

NCSO Warns of Bitcoin and Cryptocurrency Scam Alert



BITCOIN AND CURRENCY SCAM ALERT



The Nassau County Sheriff's Office has observed an increase in Bitcoin-related scams. These scams often involve impersonation of law enforcement officers. Scammers call victims, claiming to be from local law enforcement agencies. They target individuals with publicly available professional certifications or licenses (healthcare, insurance, real estate, etc.). Scammers use names of actual officers from agencies like Jacksonville Sheriff's Office and Nassau County Sheriff's Office.

The scam typically includes false warrant claims. Victims are told they have an outstanding warrant. Scammers then demand payment of a "bond" to avoid arrest. Cryptocurrency payment demands are a key feature of these scams. Victims are directed to use CoinMe Machines (often found in CoinStar kiosks) or other cryptocurrency ATMs. Scammers provide a phone number for victims to enter into the machine. Victims are instructed to deposit cash, which is converted to cryptocurrency.

agency will ever request payment via cryptocurrency or standalone machines in businesses. Be cautious when asked to pay using Bitcoin, Ethereum, Dogecoin, Litecoin, or other cryptocurrencies. Exercise caution when using CoinMe, Bitcoin Depot, Coinsource ATM, LibertyX ATM, and other cryptocurrency ATMs. Be wary of requests to pay bills using gift cards, QR codes, Cash App, or Venmo.

If You Receive a Warrant Call: Hang up immediately. Contact your local law enforcement agency directly to verify the claim.

WNHS Selected to Host Smithsonian Exhibition

Humanities, Florida in partnership with the Smithsonian Institution's Traveling Exhibition Service (SITES), has

launched a new exhibition partnership program, "Exhibition Starter Kit: FOOD" and selected the West Nassau Historical Society as an inaugural recipient. In total, eight nonprofit organizations received funding from Florida Humanities in June 2024 to create exhibitions that capture and share local narratives on food, utilizing templated resources as well as virtual and in-person support from the Smithsonian Institution.

Exhibition Starter Kits provide a Smithsonian-developed framework to guide selected venues through the development of local humanities-based exhibitions using their own collections and cultural content. While working on their exhibition project, funded venues will receive guidance from the Smithsonian on how to design and develop compelling exhibitions that highlight their local history and culture through the lens of food. By incorporating local elements directly into the

exhibition, each installation will be unique while broadly addressing the same national themes curated by the Smithsonian.

All sites have received initial funding of \$5,000 from Florida Humanities to work with the Smithsonian over the next year to create their exhibition script, collect physical objects such as artifacts and images to accompany their exhibition, and design an exhibition floor plan. Exhibitions will then be fabricated and installed at each venue in early 2026 with additional support provided by Florida Humanities.





"Exhibition Starter Kits give small museums a great opportunity to use a Smithsonian framework that gives national context to local exhibitions," said Carol Harsh, Director, Smithsonian Institution Museum on Main Street program. "Florida Humanities contributes state-specific resources and scholarship, which adds an even richer training opportunity for host organizations to bring out the unique local flavors of each community."

Callahan Town News

The Callahan Town Council met Monday night for their first and final meeting of July, due to the July 4th holiday. The first order of business was to discuss and set the tentative millage rate for Fiscal Year 2024-2025. Last year, the towns gross taxable value was \$162,822,128.00 with a millage rate of 1.8504. This year the town's taxable value was \$169,128,017.00 with a rolled-back millage rate of 1.7814. Town Manager Mike Williams advised the council that the tentative millage rate could be set however the council would be able to lower the rate prior to the final but not make it any higher. Williams also advised the council to choose the rolled-back rate (1.7814), as the town did well at that rate.

Councilman Matt Davis made a motion to set the tentative millage rate at 1.8504.

"So, we can lower the rate but we can't make it any larger before the final reading, correct?" said Councilwoman Jacquelyn Fleming.

"That's correct," added Williams.

Fleming seconded the motion to set the tentative millage at 1.8504.

In other business, Williams also advised the council that the Governor approved a bill that we must add into our Comprehensive Plan, which is Allowing



Street in Callahan. This will be a traditional debate conducted by members of the Young Republican Club. Following the debate, there will be question and

answer time with the audience.

Affordable Housing in any district (Industrial, commercial, etc.). "We will need to amend our Comp Plan to include

this language," said Williams. In closing comments, Mayor Randy Knagge thanked everyone that helped out with the Independence Day Celebration at the fairgrounds. "The event was well attended and I think everyone had a great time," said Knagge. "I've heard a few comments from residents about the parking and the mud but mostly people saying how much they enjoyed it."

Councilwoman Ashton Vargas added, "We were parked in the parking lot. There were quite a few people with large fireworks near us. I was a little frightened so my family and I moved from the area. I think it should be discussed next year that no one can bring fireworks to the event. Sparklers and firecrackers maybe, but not fireworks. A few of them really got out of hand. I'm really surprised no one got hurt."

"I'm sure the towns of Callahan and Hilliard will be meeting around January to get things going again and I'll make sure to share this with the committee," said Knagge.

The next meeting of the council will be Monday, August 5 at 7 p.m.



Jacquelyn White Retires from Tax Collector's Office



The designated parking spot is conveniently located in front of the sheriff's office, adjacent to the memorial wall. This new facility aligns with a Florida law that took effect on July 1st, requiring all Sheriff's Offices in the state to create at least one such safe exchange location. Governor Ron DeSantis signed this legislation into law in early June.

Parents can utilize this service at the sheriff's office, located at: 77151 Citizens Circle, Yulee, FL 32097. To ensure the utmost safety and security, the exchange zone is under 24/7 video



surveillance. We encourage parents and guardians to take advantage of this new resource, designed to prioritize the well-being and safety of children during custody exchanges.

NCSO Announces Arrest in Disturbing Animal Cruelty Case

Sunday, July 7, the Nassau County Sheriff's Office (NCSO) received a call about a suspect, identified as Jasmin Tedrick, 26, of Yulee, who was allegedly threatening customers and mistreating a kitten outside the main

entrance of Target in Yulee. Upon arrival, deputies reviewed the store's surveillance footage. The footage reportedly shows Ms. Tedrick grabbing a kitten from her lap and forcefully throwing it. Due to the collar and leash, the kitten's neck snapped back violently. Shortly after, Ms. Tedrick is seen throwing a cup of water at a nearby wall and repeatedly yanking the kitten's leash from side to side. "When I watched the video of this crazy person abusing this kitten it made me sick," said Sheriff Leeper.



Based on this evidence, it was determined that Ms. Tedrick intentionally inflicted unnecessary pain and suffering on the animal. Consequently, she was taken into custody

and charged with Aggravated Animal Cruelty. "We take cases of animal abuse very seriously, and cruelty to animals will not be tolerated in our community," emphasized Sheriff Leeper.

The kitten has been named Bullseye and is now in the custody of Nassau County Animal Services and receiving appropriate care.

Sheriff Leeper concluded by urging the public to report any instances of animal cruelty immediately. "Together, we can protect the vulnerable members of our community, both human and animal alike," continued Sheriff Leeper.







A 90 percent save rate is the nationally recognized benchmark to be considered "no kill," factoring that approximately 10 percent of pets who enter shelters have medical or behavioral circumstances that warrant humane euthanasia rather than killing for lack of space.

Qualifying criteria for receiving the award required the presence of a brickand mortar shelter and availability of 12 months of 2023 data as of April 2024.
