# Keep or Remove Trees on Booth Street in Callahan?

The Callahan Town Council met Monday night for their only meeting in July. Two councilwomen, Janet Shaw and Ashton Bishop Vargas, were absent. Both agenda items concerned the West Nassau Historical Society (WNHS) so John Hendricks, President, addressed the council. The first item request was permission to use the rail bed (owned by the Town) for the vendors for Hobo Day Saturday, November 6; and also for next year's Railroad Day Festival Saturday, April 2, 2022. "We do use the railroad bed for the Arts & Crafts vendor area. I know the town has designated that property for Depot Park but I just wanted to give you these dates so there will not be a problem with construction going on in that area. We have made sure to provide insurance as normal," said Hendricks. "We (WNHS) plan to use both of these events to build on our membership and sign up new members. It's time for the younger generation to step up and get involved in our history." The council granted permission for the use of the property.

The West Nassau Historical Society will also take over hosting the Callahan Christmas Parade and Craft Festival

that will be held Saturday, December 4. "We (WNHS and council) have had one workshop about this event. The first Christmas Parade was held in 1974 and has become a very popular Christmas event. The parade will continue to begin at Dixie Avenue however we need to discuss where it will end," continued Hendricks. "There were some issues last year with the end. Also, the Craft Fair will be held at the Depot railroad bed. We will also ask permission to use the rail bed for that event. Expenses to host the parade will be around \$1850 and I have a breakdown. We are hoping to have some help from the town or sponsors for the event. This could be another workshop suggestion."

The council advised the Town Manager Mike Williams to add this item to next month's meeting.

During closing comments, Councilwoman Jacquelyn Fleming asked the council, "Where do things stand on improving Booth Street?"

"I know we have talked about Booth Street and the dangers of the trees getting larger and the road getting smaller," said Fleming. "I recommend that we (council) change the road to a one way road and then it wouldn't be as dangerous as when you meet another vehicle on the road."

"I want to see the road a one way road. I think the trees are nice and probably the oldest thing in town," added Urban Fleming, Callahan resident. "I think it's a safety issue to make it one way. Thanks!"

After much discussion, Fleming made another suggestion. "Why don't we ask the residents what they would rather see? If you (residents) don't want the trees (probably about 7) to come down then the road would be repaved and turned to a one way street," said Fleming. "If you want the road to be wider and still have two-way traffic, the trees will have to come down."

Residents are encouraged to call Town Hall, 879-3801, with their thoughts about improving Booth Street (trees or no trees) or attend the next regular meeting on Monday, August 2 at 7 p.m.



# **OREMC** System Maintenance/Pole **Inspections Happening**

As part of its annual system maintenance plan, Okefenoke REMC will begin pole inspections on its distribution system in parts of Brantley County in Georgia and Nassau County in Florida. About 8,000 poles will be inspected.

In Callahan, inspections will be in the area south of Little Mills Creek, south to Ford Road in Verdie and west on River Road to County Road 121, then south to Horseshoe Circle. Inspections on Central Ave. will begin in Ware County and

move east to Hwy 121 in Hoboken/ Brantley County, then south of Hwy 82 to Randell Crews Rd.

"We wanted to give our consumermembers a heads up in these areas so they wouldn't be surprised when they saw people digging in and around poles on or near their property," explains Travis Page, OREMC operations manager. "Pole inspections are part of routine maintenance on our system to ensure its integrity and reliability. In accordance with the Public Utilities Commissions of Florida and Georgia we inspect about 10 percent of our



system each year.'

OREMC has contracted with Osmose Utility Services, LLC, to complete the inspections. Their crews will be identified as an OREMC contractor in marked trucks, ATVs (allterrain vehicles), UTVs (utility task vehicles) and on foot as they move from pole to pole on the system. They will be capturing GPS points of poles for mapping, numbering poles if necessary, conducting minor maintenance repairs such as fixing guy markers, guy wires and broken ground wire. They will also be digging around the poles to check for any structural damage or deterioration.

## Hilliard Town News

The Hilliard Town Council met Thursday night for their final regular meeting of July. The council was without two councilmen Jared Wollitz and Kenny Sims. Town Attorney Christian Waugh joined the meeting through teleconference, as he was celebrating the birth of he and his wife's first child, a daughter born on July 14. "Thank you for your prayers as they are both doing great! Happy and healthy," said Waugh.

The first order of business was First Reading and Public Hearing on Ordinance 2021-06 which concerned amending Chapter 62 Zoning and Land Development regulations of the Hilliard Town Code; amending Section 62.359, Accessory uses and structures; adding language to Subsection (a) to include a lot split by a right of way of no more than 25 feet as a contiguous lot. The council approved the ordinance on first reading. The Second Public Hearing and Final Reading will be held Thursday, August 19 at 7 p.m.

The following three items concerned the Land Use Administrator, Janis Fleet; the Code Enforcement Officer, Del Miley; and the Building Inspector Official, Bryan Higginbotham, all presenting their quarterly reports to the council. All were submitted digitally. All reports were accepted by the council without any questions or concerns.

The council recently held a joint workshop with the Planning & Zoning Board to discuss Dayspring's Common Planned Unit Development Project by Doug Adkins. The plans were not accepted as presented to each board. Prior to the meeting, Mr. Adkins had emailed Hilliard Land Use Administrator Janis Fleet requesting to meet to discuss other options for the project. The project being discussed is planned for Orange Street and West Sixth Street on 4.17 acres.

The council and Planning & Zoning also had a joint workshop on the process of making Hilliard a Golf Cart Friendly Community. The council advised Fleet to meet with Attorney Waugh to work on an ordinance for the council to discuss.

Town Clerk Lisa Purvis requested approval to set a Special Meeting Monday, July 26 at 7 p.m. to advise the Nassau County Property Appraiser of the Proposed Millage Rate, Roll-Back Rate, and date, time and meeting place of the Tentative Budget Hearing. The council approved the Special Meeting July 26.

Purvis also asked for approval of Budget Workshop dates August 5th and 19th and September 2nd and 16th at 6 p.m. The council approved the dates.

The council approved an AECOM payable for \$6,094.30 to replace RW 18-36 Edge Lighting, Signs, REILS, Wind Code and PAPIs at the Hilliard Airpark.

The council also approved the final payment to KYNEX, Inc., \$6,400, for the joint Fireworks Display with the Town of Callahan. "I was very impressed with the fireworks display this year," said Council President John Beasley. "I thought the fairgrounds was a great place to have it and there







# FDOH Recognizes UV Safety Awareness Month

The Florida Department of Health in Nassau County recognizes July as Ultraviolet (UV) Safety Awareness Month. "UV rays are an invisible kind of radiation that comes from the sun, tanning beds, and sunlamps" (CDC, 2021). This month is recognized as a reminder to protect yourself from UV rays all year to help decrease the risk of skin cancer.

According to the Skin Cancer Foundation, about 90% of nonmelanoma skin cancers are associated with exposure to UV radiation from the sun. One in five Americans will develop skin cancer by the age of 70 years. In order to reduce the risk of any disease, it is important to know the factors that can contribute to the development of the disease.

The factors that increase your skin cancer risk are: Indoor Tanning; Sunburns; Skin Type; Unprotected Exposure to UVA & UVB Rays; Genetics; Atypical Moles; Organ Transplant; and Red Hair.

The factors that can help decrease your skin cancer risk are: Daily use of broad-spectrum sunscreen with an SPF 15+ 2. Use of sunglasses, hats and sun-protective clothing; Seeking shade when possible; Protective window film in your car and home; Annual skin exams with your physician; Monthly self-exams; and A healthy diet.

Performing a Self-Exam! The American Skin Cancer Foundation recommends you perform a head-totoe self-exam once a month. If you see anything NEW, CHANGING, or UNUSUAL get checked by a physician as soon as possible. Please visit https:// www.skincancer.org/early-detection/ self-exams/ for instructions on how to perform a self-exam.

What to Look For: A growth that increases in size and appears pearly, transparent, tan, brown, black, or multicolored. A mole, birthmark or brown spot that increases in size, thickness, changes color or texture, or is bigger than a pencil eraser. A spot or sore that continues to itch, hurt, crust, scab, or bleed. An open sore that does not heal within three weeks.
