Unlocking Clues, One Card at a Time

Florida Launches "Playing Cards for Justice" to Crack Cold Case Homicides



In a groundbreaking collaborative effort, the Florida Sheriffs Association President Sheriff Bill Leeper joined forces with Florida Attorney General Ashley Moody, Hillsborough County Sheriff Chad Chronister, the President of the Florida Association of Crime Stoppers (FACS) Frank Brunner, and the Florida Department of Law Enforcement in Tampa on Monday to unveil the "Cold Case Homicide Playing Cards" initiative.

This innovative program aims to leverage the power of community engagement and law enforcement support to bring long-awaited justice to victims and closure to their families. Funded by generous grants from the Crime Stoppers Trust Fund and the FSA's Criminal Apprehension Assistance Program, decks of playing cards

featuring unsolved homicide cases will be distributed across county jails and correctional facilities throughout Florida.

Each card in these unique decks of cards feature a photograph of a victim and details of an unresolved homicide case, transforming a simple recreational item into a powerful tool for seeking justice. By placing these cards in the hands of inmates, authorities hope to spark crucial conversations, jog memories, and generate valuable leads that could finally break open cases that have remained unsolved for years, even decades.

The FSA's Criminal Apprehension Assistance Program was specifically designed to aid sheriffs' offices in investigating violent crimes, heinous acts, and high-profile cases where leads are scarce. In such circumstances, rapid identification and apprehension of offenders are critical due to the gravity of the crimes involved. "We are immensely honored to partner with Crime Stoppers on this initiative," said Sheriff Bill Leeper. "Together, we are turning playing cards into catalysts for justice. Each card represents a life lost, a family in mourning, and a community seeking answers. By placing these cards in correctional facilities, we're not just distributing games; we're distributing hope."

Every cold case solved brings closure to grieving families, removes dangerous individuals from our streets, and sends a resounding message: in Florida, justice may be delayed, but it will never be denied. The FSA and its partners are committed to making a meaningful impact in this pursuit of justice, one playing card at a time.



Callahan Burger King Just Repaired

The Callahan Town Council met Monday night for their final meeting of June. The first order of business was to discuss the town's comprehensive plan that was recently updated due to a Senate Bill passed by Governor Ron DeSantis. The updates included changes to: the development of Affordable Housing; Resiliency Facility allowing for the use of natural gas for the town water supply during a system outage or natural disaster; Town Water Supply Facility Work Plan, the plan was updated to comply with the recent Regional Water Supply Plan; and Private Property Rights Elements, the town will seek to include this element in its Comprehensive Plan.

The final order of business was replacement window estimates for both Town Hall and the Fire Station. "These are quotes from Window World, who provided a couple windows a few years ago," said Town Manager Mike Williams. "There will be 7 windows replaced in the Town Hall building; and 8 windows in the Fire Station. All of the windows are in rough shape. The total cost is \$16,190 for all."

The council approved the purchase and installation of new windows.

In closing comments, Councilman Matt Davis asked, "What is going on with Burger King? Are they planning on reopening?"

"Repairs were being made on the Burger King building only. Currently there are no plans to reopen the business," said Williams. "At this point, I think it is bank owned."

"Could we contact them about maintaining the area? Like mowing the grass," asked Councilwoman Janet Shaw. "It looks horrible around there."

"We'll have our Code Enforcement person to contact them about the maintenance," added Williams.

The next meeting of the council will be Monday, July 15 at 7 p.m. due to the July 4th holiday.
