D-DAY: June 6, 1944

Editor's note: Ms. Magna Hull is a Hilliard resident and lived through and witnessed D-Day. She is a true American and so thankful for that day. Her vivid memories of those days follow. Magna Hull

I remember the day very well. It came 4 years after the Germans had invaded Belgium on May 28, 1940.

After the brutal invasion and occupation of Poland in 1939, the people in Western Europe (France, Holland, Belgium and Luxembourg) anticipated Hitler's attack. It was only a matter of time and preparations for the coming war began. As most still remembered the starvation and hardships during the German occupation of the 1914-1918 war, stockpiling of basic survival needs began. We gathered foods like rice, green coffee, grains, wine, chocolate, condensed milk, and other basic items like blankets, towels, knitting yarn and sewing materials.

D-DAY could not have come soon enough. We had run out of everything. The occupation had taken its toll. Grandma was shot by the SS near our front door; she had wandered off after curfew. My older brother was in hiding from the Gestapo; they had unsuccessfully tried to round him up for forced labor in German factories. Dad had been gone for over a year after his arrest by the SS for his "underground

activities." Luckily he had escaped from a train destined for Germany. Our two cats had disappeared - most likely stolen for food.


D-DAY news came to us from the London BBC. Our government-owned radio station was managed by the Nazis. There was a lot of German propaganda, including speeches by Hitler himself. He had that mad shrilly voice which prompted us to name our yapping dog after him. We had no radio news from anywhere else as the technology to transmit over long distances did not exist. However, in 1941 the BBC was able to transmit from offshore locations. The Nazis promptly confiscated all radios which was easy to do since we paid a radio license tax. One of my brothers built a secret galena stone radio system and that is how we had daily news from the BBC and the announcement of the D-DAY invasion.

On D-DAY we celebrated with some of our remaining supplies and what we raised ourselves. We feasted on rabbit, carrots, rice, canned peaches and mom brewed the last of the coffee.

Although liberation did not come until February 1945, there were immediate changes: The Nazis dug up their dead for repatriation to Germany. The local SS Kommandatur offices were vacated; it allowed us to be outside after

The Town of Callahan held a workshop prior to their regular meeting Monday night concerning garbage costs for the upcoming fiscal years 2019-2022. No residents attended the meeting to address their likes or dislikes concerning garbage pick-up within the town limits. Town residents' garbage fee is added to their water bills each month. The town has a franchise agreement within the town limits for one company to handle the garbage pickup.

Formerly, the agreement was for both

residential and commercial. The new franchise will only be for residential pickup; commercial accounts will be responsible for their own garbage.

For numerous years, Advanced Disposal has held the franchise agreement with the town. Three bids were received for the franchise: Advanced Disposal; Meridian Waste; and Waste Pro. The council will make a decision on the bid winner possibly at the next meeting and residents will just have to accept the choice they make.

Marinated Grilled Shrimp

- 3 cloves garlic, minced 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
 - 2 lbs. fresh shrimp, peeled and deveined

In a large bowl, stir together the garlic, olive oil, tomato sauce, and red wine vinegar. Season with basil, salt, and cayenne pepper. Add shrimp to the bowl, and stir until evenly coated. Cover, and refrigerate for 30 minutes to 1 hour, stirring once or twice. Preheat grill for medium heat. Thread shrimp onto skewers, piercing once near the tail and once near the head. Discard marinade. Lightly oil grill grate. Cook shrimp on preheated grill for 2 to 3 minutes per side, or until opaque.

Husband and Wife Arrested for Sexual Assault of a Minor

On May 21, 2019, NCSO received information from the Department of Children and Families (DCF) Child Protection Team of a complaint and subsequent interview of a minor female, over the age of 12 and under the age of 18, that she was being forced to drink alcoholic

beverages and made to have unlawful sexual conduct with an adult male member of her family and his wife on multiple occasions between December 2018 and April 2019.

On May 29, 2019, an NCSO Detective interviewed both male and female suspects independently at the Nassau County Sheriff's Office. Both suspects were arrested immediately after the interview for unlawful sexual



conduct on a minor child and booked into the Nassau County Jail.

Aurthur Brian Hastings, 29, from Yulee, was charged with Sexual Battery on a Minor Child over the age of 12 and under the age of 18; Incest; and Contributing to the Delinquency of a

Minor.

Danielle Alyse Kirchenbauer, 29, from Yulee, was charged with Sexual Battery on a Minor Child over the age of 12 and under the age of 18; and Contributing to the Delinquency of a Minor.

Kirchenbauer had been a 911 Call Taker for Nassau County since April 2018, prior to her termination subsequent to her arrest.

Don't Arque, Simply Tell Your Story

Those of us who know Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior enjoy a rich relationship that affects every part of our lives. We know we are in a relationship with a creator who loves and cares for us. We desire to share Jesus with others so they can have what we have. Sometimes, even out of the greatest of intensions, our sharing can look more like arguing. I wonder if the Apostle Peter had this in mind when he wrote, "...Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do

this with gentleness and respect." 1 Peter 3:15, NIV.

I would caution the enthusiastic apologist/evangelist not to argue. We have all seen it on Facebook where a well-intentioned Christian gets downright ugly defending their view on an issue. It never works out well, no one changes their mind or position, and no fruit comes out of it. The old saying rings true: "If you can argue someone into the Kingdom of God, someone else will be able to argue them out." In sharing Christ, we are not merely imparting knowledge (although we must be knowledgeable about what we believe) we are proclaiming Jesus with the hope of bringing others to an experience with God.

So how do we do that? One way that rarely leads to an argument is sharing the experience we have had with Christ. It is the one we know best. It also leaves little room to get into an argument. When you are sharing what God has done in your life, very few will argue, "No he didn't." It allows us to approach people the way 1 Peter instructs us to, "with gentleness and respect."

Keep in mind, Jesus did not instruct us to convince, persuade, or argue people into His Kingdom; He told us to, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation." Mark 16:15, NIV.

We are called to proclaim. "The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free." Luke 4:18, NIV. "We proclaim him, admonishing and teaching everyone with all wisdom, so that we may present everyone fully mature in Christ." Colossians 1:28, NIV. But what does it say? "The word is near you; it is in your mouth and in your heart," that is, the message concerning faith that we proclaim:" Romans 10:8, NIV.

"We proclaim to you what we have seen and heard, so that you also may have fellowship with us. And our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son, Jesus Christ." 1 John 1:3, NIV. "For I have not hesitated to proclaim to you the whole will of God." Acts 20:27 NIV.

Property Values Reach Record Levels

The Nassau County Property Appraiser's Office released the 2019 estimated preliminary market values showing an increase once again for all taxing authorities.

According to Property Appraiser Mike Hickox, the real estate market in Nassau County continued to steadily increase in value due to strong demand and limited supply in most market segments. Hickox said, "The total market value for the County has reached a new record high and the taxable value has also surpassed any previous year in Nassau County. This includes a continuation of new commercial and residential construction projects completed during 2018. Overall the market is stable to increasing but showing signs of cooling off some in 2019 due to increased inventory levels."

Nearly 28% of the total \$1 billion market value increase from the previous year was a result of new construction completed last year and a second year in a row of adding over \$250 million to the countywide taxable value. The 2019 total market value for Nassau County is now a record \$14 billion, up over 7.5% from the previous year. The market value includes all property before any exemptions, classification reductions or capped assessments.

Hickox presented the 2019 estimated values to the taxing authorities on May 29, so they can begin their budget process using actual values in place of the less accurate State Revenue Estimating Conference figures. They will use the values to help determine their tax rate for the property owners in Nassau County later this summer.

Although taxable values have increased countywide, many property owners are protected by the Save Our Homes (SOH) amendment which caps the amount the assessed value can increase. "Homestead properties can increase no more than 3%, or the consumer price index (CPI), whichever is lower," said Hickox. "Based on the CPI used for 2019, previously homesteaded properties will increase no more than 1.9% this year." Nonhomesteaded properties are capped at

In 2019, Nassau County's taxable value is estimated to be about \$9.2 billion, up about 8.5% compared to last

The City of Fernandina is projected to see an increase of 10%, bringing their taxable value to above \$2.4 billion.

The Town of Callahan is estimated to have an increase in their taxable value to over \$98 million, up by over 3.5% from last year.

The Town of Hilliard is expected to see about a 6.5% increase in taxable value, bringing their value to slightly over \$99 million.

The official preliminary tax roll is expected to be released to the taxing authorities and the Department of Revenue by July 1st. Property owners are encouraged to visit the property appraiser's website, www.nassauflpa. com, in mid-July to view their 2019 property values.

The Callahan Town Council met Monday night for their first regular meeting of June. Mr. Milton Locklear, representing the North Florida Transportation Planning Organization, approached the podium. "I appreciate the council's time, as I know I was not on the agenda tonight. I have four projects to tell you about tonight," said Locklear. The projects included: Dyal Road, planning stages to do Road Reconstruction from US Highway 1 to Cottonmouth Lane in 2020; River Road (CR 115) from US Highway 1 to CR 121, 10.952 miles, Pave Shoulders, 2019-2022, cost \$233,476; US 301 & SR 200 from Overpass to Stratton Road, Resurfacing, .759 of a mile, FDOT, 2019/20 (currently being done), cost \$20,520; and SR 200 from Stratton Road to Griffin Road, 6.130 miles, FDOT, Resurfacing, 2019-2022, cost \$13,322,098. "Again, thank you for your time," added Locklear.

The first order of business was first reading on Ordinance 2019-O04 which concerned to repeal and replace Chapter 190 of the Callahan Code by removing outdated provisions, updating fees, updating connection requirements and

updating superseded language. The council approved the ordinance

The next item was also first reading Ordinance 2019-O05 which concerned changes to Chapter 195 in the Callahan Code concerning Zoning. The council approved the ordinance.

The following item concerned Resolution 2019-R13. This resolution concerned a donation of \$500 for the Backpack Giveaway Day, sponsored by Second Baptist Church. The council approved the \$500 donation. The Backpack Giveaway Day will be held Saturday, July 20 from 10 a.m. - noon at West Nassau High School in the bus drop off sidewalks. There will be stuffed backpacks for every age group and the students must be present to receive a backpack. There will also be bounce houses and other giveaways!

In closing comments, Council President Ken Bass advised the council that he talked with FDOT workers as they placed new eye level school zone signs on US 301. "We've wanted these for a long time! I was happy to see them," said Bass.

sunset. We said goodbye to our coal potbelly stove as the gas lines had been reconnected.

We could gather outside in groups of more than four. This had been a problem for our large family going to church. We had to walk in two groups. The "fat" collaborators were on the move to Germany. Everyone was skinny during the war except the

collaborators. The SS rewarded them with extra ration stamps and plenty of food.

The BBC kept us informed. It was extremely sad to hear that 9000 GIs had died for us on the Normandy beaches. The U.S. troop movement was proudly marked on our war map. Russia was making great strides on the Eastern front as well. The occupied territories became smaller every day. The setback, due to the von Rundstedt offensive in the Ardennes during Christmas of 1944, was heartbreaking. Uncle Benoit and his son had been shot by German soldiers because they had prematurely displayed the American Flag.

Then came February 4, 1945! Our church bell rang in the middle of the night. All the other bells in the bell tower had been removed by the Nazis in 1943 to make ammunition. Anyway, the next morning, GIs on top of monster tanks came rolling in. It was overwhelming. There was dancing in the streets. Some people cried.

For us the war was over and things got better every day. We had electricity and water after dark. Radio stations came back on line. Grocery items began



to flow. After a couple of weeks even tropical fruits arrived. I recall eating my first banana; as I was a toddler when the war broke out, I did not remember how to eat bananas so I took a bite and did not like it. I had left the peel on.

The next few months were like a dream. Dad came home; other than some scars he seemed fine. He celebrated with Champagne and a Cuban cigar. My brother was home 3 weeks later.

The U.S. Army set up a post in a nearby meadow. That was the place where the GIs came for rest and recreation after being relieved from the front lines. They invited visitors. They had even started a soup-kitchen. They played cards and a game called "baseball." We would hang out to listen to the radio. Bing Crosby and the Andrew Sisters were favorites.

Today and every year on June 6, I remember that day 75 years ago, when my family was saved from the brutal Nazi occupation. It is not a Memorial Day shopping spree but a day of remembrance and to be thankful to the American Veterans and pay tribute to thousands of American soldiers whom had perished for my freedom.







FLAG DAY...June 14 Part 1

What is Flag Day? Each year on June 14, we celebrate the birthday of the Stars and Stripes, which came into being on June 14, 1777. At that time, the Second Continental Congress authorized a new flag to symbolize the new Nation, the United States of America.

The Stars and Stripes first flew in a Flag Day celebration in Hartford, Connecticut

in 1861, during the first summer of the Civil War. The first national observance of Flag Day occurred June 14, 1877, the centennial of the original flag resolution. In 1916, President Woodrow

Wilson issued a proclamation calling for a nationwide observance of Flag Day on June 14. It was not until 1949 that Congress made this day a permanent observance by resolving "That the 14th day of June of each year, is hereby designated as Flag Day..." The measure was signed into law by President Harry Truman.

The United States Flag Code, first adopted in 1923, prescribed flag etiquette for a variety of circumstances ensuring that our national symbol is treated properly. A few minor changes were made a year later during the Flag Day 1924 Conference. On June 22, 1942, Congress passed a joint resolution which was amended on December 22, 1942 to become Public Law. Exact rules for use and display of the flag as well as associated sections, conduct during playing of the National Anthem, the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag and Manner of Delivery were included.

"I Pledge Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God Indivisible with Liberty and Justice for All." The Pledge of Allegiance received official recognition by Congress in an Act approved on June 22, 1942. However, the pledge was first published in 1892 in the Youth's Companion magazine in Boston, Massachusetts to celebrate the 400th Anniversary of the discovery of America, and was first used in public schools to celebrate Columbus Day on October 12, 1892.

In its original version, the pledge read "my flag" instead of the "flag

"my flag" instead of the "flag of the United States." The change in the wording was adopted by the National Flag Conference in 1923. The rationale for the change was that it prevented ambiguity

among foreign-born children and adults who might have the flag of their native land in mind when reciting the pledge.

The phrase "under God" was added to the pledge by a Congressional act approved on June 14, 1954. At that time, President Eisenhower said: "In this way we are reaffirming the transcendence of religious faith in America's heritage and future; in this way we shall constantly strengthen those spiritual weapons which forever will be our country's most powerful resource in peace and war."

No disrespect should be shown to the flag of the United States of America; the flag should not be dipped to any person or thing. Regimental colors, State flags, and organization or institutional flags are to be dipped as a mark of honor. The US Flag should always be treated with the utmost care and respect. Remember, the flag represents a living country and, as such, is considered a living thing.

There will be a public Flag Retirement Ceremony held Friday, June 14 at 6 p.m. at Callahan Speedway.

Spotlight on Nassau Gardens

Rocky Lynn lives in Bryceville in a neighborhood where one of his dear gardening friends is living nearby, Linda Clemons. They both lived in Jacksonville years ago and moved to Nassau, as did seven other friends with children. Together, they all enjoyed being far away from the traffic and busy, noisy city. One of Rocky's favorite things is enjoying his hunting dogs, plus raising chickens, pigs and cows, and planting a special garden in his yard. He was very active with the 4-H Club for several years. After his wife passed away, friends and family came together and planted a crape myrtle in her honor at the Bryceville Community Center.



Rocky enjoys daily working in his vegetable garden. Those who grow vegetables know you must scout for insects and disease on a regular basis. He often shares the fruit of his labor with his friends and family. He calls sharing the vegetables his "heart medicine." He grows corn, bell pepper, cucumber, eggplant, yellow squash, zucchini, and three different kinds of tomatoes. Next, he wants to try his luck at planting potatoes and watermelon.

Tall stalks of corn were started in the fall and winter in his greenhouse. The smaller stalks of corn are the result of seeds planted directly in the ground. There is an advantage to starting your spring crop in greenhouses - they are protected from insects, cold and disease. Eggplant has purple flowers and zucchini has yellow flowers - a beautiful



combination. Deer come around at night and eat what they want. Rocky often sees them in the wee hours of the morning feeding. Sections of white clover will be covered with native bees and other pollinators. Chickens are busy bustling around his yard hunting for tiny insects. Some of his hens are sitting on 16 eggs soon to be hatching baby chicks. The large, healthy pig is in an area nearby. Linda feeds him cookies to make him plump. All their neighbors enjoy living in Bryceville surrounded by friends, beautiful flowers, delicious vegetables and the occasional natural Florida critter!



NCSO Arrests 16-year-old

On May 25, 2019, an armed robbery and attempted murder occurred at 35157 Goodbread Road in Callahan. Two suspects (one a runaway juvenile who lived at the address) entered the

residence and were met by the 71-yearold male homeowner, Charles Cribbs, who is the grandfather of the runaway.

One suspect pointed a .22 caliber revolver at the homeowner and then gave the weapon to the second suspect as he went into another room to search for additional weapons. A .38 caliber revolver was found and taken from the residence. The suspect holding the .22 caliber handgun then shot the homeowner in the face and both suspects left the scene in a white Chevrolet pickup truck driven by a third suspect.

The homeowner was transported to UF health in Jacksonville and was treated for his injuries.

One suspect, Pierce Nugent Cribbs, 16, from Callahan, was arrested for Attempted Murder and Armed Robbery. He was booked into the Nassau County Jail and subsequently taken to Juvenile Detention in Jacksonville.

The Nassau County Sheriff's Office had an active warrant for Joshua Levi Carroll, who is the suspected shooter involved in the attempted murder incident that occurred on May 25, 2019, at 35157 Goodbread Road in Callahan. Joshua Carroll was wanted for: Attempted Murder and Armed Robbery. He is from Nassau County but does NOT own a validle.

Monday, June 3, 2019, the Westside Journal received this report from the Nassau County Sheriff's Office: Carroll turned himself in to the Decatur Police

Department in Decatur, Alabama on Friday, May 31, 2019 around 7 p.m. and booked into the Morgan County Jail on the outstanding warrant. He will be transported back to Nassau County.

Q: I found these tiny, white cotton clumps on blades of grass in my yard. What are they? JC

A: I appreciate you bringing in a sample which made it much easier to identify. These are the eggs of the Fall armyworm, Spodoptera frugiperda. The number of eggs per mass varies considerably but is often 100 to 200, and total egg production per female averages about 1,500 with a maximum of over 2,000. Duration of the egg stage is only two to three days during the summer months. Young larvae are greenish with

a black head. The face of the mature larva is also marked with a white inverted "Y." Larvae tend to conceal



themselves during the brightest time of the day. Duration of the larval stage tends to be about 14 days during the summer and 30 days during cool weather. Larval feeding occurs uniformly in groups over larger areas, rather than in patches. Caterpillars first skeletonize the grass blades and later create bare spots in the lawn. This species seemingly displays a very wide host range, with over 80 plants recorded, but clearly prefers grasses. Other crops sometimes injured are apple, grape, orange, peach, strawberry and several flowers. Weeds known to serve as hosts include bentgrass, crabgrass, Johnson grass, morning glory, nutsedge, pigweed, and sandspur. The predators of fall armyworm are general predators attacking many other caterpillars. Among the predators noted as important are various ground beetles, striped earwig, the spined soldier bug, and the insidious flower bug. Vertebrates such as birds, skunks, and rodents also consume larvae and pupae readily. Hand removal of the

eggs is possible but there is no chemical to control the egg stage. Treat at the first sign of damage for best results. Insecticides are more effective against younger caterpillars. Apply chemicals to lawns between May and June but do not over apply. Please read the directions on the label.

Q: I like your definition of a weed, which is simply any plant in the wrong place. So, I am not sure if this is a wildflower or a weed. I live around a retention pond and there are several patches of it. CL

A: Thank you for sending me a photo and more importantly, I am grateful you did not pull it up. Remember, wildflowers should not be pulled from their natural habitat nor should we glean the seeds. Otherwise we will be reducing future populations in their native habitat. The Forest Rangers motto is to not take anything out of the forest and do not leave anything either. We can



take all the photos we want, which is exactly what you did. Good job! This wildflower is called orange milkwort, Polygala lutea or candy

root, Polygala nana. Orange milkwort is found throughout most of Florida and a common flower here in Northeast Florida. It prefers moist soil, which explains why you see it most often around the retention pond. It is a biennial which means it has two seasons to grow the green basal leaves then put up a short (2-3 inch) flower stalk to display the bright orange flowers. There would be no missing this pretty cluster of flowers. The leaves of the orange milkweed are a medium green color and succulent.
