### **Huge Fourth of July Celebration Planned**

The Callahan Town Council met Monday night for their first meeting of June. The first part of the meeting was a presentation from Callahan resident and business owner Paul Schwend. "This year the July 4th celebration will be bigger and better. For one thing, Nassau County is celebrating 200 years this year and will be helping to fund the fireworks. The towns of Callahan and Hilliard have joined together for the past two years to fund the show, now the county will also be adding money to make the show bigger," said Schwend. "We also will be honoring Mr. Rodney Mills, also known as the Father of Southern Rock.

Rodney was in the music industry for over 60 years, as a producer, mixing and/or engineering music. Rodney and his wife Mary have lived in Nassau County for 40 years. Here's just a little playlist of songs that will be played and sang by different artists on July 4th right here in Callahan at the fairgrounds!" Schwend then played little snippets of just some of the songs Rodney had a part of. "This is going to be a fun day for our community and county," added Schwend.

"I am honored for Paul to have taken on this task," said Mills. "I've always been behind the scenes with my production and am okay with that. I was raised in Coffee County, Georgia

and worked in the fields. I told myself then, I wasn't going to do that for a living. Music has been good to me and I'm thankful for this great honor."

4th The July Celebration will be held on Thursday, July 4th this year at the NE FL Fairgrounds.

The gates will open at 4 p.m. There will be food trucks, pie baking contest, watermelon eating contest, vendors, games and much more, and of course spectacular Fireworks at dark.

The first agenda item was a concern from Mr. Micheal Benjamin, who has a house on Dixie Avenue that he has been renovating. "I currently live in Lake City until I can finish the work on my house. I would like the town to turn my lights back on for me. Also, the town is still taking money out of my account for water," said Mr. Benjamin. "You were told at that meeting, you needed to have a structural engineer to inspect your house and give you a letter of approval to live in the house. You told us then, that you would bring the letter to us. You never did."

"Ma'am, I talked to a structural engineer and they wanted lots of money to inspect my little house," added Benjamin. "I don't have that kind of money. And I'm still having money

## **Fatal Accident Claims Two**

Last Tuesday, the lives of two families were changed forever from a head-on collision on US 17 north of Yulee. According to Florida Highway Patrol reports, around 6:40 p.m. a Dodge Ram pick-up truck, driven by a 58-year-

old Fernandina Beach man, was traveling north of US Highway 17, north of Quail Ridge Road. A 2018 Kia Sportage, driven by Charles Cribbs, 53, of Hilliard, was traveling south on US Highway 17, with his wife Denise, 48, as a passenger. The driver of the Dodge pick-up

failed to maintain control of his vehicle, which caused his vehicle to enter the southbound lane and into the direct path of the Kia Sportage. The front of the Dodge collided with the front of Kia.

After the impact occurred, the Dodge went over the concrete wall and fell to its final rest. The Kia came to final rest, facing east, in the southbound travel lane. The driver of the Dodge and the passenger of the Kia, Denise, were pronounced deceased at the scene. The driver of the Kia, Charles, was taken to UF Health with serious injuries.

Charles and Denise Cribbs are both well known throughout the towns of Callahan and Hilliard. Denise has been a hair stylist for many years and has built up her clientele to a huge group of people that have grown to be dear friends. She recently opened her own salon in Hilliard, Lovely You Beauty Parlour. All the salons in both towns



were shattered to hear the news of Denise's passing. She was a stylist that not only did an amazing job with cuts and styles but also took time to enjoy her customers by always listening and caring about their lives. That included not only women, but also men and lots of children.





In closing comments, Councilwoman Janet Shaw advised the council about getting a cost on some upgraded cameras for Ewing Park. "I know we have discussed it but I think we need make a decision about it," said Shaw.

"I think this is more of a public safety issue and we need to have better cameras," said Councilwoman Jacquelyn Fleming. "We want to people to be able to enjoy the park, safely."

"Currently, we are spending \$900 per week for Nassau County deputies to patrol three days a week," said Gugliuzza. "We can't continue to do that." The council agreed to move forward on getting prices for better cameras for Ewing Park.

The next council meeting will be held Monday, June 20 at 7 p.m.

**Tasty Onion Chicken** 

1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce 1 teaspoon ground mustard

1 can (2.8 oz.) French-fried onions, crushed 4 boneless skinless chicken breast halves (4 oz. each)

In a shallow bowl, combine butter, Worcestershire sauce and mustard. Place onions in another shallow bowl. Dip chicken in butter mixture, then coat with onions. Place chicken in a greased 11"x7". baking dish; drizzle with remaining butter mixture. Bake, uncovered at 400° for 20-25 minutes or until an internal thermometer reads 165°.







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### Citizens for a Better Nassau County **Releases Updated Study**

Citizens for a Better Nassau County released an updated study, performed by the real estate economics consulting firm RCLCO, that reexamines Nassau County's fiscal sustainability. The original study, which was commissioned by Citizens for a Better Nassau County back in 2016, showed that Nassau County was facing long-term fiscal sustainability issues.

Specifically, the 2016 study found that the county's tax base was much more dependent on its residential tax base than surrounding counties, counties of a similar size and to Florida as a whole. It also showed that the anemic growth in industrial and commercial land use development had created a much greater reliance on residential property taxes to fund the county government and that a lack of higher value industrial and commercial development had contributed to the one-mill property tax increase that had happened at that time. "We're excited to be releasing an updated study that shows where Nassau County is today," said Bill Gingrich, a retired GE executive and the chairman of Citizens for a Better Nassau County. "The 2016 study stressed the need for the county to diversify and broaden its tax base and decrease its dependence on residential property taxes to fund all government services, in order to become more fiscally sustainable, and we wanted to see if the county has made any progress toward doing so."

Over the past two years, Citizens for a Better Nassau County has detailed the concerted effort that Nassau County has made to address its fiscal sustainability, which has included the following: Shifting historic development patterns to higher quality and more compact, mixed-use community developments to minimize the impacts of inevitable population growth while encouraging non-residential land uses and economic development to strengthen tax rolls; Right-sizing impact fees paid by builders after many years of mismanagement; Developing and executing fully funded capital improvement plans, resulting in new fire houses, parks and infrastructure improvements across the county; Implementing multi-year budgetary practices; All while maintaining low millage rates.

"We wanted to know if all this work by our county commission had paid off, and the updated study shows that it has and that what they are doing is moving the needle in the right direction," said Gingrich.

The updated study found the following: While Nassau County still remains more reliant on residential development than other counties in the state and the region, the county has seen an increase in retail and office development, which has helped to create a more diverse tax base; Office occupancies are also strong relative to more urban areas, insulating the county budget somewhat from declining office property values seen in other parts of the country; and In turn, millage rates have declined modestly since 2016, in part due to the support of a growing tax base.

All commercial development industrial, retail and office - increases fiscal strength more than residential uses do, with 25 acres of retail generating over 26 times the net fiscal impact of 25 acres of single family residential. This means that additional commercial development in Nassau County will enable the county to continue to maintain its low millage rates. "While the industrial development that is needed to further diversify the tax base hasn't borne out yet in the current economy with high uncertainty, development costs and interest rates, the county is now well positioned for it," said Gingrich. "The county now has the means to do so, as both the Crawford Diamond, southwest of Callahan, and the Wildlight Commerce Park are ready for development. Diversifying our local economy and tax base benefits everyone, creating an economy more resilient to future economic downturn, high-wage jobs for current and future generations of citizens, lower residential property taxes, a higher quality of life and a more fiscally sustainable county," continued Gingrich. "Our county commissioners and staff deserve a lot of recognition for helping to get our county on the right fiscal path. We hope they keep up the great work!"

### Importance of a Blood Clot Surveillance System

You may not be aware of the true threat posed by blood clots ... but you should be. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, an estimated 900,000 families are affected by blood clots each year and 100,000 of them have

suffered a death as a result. Florida may be at the forefront of a breakthrough by becoming the first state in the nation to introduce a blood clot surveillance system. Floridians are generally unaware of not only their risk of developing blood clots but also the lifesaving steps they can take to prevent them. A survey of Floridians last year showed that of those who were aware they had a blood clot risk factor, fewer than 1 in 5 said their doctor talked to them about a prevention plan. The effort to track blood clots will be championed by the policy workgroup established under the Emily Adkins Prevention Act, a Florida law inspired by our nonprofit foundation, Emily's Promise, dedicated to honoring the life of our daughter who died of a blood clot. The workgroup consists of lawmakers, medical experts, and blood clot survivors working hard to see this surveillance system come to life.

The steps to build and implement a statewide blood clot surveillance



system have been identified by the policy workgroup as: 1. Develop case definitions; 2. Identify indicators and data sources; 3. Identify partners to undertake Collect, surveillance; 4. analyze, and disseminate data and findings; 5. Evaluate the system and its impact on

Venous thromboembolism (condition caused by blood clots). By establishing a surveillance system, Florida would lead the nation in establishing a tool to let health care providers obtain valuable data from various sources, including hospitals, research institutions, and clinics. This data would further advance knowledge of trends, risk factors, outcomes related to blood clots, and available resources to address such outcomes effectively. Additionally, by tracking such information, we may be able to see and track a reduction in blood clots as awareness efforts expand.

Executing this tool will save lives, protect public health, drive research and innovation in the medical field, and transform preventive medicine and patient care. It's time to recognize the urgency of implementing such a system and put it into action now for the sake of those who will be affected by the silent threat, and potentially life-altering heartache, of clot-related conditions.



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### Nassau County School Millage Update!

Thanks to the voters of Nassau County, the millage funds are helping to enhance Employee Compensation, Arts, Athletics, and Security across all our schools. Millage revenues are being divided between the four areas of Employee Compensation, Safety, Arts, and Athletics: 70% - Compensation, 12% - Safety, Health, Intervention and Prevention, 9% - Arts and 9% -Athletics.

Enhancing athletics in our schools, the Nassau County School District recently completed the first weight room. They began refurbishments

at Hilliard Middle-Senior High School, which was in dire need. They are not stopping there. Along with weight room refurbishments, funds are also being used for full-time athletic





trainers at all four high schools, new equipment for all middle and high

rubberized surfaces at all four high and quality enhancements and upgrades to athletic fields. Renovations are already in progress at our other high schools!

In an effort to keep our students and staff safe, NCSD has implemented the purchase of the Centegix mobile panic alarm system, access control for all schools, new video surveillance walk-through equipment, metal detectors, new police radios, and the addition of a technician specializing in security equipment operation, installation, and maintenance.

In order to enhance Fine Arts in our schools, for the first time in many years, we will have art teachers in each of our nine elementary schools. Our middle





schools, track refurbishments with

and high schools will receive funds to purchase new equipment, instruments, and materials for all of their fine arts programs, including band, drama, chorus, and visual arts.

Nassau County School District teachers and support personnel are also benefiting from the millage. Revenue generated by the one mill has allowed teachers to receive supplements ranging from \$2,000.00 to \$10,000.00 based on years of experience. The supplement amounts were determined through union negotiations and a teacher vote of approval. Over the past three years, state funding has been targeted at increasing beginning teacher pay while veteran teachers' pay has remained stagnant. The one mill has allowed our veteran teachers to receive a welldeserved and overdue boost in pay. Our support personnel, including bus drivers, custodians, paraprofessionals, food service workers, maintenance workers, and clerical staff, provide a range of services that contribute to the school district's success. The millage provided salary supplements for all of these employees. The supplement amount was determined through union negotiations and an employee vote of approval. This will continue to support us in our recruitment and retention efforts.




event. "We are extremely grateful to FPL for partnering with us, making sure that our seniors can be sustained in the

The U.S. EAC opened submissions for its Clearinghouse Awards this past February, and applications were submitted nationwide. Thirty-two entries, including four entries from Nassau County, were recognized. "We strive daily to build trust and transparency and to improve communication with voters. A public office is a public trust and everything we do is built on increasing public trust in Nassau County elections. This national recognition is evidence of the dedication and commitment to excellence that our team puts forward for Nassau County voters," said Supervisor Janet H. Adkins.

The United States Election Assistance Commission commends Nassau County for sending voters text messages and emails reminding them of early voting and election day, including a picture of their polling location. This initiative was awarded the Distinguished Voter Education and Communication Initiatives category for the Mass Messaging sent out during election time. twice in the Outstanding Innovations category. The first recognition is for our website's chatbot which allows voters to quickly get information by submitting a chat request. Our office then contacts the voter after researching the request. The second recognition is for our new Precinct Management app, which allows our office to improve communication with election workers at the polls during early voting and on election day.

Election workers are at the heart of our office, which makes the final recognition even more meaningful: Recognition for best practices in recruiting, retaining, and training poll workers. With the implementation of the ROAR (Recruit, Orientation, Assign, and Retain) program, we have nearly doubled our election worker pool, expanded the number of positions to improve workflow, and trained a record number of election workers for the 2024 Presidential Preference Primary. Building a culture where election workers want to be a longstanding part of our Election Team is a win-win for our voters and community. 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
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#### **KATHERINE ANN BURCH**



### Yellow-Legged Hornet with a Dangerous Sting

On August 9, 2023, the U.S. Department of Agriculture confirmed the detection of yellow-legged hornet in Savannah, Georgia. This hornet is a pest of honey bees and, if established, has the potential to significantly impact Florida's vast apiary industry, which provides not only honey but pollination services all over the country. In response to this find, the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services' Division of Plant Industry (FDACS-DPI) formed the Florida Taskforce for the Yellow-Legged Hornet. This taskforce was formed to develop safeguarding strategies should this pest be found in Florida. The sting from this



particular hornet can be dangerous. Should you be stung and seek medical attention, try to bring the dead hornet with you to the doctor or emergency room if you have to go.

taskforce visited the current eradication program in Savannah to participate in ongoing eradication efforts by the Georgia Department of Agriculture and collaborate with personnel to begin developing emergency response protocols to implement in the event of an introduction of this pest into Florida.

The yellow-legged hornet belongs to the subfamily Vespinae, which includes yellow jackets and hornets. This group can generally be identified by the combination of two characteristics: the wings are longitudinally folded at rest, and the anterior end of the abdomen has a blocky shape. In Florida, there are three native species of Vespinae: the southern yellow jacket, the eastern yellow jacket, and the bald-faced hornet. In some cases, the color forms of some species of vespine wasps can be variable. Vespa velutina exhibits significant color variation in its native distribution. Yellow-legged hornets are large, about 1 inch long, including queens and workers.

The yellow-legged hornet builds paper nests in trees, shrubs and humanmade structures. Nests are egg-shaped and similar in appearance to nests of the bald-faced hornet. Colonies have an annual cycle and each spring a single queen will start a nest from scratch. The nests grow rapidly during the warmer months and at the end of season new queen's mate and disperse. This makes locating and destroying nests prior to the dispersal of potential foundresses a priority.



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As the county experiences rapid growth, voters in Yulee, Wildlight, Callahan, Hilliard, Bryceville, and off-island Fernandina Beach will soon decide whether to expand the TDT user fee.
