held Monday, June 1 at 1 p.m. at the First Baptist Church of Boulougne with Rev. Paul Lucas officiating.
