Hilliard Town News

The Hilliard Town Council met Thursday night for their first meeting of May. The first business was a presentation read by Mayor John Beasley congratulating Hilliard Town Clerk Lisa Purvis as they celebrate Professional Municipal Clerks Month during the week of May 5-11.

The first order of business was the approval on First Reading of Ordinance 2023-03 which concerned Trespass Warning on town property. The ordinance went on to read: An Ordinance of the Town of Hilliard adding a Section to the Code of Ordinances regarding Trespass Warnings on Public Property and other Property Generally open to the Public. The Town of Hilliard desires the Nassau County Sheriff's Office to issue trespass warnings to individuals who are acting in violation of any Town Ordinance, rule or regulation, or state law while on or within a town facility, building, or outdoor area; and the Town of Hilliard desires to provide consistency and uniformity for the issuance of these trespass warnings; and the Town desires to create a process for individuals to appeal these trespass warnings. The Public Hearing and Second and Final reading will be held Thursday, June 6 at 7 p.m.

The next item concerned the approval to adopt Resolution 2024-10 which concerned amending Resolution 202304, adding penalty fees to the Zoning & Land Development Regulations for work being done prior to approval.

The council also approved adopting Resolution 2024-11, which adds a fee (\$250) for well exception applications, just as the septic tank exceptions pay.

The following item was the Town Clerk's notification to the council of the emergency procurement in accordance with Town Code Chapter 2 Administration; with TB Landmark Construction, Inc. for the approval for the replacement of Manhole #208 at Shady Lane and Pine Street. The council will be notified when the road will be closed to complete the work on the Manhole.

The council approved the payable for project: NW Quadrant Street Millings in the amount of \$30,523. The council approved the payable for TB Landmark Construction, LLC for project Oxford Street Force Main Rerouting in the amount of \$147,565.30.

The council approved the payables through March 12 for project: Town Hall Park Expansion in the amount of \$18,353.65.

The final item was the council approval of the payable through April 9 for project: IT Town Hall Refresh in the amount of \$6,105.39.

The next meeting of the council will be Thursday, May 16 at 7 p.m.

Social Emotional Learning (CASEL. org) relationship, and Pearson alignment with Gender Spectrum Symposium, and Pearson alignment with Tavistock & Portman, UK's largest provider of transgender services.

Peanut Nodule Analysis

If you are a peanut grower, then you need

to take advantage of our county agent, David Hébert, who is doing site visits this spring and summer to assess crop health for peanut growers all over the county. "One of the main indicators of peanut health is nodule activity and we can make quick field determinations about the health of your crop. In addition, we can easily differentiate between nodules and root knot nematodes, which are also prevalent and tend to have the same appearance,"

said Hébert.

Based on the inside color of the nodules, UF/IFAS Extension Nassau County can draw conclusions about the health of your peanut plants. For 2024, the extension office is offering this service free of charge in an effort to promote awareness of the services it has to offer county residents.

Controversy at Callahan **Community Market**

The Callahan Town Council met Monday night for their first meeting of May with a completely packed room. Once the meeting was called to order, persons wishing to address the council did. John Hendricks, representing the West Nassau Historical Society (WNHS) approached the podium. "I'm here concerning the Callahan Community Market. I want to share a little history. The Town of Callahan (TOC) retained the rail bed years ago. Two years ago the TOC began building the pavilion. The WNHS became the third party to handle the rental of the pavilion and rail bed for the TOC," said Hendricks. "The Callahan Community Market began in 2013 setting up in the parking lot in front of the Depot. Verbal rules were that the vendors had to be a non-profit or giving back to the community in some way and handled by the honor system. This January, I was approached and told there would be a new market manager coming for the first Saturday of the month. Eventually the old group moved to the second Saturday of the month. Now there are issues brewing with vendors being blocked by old vendors and we need help from the council to continue. The WNHS has been good stewards for the town for 19 years and we will continue to do so with your (council) help."



The first order of business was the swearing in of Matthew Davis as a Councilman. He was appointed to take the seat that David Mellecker held. If Davis choses, he will have to run in the November 2024 election to retain the seat.

The next order of business was the approval of Resolution 2024-R03 which concerned donating \$500 to the Callahan Methodist Church Memorial Day Rod Run.

The final agenda item was the site plan review for Aroma Waffle & Ice Cream Shop. The shop will be located at the corner of 5th Avenue and US Highway 1 (beside Baptist Primary Care office). The site plan was approved contingent on the shop owner providing 10 additional parking spaces and 2 handicap spaces. The owner, Tony Asad, plans to also offer parking at the south end of the building beside the used car lot. "The shop will offer all kinds of ice cream and be a family place. There will also be coffee available in the mornings," said Asad.

In closing comments, Councilwoman Ashton Bishop Vargas asked if the Oak Trail speed limit would be on the next agenda? "I drove down Oak Trail. The speed limit is currently 25mph. I think 20mph would be fine. I drove 20mph and think that would help the residents," said Vargas.

The council just gave a consensus to change the speed limit signs to 20mph on Oak Trail, as soon as it can be done.

Also, Council President Ken Bass asked if anyone else wanted to speak? At that time eight or more of the group spoke at the podium concerning the market manager Mariah Luster about her character and her concerns for each vendor and her love for community.

Mayor Randy Knagge advised the group that the council and WNHS will get together and try to work this out quickly for both markets.

The next meeting of the council will be Monday, May 20 at 7 p.m.









Presidential Primary Post-Election Audit

Nassau County Supervisor of Elections Janet H. Adkins shared the Post Election Audit results from the March 19, 2024, Presidential Preference Primary. On Wednesday, April 3, the Nassau County Canvassing Board met to certify the results of the Post Election Audit. The audit was completed with 100% accuracy, and the results can be viewed at Audit Results.pdf (cdn-website.com).

Pursuant to F.S. 101.591, "An automated audit shall consist of a public automated tally of the votes cast across every race that appears on the ballot. The tally sheet shall include election day, vote-by-mail, early voting, provisional, and overseas ballots in at least 20 percent of the precincts chosen at random by the county canvassing board or the local board responsible for certifying the election."

The Independent Audit system allows Nassau County to exceed the 20% audit requirement. Nassau County conducts an audit of all precincts, all ballots, and

Once the ballots have been processed in the tabulation system, they are separately scanned into the Independent Audit equipment. The Canvassing Board then compares the results from the two systems. "Our office strives to build trust with voters and ensure an accurate election. We can achieve that by surpassing statutory requirements and completing 100% audit of all precincts," said Adkins.
